LCH may lose 10 staff members due to federal vaccine mandates

Lynn County Healthcare (LCH) System was facing the possibility of losing 10 staff members this week, due to compliance with President Joe Biden's federal mandate requiring COVID-19 vaccination of eligible staff at health care facilities that participate in the Medicare and Medicaid programs.

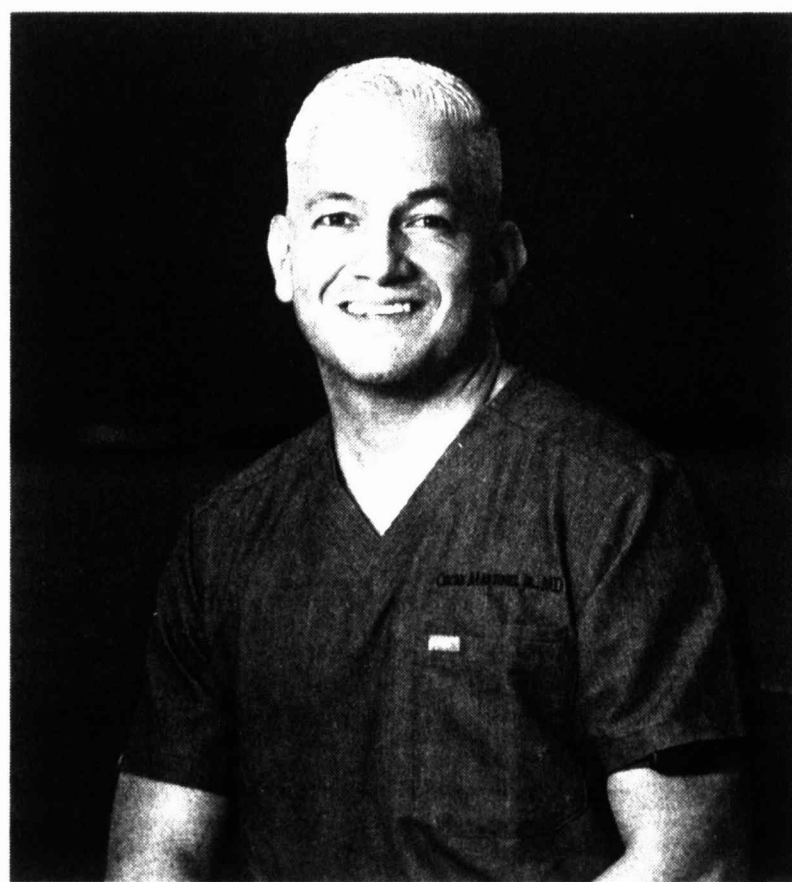
Facilities covered by this regulation must establish a policy ensuring all eligible staff have received the first dose of a two-dose COVID-19 vaccine or a one-dose COVID-19 vaccine prior to providing any care, treatment, or other services, by December 6, 2021. All eligible staff must have received the necessary shots to be fully vaccinated by January 4, 2022. The regulation also provides for exemptions based on recognized medical conditions or religious beliefs, observances, or practices. Facilities must develop a similar process or plan for permitting exemptions in alignment with federal law.

"We already require weekly testing for any unvaccinated staff members at Lynn County Hospital,

and require masks for unvaccinated employees who have any direct contact with patients," Dr. Melanie Richburg, CEO at Lynn County Healthcare System, told *The News* on Tuesday afternoon.

"However, LCH must comply with the federal mandate. This Friday will be the last day for any employees to file a request for accommodations not to be vaccinated, according to the federal guidelines. We have granted the accommodations for those who filed for the exemptions, but as of today (Tuesday) we still have 10 or so employees who have not been vaccinated and who have not filed for the accommodations," said Dr. Richburg.

There is much controversy about the mandate throughout the U.S., and Richburg is hopeful that the federal restrictions may be changed in regards to staff members with no direct contact with patient care, such as business office or maintenance staff, but at this time the mandate encompasses all healthcare workers of facilities that participate in Medicare/Medicaid programs.

Local K-9 unit alerts for drugs in traffic stops during past week

The Lynn County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) K-9 unit assisted with two traffic stops and alerted for drugs, with two arrested in separate incidents on drug-related charges during the past week.

Both traffic stops were made on US 84 near the Garza-Lynn County line. The first incident occurred at 9 p.m. Nov. 26, with a deputy conducting a traffic stop. After the K-9 was deployed and indicated a positive alert for drugs, a female was arrested for possession of a controlled substance and transported to the Lynn County Jail. On Nov. 28, at 2:53 p.m., a DPS trooper requested LCSO K-9 assistance in a traffic stop on US 84 just inside Garza County. Another positive alert was indicated, and an arrest was made for possession of

marijuana and possession of a controlled substance.

Another drug-related arrest after a traffic stop was made at 2:48 a.m. on Nov. 26, in US 84 area near the Garza County line. A female was arrested for possession of a controlled substance.

A male driver was arrested on charges of Driving While Intoxicated, after a traffic stop on US 87 near O'Donnell at 5:27 p.m. Nov. 22.

A Lincoln MK struck a deer on US 87 near CR 31 at 7:12 p.m. Nov. 25. No injuries were reported but the vehicle had to be towed from the scene.

A dead deer was reported on US 87 just south of Tahoka at 8:10 a.m. Nov. 28, with the caller asking that the deer be picked up before

Wiley Lee Curry, Jr., 62, of Lubbock, Texas, returned to his heavenly home on October 21, 2021.

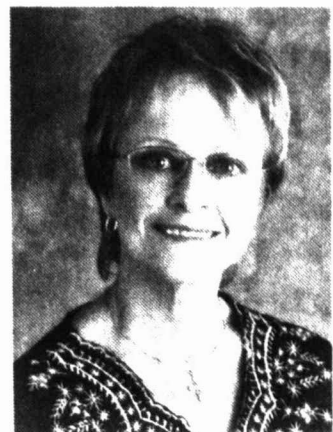

Suetta dedicated her life to

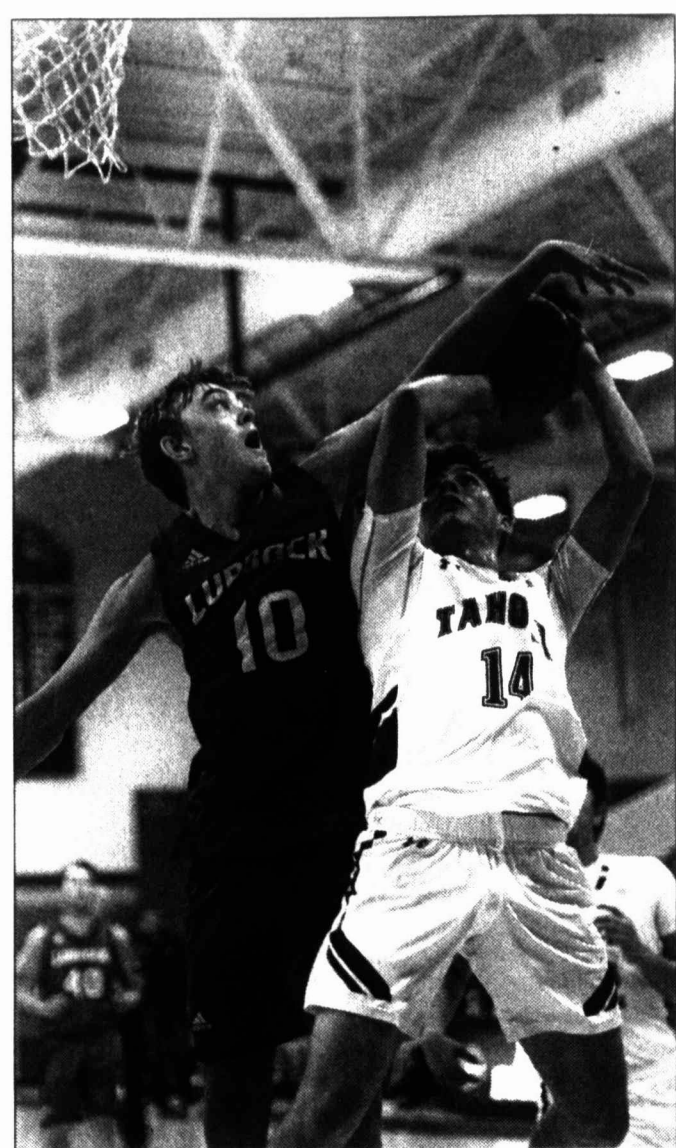

Social media posts about fatal bus crash leads to teen's arrest

ANDREWS - A San Antonio male who posted derogatory messages about Andrews Independent School District's tragic school bus accident and threatened Andrews students with violence through social media was arrested Tuesday (Nov. 23), according to police.

Stephen Gomez, 17, was taken into custody in San Antonio and charged with terroristic threat of placing the public in fear of serious bodily injury - a third class felony.

Gomez is currently in custody in the Bexar County Jail, according to Andrews police.

Local officers were initially notified over the weekend about a series of threatening social media messages that had been posted online and were aimed at Andrews students, police said.

"The messages were vulgar in nature and referenced upcoming violence to Andrews students as well as derogatory messages about the tragic school bus crash," police stated in a press release.

Commissioners approve final plats for two new subdivisions in county

Lynn County Commissioners approved final plats for two new Lynn County subdivisions in their Nov. 22 meeting. The Malcolm Farms subdivision, located north-northeast of New Home, begins at the corner of Nora Road and County Road 3, and includes 152 1.1-acre lots. A smaller subdivision, Vista Estates, located between CR 2 and CR 3 on FM 179, includes five 1-acre lots.

In other business, the Purchasing Policies and Procedures manual for Lynn County was approved, as was a resolution for submission of application to the Texas General Land Office for the county's Mitigation Plan Program, which is a plan for lessening the impact of hazards to people and

property.

An agreement between StarCare Continuity and Lynn County Sheriff's Office was approved, and resolutions were approved for a Sexual Assault Response Team Statute as required by SB 476, and a resolution for Lynn County School Choice Week.

Sheriff Wanda Mason and Chief Deputy Hester presented reports, and Lynn County Tax Assessor/Collector Donna Willis presented a report.

Monthly bills were approved as presented, and County Judge Mike Braddock updated commissioners on the status of courthouse repairs.

Judge Braddock led the meeting, with all four commissioners present including Matt Woodley, John Hawthorne, Don Blair and Larry Durham, and others.

"We have had a couple of gentlemen who have drilled wells in La Tierra, a subdivision in which we own the water rights. When they purchased the land, we agreed to provide the water. They do not have the water rights, and they have drilled wells into water rights they do not own," said City Manager Tommy Phillips. "They have been given every opportunity to provide us with proof that those wells have been plugged and abandoned, and they refuse to do so. As a result, the City will file suit to ensure the wells have been plugged and abandoned and the individuals are not using water that does not belong to them."

Herbicide evaluations by EPA cause frustration among farmers, ranchers

LAMESA — Farm and ranch groups are frustrated with the final biological evaluations made by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) on atrazine, glyphosate and simazine.

Grower organizations, including American Farm Bureau Federation (AFBF), say EPA failed to take the groups' comments and real-world scenarios into account before releasing the evaluations showing the three common farm herbicides are "likely to adversely affect" certain listed endangered or threatened species or designated critical habitats.

The agency used unrealistic assumptions about how farmers and ranchers use these chemicals, according to AFBF and the American Soybean Association (ASA).

"Herbicides are vital tools in climate-smart farming because they enable farmers to use minimum tillage practices and fewer resources to raise their crops. EPA must take a well-rounded approach to its biological evaluations and use best available data when deciding on rules that will affect how farmers grow healthy crops," said AFBF President Zippy Duvall.

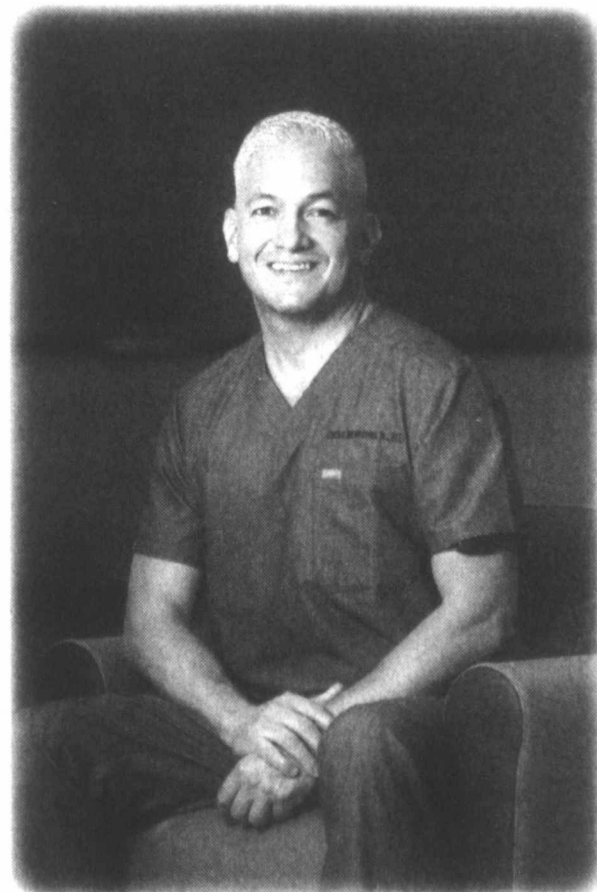

Game Wardens respond to unusual cases across Texas

The following items are compiled from recent Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) law enforcement reports, and released by the TPWD to the media.

Tubin' to the Oldies
Real and Uvalde County Game Wardens received a call about a 67-year-old man who had been separated from his family while tubing down the river. After interviewing the family and the outfitter, wardens determined the tuber failed to exit at the designated area and continued downstream. One warden drove to a nearby ranch where he launched a drone in an attempt to locate the tuber. At the same time, the other warden spoke to the foreman of the ranch and requested assistance in locating the tuber. The foreman spoke to a group of tubers who said they saw the individual. The information was relayed to both wardens. Based on the tips, the wardens located the individual and returned him to his family.

Shell Shocked
A state biologist contacted a warden about an inquiry made by a local elementary school

regarding rehabilitating Texas tortoises. After learning more about the situation, the warden determined that the school was keeping approximately 24 tortoises inside a small atrium on school property. Unfortunately, the tortoises were a threatened species and unable to be possessed by any individual or entity. School staff stated that several years ago they acquired two tortoises and over the years, students brought more tortoises into the facility. The warden arrived at the school to collect the tortoises for TPWD assisted relocation. In doing so, the curious students and staff gathered around the atrium to watch. The warden made use of the attention by turning the removal into an impromptu educational program on the tortoises and their natural habitat. The tortoises were later released at a nearby ranch in prime Texas tortoise habitat.

Mother Knows Best
Over the Memorial Day weekend, game wardens conducting water safety patrols were sent videos of a man jumping off a red and white boat, harassing and capturing a Canada Goose. Despite efforts to locate the boat and the individuals involved, wardens were unable to track them down. Two months later while conducting a water safety check on a different boat, the wardens noticed several of the occupants on the vessel wearing identical hats to those in the video. One of the wardens humorously asked about the hats and if they knew the individual who had caught the goose in the video. The occupants confirmed they knew him and affirmed their knowledge of the "goose video". They pointed to a male in the back of the boat and identified him as the "goose capturer". The Wardens asked the identified male to join them on their boat for further questioning. The male admitted he was the one in the video and said his mom had warned him he was going to get into trouble. He added, "I should've listened to my mom!" Wardens explained to the individual the definition of "Hunt," according to Texas law is "To capture, trap, take or kill, or any attempts thereof." The individual was issued a citation for "Hunting Canada

Geese in a Closed Season." He was also issued a written warning for "Hunting Canada Geese by Illegal Means and Methods." The goose survived.

Old Fishing Buddy
Texas Game Wardens were patrolling for water safety and recreational fishing activity when they received information regarding a boat that potentially possessed over the daily bag limit of red snapper. The Wardens located the unoccupied boat moored at a dock. Upon performing an inspection, twenty-one red snapper were found on board, exceeding the individual fishing limit. Wardens attempted to contact the occupants of the house where the boat was docked. After approximately thirty minutes of knocking, announcing, speaking with neighbors and attempting to call the suspect and his family members, an individual exited the residence. The suspect was immediately evasive when questioned about the red snapper in the boat. He stated he had caught them with five other people but only provided one name. The Wardens contacted the individual who stated he had not talked to the suspect in fifteen years. The suspect admitted to going over his daily bag limit to the wardens. Seventeen red snappers were seized, and citations issued, along with civil restitution.

Sting Operation
In August, a concerned citizen contacted Montgomery County game wardens regarding a neighbor keeping an alligator in his backyard. The wardens responded to the home where the alligator was reportedly kept. The homeowner admitted to capturing an alligator 4 or 5 feet in length from Lake Conroe, transporting it home to show his kids and then releasing it the next day. The wardens inspected the property

and noticed a room full of aquariums. Knowledgeable in aquatic species, one of the wardens identified the animals as freshwater stingrays, which are an invasive species and illegal to possess. Through further conversation, the homeowner also admitted to removing a small alligator snapping turtle from Lake Livingston and keeping it in a tank. As the largest freshwater turtle in North America and a threatened species, it is illegal to capture or possess one without a permit. After discussing the matter with the homeowner, he agreed to assist game wardens in relocating the animals to better suited facilities. The turtle was donated to the Spring Creek Nature Center, which is permitted to possess native species and display them for educational purposes. The stingrays were transported to Moody Gardens to educate the public about different ecosystems and the harm that invasive species can cause to local wildlife.

Perception Pays Off
The El Paso County Sheriff's Office Major Crimes Unit released a "Be on the Lookout" bulletin to assist in the identification of an individual and vehicle last seen leaving a crime scene in the San Elizario area. An El Paso/Hudspeth County game warden remembered the vehicle from a recent encounter with fishermen which resulted in the arrest of the individual. The warden contacted the lead investigator and passed along the identifying information. Several days later, El Paso County Sheriff's detectives notified the warden that without firm leads in the case, the information he shared with their office was vital in locating the subject and the vehicle. Due to his inter-agency collaboration, an arrest was carried out.

Hold the Pepper

In September, a Bexar County game warden received a call from Austin communications about dove hunters peppering local residences with shotgun pellets. Upon arrival to the field, the warden observed two gentlemen hunting. As he drove up to the individuals, one of the gentlemen stood up and shot a bird that fell a few yards from him. The warden proceeded to complete a hunting check. He spoke with the individual and asked if he was aware of the type of bird he had just shot. The hunter did not know. The warden informed him that the bird was an American kestrel, a protected bird of prey, and is not allowed to be hunted or harvested. The warden checked the other hunters in the group and discussed the issues around peppering, ensuring their shotgun pellets did not cross property lines. A citation was issued for harvesting a protected species. The case and civil restitution are pending.

Off the Road Again

An Amarillo district game warden was patrolling in Potter County after dark when he was notified about an injured individual who had been "run over" by an all-terrain vehicle. The warden responded immediately. He found one adult male hit by an ATV and suffering non-life-threatening injuries to his legs. The victim and other eyewitnesses at the scene identified another adult male as the driver of the ATV. Upon speaking with the driver of the ATV, the warden noticed that he had heavily slurred speech patterns, glassy/bloodshot eyes, and the odor of alcohol emitting from his breath. The victim of the collision was transported to an Amarillo hospital. The driver of the ATV admitted hitting the victim with the ATV and was subsequently arrested for driving while intoxicated and deadly conduct. The driver was booked into the Potter County Jail without incident.

Caught on Camera

In September, a Tyler County game warden received information on individuals potentially participating in road hunting. The warden worked with a landowner setting up surveillance cameras in their field. Not long after he set up the monitoring system, he observed a slow-moving vehicle spotlighting and headed towards his location. The warden initiated a traffic stop, determining the subjects were hunting at night. Inside the vehicle, the warden located a loaded .22 long rifle. Additionally, the subject was a minor operating a vehicle under the influence of alcohol. Charges are pending.

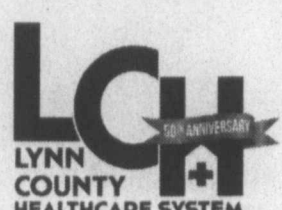
