City officials say no to opening Little League ballfields, city pool

Tahoka City Council met in a Zoom videoconference session Monday night to discuss city business, including the city's continued precautions for the Covid-19 Pandemic. Discussion was held on whether to allow Little League

the use of the city's baseball fields, and whether to open the city pool for the summer, with city officials agreeing to keep them closed, for now, as precautionary measures against spreading the Coronavirus. Mayor John Baker said that city officials take their responsi-

bility of keeping everyone as safe as possible very seriously, and told The News, "At this unprecedented time in our history, a significant responsibility has been placed on our shoulders: the responsibility to keep the most valuable Americans safe, our precious children







USDA reports record enrollment in safety programs

Producers signed a record 1.77 million contracts for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) and Price Loss Coverage (PLC) programs for the 2019 crop year, which is more than 107 percent of the total contracts signed compared with a 5-year average. USDA also reminds producers that June 30 is the deadline to enroll in ARC and PLC for the 2020 crop year.

"Producers for several years have experienced low commodity prices, a volatile trade environment and catastrophic natural disasters," said Richard Fordyce, Administrator of USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA). "Farmers looking to mitigate these risks recognize that ARC and PLC provide the financial protections they need to weather substantial drops in crop prices or revenues." . Producers encouraged to participate in **HPWD Irrigation Assessment Program**

Interested producers are encouraged to participate in the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District's (HPWD) 2020 Irrigation Assessment Program.

"The Irrigation Assessment Program has two major benefits. Producers learn more about the performance of their center pivot or subsurface drip irrigation system. Plus, it gives a better understanding of groundwater conditions in aquifers within the HPWD service area," said Field Staff Supervisor Keith Whitworth

Since 2013, cooperators have volunteered to have their irrigation systems assessed by HPWD staff. Water levels in wells are measured at the beginning/end of the growing season. In addition, flow rates of the wells/irrigation systems are checked using an ultrasonic flow meter. This service is provided free of charge to program participants by HPWD.

Total pumping hours, gallons per minute pumped, and number of irrigated acres are calculated to determine the total acre-inches of groundwater applied during the growing season.


Rainfall totals are determined through use of radar estimates from April-September. This gives an estimate of the total inches of water available for plant use.

For example, the 2019 program participants' well data indicates an average depth-towater of 223 feet and an average flow rate of 105 gallons per minute. The average amount of irrigation water applied in 2019 by program participants was 13.4 inches for corn; 11.2 inches for cotton; 16.7 inches for silage; and 3.6 inches for wheat. All information gathered from each site is shared with program participants.

Whitworth said water samples are also collected as an extra service to Irrigation Assessment Program participants. HPWD is able to check Total Dissolved Solids (TDS), chloride, and pH levels of groundwater. Knowing the water chemistry in wells is important since it impacts efficient use of supplemental nutrients applied to crops.





"Schedules" are essentially formulas that appraisers use for determining values. LCAD contracts with an outside appraisal company, Eagle Appraisal, to conduct all of their property appraisals.

Prisoner guickly captured after escape in Lamesa

LAMESA - A prisoner in handcuffs and shackles who jumped from a moving sheriff's vehicle and fled into a nearby house in Lamesa Friday morning was back in custody in just over 10 minutes, according to local law enforcement officials.

Blane Lars Spear, a 36-year-old male who has been an inmate in the Dawson County Jail since March 17, was recaptured without incident, according to Sheriff Matt Hogg.

A woman who was inside the residence where Spear fled to was "shaken up" by the incident but was not injured, said Josh Peterson, the sheriff's chief deputy who also is serving as acting chief of the Lamesa Police Department.

The incident was reported at 8:01 a.m. by a sheriff's department jailer who was transporting Spear from the county jail to an appointment with a dentist in Lamesa, Hogg said.

Although the doors to the vehicle should have been locked, Hogg said, Spear was able to get the door open in the 700 block of N. 3rd St. and flee toward a nearby residence.

"He was handcuffed and shackled but he was able to get up to that residence before the jailer could get the vehicle in park and try to run after him," Hogg told the Press-Reporter.

Officers from the sheriff's department, police department, and Texas Dept. of Public Safety quickly responded to the location. When a deputy and a police officer approached the residence together, a woman came out and said a man was inside a back bedroom, according to Hogg and Peterson.
