District Judge Reed Filley files bid seeking second term of office

On Nov. 13, Judge Reed Filley officially filed his Application to be placed on the Republican Primary ballot for re-election to the position of 106th Judicial District Judge.

Judge Filley has been a resident of Tahoka since 2007. He was first elected to the position of District Judge on November 6, 2018 and took office January 1, 2019.

Salvation Army offers assistance here for county residents in need

by JUANELL JONES eed help paying utilities, or facing eviction because of past-due rent? Not enough groceries to feed your family? Aware of a transient needing funds for gasoline for their vehicle to get them back on the road? There is help available here in Lynn County, and it is through The Salvation Army.

The Salvation Army programs and services are available through the First Methodist Church of Tahoka, at 806-561-4503, with pastor Billy Everett and church secretary Marcy Whitley serving as The Salvation Army's primary points of contact in Lynn County as they continue providing the services and programs that have been offered here for a number of years. These services are available for anyone in

Lynn County who may qualify. Additionally, since September, a representative from The Salvation Army-Texas South Plains (the umbrella organization for Lynn Coun-

ty and other South Plains counties) has been coming to Tahoka twice a month at regularly-scheduled hours to provide services. This Salvation Army "Hope On The Go" caseworker is here every first and third Thursday, from 9-11 a.m., at First Methodist Church at 1801 Avenue J in Tahoka, to provide assistance for those in need from Tahoka, O'Donnell, Wilson, New Home, Grassland or any Lynn County resident.

There are certain requirements and restrictions for receiving aid from The Salvation Army, for services including rent, utilities, trans-

holiday provisions, prescriptions/medications, food, Thanksgiving and Christmas Food Boxes, clothing and other life essentials. The caseworker is able to meet with

those interested in seeking assistance to determine if they qualify for such assistance.

"For those needing help with funds for things such as rent, utilities and medications, those types of aid are handled by the representative when she is here at the church on the first and third Thursdays of the month," explained Marcy Whitley. "However, for emergency assistance, such as food or assistance for transients, you may call the church office anytime during business hours, at 806-561-4503," she added.

The Salvation Army also has

access to a specially-equipped Hope On The Go truck, that can provide services directly to people in need who are unable to leave their homes to seek assistance, such as the homebound, elderly, disabled, or those without transportation.

Any funds contributed to the Lynn County Salvation Army Unit are designated strictly for Lynn County assistance, and are not used for any other services elsewhere or at the Methodist Church. During the holiday season, bell-ringers for The Salvation Army kettle may set up at the Cash Savers grocery store in Tahoka to accept donations, but donations are also accepted here at any time throughout the year. Checks may be mailed to Salvation Army Fund, PO Box 2143, Tahoka, TX 79373. Make checks payable to Salvation Army Unit. Donations may also be brought to the Methodist Church.



In response to the of Chronic discovery Wasting Disease (CWD) in a free-ranging mule deer in southeast Lubbock County in February 2021, the Texas Parks & Wildlife Commission has approved a CWD zone that encompasses southeast Lubbock County, northeast Lynn County, southwest Crosby County, and northwest Garza County.

This hunting season, all CWD-susceptible species harvested within the zone must have tissue samples collected for CWD testing within 48 hours of harvest. Susceptible species include white-tailed deer, mule deer, elk, and various nonnative deer species. A Texas Parks and Wildlife (TPWD) technician will be on call Friday-Tuesday to collect samples.

TPWD also encourages hunters who harvest deer/elk outside the Lubbock CWD zone to assist with the CWD sampling effort. Hunters outside the zone can contact their local TPWD biologist regarding sample collection from their harvested animal. Questions about the CWD testing requirements and carcass movement restrictions can be directed to the TPWD Lubbock Regional Office at (806) 761-4940.




BURN BAN REINSTATED IN LYNN COUNTY on Oct. 25, 2021






