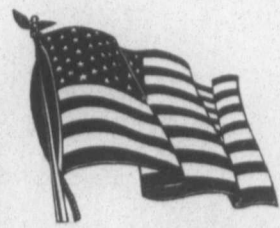

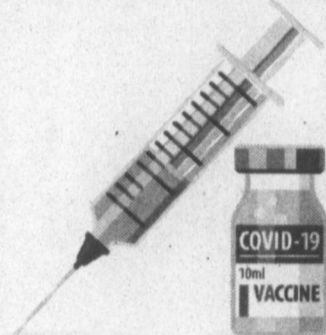
Ages 50+ now eligible: Walk-in Covid-19 Vaccine Clinic set at County Show Barn Tuesday

The South Plains Public Health District will provide 300 Covid-19 Pfizer vaccines at a Covid-19 Vaccine Clinic in Tahoka next Tuesday, March 23.

This will be a clinic for the first dose of the Pfizer vaccine, with no appointment necessary for the walk-in clinic that will be held at the Lynn County Show Barn, located two blocks west of Ave. J on South 9th Street in Tahoka.

The walk-in clinic will open at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday and remain open until all vaccines have been administered by healthcare professionals, on a first-come first-serve basis.

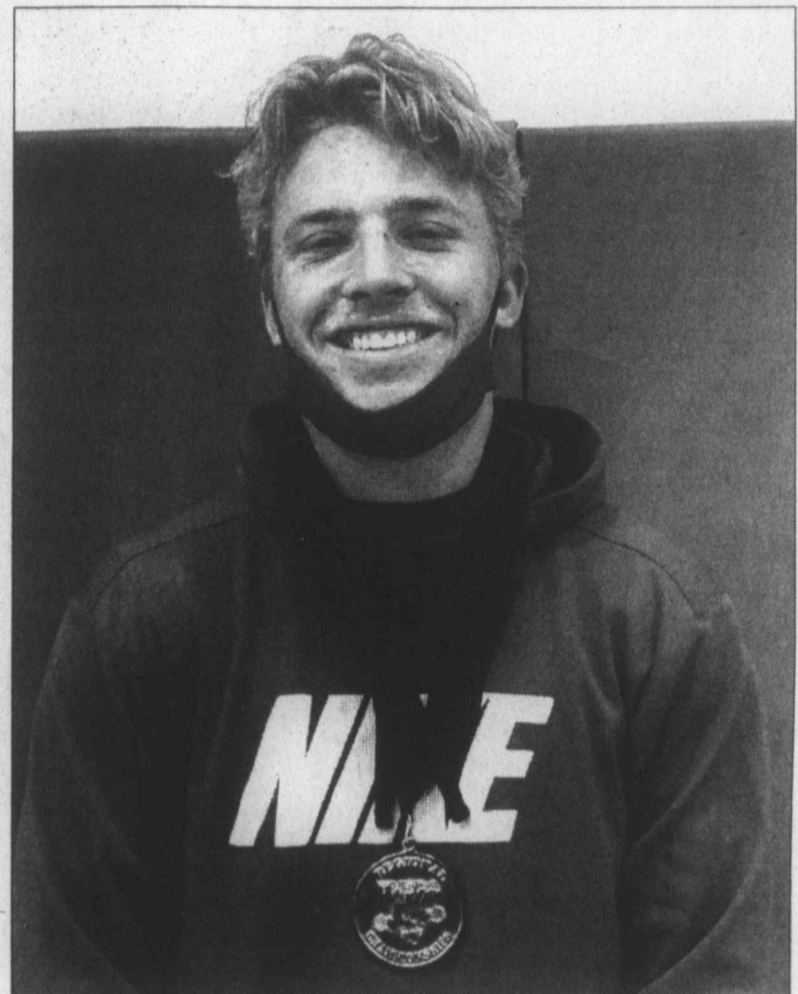
The vaccine is free, and will be available to all citizens age 50 or older (previously was required to be 65-or over but that age number has been changed to 50+), or individuals ages 18-49 who have other underlying medical conditions. In addition, all individuals who are considered to



be essential workers or medical or first-responder personnel, are eligible for the vaccine.

"There is no appointment necessary, just come to the show barn and there will be personnel there to assist you," said Zachary Holbrooks, Executive Director, South Plains Public Health District.

Information will be provided to those receiving the first dose as to when the second dose should be administered.

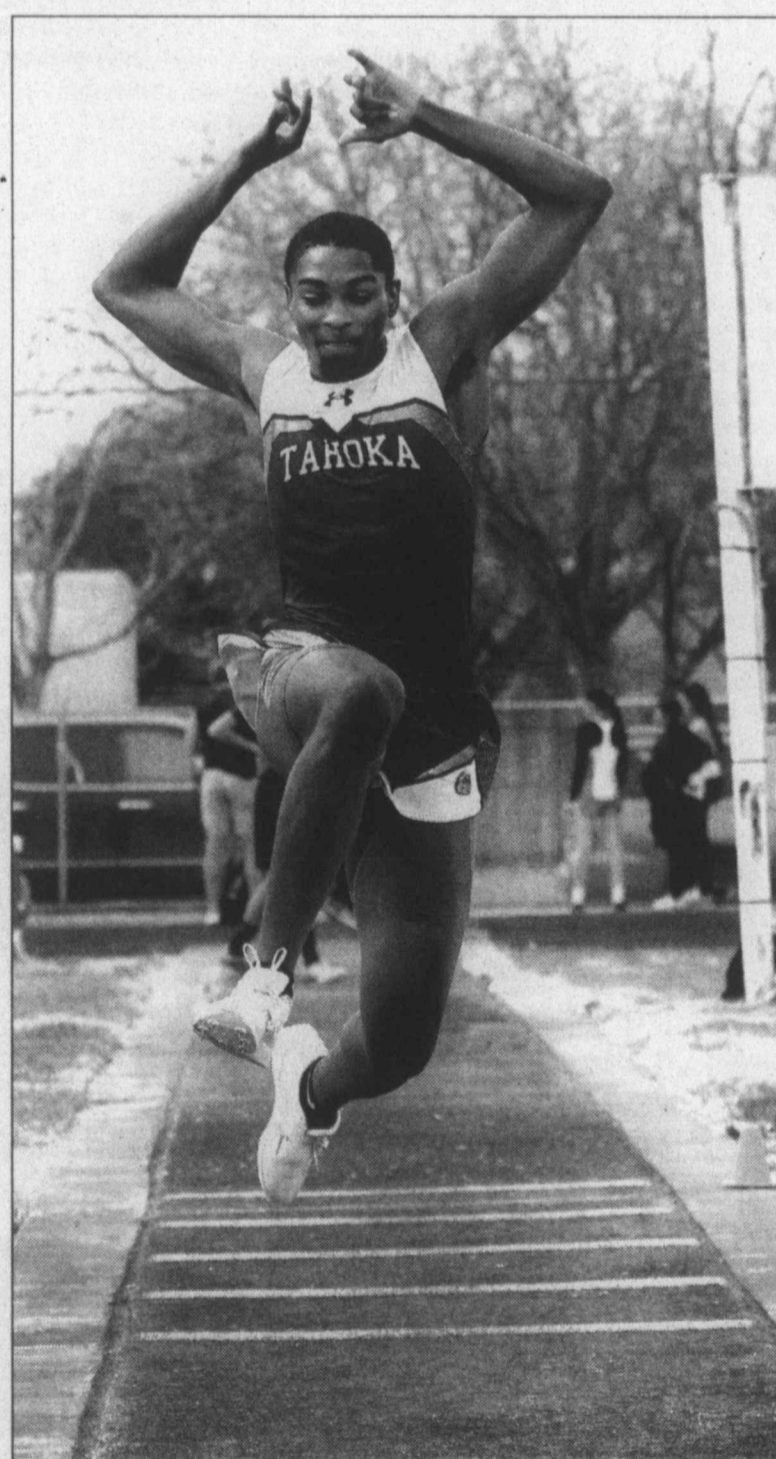

Stranded motorists, harassment, criminal mischief in law reports

No traffic accidents occurred in Lynn County last week, but law enforcement responded to a variety of other calls including several for stranded motorists, criminal mischief, welfare concerns, domestic disturbances, and a call to Tahoka Police that ended in an arrest with felony charges.

Police responded to a call at 2:45 p.m. Saturday when the owner of a silver Dodge Nitro reported that her ex had driven off in her vehicle without her permission and that she suspected he was intoxicated. Police located the man in the vehicle in the 1300 block of Ave. K, but according to the police report the man attempted to evade arrest by driving away from the officer. Upon stopping the vehicle, police arrested Marcus Liendo on a felony charge of Attempting to Evade Arrest with a Vehicle, and charges of Driving While Intoxicated, second offense.

Tahoka Police were called to the alley in the 2500 block of N. 1st at 6:30 a.m. last Thursday, where a transformer on an electrical pole was reportedly sparking or on fire. Xcel Energy and Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept. both responded to the scene.

The U.S. Post Office in Tahoka was apparently the target of someone with some type of marker who wrote the word "Jesus" on several outside locations on the property, including the flag pole, mailbox, electric meter box, and the building's AC unit. The criminal mischief occurred sometime between 4 p.m. March 10 and 8:30 a.m. March 11.

Police called the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept. to a local convenience store at Lockwood and Ave. L in response to a gasoline spill requiring the VFD to apply a chemical to soak up the spill at the gas pump, at 12:30 Sunday afternoon.

A woman complaining of harassing texts from an ex-boyfriend asked Tahoka Police to assist her in stopping the harassment. The officer visited with the woman at noon last Wednesday, and while in the officer's presence the woman sent a text to the ex-boyfriend requesting that he no longer attempt to text her or harass her in any manner. The male sent three responding texts to the woman's phone while she was with the officer, who saw the texts come in. The officer took note of the texts, and said a report would be

filed with the Lynn County Attorney to issue a criminal warning to the male, as well as issuing a criminal trespass against the individual at the woman's place of employment and two residential locations.

Police responded to several domestic disturbances, initiated a discussion between two neighbors when one neighbor complained of the other neighbor's dog leaving messes on his property, responded to complaints of loud music, a teenager riding a mini-bike on roadways, and a complaint of someone possibly living in a house that the owner said should be vacant.

Lynn County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) responded to a call from Wilson at 10:17 a.m. last Monday, March 8 in the 1200 block of Gouger Ave., where a man reported that his "ex-girlfriend's new boyfriend had slashed both his back tires" on his 2009 Tahoe on Saturday night. The caller said he had already replaced the tires, but saved the slashed tires as proof of what had occurred, and a report was taken.

A caller at 7:11 a.m. last Tuesday told LCSO that there was a gray Jeep Cherokee stopped in the southbound lane on FM 212 with a woman lying on the ground beside it. The caller told the SO that by the time he turned his vehicle around to check on the woman, she had gotten into the vehicle and left the scene. Officers were unable to locate the vehicle.

At 1:19 p.m. last Wednesday, a caller reported a grey SUV on the side of the road on the west side of FM 400 between CR 2 and CR 3, and that all the windows appeared to have been shot out, but no one was in or near the vehicle. A deputy investigated the scene, and according to call sheet reports said that the owner of the vehicle resided in Wilson, who had been driving the vehicle at a previous disturbance, but that everything was okay and the vehicle had been parked off the roadway.

An individual contacted the SO at 6:27 p.m. last Thursday to report (See LCSO REPORT, page 2)

Make appointments now for Covid-19 Vaccine Clinic in Wilson

Wilson VFD/City of Wilson in cooperation with City of Lubbock Health Department will hold a rural vaccine clinic at the Wilson City Hall (Green Building) on Saturday, March 27, from 10:00 a.m.-3:00 p.m.

Citizens will be able to make an appointment for the vaccine starting at 10:00 a.m. Tuesday, March 9th through 2:30 p.m., Thursday, March 25th. The clinic is open to Wilson and Lynn County citizens, ages 16 and over.

The vaccine is available for Phases 1A, B, C, including essential workers, teachers, school staff, and child care personnel. All individuals are

DPS issues official 60-day notification that DL expiration waiver ends in April

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) has officially issued the 60-day notice that the COVID-related waiver on expiration dates for driver licenses (DLs) and identification cards (IDs) ends on April 14, 2021. Therefore, DPS continues to urge customers to make an appointment or renew online today. The department first advised the public that the waiver would end two months ago.

To assist customers with expired licenses who are unable to schedule an appointment prior to the April 14 deadline, DPS has implemented a new procedure. If a customer has a renewal appointment that falls after the deadline, they will be able to request a temporary driving permit that will be valid until their appointment date. For additional details on the new procedure, please visit the DPS website.

The expiration waiver, originally granted by Governor Greg Abbott in March 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic, applied to DLs, commercial DLs, commercial learner permits, ID cards and election identification certificates that expired on or after March 13, 2020.

Many Texans are eligible to skip the trip to the office entirely by renewing their DL/ID card or changing their address online at Texas.gov. Customers can also renew by phone at 1-866-DL-RENEW (1-866-357-3639). The requirements and cost for online and phone renewal are the same as in-person transactions. (If you schedule an appointment, you will also be notified if you are eligible to renew online.)

To assist customers needing in-office DL services, designated high-volume offices are offering expanded hours

from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Thursday, and 7 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Friday.

Services at driver license offices are now conducted by appointment only. To schedule an appointment or check availability, visit the online appointment scheduler. If you are unable to find an appointment at the office of your choice, check back for availability at that office or other locations nearby. Please check often as availability does change.

that he had purchased a vehicle from another individual, but that when he went to register the vehicle under his name at the tax assessor's office he was informed that the vehicle had been listed in the state system as stolen out of Terry County. The new owner had the vehicle's title and asked LCSO to investigate the matter. The response from Terry County SO reported that the case had been closed and the file showed the vehicle was no longer listed as stolen.

A woman traveling southbound towards Big Spring apparently got lost in the rural roads of Lynn County when her GPS system took her down a dirt road and she was unable to give her location when she called 9-1-1 at LCSO at 5 p.m. Friday for assistance. The 9-1-1 system plotted her location to be between CR 15 and CR 18 on CR EE, and the dispatcher was able to advise her where to continue driving until she arrived at Tahoka,

where she was able to get on US 87 to continue her journey.

Deputies assisted several other stranded motorists during the week, and transported a male transient from the Garza/Lynn County line on US 380, where Garza County SO had brought the man before contacting LCSO, to the Lynn/Terry County line, notifying Terry County SO of the transient. The man said he was trying to get to California.

Another caller reported a gray Toyota pickup was stuck in the ditch on CR Y and FM 400, at 12:46 p.m. Saturday, and that a man was walking down the dirt road but kept falling down. A deputy located the individual and arrested him on charges of Driving While Intoxicated, according to LCSO call sheet reports.

A wallet was turned in that had been found on Green Ave. in Wilson, at 2:30 p.m. Sunday.

Other reports to LCSO during the week included identity theft, illegal dumping on property five miles south of New Moore, a possible structural fire reported on CR 29 about a half mile east of FM 1054, and domestic disturbances.

Woodwork

ANYONE who owns a computer and gets e-mail knows by now that 85 per cent of everything sent out on the internet is untrue, or at least just a rumor, posted by someone who wants you to believe something they just dreamed up.

That 85 per cent figure has been confirmed by Snopes, or Dopes, and should also be considered in light of one statement I got in an e-mail, that "92 per cent of all statistics are made up on the spot."

Occasionally someone sends me lists of home remedies for nearly everything, and sometimes they are true and sometimes they are not. These lists are usually interesting and perhaps worth checking out yourself, just in case these things work.

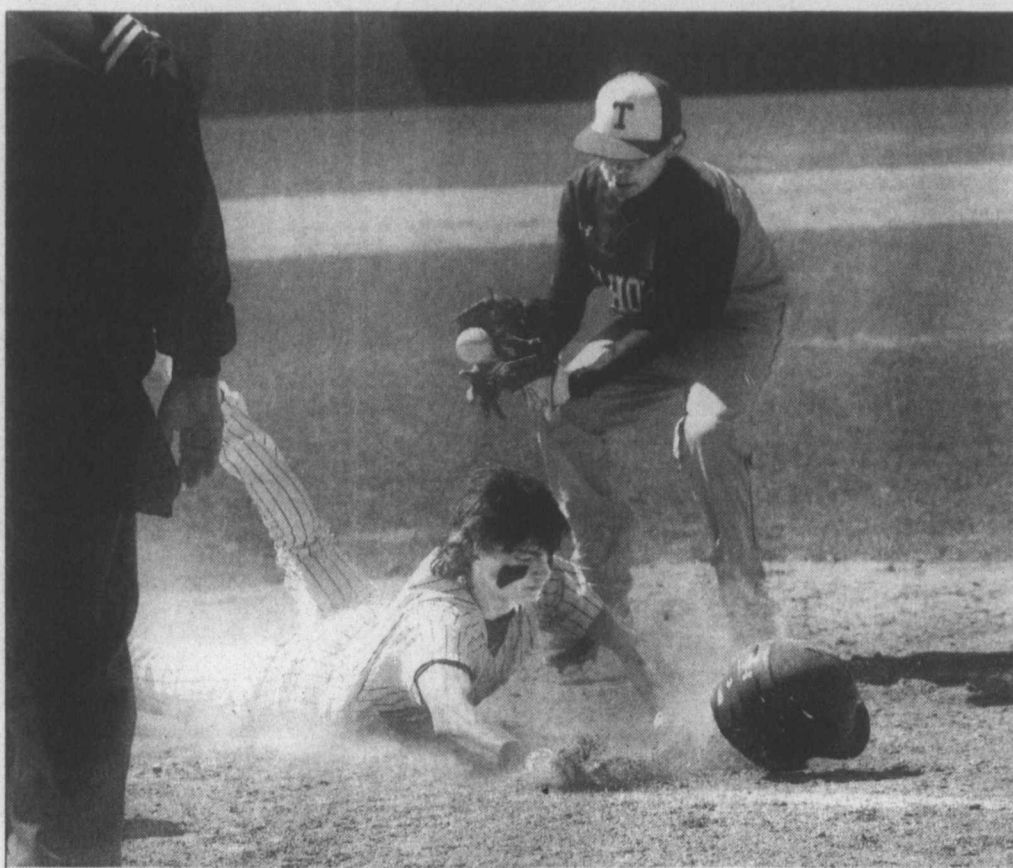

JTF Foundation assists families with children who have medical needs

The Joseph Thomas Foundation (JTF) is a non-profit foundation that can help medically fragile children and their families by helping cover expenses not covered by Medicaid and/or insurance. JTF's service area now includes Lynn County, and interested families are encouraged to apply for assistance.

The Joseph Thomas Foundation was established in 2007, by John and Erin Thomas after the loss of their 6 year old son who was born with multiple medical complications. While the big expenses of Joseph's conditions were covered by Medicaid, it was the constant barrage of little expenses that whittled away at their ability to simply survive financially. John and his wife felt a calling to help other families on a similar path. They started their non-profit, The Joseph Thomas Foundation, in honor of their son to help other families with expenses not covered by Medicaid and/or insurance.

They began by helping a few children a year, and in doing so, it helped them as grieving parents. Through the grace of God and continued support of friends and the community, the Joseph Thomas Foundation has exceeded all expectations. They have helped over 100 kids with over \$100,000. The foundation has expanded their service area throughout northwest Texas, and includes the Lynn County area.

JTF helps children from birth through high school with:

- Making their family vehicles wheelchair accessible.
- Surgery expenses and prescriptions.
- Leg braces and wheelchairs.
- Helping with treatment costs for cancer and cerebral palsy.
- Receiving ABA and Equine Therapy and much more.

"JTF's service area has grown from a few of Abilene's surrounding counties to 101 Texas counties. This newspaper's readership counties are all included. If you have, or know of, a medically fragile child that needs help, please go online to www.JosephThomasFoundation.org or keep in touch with JTF at www.facebook.com/JTF2007/," said Roenna Thomas, JTF Board member and Joseph's grandmother.

"The foundation has storage facilities located in Abilene, Lubbock, Wichita Falls and Weatherford, where donated medical supplies, supplements, and equipment can be donated. The Facebook page posts items available. If you have a need, you can fill out a Closet Request on our website," stated Thomas.

The foundation takes applications for assistance for equipment, therapy, or supplies through a form located

on their website. Any questions concerning the application can be answered with a phone call.

The foundation holds two main events a year for medically fragile children and their families – a Triathlon in February at PrimeTime in Abilene, and a Biathlon in November at Film Alley in Weatherford. Families can play miniature golf, Skee ball and bowl at these free events.

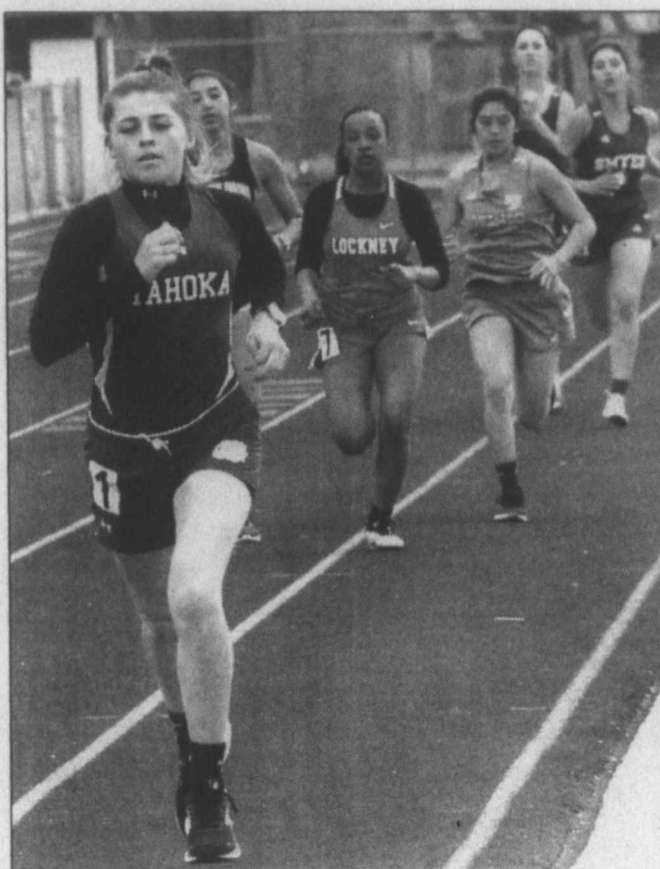
Lynn County 4-H Archery to begin

"Each year, HPWD funds a number of research and demonstration projects. We invite those with innovative ideas to submit requests for proposals. Since 2014, HPWD has provided more than \$500,000 in supplemental funding for research, demonstration, and education projects.

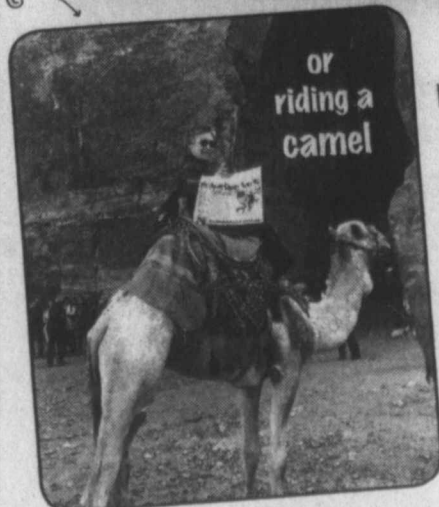
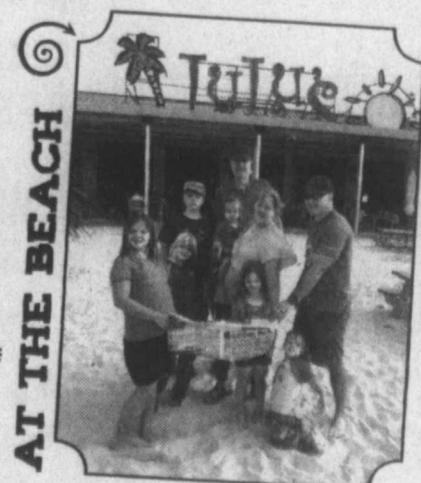

State bill could halt WCS' plans for spent nuclear fuel storage

ANDREWS – Waste Control Specialists (WCS) longtime efforts to construct a facility for interim storage of used nuclear fuel could be tabled if proposed state legislation passes this session.

State Rep. Brooks Landgraf recently filed House Bill 2692 that would prohibit the storage and disposal of high-level radioactive waste in West Texas.

WCS, which has pursued spent fuel storage for more than five years following a state evaluation of what to do with Texas' nuclear power plant waste, could receive a license from the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) the third quarter of this fiscal year, WCS representatives said.

WCS and partner Orano USA formed a joint venture known as Interim Storage Partners that submitted a revised license application in June 2018 to the NRC to construct a facility for spent fuel storage at the Andrews County site.

The intent is to provide a temporary storage solution for waste presently being stored on site at numerous nuclear facilities – some of which are shut down – across America. However, HB 2692 would prevent the interim storage facility's construction and operation.

Dawson Co. seeking bids on mineral lease

LAMESA – Dawson County officials are again seeking bids for an oil and gas lease involving mineral interests owned by the county.

Dawson County Judge Foy O'Brien said during a meeting of the Dawson County Commissioners Court that he has been approached by a company interested in leasing mineral interests owned by the county.

Those mineral rights, he said, are located beneath FM Highway 26 just off of US Hwy 87 south of Lamesa.

"It's not going to be a lot of money," O'Brien said. "I think the total acreage is less than five acres."

Members of the court agreed to seek bids to be opened on April 6.
