

Sheriff, Pct 1 Commissioner races, to be determined on REP Ballot:

Polls open Tuesday for Primary Elections

Early Voting for the March 3 Republican and Democratic Primaries will end Friday, Feb. 28, and polling locations will be open on Election Day, Tuesday, March 3, from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. in Lynn County. Voters must choose which primary election in which they want to cast their votes, either Republican or Democratic, as voters may only cast ballots in one party's primary. Voters are reminded to bring their Voter Registration cards and photo ID with them to show election officials.

Serving Lynn County since 1903

Locally, the Lynn County Sheriff's race will be determined in the Republican Primary election, with incumbent Abraham Vega and challenger Albert Flores vying for the four-year office. Another locally contested race is for Commissioner Precinct 1, with incumbent Matt Woodley facing challenger Josh Isham for the position. This



race is also on the Republican Pri-

Also on the Republican Primary ballot are three other local offices being sought by unchallenged incumbents wanting to serve another four-year term. Those incumbents include County Attorney Rebekah Filley, County Tax Assessor-Collector Donna Willis, and Pct. 3 County Commissioner Don Blair. Philip Mack Furlow, District Attorney for the 106th Judicial District, which includes Lynn, Garza, Dawson and Gaines counties, is also unopposed on the ballot. These po-

sitions are four-year terms that will begin Jan. 1, 2021.

Both the Democratic and Republican ballots have a list of presidential candidates for voters to consider, as well as other federal and state offices. The Democratic ballot also has 11 propositions to consider, and the Republican ballot has 10 propositions.

Sample ballots from both Primaries may be viewed at the Lynn County Clerk's Office on the first floor of the Lynn County Courthouse. Susan Tipton, Elections Official for the county, also said that citizens may pick up a sample ballot to take home for review if they desire, before going to election

The winners from the March 3 Republican and Democratic Primary elections will be on the ballot in the November 2020 General Elec-







The County Treasurer stated in open Commissioners' Court that in the twelve years she has worked in the County Treasurer's Office, that since I have become Sheriff, it has been the first time that the Sheriff's Office has come in under budget and actually returned

It has been my honor to serve in the Sheriff's Office. It is not the Sheriff's Department. The Sheriff's Office is unique because its direct accountability is to the citizens through the election of the Sheriff. The Office of Sheriff is not a department of county government; it is the independent office through which the Sheriff exercises the powers of the public trust. No individual or small group hires or fires the Sheriff, or has the authority to interfere with the operations of the office. Elected sheriffs are accountable directly to the constitution of their state, the United States Constitution, statutes, and the citizens of their county. The sheriff should naturally do his best to work with all entities because it is important in a democratic society. The sheriff must work with all segments of government to serve and protect the citizens of the county (taken from the National Sheriff's Association).

February 28 is deadline for CRP signup

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) reminds agricultural producers interested in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) 2020 general signup that the enrollment deadline is February 28, 2020. This signup is available to farmers and private landowners who are either enrolling for the first time or re-enrolling for another 10- to 15-year term.

Farmers and ranchers who enroll in CRP receive yearly rental payments for voluntarily establishing long-term, resource-conserving plant species, such as approved grasses or trees (known as "covers"), which can control soil erosion, improve water quality and develop wildlife habitat on marginally productive agricultural lands.

CRP has 22 million acres enrolled, but the 2018 Farm Bill lifted the cap to 27 million acres.

Signed into law in 1985, CRP is one of the largest private-lands conservation programs in the U.S. It was originally intended to primarily control soil erosion and potentially stabilize commodity prices by taking marginal lands out of production. The program has evolved over the years, providing many conservation and economic benefits. Marking its 35th anniversary in 2020, CRP has had many successes, including:

• Preventing more than 9 billion tons of soil from eroding, enough soil to fill 600 million dump trucks;

· Reducing nitrogen and phosphorous runoff relative to annually tilled cropland by 95 and 85 percent respectively;



Notice of Availability of Uncompensated Medical Care

Lynn County Hospital District will provide at least \$80,000 uncompensated care this fiscal year. This care is available to individuals who cannot afford to pay for their medical care, and are legal residents of Lynn County.

Uncompensated services for Lynn County Hospital District are limited to all inpatient services, all outpatient diagnostic and radiological examinations, emergency room services, ambulance services and all out-patient rehab and therapy services performed by LCHD employees at the Lynn County Hospital District Hospital and Lynn County Hospital District Clinics.

To determine eligibility of this care, LCHD uses maximum level of income for the appropriate family size, which is established by the HHS income poverty guidelines. The current maximum levels of income are given below.

FAMILY SIZE MAXIMUM 250% FPLG **MAXIMUM ANNUAL INCOME** \$31,900 \$43,100 \$54,300 \$65,500 \$76,700 \$87,900 \$99,100 \$110,300

For families with more than 8 members, add \$4,480 for each additional member. The services will be provided to those who first request it until the compliance level is met for this fiscal period. To make a request for uncompensated services, please contact the Patient Care Navigator in the Specialty Clinic at (806) 561-4053. If Patient Navigator is unavailable contact the Administrator or Financial Officer. The Patient Care Navigator will make a written determination of your eligibility for services.






