THE RIGHT STUFF THS Valedictorian Molly Broun to attend US Air Force Academy

It's been a lifelong dream, backed up with determination and a mindset as a freshman that was geared towards choosing the best academic and extracurricular paths in her high school career that would lead straight to the doors of a life-changing opportunity – for a chance to be accepted in an exclusive military academy that allows only a select few to enter their topnotch programs. But meet Molly Broun, a 17-year-old Tahoka High School senior, who has been accepted to – not one, but two – of these academies. She is excited about her future, and a world-class education is a big step in the right direction.

There are only five United States military academies – the Air Force, Navy, Army, Coast Guard, and Merchant Marines. All are extremely selective. Despite the indisputable odds being against her acceptance, Molly persevered in her quest for achieving her dream. According to the National Center for Education Statistics, 41,989 people applied to the five military academies for the Class of 2023. However, there are only about 4,100 slots available each year.

That puts the overall service academy acceptance rate at around 9.8%.

Molly, a small-statured blonde with big hopes and dreams, is the Tahoka High School Valedictorian for the Class of 2021. She evidently has the "right stuff," because both the U.S. Air Force Academy and U.S. Naval Academy approved her applications, notifying her that she could be a member of the Class of 2025.

Being accepted by both academies

Defendant gets deferred adjudication

First jury trial held here since Pandemic began

In 106th District Court proceedings held here Tuesday and Wednesday, April 27-28, Miguel Angel Garza, 23, was sentenced to 5 years incarceration in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice system, that was deferred to 10 years Community Supervision, after a jury found him guilty of charges of Evading Arrest with a Motor Vehicle.

It was the first jury trial held in the 106th Judicial District Court here in more than a year, due to the reduced COVID-19 restrictions recommended by the Texas Supreme Court and the Office of Court Administration. District Judge Reed A. Filley was the presiding judge for the trial.

The charges stemmed from an incident on July 20, 2019, when Garza reportedly led Tahoka and Lynn County law enforcement agencies in a chase pursuit just before midnight, crisscrossing across both US 380 and US 87 as he evaded officers. A Tahoka Police officer

attempted to stop the man who was traveling west in a Chevrolet Suburban on US 380 towards Tahoka, after he observed the vehicle traveling 72 mph in a 55 mph zone at the city limits. According to law enforcement reports, the driver, identified as 21-year-old Miguel Angel Garza of Brownfield, refused to stop, speeding up as he drove west down Lockwood Street in Tahoka, then making several high speed turns through town and running stop signs at every intersection as he moved erratically through the town. He eventually turned east on N. 6th and reached the west 87 Access Road, then sped, bouncing, across the ditches and median across US 87, continuing on N. 6th until it ended at the Compress parking lot. He turned north, went into a field, and came out of the field jumping the east side ditch on CR R just north of N. 7th and Ave. D. The vehicle stopped when it high-centered on the embankment on the east side of the ditch. The man then jumped out of the Subur-

ban and ran away on foot.

By that point, city and county officers were all involved in trying to locate the man who had fled on foot. Police Chief Jeff Parker located footprints in the field that indicated the man had headed west, and in several minutes the Lynn County Sheriff radioed in that he had found the man behind the Tahoka Motel. Police arrested the man on charges of Evading Arrest or Detention with a Motor Vehicle, a third-degree felony.

When the vehicle went into a field, it struck a well on the private property, causing damage. In the trial proceedings, Garza was instructed to pay restitution of \$2,495.05 to the owner, as well as pay a \$1,000 fine and court costs in the case.

The trial proceedings were held in the District Courtroom in the Lynn County Courthouse, but because several hundred jurors were called to appear for the jury selection, the first day of the trial that involved jury selection was held at

the Tahoka High School gymnasium due to the social distancing recommendations still in place.

Judge Filley expressed his appreciation to school officials for allowing the use of the gym for the jury selection process.

"Thank you Acting Superintendent Gary Harrell and Principal Don Worth for all your efforts to help make this happen. Thank you to the staff and students at the school who helped set up and clean up. Thank you to all the members of law enforcement who provided security. Thank you to the District Clerk's office and the Treasurer's office. And thank you to all the Lynn County citizens who appeared for jury duty," Judge Filley stated.

"Very few people enjoy being called for jury duty, but the right to a trial by jury is part of what makes our legal system the best in the world. It tells a lot about a community when so many people can come together to help make the system work!" he added.

Chiari Malformation (kee-AH-ree mal-for-MAY-shun) is a condition in which the brain tissue extends into the spinal canal. It occurs when part of the skull is abnormally small or misshapen, pressing on the brain and forcing it downward. Craniosynostosis is a birth defect in which the bones in a baby's skull join together too early. This happens before the baby's brain is fully formed.

Upon diagnosis Carlos' mother, Ashley Munoz, quit her job and became a full time caretaker to

Carlos. He had surgery almost a year ago to correct the Chiari Malformation. The surgery itself was

successful; however, Carlos is now having complications due to the

Bringing back the tradition ... Harvest Festival sets Sept. 25 date, moving back to courthouse square

After taking a hiatus during 2020's Covid-19 Pandemic, the Lynn County Harvest Festival is coming back this year, and it's coming back with quite a few changes. For the first time ever, the festival will not be held in conjunction with the Tahoka Homecoming festivities, and the location is moving back to the downtown square in Tahoka.

The Harvest Festival moved to the Tahoka mini-park in 2017 during the courthouse renovation, and remained there through 2019. In 2020, the event was cancelled due to the Pandemic, and this year the event is moving back to the courthouse square — but there is a new requirement. Instead of vendors and games on the grassy lawn surrounding the courthouse, this time it's moving out to the streets in the downtown area.

"Because the courthouse grounds were part of the renovation, with new underground sprinkler systems, county officials have stated that no lawn chairs, awnings, or tents may be placed on the grassy areas," stated Courtney Stennett, who was elected as chairman of the newly-reorganized Harvest Festival Committee in action taken at last Tuesday night's meeting.

"All of the activities will be moved into the streets in the downtown area, and we plan to close the downtown streets to traffic south of the traffic light," said Stennett.

The committee also decided to separate the 2021

Harvest Festival from the Tahoka Homecoming, for several reasons. The 2021 THS Homecoming is scheduled for Sept. 3, which is very early in the school year and makes it difficult for princess and queen contestants to have time to sell tickets, which is a primary fundraiser for the festival. Additionally, that is also Labor Day weekend, and it was felt that attendance might be poor due to many people traveling for three-day vacations. And, a final reason to try a different date from Tahoka's Homecoming was to separate the festival from being considered a "Tahoka" festival and possibly enticing more participation from schools, organizations and citizens from the other communities in Lynn County.

After some discussion, the committee voted to set the date for the last Saturday in September, on Sept. 25, and to see how the Lynn County Harvest Festival does on its own.

After making a plea for new volunteers to join the HF Committee, much interest has been shown by more than a dozen new members, who are eager to reinvent the county festival and are bringing energy and new ideas to the table, including new band(s) for the day as well as for a street dance, expanding the vendor areas throughout the downtown street area, new entertainment throughout the day, and more.

In addition to Stennett named chairman, Marisa

Still the best! Tahoka 3-D Band earns 19th consecutive Sweepstakes

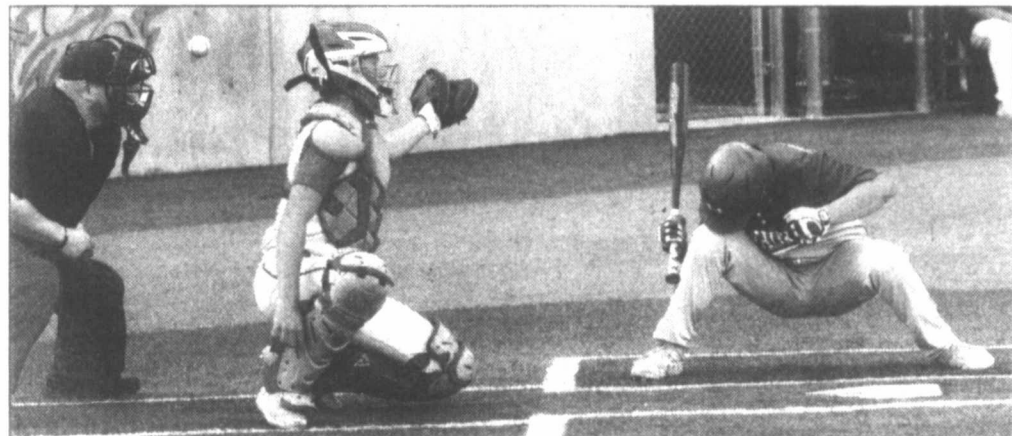

ELECTION RESULTS

NHISD bond approved, TISD trustees retain seats

Voters marked ballots in three area elections on Saturday, May 1, including a bond election for New Home ISD, choosing a mayor and a city council member for the City of New Home, and re-electing two trustees in the Tahoka ISD election.

Voters approved an \$18-million bond for New Home Independent School District. The bond passed 150-82, and the funds will be used for the construction of a new elementary campus and football and track facility.

Shane Fiedler, NHISD Superintendent, said that the construction project would take approximately 2.5-3 years to complete, and that the district would use portable buildings for extra classrooms during the interim period to accommodate the number of students in the district.

In the Tahoka ISD Board

of Trustees election, incumbents Clay Taylor and Lea Swinford retained their At-Large seats for another three-year term. Taylor led the ticket of five candidates with 177 votes, and Swinford carried 147 votes. Mike Rivas had 67, Nathan Garcia 35, and Pablo Herevia 12.

In the City of New Home election, interim mayor Brad Emert carried 50 votes to win the two-year term for mayor, over Imelda Mendez Willis, who had 12 votes. Jason Reyes, unopposed in his bid for a seat on the New Home City Council, had 42 votes to win the seat.

REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL FOR CONSTRUCTION

Nursing Home and Hospital Renovations and Additions

Lynn County Healthcare System (LCH) invites proposals from qualified contractors to serve as Construction Manager-at-Risk on a project involving the construction of a new ground up Nursing Home and renovations/additions to the existing Hospital in Tahoka, Texas. The project site is located at 2600 Lockwood Street, Tahoka, Texas 79373.

The selection process will be a one-step process per Tex. Gov't Code Section 2269.253. The Lynn County Healthcare System reserves the right to negotiate with any or all proposers at any time before or after submission of a proposal. LCH reserves the right to reject any or all proposals and to waive technicalities.

The general scope of the project is as follows: serve as Construction Manager-at-Risk on a project involving all aspects of construction of the facilities at Lynn County Hospital. This includes working with Studio Eles (the architectural firm), providing consultation during and after design of the facilities and serving as general contractor on the project. The project consists of a 40,500 square foot Nursing Home that includes 28 standard resident beds, a 12 bed Memory Care unit, dedicated ancillary services for these units, a full commercial Kitchen, Servery, Dining room, Receiving space, Physical Therapy, Chapel, Hair & Nail Salon, Administrative offices and (2) internal courtyards. It also consists of 15,250 square feet of additions and 10,625 square feet of renovations to the Hospital. The additions include a separate Isolation wing comprised of primarily (4) private patient rooms, the connector from the Hospital to the Nursing Home which includes (2) semiprivate patient rooms and (3) private patient rooms, a front entrance, lobby, reception desk and administration suite, a (3) procedure emergency department and a 1 provider fast track clinic. The renovations include the billing department, public servery and dining room, a community room and (14) existing patient rooms.

The contractor must ensure all construction is completed in compliance with all state and federal regulations and in congruence with regulations from the Texas Department of Health and Human Services including the Texas Department of Aging and Disability Services and within CMS guidelines. The selected contractor will be expected to agree to a guaranteed maximum price on the project. The proposed start date is January 15, 2022.

The criteria that will be used for selection of the contractor, as well as the weight assigned to each criteria are as follows:

- 39% Prior hospital construction
- 20% Prior construction experience in West Texas within a 220 mile radius of Lynn County
- 10% Experience of superintendent leading the project
- 10% Costs & Fees
- 8% References
- 8% Experience working with an Architect during design phase
- 5% Financial Stability & Satisfactory Bond

The submitted proposal should address each criteria above, including the contractor's proposed fees and prices for fulfilling the project requirements. LCH takes fees and costs into consideration, but is not required to select the lowest bidder.

The estimated construction budget for the project is \$16 million.

Sealed proposals will be accepted at the Lynn County Healthcare System administration office located at 2600 Lockwood St. Tahoka, Texas until 10am on May 20, 2021. Proposals will be opened publicly at Lynn County Hospital 10am on May 21, 2021 in the hospital board room. Contractor interviews will be held May 26 and scheduled with each GC in advance. The award will be made during the regular board meeting which will begin at noon on June 9, 2021. Proposals received after 10am on May 20, 2021 will not be accepted.

A pre-proposal virtual meeting will be held on Tuesday May 18 at 9am. A transcript of the pre-proposal meeting events will be available on Tuesday May 18 after 3pm for those unable to call in. Clarifications including the project scope and duration are available immediately.

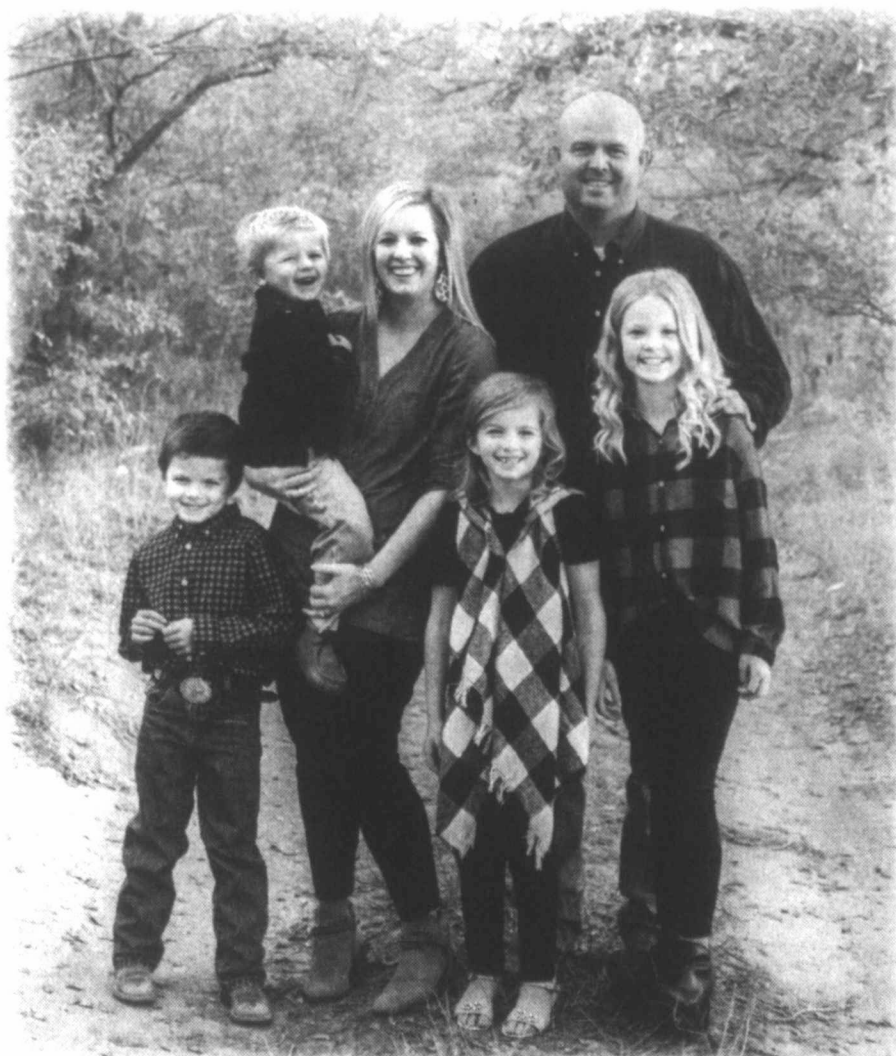

And the city moves on... It's warm, kind of, and thoughts turn to keeping our yards alive. The City has decided to try a new watering plan. We may water two days a week for two hours each of those days. Homes with addresses ending in odd numbers will water on Tuesdays and Fridays. Those with addresses ending in even numbers will water on Mondays and Thursdays. Citizens,

even those with private wells, are urged to avoid watering between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. as the heat will evaporate much of the water before it can do any good. So, choose your two hours prior to 10 in the morning and after 6 in the evening. Sit on the porch, drink some tea, and smell the sprinkler on the grass. If you close your eyes, it almost seems like rain....

Back to real life. We are charged for the water we use, \$38 for the first 5,000 gallons and \$8 per every 1000 gallons after that. So, watch your water bill to determine how close you are getting to additional charges. Also, if the city water usage gets too close to 100,000 gallons in a day, we will have to cut back to 1 day of watering per week. Water wisely!

The next city council meeting will be Tuesday, May 25, at 7 p.m.

Finally, the café is set to reopen under new management soon! Good times.

Molly Broun has the right stuff ...

created a dilemma that she never dreamed she would face — making the difficult choice of which academy to attend.

After much consideration, Molly made the tough decision, and actually surprised herself by choosing to accept the appointment from the U.S. Air Force Academy.

The surprise was because, in all of her planning and dreaming, it is the Naval Academy that has long been her goal. Her family has a lengthy history with the U.S. Navy, as her father, aunt and uncle, grandfather, and great-grandfather, have all served (or still serving, in her aunt and uncle's case) in the Navy.

"My plan all along was to go for the U.S. Naval Academy," Molly told *The News*. "When I was younger, about the time I became a freshman, I told my Dad that I knew I wanted a military career, but I also wanted to go to college. He told me to try for the Academy, and that's when I began researching how to go about the application process, and the timeline for all the steps required," she said, noting that she planned her high school courses, extracurricular activities and leadership opportunities to fit the profile of what they were looking for, and carefully maintained a high grade point average.

Molly is the daughter of William and Karina Broun, and the granddaughter of Andy and Lynn Broun, all of Tahoka. She has an older sister, Alicia Broun, a THS graduate who is in college in New Mexico, and two brothers, Zeke Luna and Xose Hernandez, who attend Tahoka ISD.

Molly says she was encouraged to apply to more than one academy, and in fact was told to apply to all

five. However, after seeing the coursework for the Merchant Marines and Coast Guard academies she felt like those were not a good fit for her, and the Army's application process was different from the Navy and Air Force process, so she focused mainly on the latter two. These applications required a long litany of conditions, including multiple teacher evaluations, writing samples, letters of recommendation, extracurricular components, strict medical and weight requirements, personal data records, and more.

During her junior and senior years she was actively involved in the application process with both academies, and in fact was enrolled to attend a week-long summer seminar at the Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland in the summer of 2020, which would give her a taste of academy life and a chance to learn firsthand about the programs there. The COVID-19 Pandemic, however, cancelled the seminars and instead she had to participate virtually.

"I was really disappointed that I didn't get to go, because it just wasn't the same as being there. I did belong to a team, however, and met others that I still am in contact with," says Molly.

Fulfilling the application requirements for both academies continued throughout her senior year, including some physical fitness tasks that she credits her cross-country coach and others at Tahoka ISD with helping her achieve.

"I had to complete a Candidate Fitness Assessment (CFA), and turn that in. It's a timed test that includes basketball throws, pull-ups, shuttle run, sit-ups, push-ups and finishes with a one-mile run,"

Molly explained.

According to the US Air Force admissions information, the CFA is a test of strength, agility, speed and endurance designed to help determine whether a candidate possesses the stamina required to successfully complete the physical program at the Academy. Molly said the pull-ups were the most difficult for her, but she compensated in other areas for a good composite score.

She actually found out in March that both academy appointments had been approved, from a surprise phone call from U.S. Congressman Jodey Arrington, who had agreed to nominate Molly in the application process. A nomination from a congressman is just one of many requirements that candidates must fulfill, along with high academic, physical, character and medical standards to be eligible for an appointment.

"He called my dad, and asked to speak to me, and I just figured he was calling to tell me congratulations because I had recently received a letter from him stating his nomination of me to the academies," said Molly. "But then he said, congratulations on your appointments ... and I was shocked! I said, wait, what?!, and he said that I had received appointments from both the U.S. Air Force and U.S. Naval Academies. I couldn't believe it!" said Molly. She later received official notifications from the two academies that stated her appointments had been approved.

Last week, Molly formally accepted the Air Force appointment. She will join the cadets at the United States Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, CO who receive a world-class education that

prepares them for careers as leaders working for the most advanced air and space forces in the world. Not only is the tuition cost-free, but cadets actually get paid a salary, and all living expenses are paid by the USAF as well, during the four-year academy. Graduates in the program are obligated to serve a certain number of years in the Air Force, depending upon their career choices.

"I'm excited to see what my choices will be," Molly said. "There are so many career opportunities in the Air Force. I'm interested in becoming a pilot, so we'll see if flight school becomes an opportunity for me. And now the Air Force has a Space Force! Wouldn't that be something?!" she said, with awe in her voice.

The next big step for Molly is actually a local one. She will give the Valedictorian speech at Tahoka High School's Class of 2021 com-

mencement exercises on May 21.

Within a month after high school graduation, Molly will be traveling to Colorado Springs where she will report to Basic Camp on June 24 — one day after her 18th birthday. Her academic classes will start in August, and will continue along with the training schedules.

"I'm ready. I'm a little scared, but I figure everyone else in the freshman cadet class is in the same boat with me, and if they can do it, I can do it," she states emphatically.

She says her family fully supports her.

"My grandmother never doubted that I would get accepted," says Molly with a laugh. "All along, she would say, 'you'll get accepted, I know you will' but I just wasn't sure. And I would think, 'oh, don't jinx it, I'm not in yet!' When I did finally get accepted, she just said, 'I told you so!'," she added.

It appears that her grandmother was right all along. Molly will be attending one of the top universities in the country and will have the opportunity to develop her skills as she joins other leaders and officers of character who exemplify courage, dedication and a desire to serve others as they make a difference in the Air Force.

If it's not a first, it has been many years since Tahoka ISD has had a student accepted into one of the exclusive U.S. military academies. Molly is setting a high standard, however, by being accepted by both the Air Force and Naval Academies. It is an accomplishment in and of itself, but the opportunities afforded to her upon completion of the Air Force Academy could be life-changing for this young woman.

With her "can do" attitude, it will be interesting to see where this turning point takes young Molly Broun.
