

# Car crashes through window at Tahoka's NAPA store

An SUV crashed through a large plate glass window in the front of the Lynnco Automotive NAPA store at 1629 Lockwood in Tahoka about 5:30 p.m. last Wednesday evening, in an accident that damaged three vehicles. A 2011 GMC SUV allegedly attempted to pass on the right side of a 2006 Chevrolet pickup driven by Jessie Arguijo, just as the pickup was turning right to park at Lynnco. After striking the pickup, the car bounced into a 1999 Dodge pickup parked in front

of Lynnco, and then bounced up two females inside the car. Kent

Dan Taylor, owner, was standing inside the store with his back to the window, when he heard what he described as a "tremendous explosion" behind him and glass shattering as the car came crashing through into the store. Fortunately, he was standing just far enough back that he was not struck by the vehicle or shattered glass, and he immediately went to check on the Stone, a member of the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept., was across the street at the fire station when he heard the crash, and came running to assist, as EMS and law enforcement officers began arriving on scene

"I've never heard anything like that in my life," said Taylor, who had just looked out the front door and was walking back towards the store counter when the crash occurred. "I had my back to the window and I didn't know what in the

world had happened. It sounded like a bomb exploded!"

"Nothing hit me. Glass was flying around but none of it hit me, and ruptured cans of oil were shooting everywhere. There were buckets of oil, cans of oil, buckets rolling around. I mean to tell you, everything was flying, it was just like a bomb went off. But I wasn't hurt. It could have been a lot worse," Taylor told The News.

Lynn County EMS checked the female driver and female passenger (See CAR CRASHES, page 3)

on the sidewalk and into the plate glass window, coming to rest a few feet inside the store.

# Deer cause 20: **Over 100 traffic accidents** occurred in county last year

ore than 100 traffic accidents occurred in Lynn County during 2019, according to information released this week by the Lynn County Sheriff's Office. A total of 106 accidents happened, of which 20 involved vehicles hitting a deer on the road, and eight involving other animals.

Last January, deer on the road caused six accidents, and all other months except July and August had at least one deer-involved accident reported. Other animals involved in accidents included three vehicles hitting cows, two striking unknown animals, and

one each hitting a dog, a coyote, and a wild hog.

There were 50 single-vehicle accidents reported throughout the year, eight of which happened in June. The most hazardous months, according to the total number of accidents reported, were January (12 total accidents), June (12), August (13) and October (12). Some of the

single-vehicle accidents were weather-related (icy roads or water over the road), and others were rollovers or veering off of roads.

A total of 26 multiple-vehicle accidents were reported during the past year as well.

Lynn County encompasses 893 square miles of land. According to Lynn County EMS Director John Baker there are 800 miles of asphalt roads in the county. County Judge Mike Braddock also said that the four precincts in the county each have approximately 220 miles of unpaved roads to maintain, for approximately 880 miles of unpaved roads in Lynn County





Basketball was invented in December 1891 by the Canadian clergyman, educator, and physician James Naismith. Naismith introduced the game when he was an instructor at the Young Men's Christian Association Training School (now Springfield College) in Springfield, Massachusetts. At the request of his superior, Dr. Luther H. Gulick, he organized a vigorous recreation suitable for indoor winter play. The game involved elements of American football, soccer, and hockey, and the first ball used was a soccer ball. Teams had nine players, and the goals were wooden peach baskets affixed to the walls. By 1897-1898, teams of five became standard. The game rapidly spread nationwide and to Canada and other parts of the world, played by both women and men; it also became a popular informal outdoor game. U.S. servicemen in World War II (1939-1945) popularized the sport in many other countries.




(Continued from page 1) inside the GMC, Julie Leal and Chelcea Moroles, transporting at least one for medical treatment of unknown injuries.

Dan Taylor was the owner of both pickups that were involved in the incident.

A one-vehicle rollover was reported just after midnight on Feb. 2, at the Tahoka FM 400 overpass eastbound lanes, where a blue Challenger was found with two people inside. Lynn County EMS responded with two ambulances and transported both to UMC in Lubbock for treatment of unknown injuries. No driver/passenger information was available.

Lynn County Sheriff's Office had five calls over a three-day period about the same person, with people calling in reports of seeing a man or woman dressed all in white or covered in a blanket standing on or beside roads in four different areas of the county, from Jan. 30-Feb. 1. As it turns out, it was a male dressed in white, carrying a blanket and a pillow, who was walking beside US 380 near the Terry/Lynn County line, then at the US 87 Star overpass, then at US 84 and CR HH, and at US 84 in Southland. After the first report, the man was picked up and taken to Lynn County Sheriff's Office, but he had committed no crime and did not wish to receive any help, so was released. He was offered assistance by DPS, Lynn, Terry and Slaton law officers during the three-day period while he was walking along roadways, but refused assistance from all.

Sheriff's deputies responded to several calls about suspicious vehicles/persons. One call was in the New Home area at 6 p.m. on Jan. 30, where a male was seen going door to door. According to a deputy who respond-



# **Tahoka USPS**: Fees may be due on post office boxes if physical address is on carrier route

Tahoka citizens who receive their mail through a post office box – depending on whether their street address is being served by a postal carrier route.

Many PO Box customers in Tahoka have, in the past, been eligible to receive free (or "No Fee Group E because delivery to physical addresses was not available here. However, those meeting certain criteria (elderly, receive home delivery if a mailbox was provided.

However, the rural routes in Tahoka have grown to the point that free home delivery to a physical address is now available to anyone who chooses to provide a mailbox at their home, if a rural route carrier is already traveling down their street ered to still be eligible for for mail delivery.


