# **Regional Champion!** Warren Taylor set to tee off at State Golf Tournament

Tahoka High School senior Warren Taylor won the 2A Regional golf tournament in Canyon last weekend by carding a 74-77 for a total of 151 to claim the Regional title from among 90 competitors. With that championship title comes the honor of representing Tahoka High School at the State Golf Tournament in Kingsland on May 17-18. This will be Warren's second


trip to the state golf tournament. He qualified for regional competition every year of his high school career (except last year, his junior year, when the COVID-19 Pandemic cancelled all tournaments), and he made it to the state tournament as a sophomore.

This year, cold windy weather

plagued the regional tournament, but Taylor persevered for the championship title. He is the son of Clay and Celeste Taylor of Tahoka.

"Warren is a kid who I am extremely proud of. You talk about a guy who works hard to develop and maintain his craft - that is Warren," said Stephen Overstreet, Athletic Director for Tahoka ISD, and Warren's golf coach. "His passion and his overall mental approach to the game of golf is something so much wiser than his actual age. It doesn't matter the day, the conditions, or the things going on around him, he finds a way to get to the course and get better.





As of last Thursday, there had been more than 25 positive cases of canine distemper within the county.

Canine distemper is a highly contagious airborne virus spread by contact with an infected animal or placenta. It has a high mortality rate and surviving animals usually have irreparable nervous system damage.

There is no cure for canine distemper, but it is preventable through vaccinations. Snyder officials ask that canine owners make sure their pet receives its full series of distemper vaccinations as a puppy and keep vaccinations up to date throughout the animal's life.



# Lynn County Appraisal District Provides **Public Information and ASSISTANCE**

This is the time of year the Lynn County Appraisal District sends notices of appraised value. Lynn County notices will be mailed on May 1, 2021. Property owners will be mailed a notice as a result of any of the following circumstances affecting real property: if the 2021 proposed value is at least \$1000 more than the 2020 certified value; if the property owner has filed a timely rendition; if 2021 is the first year the property is listed in the appraisal records; if the property changed ownership during 2020; or if the property is a producing mineral interest. Notices will also be mailed to owners of taxable furniture, fixtures, machinery, equipment, vehicles, and inventory used in a trade or business.

Property owners who have questions, or want to discuss the value placed on their property should contact the appraisal district office. The legal deadline for filing a timely protest is thirty days from the date of your notice. Those who receive a notice in Lynn County have until June 1, 2021 to file a protest. If you believe the proposed market value of your property is incorrect, be sure to contact the appraisal district prior to your deadline. It is important to ask questions or call to our attention unusual facts about your property as soon as possible. In the case of value questions, property owners are urged to present conclusive evidence regarding the true market value of their property. Such evidence consists of closing statements, listing agreements, fee appraisals, income and expense statements, pictures, and surveys. Our goal is to treat all property owners in a fair and equitable manner; and this can best be accomplished when you provide evidence to us about your property as soon as possible.

The following publication is required by Section 41.70 of the Texas Property Tax Code.

# **Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures**

the appraised (market) value of your property;

> To the greatest extent practicable, the hearing will be informal. You must indicate your request for a telephone conference call hearing on your written notice of protest filed with ARB not later than the 10th day before the hearing date and provide your evidence and written affidavit before the ARB hearing begins. You may use the Comptroller Form 50-283, Property Owner's Affidavit of Evidence to the Appraisal Review Board, to submit evidence for your telephone conference call hearing or for hearing by affidavit.

### **Review by the ARB**

If you cannot resolve your problem informally with the CAD, you file a notice of protest requesting to have your case heard by the ARB.

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that hears and determines protests regarding property appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes based on evidence heard during the ARB hearing.

If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing and send you written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening or on a Saturday. You may use Comptroller Form 50-132, Property Appraisal - Notice of Protest, to file your written request for an ARB hearing.

Prior to your hearing, you may request a copy of the evidence the CAD plans to introduce at the hearing to establish any matter at issue. Before a hearing on a protest or immediately after the hearing begins, you or your agent and the CAD are required to provide each other with a copy of any materials (evidence) intended to be offered or submitted to the ARB at the hearing. Evidence may be submitted for any hearing type either in paper or on a small portable electronic device(such as CD, USB flash drive or thumb drive) which will be kept by the ARB. Do NOT bring evidence on a smart phone. The ARB's hearing procedures regarding all the requirements to

You and the CAD representative have the opportunity to present evidence about your case. In most cases, the CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented.

In certain protests, the chief appraiser has the burden of proving the property's value by clear and convincing evidence. You should review ARB hearing procedures to learn more about evidence and related matters

You should not try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. ARB members are required to sign an affidavit saying that they have not talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

### Review by the District Court, an Arbitrator or SOAH

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you are not satisfied with the ARB's decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. As an alternative to district court, you may appeal through binding arbitration or the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH) if you meet the qualifying criteria.

If you choose to go to district court, you must start the process by filing a petition with the district court within 60 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If you chose to appeal through binding arbitration, you must file a request for binding arbitration with the CAD not later than the 60th day after you receive notice of the ARB order. If you chose to appeal to the SOAH, you must file an appeal with the CAD not later than the 30th day after you receive notice of the ARB's order. Appeals to district court, binding arbitration, or SOAH all require payment of certain fees or deposits.

### **Tax Payment**

You must pay the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute, the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken or the amount of taxes due in the previous year.


