"We invite everyone to come together to light the Christmas tree and spread the Christmas cheer at 6:30 to kick off the night," invites sponsors.


The event will be emceed by Calloway Huffaker, and Pastor Cliff Holdridge will open the event with a Christmas message and prayer.

Job search moves to Round 3:

New City Administrator quits before starting here

by JUANELL JONES he search for a new Tahoka City Administrator took another unusual twist last week, when the newly-named administrator Derek Stephens decided to decline the position before ever beginning his duties for the City of Tahoka.

Stephens had officially accepted the position last Monday, but within three days he reportedly contacted city officials and said he was declining to accept the position.

He is the second candidate to decline the offer of City Administrator here.

The Council had conducted interviews with six candidates from among a slate of 19 applicants, and had originally chosen candidate Clint Gardner for the job, but he declined to accept the offer after it was made. Council members then unanimously chose Stephens for the position, who had originally accepted but now has declined.

That brings the job search to Round 3.

The City Council met in special session Monday night, Dec. 7, to consider their next step. After some discussion, council members decided to open the search by advertising again for a two-week period, to accept new applications for the position.

After the two-week period, the council will then choose a slate of candidates to interview to narrow it down to choosing one or more finalists for consideration. It will most likely be the end of December, or early January, before a new administrator is named.




Steven Lee Nailon





COVID rate near 10 percent in Dawson County

LAMESA - Dawson County's total number of confirmed COVID-19 cases is nearing 10 percent of the county's total population.

The South Plains Public Health District (SPPHD) is reporting that, as of Tuesday (Dec. 1), a total of 1,221 Dawson County residents have been confirmed with the virus since the first case here was reported in March.

The latest estimates from the U.S. Census Bureau show Dawson County with an estimated population of 12,728.

SPPHD figures show that 318 of those confirmed cases are still considered active, with 889 local residents having recovered from the virus.

The COVID-19 death toll in Dawson County remains at 36, according to information available Dec. 2 on the Texas Dept. of State Health Services website.

The SPPHD website was reporting only 14 COVID-19 deaths in Dawson County as of Dec. 1. Numbers from the state

and local health authorities have consistently differed significantly on the number of COVID-19 deaths in Dawson County. - from the Lamesa Press-Reporter

PRMC should receive virus vaccine later this month

ANDREWS - Permian Regional Medical Center (PRMC) could receive its first supply of COVID-19 vaccine later this month, according to the hospital's chief executive officer.

The state informed PRMC CEO Donny Booth and other location – just mineral interests. hospitals that the vaccine should be available for frontline healthcare workers this month.

"I've heard that they will start sending hospitals the vaccine in mid-to-late December so we can vaccinate our frontline staff," Booth noted. "It is not confirmed, but I'm pretty confident they'll get it out to hospitals pretty quickly."

Lease inquiry reveals county's ownership of mineral interests

LAMESA - Dawson County could eventually get some oil and gas revenue from mineral interests that local officials didn't know the county even owned.

Dawson County Judge Foy O'Brien said he initially received a phone call from a company - which he did not disclose - wanting to lease the county's oil and gas interests on property south of Lamesa.

"We've got 1.06 mineral interest in some land at Sparen-

berg," O'Brien told members of the Dawson County commissioners court during their regular meeting Tuesday. "I had no idea we had that."

He said the county does not own any surface rights at the

Members of the commissioners court agreed to seek proposals on an oil and gas lease for those mineral interests, a procedure that is required by law for a government entity such as the county.

"There probably will not be any other companies making an offer, since this company (which contacted O'Brien) pretty well has all the mineral interests out there," O'Brien said.

Dawson County regularly receives revenue from mineral interests on property which the county owns in Gaines County. That money goes directly into a county fund to assist local school districts with capital purchases and improvements.


