

Deer to blame in three accidents in county during past two weeks

Three of eight accidents in Lynn County during the past two weeks involved vehicles hitting deer, according to information from Lynn County Sheriff's Office call sheet reports.

At 7:07 a.m. Nov. 23, a driver hit a deer with her vehicle at FM 2053 and CR F. No injuries were reported, but the vehicle was damaged and required towing.

At 7:38 p.m. Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 28, a man driving a 2017 white Kia registered out of Abilene struck a deer at US 87 and FM 211.

Two file for **County Sheriff**

Two candidates filed during the past week seeking the office of Lynn County Sheriff. Sheriff Abraham Vega is seeking another fouryear term in office, and challenger Albert Flores has also filed for the office. Both have filed with Republican Party County Chairman John Baker for a place on the Republican Primary ballot

Previously, County Tax Assessor-Collector Donna Willis and Pct. 3 Commissioner Matt Woodley filed for re-election, also on the Republican party ticket.

The filing period continues through Dec.9 for candidates interested in filing for elected county positions that will be in the March 3 Republican and Democratic Primary elections.

The vehicle required towing, but no injuries were reported.

The other accident with a deer was also on US 87 at night, at 9:53 ß.m. A silver 2013 Volkswagen registered to the driver, Derrick Vela of Lamesa, hit a deer on US 87 near CR 26 in the southbound lanes. Again, no injuries were reported but the vehicle required towing.

An accident involving three vehicles occurred on US 87 at CR 3 at 7:20 p.m. Nov. 24, about 5 miles south of FM 41. A pickup and a car northbound on US 87 collided and ended up in the southbound lanes and adjacent cotton field. Shortly afterwards, a third vehicle struck the pickup truck that was on the highway and flipped over. Lynn County EMS, Aerocare and law enforcement responded to the scene and traffic was stopped during the accident. No driver or vehicle information was available

Two vehicles collided in Tahoka at 12:45 p.m. on Nov. 25, with no injuries reported by either driver. Brenda Lee Tillman was the driver of a 2007 Chevrolet Uplander owned by the Lynn County Pioneers Senior Citizens Center, that collided with a 2014 Chevrolet Impala driven by Ladonna Kay Wilson of Lubbock, at the intersection of Ave. L and the 1700 block of S. 1st Street. Both vehicles sustained some damage

A driver who reportedly said he fell asleep while driving at 4:54 a.m. Thanksgiving Day on US 87 veered off the road near FM 211 and the driver said he awoke "in a (See POLICE REPORT, page 6)
