Vehicle pursuit ends north of Wilson

A vehicle pursuit from Lubbock County ended on FM 400 about a mile north of Wilson last Wednesday, and a one-vehicle traffic accident was in law reports during the past week.

Lubbock County informed Lynn County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) of a pursuit entering Lynn County on FM 400 from US 84, about 6 p.m. on Wednesday, Sept. 1. DPS was in pursuit of a black Cadillac SUV, and Lubbock County units stopped the vehicle about a mile north of Wilson on FM 400. Lynn County EMS was requested on the scene, and transported the male driver of the Cadillac to a Lubbock hospital for treatment. A female passenger was brought to the Lynn County Jail on outstanding warrants.

At 5:48 a.m. on Sept. 1, a caller to LCSO said that a vehicle had struck a pole at the Co-Op Gin, at 1301 South Loop 76. The female driver was transported by Lynn County EMS to Lynn County Hospital for treatment of unspecified injuries, and the vehicle was towed from the scene. No driver information was available.

A front door to a residence was reportedly broken into at a rural

residence on US 87, a caller reported at 2 p.m. Sept. 1. The caller was unsure if anything was taken from the residence.

Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept. was paged to two fires during the past week. The first one, at 9:40 p.m. Sept. 1, turned out to be a control burn in a pit at a location 5 miles east of Tahoka on US 380. The second call was for a fire at the Tahoka city landfill on FM 400, at 4:15 p.m. Sept. 2.

LCSO received two complaints of hunters shooting near residences, one on FM 211 at 8:30 a.m. Sept. 1, and one at 10:36 a.m. Sept. 4 on FM 179. In both instances, it was determined that the hunters were hunting legally with owners' permission, according to information on the LCSO call sheets.

Tahoka Police were busy during the week with numerous, but minor, calls which included residential/commercial alarms, civil standbys, welfare concerns, reckless driving, domestic disturbances, and unwanted persons.

Other LCSO calls during the week were for criminal trespass, abandoned vehicle, civil issues, domestic disturbances, illegal dumping, suspicious activity, and assisting motorists.

City property tax rate to remain the same

The Tahoka City Council is proposing to keep the same property tax rate for 2021, according to information provided this week by the City of Tahoka. Council is proposing to keep the tax rate of \$0.727030, and will hold a public hearing followed by a vote on the tax rate, at 6 p.m. Sept. 13 in the City Hall Community Room.

Although the tax rate will re-

main the same, it is considered a tax increase because of increased property valuations which will bring in more revenue to the city than the previous year at that tax

Council members Shiloh Braddock, Ray Box, Courtney Stennett and Ryan Curry voted in favor of proposing the tax rate. Councilman Ronny Jolly was absent from the





The Tahoka High School cross country teams competed at the LCU Rustbuster on Saturday, August 28th, to prepare for the upcoming Cross Country season, under the direction of Head Coach Derrick Morrissey. The rust buster is a twoperson relay with each person running 1.5 miles with 124 two-person teams competing from approximately 30 schools. Tahoka's standout performance of the Rustbuster was the team of senior Amy Tew and sophomore Lillian Morrissey combining to run for a time of 19:32 and a 2nd place overall finish in the 1A to 4A division.

The freshman team of Gabby Stice and Calgary Due finished with a time of 22:14 and a 38th place finish, Another freshman team of Esperanza Bustamante and Micaela Sullivan teamed up for a time of 25:41 and a 88th place finish. Explanatory Statements for the November 2, 2021 Constitutional Amendment Election

Proposition Number 1 (HJR 143)

HJR 143 proposes a constitutional amendment expanding the circumstances in which a professional sports team charitable foundation may conduct raffles to raise money for the charitable foundation's purposes. The proposed amendment would allow professional sports team charitable foundations of organizations sanctioned by the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association or the Women's Professional Rodeo Association to hold charitable raffles at rodeo events.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the professional sports team charitable foundations of organizations sanctioned by the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association or the Women's Professional Rodeo Association to conduct charitable raffles at rodeo venues."

Proposition Number 2 (HJR 99) HJR 99 proposes a constitutional amendment allowing the legislature to authorize a county to issue bonds or notes to finance the development or redevelopment of an unproductive, underdeveloped, or blighted area within the county and to pledge for repayment of those bonds or notes increases in property tax revenues imposed on property in the area by the county. The Texas Constitution gives the legislature the power to authorize an incorporated city or town to issue such bonds or notes but does not expressly give the legislature the power to grant that same authority to counties. The proposed amendment also provides that a county that issues bonds or notes for transportation improvements may not pledge for suspension. the repayment of those bonds or notes more than 65 percent of the increases in ad valorem tax revenues each year, and a county may not use proceeds from the

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a county to finance the development or redevelopment of transportation or infrastructure in unproductive, underdeveloped, or blighted areas

in the county." **Proposition Number 3** (SJR 27)

SJR 27 proposes a constitutional amendment barring the State of Texas or a political subdivision from enacting, adopting, or issuing a statute, order, proclamation, decision, or rule that prohibits or limits religious services. The proposed amendment would apply to religious services, including those conducted in churches, congregations, and places of worship, in the state by a religious organization established to support and serve the propagation of a sincerely held religious belief.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to prohibit this state or a political subdivision of this state from prohibiting or limiting religious services of religious organiza-

Proposition Number 4 (SJR 47)

SJR 47 proposes a constitu-

tional amendment changing

certain eligibility require-

ments for a justice of the

Supreme Court, a judge of

the Court of Criminal Ap-

peals, a justice of a court of appeals, and a district judge. The proposed amendment provides that a person is eligible to serve on the Supreme Court if the person, among other qualifications, is licensed to practice law in Texas; is a resident of Texas at the time of election; has been either a practicing lawyer licensed in Texas for at least ten years or a practicing lawyer licensed in Texas and a judge of a state court or county court established by the legislature for a combined total of at least ten years; and during that time has not had the person's license to practice law revoked, suspended, or subject to a probated suspension. The same eligibility requirements would apply to a judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals and to a justice of a court of appeals. The proposed amendment further provides that to be eligible for appointment or election as a district judge, a person must be a resident of Texas; be licensed to practice law in Texas; and have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court in Texas, or both combined, for eight years preceding the person's election, during which time the person's license to practice law has not been revoked, suspended, or subject to a probated

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment changing the eligibility requirements for a justice of the supreme court, a judge of the court of criminal appeals, a justice of a court of appeals, and a district judge."

Proposition Number 5 (HJR 165)

HJR 165 proposes a constitutional amendment allowing the State Commission on Judicial Conduct (SCJC) to accept complaints or reports, conduct investigations, and take any other authorized action with respect to a candidate for a state judicial office. Currently, the Texas Constitution only permits the SCJC to take such actions as to persons holding a judicial office.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing additional powers to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct with respect to candidates for judicial office."

Proposition Number 6 (SJR 19)

SJR 19 proposes a constitutional amendment establishing that residents of certain facilities have the right to designate an essential caregiver with whom the facility may not prohibit in-person visitation. The proposed amendment would apply to a nursing facility, assisted living facility, intermediate care facility for individuals with an intellectual disability, residence providing home and community-based services, or state supported living center. The proposed amendment also would authorize the legislature to provide guidelines for these facilities to follow in establishing essential caregiver visitation policies and procedures.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment establishing a right for residents of certain facilities to designate an essential caregiver for in-person visitation."

Proposition Number 7 (HJR 125)

HJR 125 proposes a constitutional amendment permitting a person who is 55 years of age or older at the time of death of their spouse who is receiving a limitation on school district property taxes on their residence homestead on the basis of a disability to continue receiving the limitationwhile the property remains the surviving spouse's residence homestead.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the surviving spouse of a person who is disabled to receive a limitation on the school district ad valorem taxes on the spouse's residence homestead if the spouse is 55 years of age or older at the time of the person's death."

Proposition Number 8 (SJR 35)

SJR 35 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the United States armed services who is killed or fatally injured in the line of duty. The Texas Constitution provides a property tax exemption to the surviving spouse of a member of the armed services who is killed in action, but the current exemption does not include members of the military who die during their service due to injuries sustained that are not combat-related.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the armed services of the United States who is killed or fatally injured in the line of duty."

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

Covid cases, deaths climb in **Dawson County**

LAMESA - The death toll from Covid-19 in Dawson County continues to climb, as the resurgence of the virus shows no sign of letting up. More than 70 new cases of the virus have been confirmed among local residents in just the past week, according to the attest information provided by the South Plains Public Health Distrit.

An update issued Friday, Sept. 3 shows 113 residents of Dawson County currently have active cases of Covid-19.

The Texas Dept. of State Health Services website on Friday was showing 73 residents of Dawson County have died from Covid-19. That's up from 70 deaths reported on the website a week ago.

West Nile virus is the leading cause of mosquitoborne disease in the U.S. The virus can infect humans, birds, mosquitoes, horses, and some other animals.

A bite from an infected mosquito can spread the West Nile virus, There is no evidence that West Nile virus spreads from animal to person or from person to person except in rare cases through blood product transfusion, tis-

Twenty lic Health District received percent of infected people develop a typically mild form of the disease (West Nile fever), which may include fever, headache, body aches, and occasionally a skin rash on the trunk of the body and swollen lymph glands. Only about one out of 150 people infected with West Nile virus will develop the more severe form of the disease (West Nile neuroinvasive disease), which may affect the brain and spinal cord. The signs and symptoms of severe disease may include headache, high fever, neck stiffness, stupor, disorientation, coma, tremors, convulsions, muscle weakness, and paralysis.

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The incubation period of West Nile virus in humans is two to 14 days.
