Lynn County Sheriff's Office is coordinating an escort of the body of Sheriff Vega from Dallas to Lubbock on Wednesday, July 15, which will be joined by other local and area law enforcement and first responders.

Lynn County citizens who want to show their respect may be stationed on the side of the road Wednesday on US 380 (from the Lynn County Law Enforcement Center to the US 87 turnoff in Tahoka) as the escort passes through Tahoka at approximately 3 p.m. on its way to Resthaven Funeral Home in Lubbock. Please line up starting around 2:30. If standing outside vehicles, officers ask that citizens please wear masks and social distance from others.

Lynn County Sheriff Abraham Vega succumbs to COVID-19; services set Friday

by JUANELL JONES ynn County has lost a good and faithful servant to the community, with the passing of a longtime lawman here. Lynn County Sheriff Abraham Vega died Saturday, July 11, after a three-week battle with the coronavirus disease. He was 48 years old.

niversary with his wife, Rachel. His condition worsened and he was placed on a ventilator on June 28. On July 7 he was airlifted to Dallas for further treatment, where he was placed on an ECMO machine, which is similar to the heart-lung by-pass machine used in openheart surgery. He succumbed to the illness on Saturday, July 11.

His death is the second in Lynn County due to complications of COVID-19.

Visitation will be held tonight (Thursday) in the First Baptist Church sanctuary in Tahoka from 5-8 p.m. Full law enforcement services will be held at 10 a.m. Friday, July 17 at the Tahoka High School football field (sit in home stands, allow for social distancing please). Law enforcement in uniform may stand on the field. The service will be live-streamed, from the Lynn County Sheriff Facebook page.

"On behalf of the Lynn County Commissioner's Court and myself, we are deeply saddened by the loss of our Sheriff, Abraham Vega," Lynn County Judge Mike Braddock told The News this week. "Abraham was not only a kind hearted, genuine man, but also a pillar of our community and county. His work as the Lynn County Sheriff didn't go unnoticed, everyone around him knew that was his passion. He has served as a law enforcement officer in the county for many years, but Sheriff was the title that fit him best. We will miss his friendship and leadership dearly. We would like to send our condolences to his family and loved ones," he added.

The Lynn County Courthouse will be closed Friday, in respect to the family, and so that county employees may attend services.

He was an active member of the Tahoka community, and could often be found at any community event. He was elected to serve on two different terms to the Tahoka ISD Board of Trustees, and served on the boards of Tahoka Little League, and Tahoka Little Dribblers.

"I have loved my job as District Clerk, and enjoyed meeting the citizens of Lynn County. Hopefully I have served them well, but it is just time for me to move on," Mrs. Laws told The News on Tuesday.

She is leaving in the middle of her four-year term, which would have ended in December 2022.

The Honorable Reed Filley, 106th District Judge, will appoint someone to fill the Lynn County District Clerk position until it can be filled in an election at a later date. He is currently accepting applications to consider for the appointment that will begin on Oct. 1,

The District Clerk is custodian of all records for the District Court in Lynn County, and coordinates the jury panel selection process for district court cases. This office also processes passport applications, manages court registry funds, and performs other duties and statutory responsibilities as determined by Texas law.

Sheriff Abraham Martin Vega, 48, died Saturday, July 11, 2020 from complications of Covid-19. He was born 1971 November 11, Brownfield, Texas.

He graduated from Tahoka High School in 1990. He began working at the Lynn County Sheriff's Office as a part-time dispatcher at the age of 19 under Sheriff Jack Miller. He eventually worked through the ranks to becoming the jail administrator. In 1994, he graduated from the South Plains Association of Governments' Law Enforcement Academy. He worked two years as a patrolman for the Tahoka Police Department, then three years as a deputy sheriff under Sheriff Charlie Smith and was Tahoka ISD's first Chief of Police. Since 2001, he has worked for the Lynn County Sheriff's Office as a Lieutenant and then Chief Deputy under Sheriffs Jake Diggs, Bob Wilson, and Jerry D. Franklin. 

Superintendent of Tahoka provided the following letter outlining the general details of the 2020-21 school year, including on-campus or remote instructional options for students. He anticipates providing a more detailed letter in a couple of weeks; outlining more specifics for parents and students as school is set to begin on Aug. 18.

The letter is as follows: about reopening schools in August, we are preparing for the year realizing parents have a choice for instruction. Working with information we have received from the Governor and the Commissioner of Education the Texas Education

As before, technology devices including internet access will be provided to families that need them.

We will follow state and local health guidelines including measures like wearing masks, social distancing, frequent hand washing, and increased cleaning of classrooms and common areas. Whether it is concerning safety of riding on the bus, getting meals from the cafeteria, or learning in the classroom, we will follow protocols to ensure the safety

"Our teachers are ready to see students! We hope to have an easy transition back to school no matter which option you choose. Please keep a watch on our website for further information as we finalize plans over the next few weeks. We look forward to being back together."

Commissioners approve hazard mitigation plan

Lynn County Commissioners met in regular session on Monday, July 13, at 9:30 a.m. in the County Courtroom, approving a hazard mitigation plan, among other agenda items. Commissioners Matt Woodley, John Hawthorne, Don Blair presented. and Larry Durham were present with County Judge Mike Braddock presiding.

Commissioners approved a resolution for adopting the FEMA approved Lamb and Lynn counties and participation jurisdictions multi-jurisdiction Hazard Mitigation Plan as presented. Hazard mitigation works to reduce loss of life and property by reducing the impact of disasters. Through effective mitigation planning and the implementation of mitigation strategies, greater risk reduction can be achieved.

Annual road reports were discussed, and commissioners approved the purchase of a dedicated line for Tele-Med for use with Lynn County Hospital by county jail inmates. A resolution on this issue will be on 11:30 a.m.

Commissioners went into executive session for an hour to discuss personnel matters.

Commissioners voted to table an agenda item regarding a deferred payroll deduction. Monthly bills were approved as

Judge Braddock expressed appreciation for Sheriff Abraham Vega and said his death is a shock to all and he will be missed. Sheriff Vega passed away Saturday, July 11, 2020 due to Covid-19 complications.

Braddock also informed the court of the passing of Rigo Avila, a former maintenance person at the courthouse.

Tahoka City Administrator Jerry Webster announces upcoming retirement plans

Jerry Webster, longtime City Administrator for the City of Tahoka, is planning to retire in January of 2021. While Tahoka City Council and other city officials have been aware of Webster's plans for some time, the City Council is now considering advertising for candidates to fill the position, and the issue was discussed at Monday night's regular council meeting.

"I plan to retire on Jan. 22, 2021," Webster told The News this week. "We will probably begin advertising the position soon, in order for the council to have plenty of time to consider candidates and make a decision in a time-frame that works best for them," he add-

Webster has been City Administrator for the past 25 years, but he has worked for the City of Tahoka for 33 years. He was first hired in 1987 as a police officer with the Tahoka Police Dept., and then served as Chief of Police from 1989 until May of 1995, when he was named City Administrator.

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

Lamesa firefighters get 19 calls in 24 hours

LAMESA - From Welch to Patricia and all over Lamesa, fires caused by fireworks were popping up at a steady clip here Saturday night, July 4.

A building at the former Lamesa Country Club was heavily damaged and an abandoned house in Patricia was leveled by

"We set a record," Lamesa Fire Chief Larry Duyck said. "In 24 hours we had 19 fire calls, and they were all fire-

works related." Duyck said firefighters would get one blaze extinguished and have just enough time to refill tanks with water before

heading to another. "It was pretty much non-stop." he said.

Eight of the calls on the Fourth of July were in the last two hours before midnight.

Most of the fires involved only grass or brush and were extinguished before they could do much harm.

Such was not the case with the fire that damaged the former pro shop at the former county club, now the A&W Event Center. Duyck said he could see flames when he arrived there shortly after the blaze was reported around 1:20 a.m. Sunday.

He said the fire already had gone up a wall and reached the attic of the structure, which had wood sides and a metal roof. "We broke a window to get inside and put it out," he said.

"We were very fortunate." The interior of the building received mostly smoke and wa-

ter damage, Duyck said, but the fire did cause some damage in

Ackerly volunteer firefighters also responded and helped transport water to the location.

"We were preparing for a long ordeal so we used our drop tank and hauled water to it," Duyck said, referring to a portable water tank which can be set up at a scene for fire trucks to draw water from.

"Everybody did a good job and we put it out fairly quickly." At Patricia, however, a long-abandoned house on the west side of Highway 349 was fully engulfed when firefighters arrived after getting a call around 11:20 p.m. Saturday.

Firefighters opted to let the building burn and focus on preventing it from spreading through tall grass to other parts of the small community. Firefighters from both Ackerly and Lamesa responded to that blaze, which Duyck said also caused by fireworks.

About 10:00 p.m. on Saturday a possible house fire was reported in Welch. Volunteer firefighters in Welch were notified and later reported the fire was contained to grass that had burned right up to the house but did not ignite the structure.

Most of the other fires were in Lamesa or the immediate surrounding area and caused relatively minor damage, limited to grass and brush.

The largest of those, Duyck said, involved one in Sulphur Springs Draw area near Seminole Highway and Ave. V, and a later one just south of the RV parking area at Forrest Park.

"A lot of them (fires) were just small ones but we had plenty of them," he said.

Several fires also were in trash containers, including dumpsters which had been placed along Weaver Road to give people who discharge fireworks there a place to dispose of their fireworks rather than leaving it alongside the road or adjacent

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
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
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

Mask order now active in Dawson County

LAMESA - With Dawson County now exceeding 20 active cases of COVID-19, the county is now under the face mask order issued last week by Governor Greg Abbot.

The requirement will last for a minimum of 30 days, even if the county's active case count drops below 20 during that time period.

The announcement was made Monday, July 6, by Lamesa Mayor Josh Stevens and Dawson County Judge Foy O'Brien. Stevens said Dawson County now has 23 active cases of CO-VID 19.

The order issued by the governor last week states, in part, "Every person in Texas shall wear a face covering over the nose and mouth when inside a commercial entity or other building or space open to the public, or when in an outdoor public space, wherever it is not feasible to maintain six feet of social distancing from another person not in the same household."

The Lynn County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) has rallied around Abraham's family during this traumatic time. Since Vega's death, members of the department have been respectfully stationed 24/7 at the home that he shared with his wife Rachel, and a deputy goes with Mrs. Vega if she leaves her home, or takes her anywhere she needs to go.

"There was a deputy here when I got home from Dallas, and there will be one outside our home, until he is buried," Mrs. Vega told The News.

The LCSO was also providing a contingent of officers to escort the body of Sheriff Vega home from Dallas on Wednesday. Tahoka Police Chief Jeff Parker was planning to join the escort, and many other law enforcement officers across the state were expected to join in the escort as it passed through each county, accompanying the Lynn County contingent on its journey.

Abraham's wife, Rachel, shared these thoughts of her husband with The News:

"I had four of the most amazing years with the man who changed my life. He had a giving heart, loving eyes, and a contagious smile. He loved me before I knew he loved me. He made sure that I knew he loved me every day. He supported me in anything I wanted to do. And when it was his turn, I was his backbone, his support, his helpmate, and I never turned in the face of adversity. His number one goal every day was to make me happy, and in turn, I made him happy. Our marriage wasn't 50-50 but 100-100 every day. I never wanted to be away from him. I missed him every day he had to go to work and leave for a few hours. Every text, every snap made my heart jump and my face smile. I can sit here and cry about everything we won't have tomorrow or the next day. I can sit here and have regrets. But I won't. Because we lived. We saw beautiful places, we explored island paradises, we experienced great wonders of our world. We experienced life together. I have memories that will last a lifetime. It was short, and we would have made so many

more happy memories, but


