attended last Thursday night's Town Hall meeting at the school auditorium to learn about an ambitious \$22-million project that will modernize Lynn County Healthcare System facilities. Dr. Melanie Richburg, Chief Executive Officer of LCH, presented a slide show presentation about the project for the 20-30 citizens on hand.

The hospital facilities, located on the western edge of the Tahoka city limits, were built in 1970, and opened its doors in January of 1971 providing inpatient and outpatient services and emergency room services. Now celebrating its 50th year, Lynn County Hospital is one of only a few remaining independent hospitals, and is overseen by a seven-member locally-elected Board of Directors, which currently include Sharon Isham, W. Calloway Huffaker, Dr. Ed Smith, Manuel DeLeon, Mary Gayle Raindl; Jana Bishop, and Connie Donald.

The LCH Board of Directors approved the \$22-million project earlier this year, and are undergoing the process for acquiring funding for the project through a USDA loan. The project includes major renovations and additions to the hospital, including a new emergency room addition, and a 40-bed nursing home addition on hospital property west of Lynnwood Independent and Assisted Living Center.

Before the Town Hall presentation began, a slide show of photos showing community and employee events allowed citizens to see what Dr. Richburg described as "the happy faces and smiles of everyone - without masks."

Downtown Strategies team meets for walking tour here

walking tour in the downtown area of Tahoka is not a usual sight here, but that's just what a group of more than a dozen people did last Wednesday morning, walking from the Tahoka Life Enrichment Center on Main Street to the square around the Lynn County Courthouse, looking at current businesses and vacant buildings, and imagining what the realm of possibilities could be here.



A walkable downtown area with inviting shops, restaurants, and other venues to entice people to spend time in the downtown area is just what the group is targeting, and the first steps to achieving that goal were taken here Wednesday

morning. The Tahoka Economic Development Corporation (TEDC) has hired Downtown Strategies, a consulting firm that specializes in solutions for community development and downtown revitalization, to partner with a taskforce comprised of local citizens to help Tahoka devise a plan to revitalize the downtown area.

Jenn Gregory, President of Downtown Strategies, and Elliott Cook, Director of Real Estate for Downtown Strategies, met with TEDC Director David Partlow, City Administrator Julie Arrington, and more than a dozen citizens who have consented to serve on a downtown revitalization committee, in a strategic visioning workshop here last Wednesday. 



Earthquake felt near Snyder

SNYDER - A magnitude 3.4 earthquake was recorded east of Snyder early Thursday morning, July 1.

According to information from the United States Geological Survey (USGS), the earthquake hit about 12:30 a.m. The epicenter was 11 kilometers - approximately 6.82 miles - northeast of Hermleigh and 13.3 miles east of Snyder at a depth of 6.1 kilometers.

The earthquake was near where a magnitude 2.5 earthquake struck in April. That temblor occurred approximately six miles north-northeast of Hermleigh. The epicenter was about two

The highest magnitude quake in recent history was a 4.3 magnitude quake on Sept. 11, 2011.

Until recently, earthquakes here had been centered north of Snyder, near the Kent County line.

USDA seeks new partnerships to restore wetland ecosystems

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is investing up to \$17 million for conservation partners to help protect and restore critical wetlands on agricultural lands through the Wetland Reserve Enhancement Partnership (WREP). USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) is prioritizing proposals that focus on assisting historically underserved producers conserving wetlands. Proposals from partners are due August 15, 2021.

Restored wetlands help to improve water quality downstream, enhance wildlife from flooding and provide recreational benefits.

"Our goal is to support agricultural producers in their efforts to conserve natural resources on their land," said Kristy Oates, conservationist Texas. "Wetland Reserve Enhancement Partnerships help partners and producers work together to protect ecosystems working lands.'

Through WREP projects, eligible conservation partners protect, restore and enhance high-priority wetlands on agriculture lands. WREP wetland restoration on working landscapes, providing meaningful benefits to farmers and ranchers who enroll in the program and to wetlands exist.

Eligible include Tribes, state and local governments and nongovernment organizations. WREP partners are required to contribute a financial or technical assistance fund by match. WREP funding is for and enrollment on October 1, 2021.

want to keep our hospital going forward, we are planning to make some significant changes," she added.

The scope of the project encompasses renovation and expansion to modernize the hospital, and Dr. Richburg showed an architect's rendering of the current and expanded facilities.

"The plan calls for tearing down the current clinic/ administrative wing on the west side of the hospital and constructing a new ER wing, including a bay for ambulances to unload patients into the ER treatment area, and an easily-accessible ER admissions and waiting room area. The Fast Track clinic currently in the west wing would be in the new ER wing, and administrative offices would be relocated in the hospital," she said.

Updates include converting all hospital patient rooms to single occupancy new wheelchairaccessible bathrooms, and a new separate wing of rooms that have independent ventilation systems, as well as some patient rooms designed for special-needs patients.

The nursing home would be a new construction on land already owned by the hospital, just west of the Lynnwood facility, and would include a memory-care unit as well as nursing home care. All of the rooms would be designed for single occupancy, Dr. Richburg explained as she pointed out the different areas on a rendering of the project. It is anticipated that the new nursing home could potentially add 40 new jobs when running at full capacity.

"Today, LCH employs 165 staff, and when the nursing

home becomes fully staffed it could add 40 jobs," said Dr. Richburg.

explained remodeling of the hospital facility is more affordable than all-new construction, and that hospital officials are currently in the monthslong application process for a USDA loan.

"We are working with USDA on our loan application as we speak, in order to secure the funding for approximately 80% of this project, at a fixed rate of 2.1%. We feel like from an investment standpoint this is an excellent interest rate and that it serves the community for us to qualify for funding through USDA to pay for this project. The remaining 20% of funding will be from standard operations as well as LCHD Foundation support.

"Right now we have a commitment from the LCHD Foundation for a million start, and how long will it dollars. "These are the facts as we know them today. We are trying to be as transparent as possible," she added.

When will the project meeting,



contractors estimate 12-18 months, but there are a lot of variables because of supply and demand. Now, because the nursing home is its own project it can be done without interrupting anything in the hospital, so 12-18 months. The hospital renovation may take anywhere from 24-36 months to complete all the phases of renovation inside the hospital, because we're trying to work around these areas without shutting down any services. Our goal is to do this in stages so that we don't have to reduce our capacity of taking care of people," Dr. Richburg explained.
