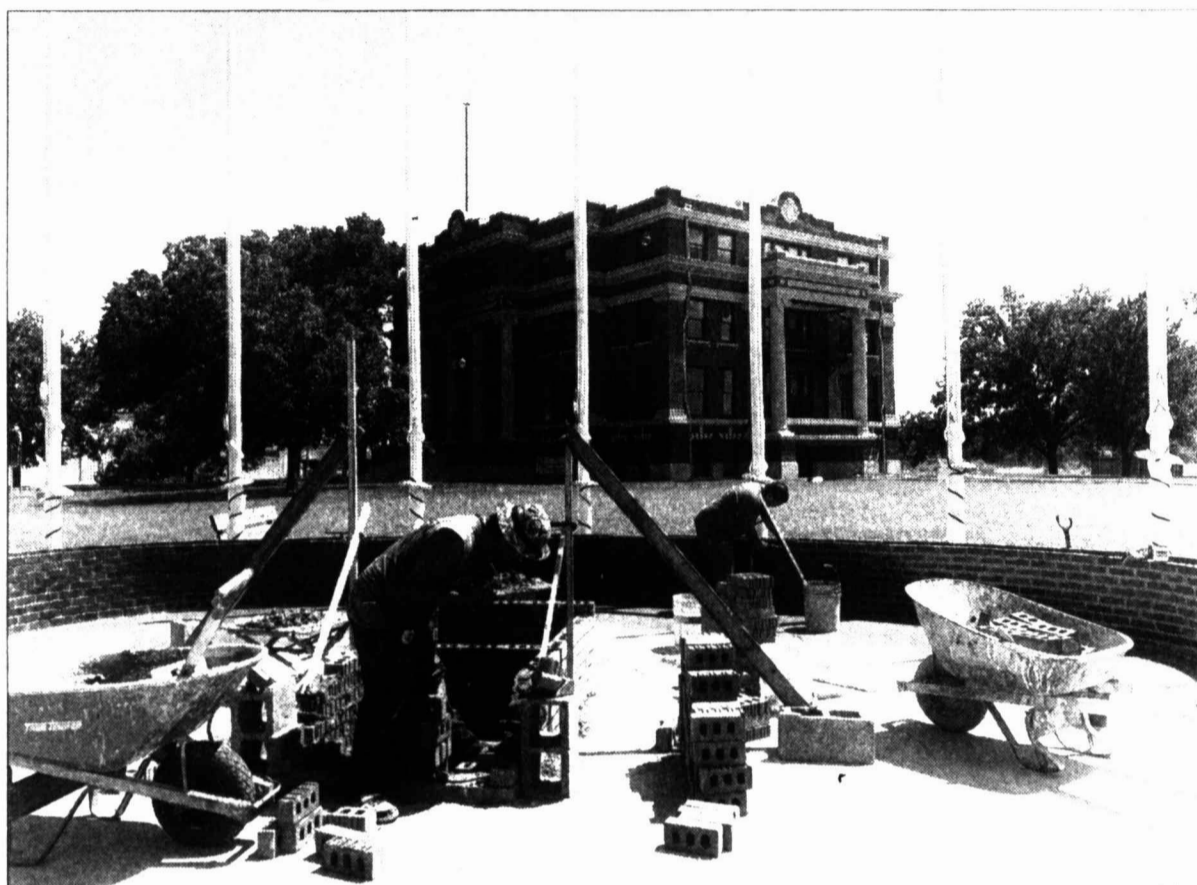
Eagle of Honor Veterans Memorial to be unveiled, dedication ceremony set 9-11

Wednesday, September 11, at 10:00 a.m. the citizens of Lynn County are invited to attend and participate in the Eagle of Honor Veterans Memorial dedication at the northwest corner of the Lynn County Courthouse square in Tahoka.

The memorial is the culmination of many months of planning, fundraising, and dedication to show support for this nation's military personnel who are currently serving, to honor the service of past service members, deceased and living, as well as honoring future military members who will don the uniform to protect and defend the freedoms that American citizens currently enjoy.

September 11th, Patriot Day, is an appropriate day to say thank you to veterans and to their families for their sacrifices. The dedication will begin at 10:00 a.m. and will last approximately 35-45 minutes. Seating will only be available for veterans and their families. Anyone else requiring seating may bring a lawn chair for seating during the ceremonies.

A bronze bald eagle, wrapped in the American Flag, which will be the centerpiece of the Lynn County Veterans Memorial, will sit on a podium in the center of the memorial. The American Flag, the flag that has traveled the world with our Army, Navy, Air Force Marines, Coast Guard and National Guard, will also surround the eagle as a tribute to all branches of the military. Bronze military seals will be displayed on a brick wall behind the eagle as a symbol of the heroic sacrifices made by military service members. The POW/MIA (Prisoners Of War/Missing In Action) black and white flag will be flown as a re-

membrane of those who valiantly left their homes and families to protect and serve this great country, to never have returned home. This flag will fly alongside the U.S. Flag and flags representing the branches of the military services.

"The Eagle represents a symbol of freedom, courage, honesty, majesty, wisdom, freedom and power. The bald eagle has been the national bird of the United States since 1782 when it was placed with outspread wings on the Great Seal of our country. It appears in many

Bulldogs start fast, gain 76-0 win in season opener

The Tahoka Bulldogs started off the 2019 season in a big way Friday night at Kelley Field, running away with a 76-0 win over the Plains Cowboys.

Tahoka had the game in hand from start to finish, racking up 485 total offensive yards to Plains' 65 yards for the night. Plains had four turnovers that the Bulldogs capitalized on, and the Bulldogs had 11 touchdowns for the night.

The Bulldogs found the endzone early on, as Malik Hamilton recovered a fumble that was returned for a touchdown. That opened the gates for the Bulldogs as they ended the first quarter up 35-0, and up 56-0 at the half.

"I was very pleased with the effort and energy that we came out with," said Coach Stephen Overstreet. "After the two scrimmages I was kind of worried about what kind of juice we would bring this year, but once the lights turned on and the people showed up these guys really came to play. I was very pleased with the overall team effort that went into the game. Multiple players found ways to contribute and what little youth we have on this team showed up in a big way. Clay Sosa and Diego Pena both made big plays and Clay found the endzone to settle those Friday night jitters. Our offense seemed to pick up right where it left off last season, and our defense looked fast and physical. Obviously we have a long way to go,

but what a way to start the season off with ending the week 1-0," added the coach.

Hamilton had five TDs, all in the first half of the game. Soul Moore added 2 TDs, John Stone had 2 TDs, and Major Due and Clay Sosa each scored a touchdown. Paxtyn Gwin made 10 of 11 PATs for the night.

The Bulldogs travel to Lubbock Roosevelt for a 7:30 matchup with the Eagles this Friday and look to keep the ball rolling.

"Roosevelt is a very improved football team from last year. Coach Matt Landers has done a phenomenal job and the kids are looking good in year two of his system," said Overstreet. "I don't expect this game to be like last week and I sure don't expect it to be like last year. They have a big time playmaker. We are going to have to play sound assignment football and make sure we are aware of Jacob at all times.

"Defensively they have a new coordinator this year and he's mixing up his front. Our offensive line must be aware of when they change from even to odd fronts. This overall should be a good ballgame and one that we can hope to grow and learn from.

"We want to thank everyone for the amazing crowd support Friday night and hope that you can all travel over to Acuff Friday night to cheer on these Bulldogs," said Overstreet.

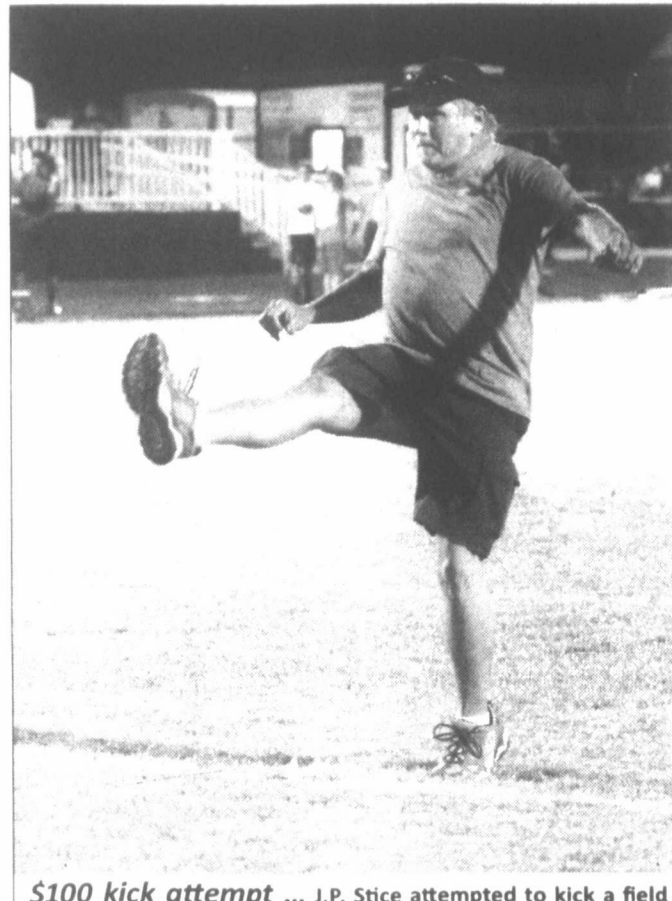
Linda is preceded in death by her parents, Harry and Eartha Hudlin and husband, Robert Hood in 2009.

Texans no longer need a referral to be treated by a Physical Therapist

Austin—Beginning September 1st Texans who want physical therapy for an injury or pain management can now access their Physical Therapist without having to first go see a physician, or other healthcare provider.

The Texas Legislature earlier this year passed HB 29 by Rep. Ina Minjarez (D-San Antonio). HB 29 allows Texans to seek the treatment they need without the delay and expense of having to see a physician first. People can now go directly to their Physical Therapist and be treated for up to 10 business days (15 in some instances).

"Many issues that patients have can be treated, and exercises that can be done at home can be demonstrated, within the two weeks that a patient can now see their Physical Therapist," said Mike Geelhoed, PT, DPT, MTC, OCS, President of the Texas Physical Therapy Association. "In cases that are going to require a longer course of treatment, Physical Therapists will know that within a visit or two and can begin the scheduling process with a physician to get a referral for the more extensive treatment."

"This is great news for patients across the state who can now seek treatment from the most appropriate healthcare provider. Patients can now come directly to us and don't have to wait for an appointment and pay for an office visit with their primary care physician or orthopedist just to be told they need physical

therapy," noted Dana Tew, PT, DPT, FAAOMPT, OCS, Vice President of TPTA.

On September 1st Texas becomes the 49th state to allow patients direct access to Physical Therapy. Other states have repeatedly shown the benefits in terms of both positive patient outcomes and financial saving. Texans may now see those benefits as well.



Attempted break-in reported at Tahoka residence on N. 7th

Two accidents occurred in the county during the past week, and an attempted break-in was reported at a residence in Tahoka.

Tahoka Police responded to a home in the 1600 block of N. 7th Street at 7:39 a.m. Monday, Sept. 2, where the homeowner reported they had discovered a broken window on the north side of the residence where someone had attempted to make entry sometime while they had been away from the home. Entry was apparently not gained to the home, however, and nothing was reported missing.

A caller to 9-1-1 reported witnessing a one-vehicle rollover about 8 miles north of Tahoka on US 87 northbound lanes, at 5:44 p.m. last Thursday. She reported that both the driver and a passenger were able to get out of the vehicle, and no injuries were reported. Colby Barnhill of Lubbock was the driver of the 2013 Nissan Titan.

Another one-vehicle rollover occurred at 9:21 a.m. Saturday on FM 179. A caller reported that a silver Honda had hit the ditch and rolled over near his residence, and that there were two females inside, possibly injured. One female was transported by Lynn County EMS to a Lubbock hospital, but no other information was available.

Deputies responded to several calls reporting suspicious vehicles/persons, and one call was received reporting 2-3 men shooting in a cotton field west of a house on Ave. P in Tahoka Sunday evening. A deputy responding said the men were hunting dove with permission from the landowner, and that they were not shooting towards the house. However, he asked the hunters to move further west, away from the home. Dove season opened on Sunday, Sept. 1.

O'Donnell Volunteer Fire Dept. responded to a small grass fire 5 miles north of O'Donnell on US 87 on the east side of the road at 7:46 p.m. last Monday.

Illegal dumping was reported at 10:52 a.m. last Monday, north of Wilson on a county road, where someone had dumped a recliner and a deep freezer.

Tahoka Police arrested an 18-year-old male at 10:08 p.m. Friday night on an outstanding warrant out of Lynn County for Burglary of a Vehicle, after stopping the male in a routine traffic stop in town.

Lynn County Jail held 33 inmates during the week, including 23 held for Ector County and 10 for Lynn. Local charges included two for public intoxication, one for criminal mischief, one for possession of drugs, one for the warrant on burglary of a vehicle, and one for assault causes bodily injury.

O'Donnell ISD awarded \$10,000 grant to expand the elementary greenhouse

ST. LOUIS, Mo. - In early 2019, America's Farmers Grow Rural Education, sponsored by the Bayer Fund, partnered with local farmers to nominate rural schools and awarded more than \$2.3 million in grants to enhance their science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) programs. Because area farmers answered the call, Grow Rural Education has awarded O'Donnell ISD in Lynn County with a \$10,000 grant.

O'Donnell ISD is one of the many schools across the country that has benefited from the Grow Rural Education program. For each grant-winning school, teachers, students and, oftentimes, community members develop plans to create more engaging and innovative STEM programs. Grow Rural Education grants have helped schools

purchase an array of STEM-related materials, such as augmented-reality sandboxes, weather-forecasting and robotics equipment. O'Donnell ISD will use the Grow Rural Education funds to enhance and expand the Elementary Greenhouse.

"America's Farmers Grow Rural Education is a unique program because farmers play an important role throughout the process, from nominating schools to selecting the grant winners," said Al Mitchell, President, Bayer Fund. "With the incredible support of local farmers, countless grant-winning schools have shared with us how Grow Rural Education funds have made their STEM programs more engaging and, in several instances, positively impacted test scores."

To qualify for a Grow Rural Education grant, farmers nominated a school or school district to compete for a merit-based grant of either \$10,000 or \$25,000. School districts that were nominated then submitted a grant application describing their STEM-focused project. Grow Rural Education's Farmer Advisory Council, consisting of approximately 30 farmer leaders from

across the country, reviewed the finalist applications and selected the winning school districts, including O'Donnell ISD.

Dove hunting season begins

Dove hunting season kicked off this weekend. Sunday, Sept. 1st was the first legal day for hunting dove in this area, according to information from J. Aaron Sims, Lieutenant Game Warden Public Information Officer for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Starting Sept 1st, hunters can use a digital image of their license as proof-of-license for any hunting that does not require a tag, like dove hunting. (Note: Hunters must still carry their driver license) Accepted formats include: a digital photo, an emailed receipt, within the Outdoor Annual app or the My Texas Hunt Harvest app, or an online purchase record.

The regular dove season in the North Zone runs Sept. 1-Nov. 12 and resumes Dec. 20-Jan.5, 2020. The regular season in the Central Zone is Sept. 1-Nov. 3, then resumes Dec. 20-Jan.14, 2020. The regular season in the South Zone is Sept. 14-Nov. 3 and Dec. 20-Jan. 23, 2020. The Special White-Winged Dove Days in the South Zone are Sept. 1-2 and 7-8.

During the early two weekends for the Special White-winged Dove Days (in the South Zone), hunting is allowed only from noon to sunset and the daily bag limit is 15 birds, to include not more than two mourning doves and two white-tipped doves. During the regular season in the South Zone, the aggregate bag limit is 15 with no more than two mourning doves.

All of the most up-to-date hunting regulations for the new season can be found in the Texas Outdoor Annual mobile app or online at OutdoorAnnual.com.

Tahoka ISD Board approves tax rate, plans to develop phone app for school info

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees met in special session at noon last Wednesday, Aug. 28, voting unanimously to approve a total tax rate of \$1.38375, which includes a Maintenance and Operating (M&O) tax rate of \$1.06835 and an Interest and Sinking (I&S) tax rate of \$0.31540, per \$100 of property value.

Five of seven trustees were present for the meeting, including Doug Green, Jon Luna, Blanda Watt, Lea Swinford and Slate May. Board President Clay Taylor and trustee Drew Stone were absent from the meeting. No citizens attended the public hearing held prior to trustees taking action on the issue. The 2019-2020 tax rate of \$1.38375 is about 4-cents lower than last year's total tax rate of \$1.43000.

The M&O rate is slightly more than a 10-cent decrease from last year's rate of \$1.17, and is in accordance with

mandates from the Texas legislature's tax relief plan. The I&S rate is an increase of 5.5 cents from the previous year, to pay for the bonded indebtedness including the \$7.5 million bond approved by voters last May for new construction of a gymnasium, field house and other athletic facilities.

Trustees also approved a budget of \$7,533,685 for the 2019-2020 school year.

In other business, trustees approved a plan to develop an app for Tahoka ISD, through Apptegy, that will allow parents quicker and easier access to information about the school district through the app. Superintendent Dick Van Hoose said that the district will work with Apptegy to develop the app specific to the needs of TISD, and anticipates implementing the new app within 60 days.

Trustees also approved a pay scale for auxiliary personnel, and approved TASB Local Policy 113 updates.

Modular builder commits to Lamesa

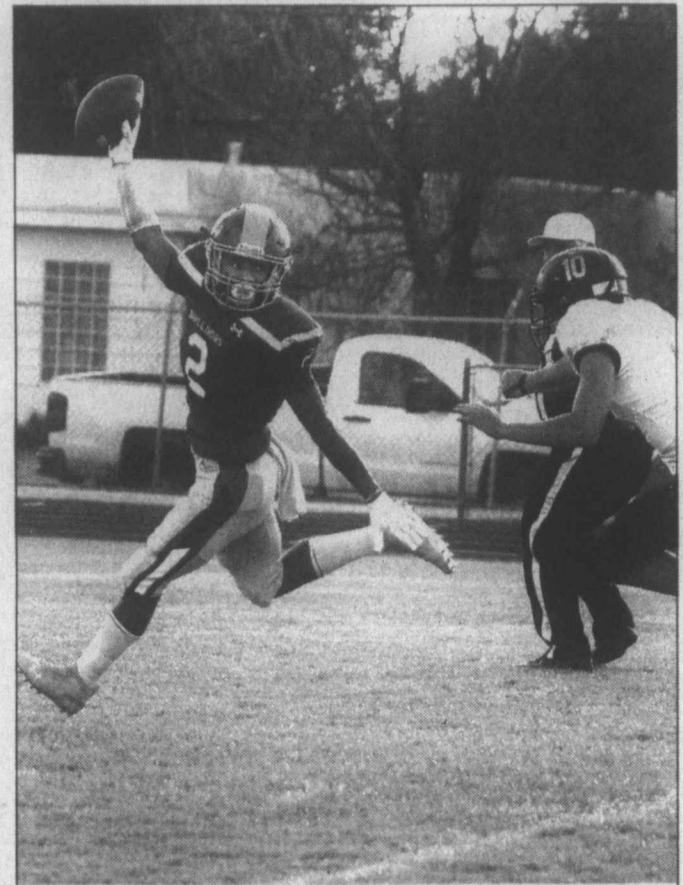
LAMESA – Lamesa has been chosen as the site for a \$20-million modular home manufacturing facility planned by McKinney-based TatumTek, LLC.

"Words can't express how honored I am to bring TatumTek to Lamesa, Texas," Edwin Tatum, founder and chief executive officer of TatumTek Modular, said in a written statement. "I speak on behalf of the entire team that we are excited and can't wait to become a part of the community," he added.

Sean Overeinder, director of Lamesa Economic Development Corporation (LEDC), who has worked on the effort for several months, said a timetable for the project has not been finalized but he expects it to move fairly quickly. The LEDC approved a \$300,000 incentive proposal for the company based on a stringent 12-year agreement, but the incentive does not include any property tax abatements, with a site of about 52 acres expected to be annexed into the Lamesa city limits.

In addition to a \$20-million capital investment, Overeinder said, the company expects to create about 150 jobs with wages ranging from \$18 to \$30 per hour. Lamesa also will benefit from ad valorem property taxes paid by the company and the sales taxes that are generated.

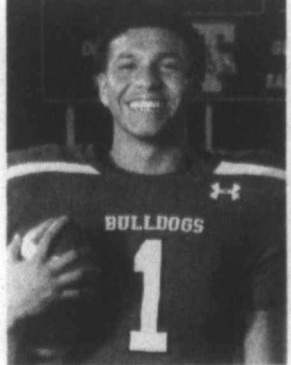

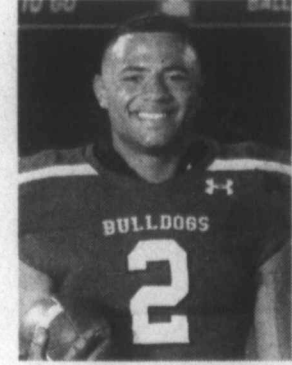

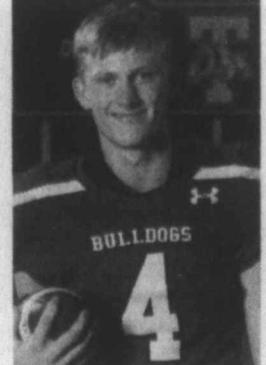
