Man trying to break into jail said aliens were giving him the door code

A man who was apparently trying to break into the Lynn County Law Enforcement Center/Jail in Tahoka on Hwy. 380 got his wish - he went to jail.

Tahoka Police responded to the Lynn County Sheriff's Office at 6:20 a.m. Jan. 3, when an LCSO dispatcher called for assistance when security cameras showed an unknown male at a locked door for employees only, on the exterior of the east side of the building, apparently trying repeatedly to open the door. When police arrived, the man, who was still attempting to open the door, told the officer he was "trying to get in, and aliens were giving him the code for the door," according to reports from the Tahoka Police Dept. The man was arrested on charges of public intoxication, and other charges may be pending.

Lynn County Sheriff's Officers made four arrests after traffic stops during the past week, and discovered two missing persons, one from Lubbock and one from Odessa, in two separate incidents.

A juvenile male was discovered to be a missing person out of Lubbock Police Dept., after a caller reported a welfare concern at 7:21 a.m. Dec. 28 regarding a juvenile

male who was walking on US 84 eastbound about a half mile south of the Lubbock County line, north of Southland. An LCSO deputy located the juvenile walking on US 84 near FM 212, and transported him to the Sheriff's Office until he could be picked up by his father.

A male reported as a missing person out of Odessa was the driver of a vehicle that was stopped in a traffic stop on US 87 and CR 1, at 2:17 p.m. Dec. 29. A deputy conducted a vehicle search and arrested the driver on charges of possession of a controlled substance, also discovering that the individual was listed as a missing person. LCSO notified Odessa law enforcement of the man's arrest.

Three other traffic stops resulted in two arrests for possession of controlled substances, and one arrest for DWI and fleeing from a police officer. An LCSO deputy attempted to stop a white Ford pickup reportedly being driven at speeds of over 100 mph, at 6:30 p.m. Dec. 28. He followed the

DON'T FALL FOR THIS SCAM

Lynn County Appraisal District this week notified *The News* that at least one local resident has received an official-looking letter in the mail saying the resident's property will be seized due to nonpayment of taxes to the federal tax authorities. The letter, however, is a scam - although it appears extremely official, and may even include a bogus government seal.

"This letter is a scam, and is NOT from the Lynn County Appraisal District," stated Rebecca Norris, Chief Appraiser. "It looks official, but thankfully the property owner contacted us at the Lynn County Appraisal District to verify that the taxes had been paid (which they had), and we determined that the letter is a scam."

The bogus letter, dated Dec. 29, 2021, arrived in an official-looking perforated envelope through first class mail with a US Postage Paid from Sacramento, CA Permit #1693 in the top right corner. It was addressed to a local resident, and a notification at the top of the letter stated, "NAME (omitted here), YOUR PROPERTY WILL BE SEIZED."

It appears that the letter is from "The Federal Tax Authorities" or "Tax Processing Center, Internal Processing Service, Lynn County Public Judgment Records," neither of which entity actually exists.

The subject of the letter states, "Final Demand For Payment For Nonpayment of Taxes To The Federal Tax Authorities," and threatens to seize the property for nonpayment of taxes, penalty and interest due to the Federal Tax Authorities. It also threatens to possibly impose a garnishment on all bank accounts in the property owner's name. The letter instructs the property owner to call a certain 800 phone number by a certain

date, or further actions will be taken.

These scam letters may target residents who actually owe or have previously owed back taxes. Some authorities in other areas where these letters have reportedly

occurred say the scammers may be mining public records and sending letters out based on such public records.

Any Lynn County property owner who receives such a

Cities, county get monthly sales tax payments

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced he has sent cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts funds in local sales tax allocations for December 2021.

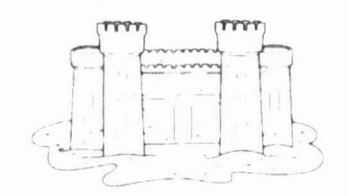
Lynn County's net payment for the month was \$13,622.23, based on a half-cent sales tax rate, making the total payment to date \$173,248.18 for the year.

The City of Tahoka's net payment for the month was \$13,181.48, based on a 1.5-cent sales tax rate (including a half-cent collection for the Tahoka Economic Development Corporation), making the total payment to date \$251,083.60 for the year.

The City of O'Donnell's net payment for the month was \$2,301.66, based on a 1-cent sales tax rate, making the total payment to date \$37,072.46 for the year.

The City of Wilson's net payment for the month was \$2,748.67, based on a 1-cent sales tax rate, making the total payment to date \$30,260.51 for the year.

Tahoka VFD responds to kitchen fire here

An everyday routine of starting the dishwasher turned into the catalyst for a fire starting in a kitchen at a home in north Tahoka on Tuesday morning. According to information from Tahoka Police Chief Jeff Parker, the homeowner started the dishwasher before leaving for work, but told her adult son, who was still in his room, that she was leaving the house. By 8:30 a.m., the dishwasher was in flames and the house was filled with smoke.

The son awoke to hear the smoke alarm sounding

an alert, and discovered the house was filled with smoke, which was coming from the direction of the kitchen. While leaving the house, he saw flames coming from the dishwasher, and called the fire department. His quick response helped save the home, as the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department arrived quickly and extinguished the source of the flames.

Firemen dragged the charred dishwasher out of the house before leaving the premises. No one was injured, but the home suffered some smoke and water damage.

Earthquake felt in Dawson County

LAMESA – Numerous residents across Dawson County and the surrounding area experienced the effects of an earthquake while carrying out their nightly duties about 7:55 p.m. Monday, Dec. 27. The earthquake's epicenter was near the center of Martin County.

It was listed as a 4.5 out of 10 on the Richter scale measuring the magnitude of the incident. While it went unnoticed by some across the area, others certainly felt the effects.

"I was sitting on my sofa when suddenly it felt as if someone started a built-in vibrator to my couch," said Susan O'Brien, who lives atop the caprock in western Borden County.

"It was rather scary and got my attention," says Sharon Shofner, a resident of the Sparenberg community south of Lamesa.

"I was on my computer and noticed the bookshelves beginning to shake. I've experience other earthquakes, but this one definitely wins," said Courtney Shofner.

Quintin Merket said the quake created both a noise and a shaking at Ackerly, near the southeastern corner of Dawson County and northwestern corner of Martin County.

"At first I thought it was a truck going to the disposal station behind our house, and then the furniture began to shake. I couldn't believe I could hear it," Merket said. "I would compare it to a truck going over rumble strips on the highway."

The epicenter of the earthquake is reported to have been on CR A3801 east of Lenora, about 11 miles north of Stanton, according to the U.S. Geological Survey. It struck at a depth of 4.8 miles.

HPWD begins annual water level measurements

Beginning Jan. 3, High Plains Water District (HPWD) personnel will make water level measurements to determine the effect of 2021 pumping on groundwater levels in aquifers within the district.

These annual measurements are made in a network of more than 1,350 privately-owned wells. These observation wells are spaced at a density of approximately one well per nine square miles throughout the 16-county HPWD service area.

"We want to let the public know that our staff will be visiting observation well sites from early January until completion of this work effort. They will be driving white pickup trucks that are clearly identified as High Plains Water District vehicles," said Field Staff Supervisor Keith Whitworth.

These water level data are made available to the public through an interactive map on the HPWD website (map.hpwd.org). This feature allows persons to access annual observation well data, annual supplemental well data, and daily water level data in select wells.

"Since 2013, the interactive map has been a highly-utilized method of obtaining depth-to-water and saturated thickness information by persons inside and outside the District," said HPWD General Manager Jason Coleman.

An introduction to the interactive map and each of its features are discussed in tutorial videos on HPWD's YouTube channel.

Those without computer access can contact GIS Specialist Jed Leibbrandt to request a printed report of annual water level measurements for an individual county or counties of interest. He can be reached at (806) 762-0181.

USDA provides additional Pandemic assistance to hog producers

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13, 2021— The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) announced a new program to assist hog producers who sold hogs through a negotiated sale during the period in which these producers faced the greatest reduction in market prices due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Spot Market Hog Pandemic Program (SMHPP) is part of USDA's Pandemic Assistance for Producers initiative and addresses gaps in previous assistance for hog producers. USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) will accept applications Dec. 15, 2021 through Feb. 25, 2022.

SMHPP provides assistance to hog producers who sold hogs through a negotiated sale from April 16, 2020 through Sept. 1, 2020. Negotiated sale, or negotiated formula sale, means a sale of hogs by a producer to a packer under which the base price for the hogs is determined by seller-buyer interaction and agreement on a delivery day. USDA is offering SMHPP as packer production was reduced due to the COVID-19 pandemic due to employee illness and supply chain issues, resulting in fewer negotiated hogs being procured and subsequent lower market prices.

"Previous pandemic assistance used flat rates across the hog industry, and this didn't take into account the various levels of harm felt by different producers," said FSA Administrator Zach Ducheneaux. "We worked closely with industry partners and USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service to target assistance to hog producers who were hit the hardest during the pandemic. This is one more example of our efforts

to provide new, broader, and more equitable opportunities for farmers, ranchers and producers."

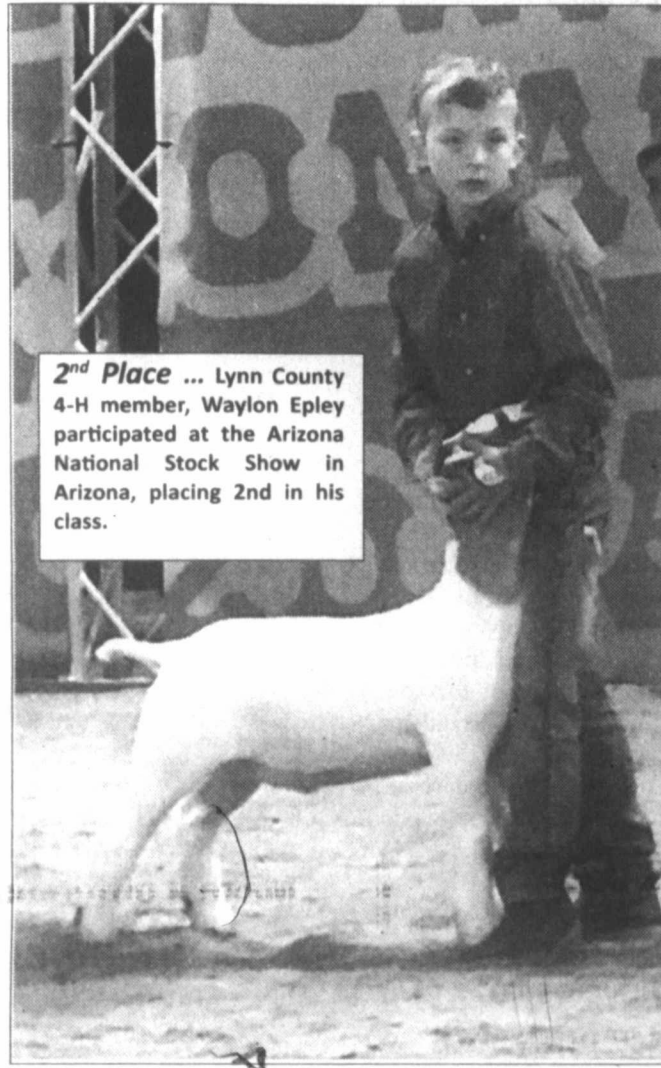
The Department has set aside up to \$50 million in pandemic assistance funds through the Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security (CARES) Act for SMHPP.

Eligible hogs include hogs sold through a negotiated sale by producers between April 16, 2020, and Sept. 1, 2020. To be eligible, the producer must be a person or legal entity who has ownership in the hogs and whose production facilities are located in the United States, including U.S. territories. Contract producers, federal, state and local governments, including public schools and packers are not eligible for SMHPP.

SMHPP payments will be calculated by multiplying the number of head of eligible hogs, not to exceed 10,000 head, by the payment rate of \$54 per head. FSA will issue payments to eligible hog producers as applications are received and approved.

Eligible hog producers can apply for SMHPP starting Dec. 15, 2021, by completing the FSA-940, Spot Market Hog Pandemic Program application. Additional documentation may be required. Visit farmers.gov/smhpp for a copy of the Notice of Funds Availability, information on applicant eligibility and more information on how to apply.

Applications can be submitted to the FSA office at any USDA Service Center nationwide by mail, fax, hand delivery or via electronic means. Hog producers can also call 877-508-8364 to speak directly with a USDA employee ready to offer assistance.

AgriLife Extension Master Marketer program slated

A Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service Master Marketer program returns to Amarillo in 2022 with in-person and virtual attendance options.

The program will be from Jan. 25-March 10 at the Texas A&M AgriLife Research and Extension Center at 6500 Amarillo Blvd. W.

The program is designed for agricultural producers and agribusiness leaders who are experienced in marketing commodities and have some knowledge of futures and options markets. It includes 64 hours of intensive marketing training, focusing on cotton, grains and livestock.

"Master Marketer is a risk-management educational program where participants learn how to develop marketing plans, evaluate marketing alternatives, manage production and price risk, and execute a risk management and marketing plan," said Mark Welch, Ph.D., AgriLife Extension economist in the Department of Agricultural Economics, Bryan-College Station. Welch is both a program presenter and coordinator.

The curriculum is offered as four, two-day sessions held every two weeks. It is the most intensive marketing/risk management training provided by the Extension network anywhere in the U.S. Master Marketer sessions will be Jan. 25-27, Feb. 9-10, Feb. 23-24 and March 9-10, with morning sessions offered virtually.

The cost is \$350 for both in-person and virtual participation. For in-person participants, the cost includes noon meals and educational materials. For those attending virtually, on or about Jan. 20 participants will be emailed instructions on accessing the virtual program.

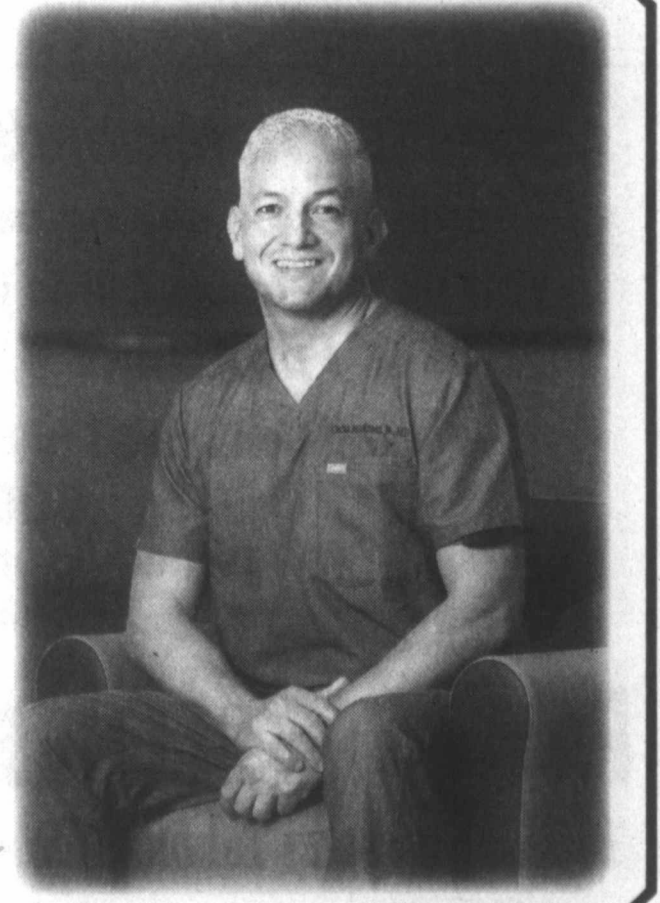

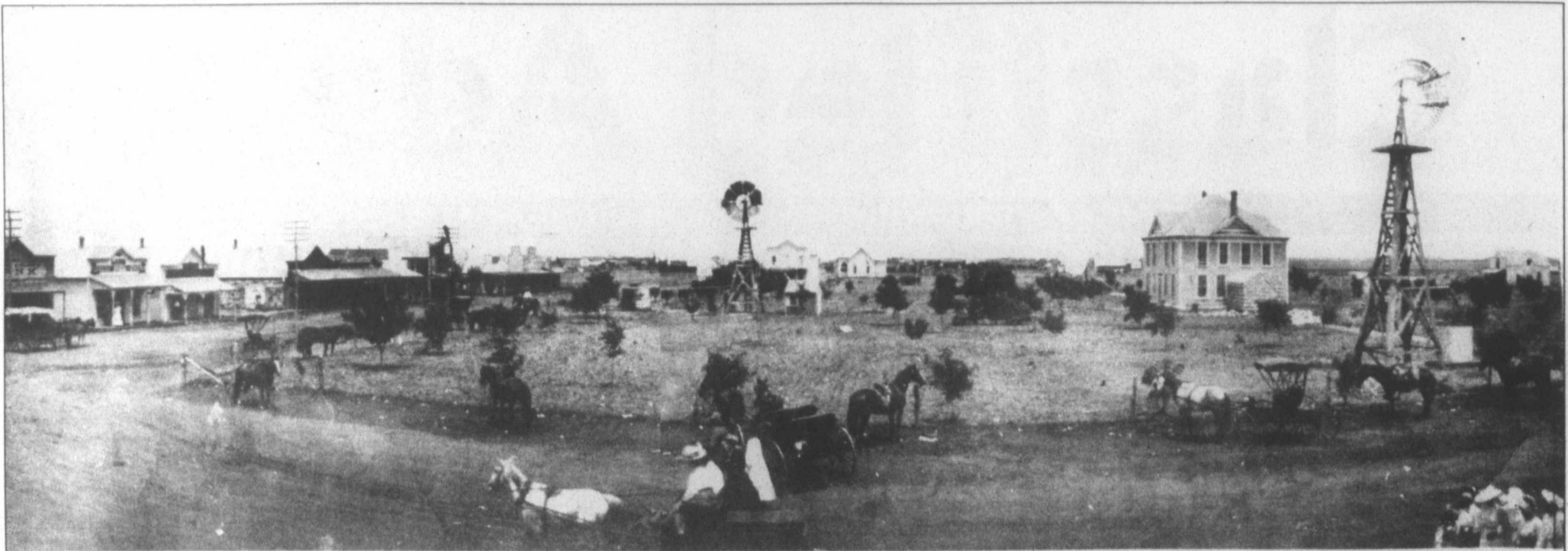

vehicle into a subdivision on FM 1730, where he was able to stop the pickup. The male driver was arrested on charges of DWI and fleeing from an officer.

AN ELEMENTARY school teacher asked me last week to come to some of her classes and bring my saxophones and play, because they have been studying woodwind instruments and it would be a good opportunity for them to see the horns up close and hear them being played.

"Well I don't know what I could play that they would recognize," I told her.

"Just play anything; they'll like it no matter what you do," she said. I decided not to go into the implications of that remark, remembering a time some years ago in Slaton when I had played a solo in church. A certain pharmacist who goes to the same church came up to me the next day as I was drinking coffee with a big group of people and said, "I don't care what the rest of them said; I thought you played pretty good yesterday."

Anyway, I took two saxophones and a clarinet to the grade school and four different groups of music students from kindergarten on up to whatever came in and I explained the way the horns operate and played a few times for them.

They all were really nice young people, many of them telling me how much they enjoyed it and thanking me for coming. Of course, the teacher may have threatened to send them to the office if they didn't clap and pretend to enjoy it.

There was a question and answer session with some of the youngsters, but most of the hands which went up were attached to people who had statements instead of questions — things like "my sister plays a clarinet," or "my brother played one of them, until daddy tore it up," or "I know you; you live across the street from us."

There were questions though, such as "what are those little keys for, why do you wear that strap, and how come the horns are shiny?"

Finally one little girl asked "don't you have to be full of wind to blow those horns?"

I told her that was all the time we had for questions.

letter regarding nonpayment of property taxes, should immediately contact the Lynn County Appraisal District at 806-561-5477.

Other tips to avoid scams:

- Don't panic. Threats that you will be arrested, or your property or accounts will be seized unless you make a same-day payment, are scams.

- Officials emphasize that people should NOT call the number or respond to the letter.

- Verify phone numbers. Never call a number provided to you by someone who is threatening you. Use a verified number to contact a government agency if you are worried you might owe a payment.

- Avoid unusual payment methods. No government agency will instruct you to pay using a payment method such as Bitcoin, money wires, mailed cash or gift cards.

- Keep private information private. Do not share Social Security or account numbers unless you placed the call to a government agency using a number you have independently verified.

Did you know?
