Tahoka woman jailed after calling police to report "missing lampshades" at her home

A woman who called police saying someone had "stolen her lampshades" ended up in jail this week. Tahoka Police responded to a residence in the 1700 block of South 2nd at 9:45 a.m. Sunday, June 6 in response to the call, where the woman told officers that someone must have come into her home and stolen her lampshades. During the investigation the officer reportedly saw narcotics and narcotics paraphernalia in plain sight in the residence. The female, Guadalupe Vargas/Garcia, was arrested on felony charges of possession of narcotics and narcotics paraphernalia.

Another female was arrested at 2:50 p.m. Sunday, after Tahoka Police were called to a location at South 6th and Ave. D in response to a caller reporting a suspicious vehicle on the property. Officers discovered narcotics inside the vehicle, and arrested Kristall Munoz for felony possession of narcotics.

Police arrested a man on charges of disorderly conduct and public intoxication, after responding to a residence in the 2000 block of N. 4th at 3:30 a.m. Friday, June 4. A fight reportedly occurred between two males, and one male was arrested at the scene, with charges reportedly pending on the other male as well.

At 2 p.m. Friday, a woman in the 1600 block of Ave. L told police that while she was standing outside a man pulled up in a vehicle and reportedly asked if she was interested in having a sexual relationship. She gave a description of the man and vehicle to police. Officers were unable to locate the vehicle but were patrolling the area to watch for it.

Police responded to the Tahoka Elementary Gym at 8 p.m. June 4, for a report of criminal mischief. Someone had spray painted obscenities on the west side of the building's exterior wall.

Criminal mischief was reported at 6:30 p.m. June 1, at a residence in the 1700 block of South 3rd. A woman told police that her boyfriend her punched her television and caused damage to it.

Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept. was called to a residence in the 2300 block of N. 5th St., where a shed in the back yard was reportedly on fire, at 8:30 p.m. June 5.

Police were called to a location at South 3rd and Ave. E at noon June 1, where someone was reported to be burning wood/limbs outdoors on the premises. Police informed the resident that outdoor burning was illegal inside the city limits, and the resident complied, putting out the fire.

Lynn County Sheriff's Office responded to several calls for minor incidents during the past week, including a report of an unwanted person at 7 p.m. June 2, when a caller reported that a 9-year-old boy riding around in a toy Jeep in Wilson was causing her dogs to bark and that he was throwing

rocks at the dogs. A deputy responding to the scene said that no crime was committed by the child, who was being supervised by his grandmother.

Wheaties, endorsed by a lot of athletes as the "breakfast of champions," were so popular that for years if someone showed any signs of weakness, like not being able to lift something, someone invariably would ask them if they ate their Wheaties that morning.

I'm not positive that Wheaties and Post Toasties are even sold these days, but they probably are.

Anyway, whether it's breakfast cereal or something else, we are supposed to eat breakfast (and maybe skip the evening meal, which almost nobody does). I eat breakfast only a couple of times a week, unless coffee and a muffin counts. My favorite breakfast would be eggs and bacon or ham and biscuits with lots of butter



Thomas Brothers Drug ... This picture at the Tahoka Pioneer Museum shows the Thomas Brothers Drug Store building that was erected in 1916, following the devastating Dec. 30, 1915 fire that wiped out all buildings on the north side of the Tahoka square. M.E. Gilmore operated the first drug store here in 1903, sold to Dr. S.H Windham, and Dr. Windham sold to A.I. and C.A. Thomas in 1906. W.C. Thomas soon bought A.I.'s interest. They sold to their nephew, Wynne Collier in the mid-1930s, and later it became Dayton Parker Pharmacy. Drs. Turrentine, Gallaway, and Singleton, various attorneys, and insurance agents, occupied the upstairs offices for many years, and a barbershop was in the downstairs east half of the building. Today, the building is the Lynn County Healthcare System Fitness and Rehab Center.


