A one-vehicle rollover occurred on FM 400 just east of the 400 overpass in Tahoka last week. These include County Judge Mike Braddock, District Clerk Courtney Odom, County Treasurer Amy Schuknecht, County Clerk Karen Strickland, Pct. 2 Commissioner John Hawthorne, Justice of Peace Pct. 1 Christie Olivan, and Justice of Peace Pct.

Other state races are also on the ballots, including Governor and Lt. Governor.

Voters may vote in either the Republican Primary or the Democratic Primary, but must choose only one Primary in which to cast a ballot.






Industrial arts program brings business to Snyder school district

LHS culinary program enjoying new facilities

LAMESA – Lamesa High School culinary teacher Kevin Pedroza says his classes and kitchens finally found a permanent home as part of the school's Career and Technology Education (CTE) facilities.

The class moved locations several times during the past four years, but finally found their home in the new CTE building.

"We've been here for a full year now," Pedroza said. "It's a huge difference. Just around 30 students can cook here pretty comfortably."

The facility includes commercial-style gas stoves and ovens, and machinery not often available in real restaurant settings: a sous vide machine that boils bags of food, a vacuumpack machine that seals food in plastic bags for later freezing, and a blast chiller that can freeze items in 10 minutes.

"It's amazing. The whole kitchen, the way it is set up, and the equipment we have here is some of the best equipment," Pedroza said.

Incumbent withdraws from Tahoka City Council ballot

LHS program gives hands-on lessons in physics, engineering

vocational and advanced courses offered at Lamesa High School's Career and Technology Education facilities this year. Teacher Janet Spencer, with 30 years of teaching the sciences in multiple school districts, handles the engineering part of the program, while Tommy Doederlein (a former extension agent) covers the honors physics classes.

LAMESA - Physics and engineering classes are among

The classes were once separated until both teachers went to school administrators with the idea of the classes working together and turning the curriculum more away from just equations and toward real-life scenarios.

"We're doing a project-based program and hands-on work instead of doing calculations and lectures," said Doederlein.

What students learn, besides the formulas and fundamentals, is the art of solving problems. Students take the laws of physics and apply them by the use of common objects such as cardboard and glue. Those building materials are turned into catapults, cars made from cans and tinfoil, a drawbridge formed from popsicle sticks that's strong enough to hold 22 pounds of weight, and a prosthetic arm capable of delicately picking up eyeglasses and other small items.

"With engineering and physics, we want them to know the mathematical equations, speed escalation and rhe different types of friction and how it falls into the equation," Spencer said. -The first thing is the thought process - learning how to plan, how to think out of the box. The process can be put into design or any science question you may have."
