The Harvest Festival will be held at the Tahoka Mini-Park at N. 1st and Ave. J, and activities kick off at 10 a.m. with the popular Turtle Races for children. Turtle races, sponsored by Lynn County 4-H, will be held in the street next to the mini-park. Food and game booths also open at 10 a.m. See the full page ad inside this edition for a complete list of booths and the Harvest Festival schedule.

A portion of Ave. J will be closed to traffic (from the museum to the Life Enrichment Center), and a portion of N. 1st will be closed to traffic, between Ave. J and Ave. K. Parking will be allowed in the Methodist church parking lot, as well as at the former City Hall building on Lockwood and Pioneer Museum on Lockwood, and other areas, but the parking lot for the Tahoka Police Dept. (across from

the Methodist church) will not be available as it is for police department use only. However, for those who may need to be dropped off close to the festival, the corner next to the police.dept. parking lot will be open for traffic, turning from N. 1st north onto Ave. J.

The festival features live entertainment, food and craft booths, games, and cash prizes from audience participation, and a Street Dance will follow that night, sponsored by Lynn County Hospital District. Some activities new to this year's festival include a climbing wall, goat roping, a dunking tank, and mega-truck rides.

Admission to the Harvest Festival is free. Bring lawn chairs for seating. Portable restroom facilities will be onsite during the festival. A live band will play popular tunes throughout the day.

The Harvest Festival Princess and Queen will be crowned during the afternoon. Winners of the 16 drawings from princess and quee tickets will be announced as they



While on an excursion from Skagway, AK, the tour stopped at the beginning of the Yukon Territory in northwest Canada. This location is near one of the two main passes that some 100,000 men, between 1896 & 1899. used to travel to the Klondike area of the Yukon Territory to try and strike it rich. The distance from the port of Skagway to the gold fields near Dawson City was approximately 600 miles. Only about 30,000 were able to complete the journey. Author Jack London, one of the prospectors, used his experiences to later write "The Call of the Wild". The Lynn County News was 3,034 miles from Tahoka.







SNYDER - Three minor earthquakes were registered within 14 hours of each other in northern Scurry County Monday afternoon (Sept. 30). The U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) reported that all three temblors were reported approximately 12 miles north of Snyder and about 3 miles below the surface.

The first quake, which registered 4.0 magnitude on the Richter Scale, was recorded at 4:47 p.m. That was followed at 2:14 a.m. by a 3.8 magnitude quake. An aftershock quake, which registered 2.5 magnitude, was recorded at 6:20 a.m.

No reports of property damage or injuries were received by local law enforcement agencies.

Four earthquakes had now been reported in Scurry County this year. The first one, a


Rival schools now united; each celebrating 100 years

Tahoka Mayor, County Judge to seek local citizen input on Ports-to-Plains

visory committee met for the first time last week to discuss costs and other matters related to extending Interstate 27 from Lubbock to Laredo.

The advisory committee consists of county judges and mayors of areas along the route, who will provide recommendations on the planning and development of the highway extension, called have on US 87, and there are the Ports-to-Plains Corridor. The 42-member committee includes Lynn County Judge Mike Braddock and Tahoka Mayor John Baker, who will be seeking input from city and county citizens on this issue.



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
