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



# Closing its doors ... Tahoka Church of Christ to close doors after final service on Sept. 29

After more than 100 years serving the citizens of Tahoka, the Tahoka Church of Christ is closing its doors, and the building at 2320 Lockwood will no longer be used as a church home for the local congregation.

Members made the difficult decision to close, after many months of declining membership and difficulties in maintaining ongoing ex-

This week, the church membership released the following announcement:

"Ecclesiastes 3 tells us that to everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven; and we know this to be true. For the Tahoka Church of Christ, we find that our time as an organized family has come to an end. Our last worship service will be Sunday, September 29 at 11:00 a.m., followed by a fellowship luncheon and you all are invited to attend. There is no need to bring food, the meal will be catered - unless you'd like to bring your favorite dessert.

"As for the building itself, we have approached Lynn County Hospital and offered to donate it to them and they plan to determine the possibility of turning it into a nursing home. Our deepest prayer is that the building will continue to serve and bless the community of Tahoka - a community that we love so very deeply."

According to historical information in "Grassroots Upside Down: A History of Lynn County," the Tahoka Church of Christ was established in late 1916, with the congregation meeting in the home of one of its founding members, Mrs. Mattie Bradley. Other founding members included George and Mary Sanford, Mrs. Allphin, Howard Draper, and Roy Ford.

In 1925, the members purchased the old building of First Baptist Church, one block east (See CHURCH CLOSING, page 2)


#### **Hadley Reynolds** makes \$200 kick





Several traffic accidents occurred last Friday during heavy rainfall in Lynn County, but no injuries were reported in any of the incidents.

A driver reported that he had rear-ended another vehicle that had stopped at 3:38 p.m. Friday on US 87 near CR 18 where water was over the the other vehicle stop due to the heavy rains. At 6:34 p.m. Saturday, a maroon Mazda CX5 slid off the roadway on US 87 north of the north roadside park outside Tahoka, with a 9-1-1 caller reporting that the vehicle had ended up in the middle of a field. The female driver was apparently not injured, and a truck stopped to pull her vehicle out and get her back on



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

#### Commissioners meet in county courthouse for first time since historical restoration

Lynn County Commissioners met Monday in the county courtroom for the first time since the two-year historical restoration of the Lynn County Courthouse began, as the courthouse opened to the public last week. County offices moved back into the courthouse last week, and the district clerk's office and district records were being moved this week, after being in temporary facilities for the past two years.

All county offices moved back into the courthouse, except for the Lynn County Tax Assessor/Collector's office (which includes vehicle licensing and voter registration) that will remain in the annex building at 1521 Ave. J, and the Lynn County Pct. 1 Justice of Peace office, which will remain at 905 Lockwood (on U.S. 380). The Pct 4 Justice of Peace office remains in O'Donnell.

Commissioners and other county officials met at 9:30 a.m. in the county courtroom, located in the northeast corner on the first floor of the courthouse. The courtroom features a judge's bench and historically restored witness stand. A long curved table is situated in front of the judge's

#### Big solar project continues to move forward

LAMESA - Plans for a large solar energy project east of O'Donnell are continuing to move forward, according to a representative of GreenGo Energy US.

"Everything is moving along well," David Veach, the company's senior director of development, told the Lamesa Press-Reporter late last week.

GreenGo Energy officials announced tentative plans early this year to build a 650-megawatt solar energy facility covering about 12 square miles of land in the northeastern corner of Dawson County.

But after obtaining tax agreements with the O'Donnell school district, Dawson County, and the Dawson County Hospital District, the project hit something of a bump in the road when officials with the Mesa Underground Water Conservation District opted not to grant a tax break sought by the company.

Although GreenGo Energy had sought consistency among all of the taxing entities impacted by the proposal, Veach said, the lack of a tax agreement with the water district does not appear significant enough to derail the project.

The water district's property tax rate, at roughly 1.5 cents per \$100 worth of property, is relatively minor compared to the tax

rates of the other entities involved. With most of what he called the "site control" issues nearing completion, Veach said the focus should be able to shift soon to

design work for the facility. Work and planning also is continuing on multiple other fronts, ranging from agreements for connections with the electrical transmission grid to completion of environmental studies.

If all continues to go well, Veach said, actual construction could be expected to start by the middle of next year.
