Six accidents reported during the past week

Six traffic accidents occurred in Lynn County during the past week, according to reports from the Lynn County Sheriff's Office.

Last Monday at 4:38 p.m., a caller told the Sheriff's Office that he was behind a white F-250 with a blue camper shell that was swerving on the road on US 87 near the Allsup's in O'Donnell. He said the vehicle then went off the roadway and wrecked at CR 38, with a male driver the only person in the vehicle, who appeared to be not injured.

The driver, Dwayne Lynnwood of Midland, was arrested at the scene of the accident on charges of public intoxication.

At 1:47 p.m. last Tuesday, the driver of a black F-250 reported he had been involved in a two-vehicle accident at the intersection of FM 3112 and FM 213. The other vehicle was an Aqua One truck. A deputy on the scene requested Lynn County EMS paged out for the driver of the Aqua One truck, who was complaining of pain. Both vehicles were towed from the scene.

At 6:19 a.m. last Wednesday, a woman driving a silver Volvo reported that a white Chevy single cab pickup pulled out in front of her very slowly on US 87, south of CR 11, when she lost control and hit the side of the truck. No injuries were reported.

A hit and run accident was reported in the New Home ISD parking lot at 3:30 p.m. last Wednesday. The caller reported that his K-Bar Electric truck had been struck by a gray Hummer that had left the scene.

On Friday at 6:08 p.m., a caller reported that he was involved in an accident 3 miles west of New Home on FM 211, and was unsure if he had sustained any injuries. No other information was available on this incident.

A one-vehicle rollover occurred north of O'Donnell on US 87 at 5:52 p.m. Saturday, with several people reported inside the vehicle including two infants. O'Donnell VFD first-responders arrived on scene and Lynn County EMS (See SHERIFF'S REPORT, page 6)

Helping others ... Local physical therapist treats many during medical mission trip to Peru

During the span of five days in May, one of Lynn County Hospital District's physical therapists was part of a medical mission team that provided medical assistance to more than 2500 people in Peru. Sponsored through an organization called Olive Branch Ministries, Brady Holcomb, a Physical Therapist at LCHD's PT/Fitness Center in Tahoka, joined a group comprised mainly of Lubbock Christian University students and professors and medical professionals from the Lubbock area, for the mission trip.

The medical mission portion of the trip was carried out in Arequipa, Peru in a subdivision within the city called Socabaya. The mission was a joint effort with the local church to help provide holistic care during clinic days that were held from May 20-24.

The mission team was comprised of medical doctors, nurse practitioners, two pharmacists, one dentist, and two physical therapists. There were 15 LCU students, and the rest of the group of 43 people on the trip were either medical professionals or their spouses, Holcomb explained. The remaining number in the group assisted with providing eyeglasses for reading and for vision during the

clinic days. Throughout the week, there were a vast number of people that were seen between all the medical professionals. At the end of the week, the total number of people seen between all the different areas was 2,529.

"There were a total number of 1,234 people seen for eyeglasses, 169 people seen in physical therapy, 158 people seen in dental, and 968 people seen by the medical doctors and nurse practitioners," said Holcomb.

"The whole idea of this trip was to help provide the people of the Socabaya community of Arequipa Peru with (See HELPING OTHERS, page 6)

Coaching vacancy is filled at TISD

One last coaching position for the 2019-2020 school year was filled for Tahoka ISD at the Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees meeting last Tuesday night. Trustees approved a contract for Lance Hogle as an assistant coach and high school history teacher.

In other business, trustees took action to renew a 2-year depository bid with First Bank & Trust, and approved contracting with Lynn County Hospital District for athletic training services for the upcoming school year.

Vince Vialle presented an update on the issuance of bonds for Tahoka ISD, for the \$7.5 million bond issue approved by voters in May, which will be used to build a new high school gym and other sports facilities. Trustees also reviewed plans for the new gym with Lenora Ask, representing Chapman Harvey Architects.

Monthly bills were approved, and camps administrators presented reports, among other routine business.

LisaMarie Nicole Alvarado

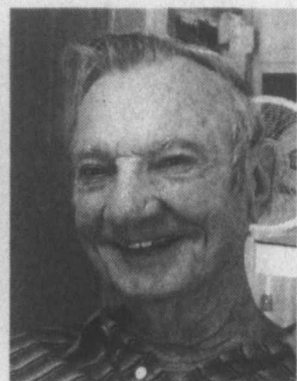

Morris Bingham

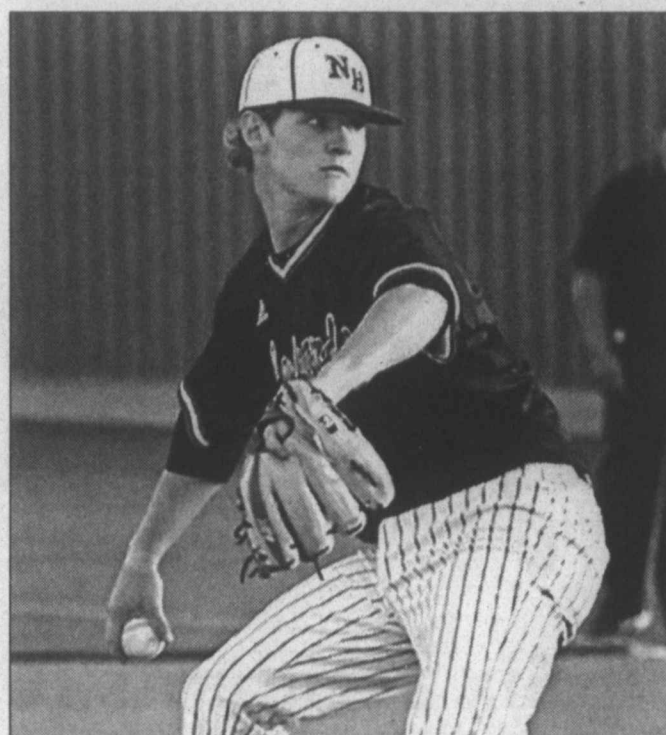

Did you know? ... about Baseball!


- A baseball player increases his chance of hitting a home run if he hits the baseball at the bat's "sweet spot." This spot is an area between 5 and 7 inches from the barrel end of the bat. When a player hits the sweet spot, there is less vibration, and the bat makes a satisfying "crack" sound.
- Throwing a baseball significantly faster than 100 mph is nearly impossible. Speeds over that would create too much torque in a pitcher's arm, leading to snapped tendons and ligaments.
- A big-league player can hit a 90-mph pitch with more than 8,000 pounds during the millisecond that the bat is in contact with the baseball. The ball leaves the bat at a speed of 110 mph.

School starts rolling on bond fund projects

LAMESA – Bids for more than \$565,000 worth of mainly cosmetic improvements at three Lamesa campuses were approved by Lamesa school board members during their regular meeting on Tuesday, June 11. On the same day, subcontractor bids for a new Career and Technology Education (CTE) building at the high school came in lower than expected, totaling about \$10.8 million.

Included in that total is not only construction of the CTE building but also renovation of the former high school choir area into the district's new Life Skills facility.

Construction work on the CTE building, with Lubbock-based Lee Lewis Construction as the general contractor, is expected to begin next month. The building will house facilities for various programs such as agriculture science, welding, computer drafting, cosmetology, building and construction trades, law enforcement, culinary, and medical training.

The CTE building is one of the major projects being undertaken during the first phase of improvements funded by a \$30.4-million bond issue approved by the district's voters in May of last year.

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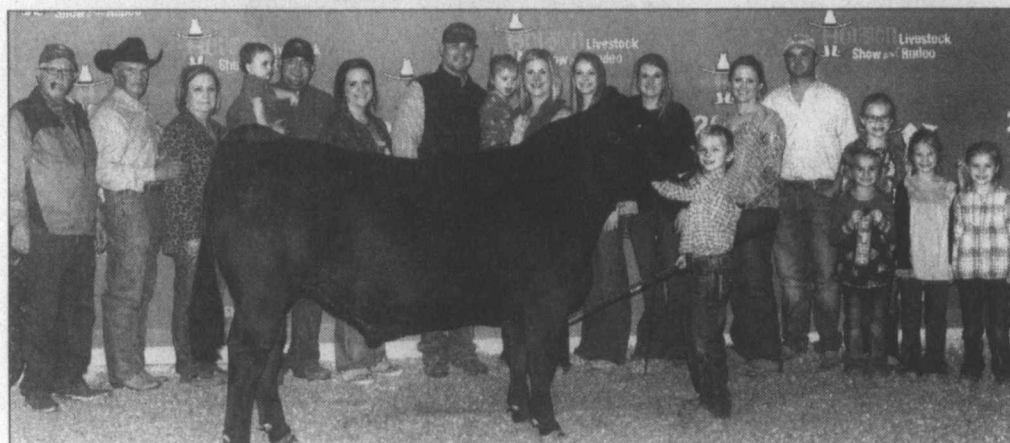

Early morning fire destroys two Slaton businesses

SLATON – Two local businesses were destroyed Saturday morning (June 15) when an early morning fire broke out at Klemke's Sausage Haus, 255 W. Garza St., in Slaton.

The Lubbock County Office of Emergency Management said in a statement a call came in to the Slaton Police Department Dispatch Center at 2:46 a.m. The caller, an employee of Klemke's Sausage Haus, reported smoke in the building.

The Slaton Fire Department was dispatched, and found the building full of smoke. Firefighters initially entered and attempted to extinguish the fire inside, but conditions worsened, forcing a retreat.

The fire then spread to the Slaton Family Clinic, located next door.

Both buildings are total losses, and firefighters worked to prevent the spread of the fire to other businesses.

The Slaton Bakery building, located near the fire, was sound; however the store was closed for the day. Chad Wilson, owner of Slaton Bakery, reported Monday the store would be closed for at least a week to assess damages and clean from the smoke.

The fire was contained to the involved buildings around 9:30 a.m., but even in late in the afternoon, firefighters were still on scene working to prevent rekindling.

Approximately 100 firefighters from 22 different stations (including Tahoka) were on scene. Several local businesses also assisted with delivering water to the scene due to low water pressure as they fought the fire.

Roads around the scene, such as the section of Garza in front of the building, are currently closed. Drivers need to look for alternate routes.

The cause of the fire remains undetermined at this time, and the Texas State Fire Marshal's Office has been requested to help with the investigation.

Approximately 90 customers were affected by power outages caused by the fire.

Dr. Al Bendeck with Slaton Family Medical Center said said patients inquiring about appointments or information may call the clinic number at 828-1600. The number will transfer to his cell phone.

Bendeck also said they are hoping to open up Monday (June 17) at the SEDCO building for the interim. SEDCO has donated a room for appointments.

SEDCO is located at 4119, 101 N 9th St., Slaton. Patients will need to enter through the left hand side of the building.

The clinic is also currently remodeling a business by the Slaton Pharmacy.

High Plains crops suffer after too much moisture at planting time

While rainfall is important for crop production, the amounts falling across the High Plains have negatively impacted row crops and agricultural operations, with potential effects extending into the summer growing season, according to a Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service expert.

Dr. Jourdan Bell, AgriLife Extension agronomist in Amarillo, said a significant amount of this year's cotton has been affected by extensive rainfall during the month of May.

While crops all across the Texas High Plains have been affected, the northeast Panhandle has suffered to the largest degree, Bell said. There are reports of rainfall in excess of 15 inches on some fields in that region since May 1.

"We are receiving daily reports of unplanted cotton fields, fields of both cotton and corn that are failing due to saturated conditions, poor stands and poor vigor," she said.

Bell said the growth in cotton infrastructure throughout the region in response to an expansion of cotton acreage in the past year or so will certainly be affected by the rainfall.

Planting stopped across most of the northern High Plains in the past two weeks for all commodities, so all crops are behind average, and some of the intended crops will not be planted. At this point, it is too late to plant cotton due to the narrow production window, which is restricted by insurance dates and the timing of the first fall freeze, she said.

"I had one producer tell me this will be more economically devastating than the drought of 2011."

Another issue is many producers, unable to get in fields to plant have already incurred expenses such as preplant fertilizer and herbicide costs, Bell said. The heavy rains may have now leached the fertilizer or washed the herbicide away.

"But even with concerns these inputs may have been lost in many cases, it's not a guarantee," she said. "Producers will need to be cautious about the plant-back intervals required for herbicides that were used with the original crop when determining their alternative crops."

Also, soil crusting has occurred in some areas, magnifying germination issues and poor stand establishment, Bell said. Where the moisture permitted the crust to soften and allowed the seedlings to emerge and establish, growth has been slowed by abnormally cool

conditions. And now, there are seedling diseases in many cotton fields.

Some corn fields planted in late April and early May during the break in rains have experienced extended periods of waterlogging, she said. Under extended saturated conditions, oxygen becomes depleted and the roots are not able to respire and take up water and nutrients. With root growth either slowed or stopped, these fields may be predisposed to more problems later in the season, such as nutrient deficiencies, water stress or even lodging.

And when the drying process does start, Bell said, if producers get in too big of a hurry and plant in overly wet fields, equipment can cause soil compaction. The planter's furrow openers can cause compaction to the furrow side walls, which also restricts root development, resulting in symptoms of nutrient deficiency and water stress later in the season.

Even with wheat, which is almost ready for grain harvest, problems can occur due to the heavy and extended rains, she said. Precipitation at this time can enhance wheat test weights and yields, but extended amounts can prevent fields from drying down and cause some lodging.

"Also, producers who had contracts for wheat silage are not able to cut," Bell said. "While they still have the opportunity to cut those wheat fields for grain, at current prices silage was a much more profitable option for many producers."

Producers now are looking for secondary crop alternatives, she said. Some

considerations are soybeans, grain sorghum, short-season corn and sunflowers. However, Bell cautioned again that preplant herbicides will be an important consideration as producers make this decision.

While some situations are dire, she said not all is lost.

"On the brighter side of things, dryland acres that have not been planted will have a

good soil moisture profile, and that will be very beneficial for late-planted grain sorghum and sunflowers," Bell said.

"And, we are starting to see the first true leaves appear in some cotton fields, so hopefully over the next few weeks, with warmer and drier conditions, we will see cotton development progress where it was successfully planted."

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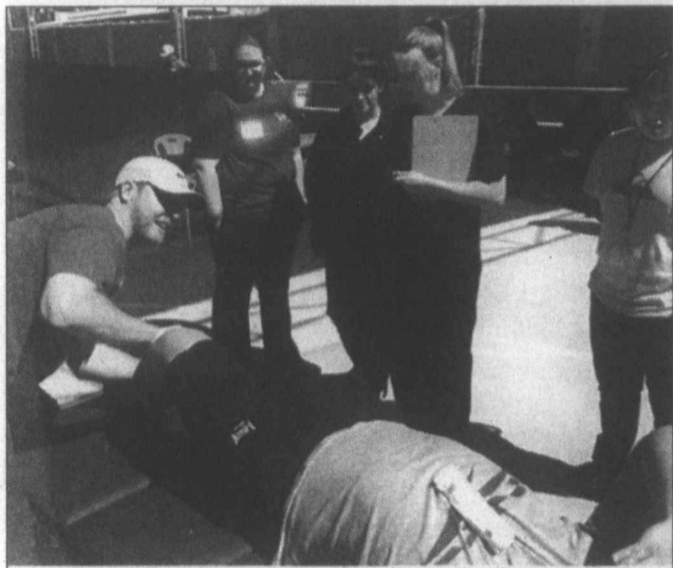

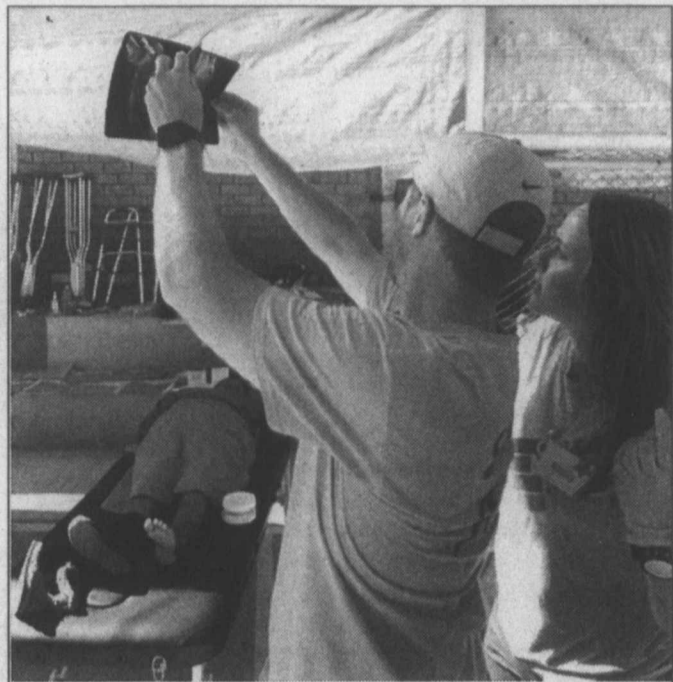

On the trip, we were able to bring a handful of walkers and crutches that we were able to utilize and give away during the week while we were holding the clinic. We were able to match this lady up with one of our walkers and give her a good-fitting one to take home as her own," said Holcomb, pleased with the outcome.

For the medical professionals, one of the other objectives was to provide education to the students from LCU on the trip in a way that is very difficult to achieve in the U.S. due to limitations in their ability to be hands-on with patients.

"One major emphasis on this trip for the providers was student education for the 15 undergraduate LCU students. Each day the students would rotate to a different provider to learn something new. Chris Huggins and I were able to work alongside and teach almost all these students by the end of the week. There were several that were Pre-Physical Therapy majors that got very solid hands-on experiences that they would not have received back home in the states," stated Holcomb. He added, "All the students were awesome and eager to learn from all of the providers regardless of their bias towards that particular discipline of medicine."

The medical mission trip was a good experience for Holcomb, held beneath the distant vista of Misti Mountain, a dormant volcano near the city.

"Overall, the trip was a very good success as there were more people seen than ever before with this specific trip in the past, and the church there made more connections because of that," Holcomb stated.

About the Solar System

• Jupiter has the biggest ocean of any planet, albeit made of metallic hydrogen. Orbiting in cold space five times farther from the sun than Earth, Jupiter retained much higher levels of hydrogen and helium when it formed than did our planet. The deceased was LisaMarie Nichole Alvarado. Justice of Peace Christie Oliván ordered an autopsy and the investigation is ongoing.

A mule deer was reported in the median north of the roadside park 2 miles north of Tahoka on the east side of US 87 at 8:39 a.m. last Tuesday. A deputy and game warden responded to the scene, removing the deer.

On June 11, a break-in was reported at a ranch house 2 miles west of FM 213 and 1.5 miles north of CR O on a private road. The owner of the house notified the Sheriff's Office that sometime during the night someone had

squeezed through his electric gate, walked into his ranch house that was not locked, and got a can of pork-and-beans out the cabinet and started opening the can. The person then apparently stopped, left the partially open can of beans on the counter, and went back outside, drove the owner's tractor back up to the gate and then left the scene.
