- Rocks can walk! If a storm gets going intense enough, it can make it look as if rocks are "walking." That's been documented multiple times in California's Death Valley, where conditions can occasionally be just right-not too sunny, with steady winds and standing water for rocks, sometimes weighing hundreds of pounds, to appear to move on their own.
- Earth is about 4.54 billion years old.

We all know the five senses touch, taste, smell, sight, and hearing—but neuroscientists have identified a number of other senses that are fundamental to our interactions with the world. 

Lynn County property tax statements should arrive during month of October

Lynn County property owners should expect to receive their 2019 property tax statements during the month of October, according to information this week from the Lynn County Appraisal District, which sends out statements to collect property taxes as set by all county taxing entities

All taxpayers with multiple properties will receive a single combined multi-item statement, instead of individual statements for each property

January 31 is the deadline to pay property taxes. After that, the late payment fees, penalties and interest begin to add up quickly.

A \$25,000 homestead exemption on school district taxes (deducted from the total value of the home) is available for property owners who use the home as their principal residence on January 1 of the tax year.

Homeowners may file an Application for Residential Homestead Exemption with the appraisal district for the \$25,000 homestead exemption up to one year after the taxes on the homestead are due. Once you receive the exemption, you do not need to reapply unless you should move or home, and the rate is then frozen at the current rate).

> A \$3,000 exemption on county taxes is given for homeowners age 65

or older (but not for disabled under 65). Also, disabled or over-65 homeowners may opt to pay their taxes in four installments instead of a onetime full payment. To make the installment payments, the homeowner must notify the Appraisal District (each year) before the end of January, of their intent to pay their tax bill in this method. The first payment is due by the end of January, with the other three payments due in March, May and July

Sandia Construction chosen as builder for new Brownfield High School

BROWNFIELD - The largest construction project in Brownfield's history took another step toward reality (last) Monday when the Brownfield ISD board of trustees selected a construction firm for the building of the new high school.

A bond election was held in May of 2018, with voters approving a \$40 million bond for building a new high school and handling several projects at BMS.

Seven firms applied for the construction project and were scored by a committee of teachers, administrators and community members who narrowed the group to two.

After listening to presentations by the two finalists, the board voted to approve Sandia for the construction project.

The district now enters into a contract negotiation window with Sandia, even though, BISD Superintendent Chris Smith stated, "it is pretty much a done deal."

He added, "After this is all agreed on, we should see dirt work beginning in December or January with an 18 month estimate on completion."

According to EMT Jacob Stroud, a soon-to-be-paramedic, several recent incidents, including the shootings in Midland/ Odessa, have spawned a need for extra protection for local first responders.

"We originally started pursuing this a little whenever the Seagraves shooting happened that involved an officer. I thought it would be a good time to look into that, but at the time we didn't have the funds," he said. As a result, the idea fell on the back burner

"With Shane Scott, it got brought back forward again," Stroud noted. Sheriff Deputy Shane Scott was stabbed while on duty June 24 in a confrontation in Gaines County.

EMS is trying not to spend their budget on the vests; instead, they are hoping to raise the extra funds themselves.



The Bulldogs found themselves in a fight this past that they couldn't get out of. The Dogs fell to a very solid Sundown team 48-9 after having a 2-0 lead after the first quarter. The key to the game would have to be that the Dogs uncharacteristically turned the ball over five times on the night.

"About midway through that second quarter we ran into a wall and started turning the ball over and giving them a short field. We still played well, but couldn't hold them out of the endzone anymore. Still at the half only being down 21-2 I felt like we had a shot and could get the ball rolling, but that just didn't

November ballot will decide future of cancer research in Texas from the Texas Medical Association

head to the polls on Nov. 5 to support future cancer research and prevention in Texas. Proposition 6, one of 10 constitutional amendments on the ballot, extends Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas (CPRIT) funding for another 10 years. Texas physicians are calling for a "yes" vote to support CPRIT and the battle against the deadly disease.

Billions of dollars in cancer-fighting grants, research, and preventive care are on the line when Texas voters go to the polls on Nov. 5. Physicians and other supporters hope voters will elect to continue funding the state's cancer-fighting agency, the Cancer Prevention and Research Institute of Texas (CPRIT). Proposition 6, one of 10 constitutional amendments on the ballot, would authorize the legislature to increase by \$3 billion the maximum bond amount for CPRIT. Without new funding, the agency's ability to award grants that promote cancer prevention and research will end by 2022. Former Rep. John Zerwas, MD (R-Richmond), who co-authored the Texas House of Representatives' joint resolution this past legislative session that led to the Proposition 6 vote, said he is hopeful voters understand the need to extend CPRIT funding.

"It's in the voters' hands, and that's where it should be,' Dr. Zerwas told Texas Medical Association (TMA) Fall Conference physician attendees. "Proposition 6 is an incredibly important thing to all of us, and it puts Texas in a place no other state can claim in terms of making great strides in cancer research and actually curing these diseases. I'm pretty confident that voters are going to see the value of it."

TMA's October Texas Medicine magazine reports that in 2007, Texas voters overwhelmingly approved the

The bottom line: Texas constitutional amendment to physicians are urging Texans to establish CPRIT and authorize the state to issue \$3 billion in bonds to fund groundbreaking cancer research and prevention programs and services in Texas. CPRIT began operations in 2009. Since then, CPRIT has handed out 1,380 cancerfighting grants, totaling \$2.3 billion, to Texas physicians and researchers at 100 academic institutions, nonprofits, and public companies throughout the state's health care system. CPRIT also helped recruit 175 top cancer researchers and their labs to Texas, including James Allison, PhD, the winner of the 2018 Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine. One-tenth of CPRIT funding goes to prevention efforts, such as screening programs that have detected more than 3,300 cancers and 16,200 cancer precursors, and gives low-income and uninsured people the opportunity to participate in clinical trials and

"Because of CPRIT, health care providers are able to provide cancer screening and diagnostics, not only for cervical cancer, but for other cancers that can ultimately impact millions of Texans," said Marian Y. Williams-Brown, MD, chair of TMA's Committee on Cancer and an assistant professor of obstetrics and gynecology at The University of Texas at Austin Dell Medical School.

CPRIT's prevention efforts also save money by helping patients avoid the expensive medical costs of prolonged, often fatal illnesses, said TMA Committee on Cancer consultant and Houston family physician Lewis Foxhall, MD. "It's hard to put a price on helping someone avoid getting cancer," Dr. Foxhall said.


