# Locals eager to see completion of new TISD sports complex

**G f you build it, he will come,**" an iconic phrase from a popular baseball film released in 1989 entitled "Field of Dreams," could be the slogan for Tahoka Independent School District's new sports complex. Local citizens have watched the progression of construction for the new gymnasium, softball and baseball fields, and field house and football practice field that has been underway since early last year, and are eager to see the completion of the complex.

Voters approved a \$7.5 million bond election in May 2019 for the sports complex and other district improvements. Groundbreaking for the project was held in early February 2020, at a 31-acre tract of land located northwest of the intersection of North 5th and Ave. P, one block north of the current high school gymnasium.



The project is under the direction of Lee Lewis Construction, and Chapman Harvey Architects designed the sports facilities.

It shouldn't be too much longer before citizens will get an opportunity to see the finished product. According to school officials, the project is due to be finished by the end of July.

"The completion date is the question we've been asking, and I was told at a recent construction meeting that we should be able to take occupancy of the facilities on July 29," Superintendent Torrey Price told *The News*.

He said that the two layers of plywood subfloors were installed in the gym last week, and the wood plank flooring has been laid, but not yet finished. The individual chairs for seating on both the home and visitors sides will soon be installed, as well as bench seating for a student section on the east end of the court. Lights and scoreboards have already been installed in the gym, and the glass for the wall of windows between the gym foyer and court was scheduled for installation last week. The baseball and softball fields are mostly complete, with tarp shade coverings still to be installed over the stadium seating in both facilities, as well as other mintor details, according to school officials. Scoreboards and lights have been completed at both fields. In the field house, a major amount of work is still underway, and sod has been laid on the football practice field to prepare it for use in early August when two-aday football practice is scheduled to begin.

These new sports facilities have been long overdue for many years, to replace the decades-old facilities that have been serving Tahoka ISD.

From a recent walk-thru for photos, it appears this new complex is going to be something in which Tahoka citizens can take great pride. The design of the complex allows for sharing of concession and restroom facilities in the gym with the baseball and softball fields, and a large parking area has been allocated for these areas.

The new gym will have individual seating for 650, and an additional student section with bench seating. A large foyer features a wall of windows that allow for watching the action on the court, and a spacious concessions area features public access for selling concessions on two sides – one opening facing the foyer for gym

# Wreck south of Tahoka results in fatality

Three accidents were reported this week in Lynn County, with one fatality resulting from a wreck where a Dodge Ram pickup drifted off onto the shoulder and struck a parked tractor-trailer.

That accident occurred at 10:30 p.m. on Sunday night, June 20th. According to Texas DPS reports, the driver of the 2012 Dodge Ram pickup, James Dean Levasseur, 58, of Williston, ND was pronounced dead at the scene after his vehicle struck the side of a parked 2014 Peterbilt truck tractor that was towing a semi-trailer which had broken down and had parked on the shoulder of the southbound lanes approximately 6 miles south of Tahoka on U.S. 87. Lynn County Sheriff's office, Tahoka and O'Donnell fire departments and Lynn County EMS all responded to the scene where both northbound and southbound lanes were shut down for a short while.

On June 16, a two-vehicle accident was reported at FM 1730 and CR1 with injuries. The vehicles involved were a black Ford pickup and a red Ford Fusion. No other information was available about the drivers.

Another accident was reported on June 18, north of O'Donnell. A caller advised a car had rear-ended a truck and vehicle was about to catch on fire. O'Donnell fire department was dispatched to the scene. Injuries were minor and vehicle was towed from the scene.

In other reports a female driver was arrested after she attempted to evade a Lynn County deputy during a routine traffic stop. The chase started at 9:00 p.m. last Tuesday, June 15 in the northbound lanes of US 87 and reached speeds of up to 110 mph. Lubbock County and Lubbock DPS was notified for assistance and the Lynn County deputy was able to stop the driver about 2 miles north of FM 41. The female driver was arrested and transported to Lynn County jail.

On June 17 at 6:14 pm Lynn County SO received a call from Dawson County that they were looking for an older model red Suburban that was supposedly driving erratically and slowly northbound on US 87. Later at 6:35 pm LCSO received another call from a driver who stated he almost rear-ended a red Suburban going only about 10-15 mph near the FM 400 overpass on US 87. After receiving numerous other calls the LCSO deputy spotted the vehicle just north of Poka Lambro travelling north. While attempting to stop the vehicle the



· There shall be no items placed on gravesites or headstones. Only flowers in a vase that is attached to the headstone. There can be no items or lights hanging in trees or on gravesites.


· Flowers are permitted, but will be taken away once artificial flowers are faded or when once fresh flowers that have turned brown, as well as faded ribbons.

### Annual health insurance plan approved for county employees

Lynn County Commissioners met in regular session at 9:30 a.m. Monday, June 14, considering employee health insurance plans and other routine business, as well as hearing an update from Lynn County Judge Mike Braddock on the damage assessment that is currently underway for the repairs caused by flooding at the courthouse in late May.

Judge Braddock explained that assessments were still being made for repairs to ceilings, walls, flooring and other areas that were damaged by the water that gushed into the building after a waterline connection burst off a pump in a ceiling, which is part of the geothermal heating/air system in the building. Braddock said that he plans to meet with a representative of a new company that provides geothermal systems to discuss possible options to the courthouse system

Commissioners voted to accept an employee health insurance plan with Blue Cross Blue Shield, for 2021-2022.

After some discussion, commissioners also voted to approve budget amendments by department instead of by line item, if the amendments fit within the departmental budgets.

Commissioners voted to accept bids for a lease purchase with trade-in for a motorgrader for Precinct 1; and approved finance reports and payment of monthly bills.

Some discussion was held on the possibility of selling the county-owned Animal Shelter facilities to the City of Tahoka, as it is now the City that actually manages and operates the shelter. A possible interlocal agreement between the City of Tahoka and Lynn County was also approved by commissioners on the county's end, for a daily rate for housing inmates with Class C Misdemeanors only, at the county jail. The agreement will go back to the city for consideration before

#### Guns found in backpacks at Lamesa ISD

LAMESA - Awareness and prompt action by a school teacher and others led to the recent discovery of a pair of handguns in the backpacks brought to school by two young students at Lamesa's South Elementary campus, according to Lamesa Police Chief Josh Peterson.

Although noting that an investigation continues into the June 2 incident, Peterson said that neither he nor his officers believe the students had any malicious intent in bringing the guns to school.

The two students are siblings and both are under the age of 8, he said.

South Elementary serves student in pre-kindergarten through second grade. The school year had ended for older students the previous Friday, but elementary students continued going to school the first four days of June. A teacher greeting students to assist them with backpacks or other needs told police she thought one of the backpacks was heavier than it should be. When the teacher opened the backpack and looked inside, Peterson said, she discovered a .40-caliber semiautomatic pistol.

The backpack with the gun was taken immediately to the school office and the school's resource officer was contacted, who contacted the child's parents. According to police, the father came to the school and informed the officers he had two guns missing from his safe at the house.

That's when a second gun, which Peterson described as a .38-caliber revolver, was found in a backpack brought to school by a sibling of the original student involved. Both firearms were found within 30 minutes of the students' arrival at school. Peterson said one of the firearms did have bullets with it,

but the gun was not loaded.

While the students are too young to face any type of criminal charge, Peterson said no decision has been made yet on whether any charges will be filed against any adults. - from the Lamesa Press-Reporter



#### Brownfield's family aquatic center to remain closed

BROWNFIELD - In a special meeting, the Brownfield City Council came to the decision to not open the Family Aquatic Center this summer. City Manager Jeff Davis, Parks and Recreation Director Scott Jackson, and Water Director James Nix all recommended to the city council to not open the pool this summer and instead, work on getting it fixed for next year.

The council voted to close the aquatic center, bring in engineers and have the pool properly fixed for next year.

"We have discovered several more leaks underneath the floor of the pool," said Davis. "It will require the cutting of the floor of the pool itself. Now its kind of up in arms whether we will open or not, and I don't see it happening. I personally think we ought to slow down and get this thing repaired. Get some people in here and cut the floor."
