Carol Miller appointed to Tahoka ISD Board

Carol Miller, formerly a nurse at Tahoka Independent School District who has since retired, was appointed to fill a position on the Tahoka ISD Board of Trustees, in action taken Monday by the board. Miller was unanimously approved for the seat that was recently vacated by trustee Blanda Watt, who has resigned from the board.

In other business, trustees approved Paige Rivas as the Special Education Coordinator to the 4CSSA Special Education Co-op, with a 12-month salary contract.

Some discussion was held on equipment needed for the concession stand in the new gym facility, and trustees approved an amount of \$4,200 for the items needed. Trustees also approved purchasing a 2022 Chevy diesel pickup for the district.

In administrative reports, student enrollment numbers were presented, with 304 students in elementary, 126 students in middle school, and 172 students in high

High School Principal Cory
Barnes reported he has implemented a Leadership Council that
is made up of four high school
teachers, to start rewarding those
students and staff members who go
above and beyond to make Tahoka
High School better every day. The
council is being called "Tell Me
Something Good."

Athletic Director Stephen Overstreet reported that the athletic department is moving in to their new offices at the new facilities, and reported that students are excited to be there.

In a Special Education Report, Mrs. Parker said that Life Skill classes have 22 students in the program, with two home-schooled and two home-bound. Three Life Skill students have earned their Food Handlers Certificates, which will help them once they get out into the work field. Tahoka will be competing in the Special Olympics Field Day at Frenship ISD, and a Special Ed Prom is scheduled for April.



Family comes home from dinner to find house in flames

Last Tuesday evening, a fire claimed the home of the Caudill family. Cassie Caudill and her family moved into their home north of Tahoka just two months ago, and arrived home after going out to dinner to find their home in flames.

The fire happened about nine miles north of Tahoka around 9:30 p.m.

Tahoka Volunteer Fire Chief Bryan Reynolds said when they arrived on scene, there was heavy smoke coming from all sides with the heaviest damage in the kitchen and living room. The rest of the house has severe smoke damage. One of their vehicles parked near the house was damaged from the fire and the heat.

Family and friends set up a Go-FundMe account to help replace what they lost.

On the GoFundMe page, Cassie Caudill wrote, "On Tuesday September 21, 2021 my little family walked out of our new home with the intention of going to dinner and returning home to our fur babies, like any other evening. When we pulled into our driveway we never expected to find our home and everything we worked for in flames, with our four legged babies trapped inside. Despite our best efforts and hardest prayers, it was burning out of control. We were helpless and we lost more than we could ever replace. Our dogs, our home, everything we owned including my car was lost. We thank God for His protection of our lives, but we truly have no idea where to begin rebuilding our lives."

A look back at ...

THE FOLLOWING subject, if interesting to anyone at all, is more likely to appeal to men than women, because it's about cars. Most women are uninterested in details about cars, so long as they look good, start every time, and comfortably for a visit by Texas Education transport them to stores and garage sales.

Okay, so maybe not all females feel that way. But guys inevitably like to talk about vehicles and their differences, what's under the hood, etc. Most guys can gaze out the window and immediately notice the difference between a 2010 Porsche and a 1967 Dodge dump truck.

I should entitle this column "The many cars I have owned and lost money on in the last 60 years." I can't actually remember all the cars and pickups I have owned; I used to trade cars as soon as I had made six payments or so. Although I managed a few pretty good deals, I mostly lost my shirt and part of my anatomy on cars.

My very first car, just after graduation from college, was an old black 1940 Chevrolet. It had a vacuum shift, and tended to jump out of high gear, so I tied under the seat a wire with a loop on one end to slip over the gear shift and hold it in high (now called "drive").

Over the years, I have bought 10 new vehicles and 18 or 20 used ones, so I have owned more cars than anybody around here, except maybe Gene Messer and Benny Boyd. Lots of car dealers knew me. Every time I walked into a dealership, they'd hand me a cup of coffee with a straw in it, because they knew a sucker when they saw one.

I owned a couple of Dodge Darts, with slant 6 engines, the best engine ever made by the Chrysler Corp. And I bought a third one as our son's first car when he was in high school.

That car was bright orange—it had been a taxicab—and had about half a million miles on it when we got it. It rattled and the doors wouldn't stay shut, but it always ran just fine. One of our daughters commented on it the other day, saying she remembered having to hold on tight when her older brother took them to school, because the doors flew open at every corner. And this was before seat belts.

I don't trade cars nearly as often as I once did. I have had my current car for four years and it runs great. But I've been looking at some of the ads.



Africanized bees destroyed after attacking dog

STANTON - On Saturday afternoon, Sept. 18, a Stanton resident on 5th Street located a swarm of Africanized honey bees after finding his dog weeping in pain in his back yard.

Mark Velasquez has been living on 5th Street for two years and knew of the beehive for at least a full year. The hive was in a pop-up trailer on the edge of the property he has been reno-

Valesquez said he had never had any problems with the bees. "I've never seen them agitated or aggressive since I have lived there," he said

But on Saturday afternoon, Velasquez heard his dog crying, and what he saw was heartbreaking.

"My dog was stuck in a swarm of bees and being stung thousands of times," Velasquez said. "God spoke to me telling me to save my dog and he would protect me. I ran into the swarm and untethered my dog and drug him to safety while only being stung by the swarm of bees one time on the knuck-

Velasquez and his neighbors warned as many people as possible of the danger via social media and going door to door.

On Sunday, Bee Busters from Midland destroyed the bees and their hive.

ORDINANCE NO. 21-0011

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAHO-KA, TEXAS AMENDING ARTICLE 8.1100 PUBLIC NUISANCE GEN-**ERALLY BY AMENDING SECTION 8.1101 PUBLIC NUISANCE TO** DEFINITIONS; SECTION 8.1102 DETERMINATION OF VIOLA-TION; SECTION 8.1103 PROCEDURE ON VIOLATION; AND RE-PEALING SECTION 8.1104 ASSESSMENT OF COSTS; 8.1105 POST-ING OF WARNINGS; 8.1106 ADDITIONAL POWERS OF THE CITY; 8.1107 AUTHORITY TO ENTER PREMISES; AND 8.1108 CRIMINAL PENALTY; BY ADDING SECTIONS 8.1104 NOTICE OF VIOLATION: ABATEMETN OF VIOLATION, 8.1105 ASSESSMENT OF EXPENSES: LIENS, SECTION 8.1106 PENALTY; AND PROVIDING FOR A SAV-INGS/REPEALING CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABLITY; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

A person commits an offense if any person violates any section of this ordinance and the nuisance remains unabated after the 11th day after the date on which the person receives notice from a city official, agent, or employee to abate the nuisance.

An offense under this section is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not less than \$500 or more than \$2,000. Each continuing day's violation shall constitute a separate offense. The penal provision imposed under this ordinance shall not preclude the city from filing suit to enjoin the violation. The city retains all legal rights and remedies available to it pursuant to local, state, and federal law.

This ordinance shall become effective upon its finding by Council that the public hearing was posted and conducted in accordance with State Law; passed by a majority vote of council and upon its publication in the official newspaper.

ORDINANCE NO. 21-012

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF TAHOKA, TEXAS, AMENDING THE TAHOKA FEE SCHEDULE; AMENDING CERTAIN FEES AND ESTABLISHING COSTS AND FEES CHARGED BY THE CITY OF TAHOKA; PROVIDING FOR A PENALTY FOR A VIOLATION OF 810.99 OF THE CITY CODE OF ORDINANCES; AND DECLARING AN EFFECTIVE DATE

A violation of this ordinance shall be a Class C misdemeanor with a fine of not more than \$500.00 as prescribed in §10.99 of the City's Code or Ordinances. If any other ordinance, including the Code of Ordinances. Establishes a different penalty for the failure to pay any fee reflected on the Fee Schedule. the provisions of such other ordinance or Code of Ordinances shall control with respect to such penalty.

This ordinance will take effect upon its adoption by the City Council and in accordance with the Texas Local Government Code. 39-1tc


