

Commissioner Precinct boundaries to change slightly in Lynn County

by JUANELL JONES

Redistricting of county political boundaries was the focus of a special meeting of the Lynn County Commissioners Court last Thursday. After considering the population numbers and demographics presented by Stan Reid from Allison, Bass & Magee, LLP, a new map was approved that basically had the Commissioner Precincts 1, 2 and 3 boundaries moving slightly further into the city of Tahoka, and Precinct 4 moving further out to accommodate the higher population numbers in the New Home area.

Redistricting - the process of redrawing the county precinct lines to ensure they have relatively equal population - is required after the U.S. Census is conducted every 10 years. County officials were using population numbers from the 2020 census in the redistricting evaluations.

The precinct boundaries did not change after the 2010 census, but the population growth in the New Home area during the past 10 years had a significant impact on

the 2020 numbers.

Currently, (before the changes are implemented), the population numbers in the commissioner precincts in Lynn County are: • Pct 1 – 1338 (includes portion

of Tahoka, and Wilson area)

• Pct 2 - 1212 (includes most of Tahoka) • Pct 3 - 1051 (includes O'Don-

nell area) • Pct 4 - 1995 (includes New

Early Voting ends Friday, polls open Tuesday for two elections

Early Voting for the Nov. 2 Constitutional Amendment Election, and for the City of Tahoka Street Bond Election, continues through Friday, Oct. 29 at the Lynn County Courthouse. On Election Day, Nov. 2, there will be four polling locations in the county open from 7 a.m.-7 p.m.

Lady Bulldogs get best regional XC team finish in THS history!

THS's Amy Tew is state-bound

he Tahoka Lady Bulldogs Cross Country Team boasted a state qualifying runner, and a history-making team finish at the UIL Region 1 Cross Country Championships held at Mae Simmons Park on Monday.

The Lady Bulldogs team finished 9th in the 2A girls division at the regional competition - the best regional finish in school history, according to THS Coach Derrick Morrissey. And, senior captain Amy Tew has one more race left as she heads to Round Rock on Nov. 6 to compete in the state championship, by virtue of her 15th place finish with a time of 13:21. She is Tahoka's first cross country state qualifier since 2007, says Morrisey.

Sophomore Lillian Morrissey just missed qualifying for state with a 19th place finish and a time of 13:32.

Gabrielle Stice finished in 72nd with a time of 14:55, Kendra Garcez finished in 97th with a time of 15:35. and Micaela Sullivan was the final scoring runner with a 108th place finish and a time of 16:26. Calgary Due and Esperanze Bustamante finished in 133rd place and 136th with times of 17:06 and 17:13.

"We are extraordinarily proud of these girls, they started the season wanting to be the best cross country team in Tahoka High School history, and in my eyes they've done that and can do even greater things in seasons to come," said Coach Morrissey.

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

Commissioners considering property tax freeze for 65+; initiate burn ban

In other business. commissioners discussed whether to implement a property tax freeze for 65-and-older residential homeowners in Lynn County, but took no action yet on the

"We would like to be able to reduce the tax burden on our older citizens who may live on a fixed income, but we are still trying to determine the numbers in how this could impact the county's tax revenue," County Judge Mike Braddock told The News. "The commissioners have asked me to find out if other counties are offering this, and I am trying to gather that information."

After obtaining more information, commissioners will likely reconsider the property tax freeze in an upcoming session.

Commissioners discussed President Biden's 30x30 Land Program, which basically is a commitment to conserve 30 percent of U.S. land by the year 2030. County officials are waiting to get more information on the issue, but are considering a resolution against the program. As more information becomes available, the issue may be addressed at a later date, according to Judge

Braddock.

"Currently in Lynn sioners met in regular session County, we have about 8 Monday morning, considering percent of land in CRP, and that several issues including is at the landowner's option. initiating a burn barn in Landowners are concerned that the 30x30 Land Program effective beginning Oct. 25, will force land into CRP, but we just do not have enough information on the issue yet, or how the program could be implemented," he told The News.

Commissioners approved a policy update on military leave, according to HB 1589, and approved payment of monthly bills. Tax Assessor/ Collector Donna Willis and Sheriff Wanda Mason presented reports on their respective departments.

Judge Braddock discussed geothermal repairs needed at the courthouse after the system leaked and caused extensive damage from flooding back in late May. Braddock told The News that he has had numerous meetings with insurance representatives, the company that installed the geothermal system, and others. Next week, he said, the company that originally installed the system is planning to come and repair the system to get it restored and back to running, and then the county will send out for bids for repairs to flooring, walls, ceilings and other damages caused by the flooding. The damage is estimated at approximately \$300,000, but Braddock said that the insurance is covering the repair costs.




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


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The Queen owns all the swans in England.

The filing period opens Nov. 13 and continues through Dec. 13, with filing to be conducted chairman of the Republican or Democrat parties.



The new map more evenly distributes the population (these new numbers were not available at press time) as required by law, with no more than a 5% variable allowed between each precinct. "These commissioner

precinct boundaries will also affect the two Justice of Peace boundaries slightly, with JP #1 (Christie Olivan) serving commissioner precincts and 4, and JP #4 (Ed Follis) commissioner precincts 2 and 3," County Judge Mike Braddock explained to The News.

The new precinct lines will also affect the voting box precincts in the county - but not for the upcoming Nov. 2 election.


