LCSO credits citizens for helping locate vehicle wanted in burglaries

orking together with citizens, the Lynn County Sheriff's Office located a red Ford F-150 that had been sought in connection with several burglaries on properties near US 87 in the past couple of weeks, resulting in an arrest at 1:40 p.m. March 1.

The LCSO posted a photo of the truck on their Facebook page on Feb. 28 asking for citizens' help in identifying the driver or owner of the vehicle, which had allegedly been caught on a video security camera after burglarizing a property in the county. Early last Tuesday, a caller told LCSO that he had seen the pickup heading southbound off of Lockwood onto Ave. D. LCSO deputies and Tahoka Police Department were able to locate and stop the vehicle in the alley between Lockwood and South 1st between Ave. E and F. All individuals in the vehicle were identified, and the male driver, 28, of Lubbock, was arrested and transported to the Lynn County Jail for fictitious plates. No property was recovered at that time, but the investigation is ongoing.

"Thank you to the citizen who contacted the sheriff's office and Tahoka PD for the quick response!" the Sheriff's Office stated.

Another burglary was reported on March 2, from a rural residence on CR O. Someone reportedly broke into a residence and barn, with the owner reporting nothing missing from the residence, but several items were taken from the barn, including lawn equipment, a log splitter, a new pressure washer, and game camera.

A two-vehicle accident occurred at 7 a.m. March 2 at Lockwood and Ave. Q in Tahoka. Bruce Angell of Slaton was the driver of a 2007 Honda Accord traveling on Lockwood behind a 2015 black GMC Sierra pickup driven by Cory Barnes of Tahoka, when the Accord failed to slow as the GMC turned right onto Ave. Q, striking the rear end of the pickup. Angell was issued a citation for using a portable device while driving and unsafe speed. No injuries were reported, but the Honda had to be towed from the scene.

On March 3, a black GMC Terrain had a blowout and ran off the road at FM 211 and US 87, just before noon. The driver called LCSO and reported the accident, but said he did not need EMS, and the vehicle was towed from the scene.

Arrests were made following four separate incidents, including two while assisting motorists, a vehicle pursuit, and a traffic stop during the past week.

A Nose for Narcotics

Dodger and Dalton make great team in getting illegal drugs off the streets

ot narcotics? Dodger, Lynn County Sheriff's Office K-9 pitbull, has the nose to find them. And find them he will, with Deputy Dalton Erb as the human half of the K-9 team leading the way. Dodger is highly trained in narcotics detection in vehicle/building searches, and he and his handler play an important role in the local law enforcement agencies' initiative that aims to stop illegal drug use and distribution in the county, or from being transported through Lynn County.

Dalton and Dodger comprise the LCSO K-9 Team, and not only patrol the roads of Lynn County together, but are also available for traffic stops made by other deputies, DPS units, and the Tahoka Police Department.

"If I'm on patrol, Dodger is with me," said Deputy Erb. "There are a lot of drugs moving through Lynn County, and we're available to assist wherever we are needed."

Dodger, now 3-1/2 years old, has been with Deputy Erb for 11 months in the LCSO K-9 team. They make a good team, and the deputy is very pleased with being a part of a unique team that serves a special purpose.

"I love it - I've always been a dog lover, and while Dodger is a working animal he is also a pet to me. I know there are those who say a working dog should never be treated as a pet, but we've got a great bond, and I have had fantastic results with Dodger. I think it's because he feels like he's a part of the family. And he is. Outside of the fact that his collar says SHERIFF, he's just a dog at home," said Erb with an apparent enthusiasm for his

K-9 partner.


The blue pit came to be with the LCSO through unusual circum-

stances that have greatly benefited the law enforcement agency.

"When the LCSO first began

looking into a K-9 program, we found a company called Sector K9, a nonprofit company that works with various animal shelters to select dogs who have the willingness and focus to be a police K9. After training these dogs, the company is careful to match the potential handlers with the dogs, because it is very important for these dogs to form a bond with their handler in order to work together as a team," explained the deputy, adding that the cost of purchasing a trained dog and the cost of additional training with the handler can easily reach



No one injured in barrage of gunfire

LAMESA - Portions of several streets in a south-central residential neighborhood of Lamesa were blocked off for about two hours early Saturday morning as police responded to and investigated an incident involving a single individual firing numerous shots.

No one was injured in the incident, and the suspect was taken into custody after being tased when he allegedly ignored the orders of officers attempting to arrest him, according to Capt. Michael Holder with the Lamesa Police Department.

The suspect, a male described as being in his 20s, was later booked into the Dawson County Jail on charges of deadly conduct and driving while intoxicated.

"Thankfully, no one was hurt. It's a miracle, as many rounds as he fired up in the air. We were blessed that day," said Holder.

Holder said police received a call about 5:45 a.m. Saturday about gunshots being fired at a location on the corner of S. 4th St. and Ave. F. Two officers responded initially, followed by a number of additional officers from the police department, the Dawson County Sheriff's Office and Texas Highway Patrol.

Streets quickly were blocked off about a block away from the residence in all directions. Police reported a male without a firearm was seen going in and out of the residence. Officers

were continuing to develop a plan to approach the residence, when the man got into a car in the driveway and backed it into the street.

Officers immediately converged on the vehicle, and the man pulled back into the driveway. The man eventually got out of the vehicle and attempted to walk back into the residence, at which time he was tased and arrested, Holder said.

An "AK style" .22-caliber rifle and a box of ammunition were later found inside the residence, and numerous empty bullet casings were found on the north and east sides of the house. -- from the Lamesa Press-Reporter

"The most we paid for it was the cost of the hotel room, while I was down there training, so we got an extremely good deal, and this program work," said Erb.

'We had reached out to Sector K9 for the possibility of a dog and training, and they had a special situation that the CEO said he was willing to consider, if it worked out that the dog and I could form a bond," he said.

Dodger was originally rescued from a shelter in New York, and had been trained to be a part of a K-9 unit with another police department. However, after the handler had left the department, Dodger was returned to Sector K9 as per their policy, to await

"That first day was a terrible day!" the deputy said with a rueful grin. "On day one, Dodger did not recognize me, did not respect me, did not acknowledge me, or anything like that. I just gave him all my at-

"The first day I was so beat from dealing with him, and learning a lot about handling a dog for a narcotics program. It was a very long day for both of us, and part of the training is that he would go back with me to the hotel, staying with me constantly room, we were both exhausted, team at LCSO. and I just sat down in a chair and

we connected," he said, laughing. "By the end of Day 2, he was giving me his belly, and that shows his trust."

By the end of the first week that really pushed me to make of training, the two had bonded very well together.

"I love working with Dodger. We still train together every day, and his reward is play time. Depending on the circumstances, the reward may be instant, or it may be delayed," said the deputy. "He loves to play ball. He's just a dog having fun at playtime. But when it's time to go to work, it's free to our jurisdiction, if I was give him the command to deploy

> "We are happy to provide our services to our schools," said Erb. "One of the things that I ask for is a demo day - I want to go and meet the kids. I want to let Dodger meet the kids. He likes meeting people. We were at the Lynn County Harvest Festival (last October) and were meeting kids all day. He was beat by the end of the day, but it was a fun

> day," he said with a smile. "I love to interact with people, and my favorite is the questions that kids ask me. Kids always ask, 'Is he nice?' and I like to joke around with them so I just look at them and say, 'I don't know, why don't you find out?' The look on their faces is just

"The K-9 budget is a line item in the LCSO budget. As a smaller county we work on limited funds and that's nothing against anyone, it's just what it is. We can use our (departmental) training budget, but I like to use the K-9 budget for K-9 things, because it justifies why we have that budget in the first place.

"We also operate on donations. If there's something that he needs, I try to get it through the K-9 donation fund. The cool thing about Dodger is that I have managed to secure donations through a Tractor Supply Co. that donates all of his food - we do not pay for his food. And I also set up a sponsorship with Live Oak South vet clinic in Lubbock and they have been providing us with heartworm and flea/tick meds and general checkups. If there are other vet bills, those are

> "The Tahoka High School FCCLA donated a bucket of tennis balls to use for his playtime, which was helpful ... but the crazy thing about tennis balls for use," he said, laughing. "They're done after one time, so I use those as my backup balls. I do have a Kong ball that I use for a month. The big purchase that we have coming up is a stronger cage/kennel for him, for those times when he needs to be ken-

"We will take all the donations we can get," said Deputy Erb. "There's not much in the budget for routine things like kennels, dog beds, toys, harnesses, and all the other things

He says that he would be glad to work with any organization that would like to do a fundraiser to donate funds for Dodger's training or other needs, and that he wants the public to know what Dodger does for Lynn County.

"I do have an Instagram for him, but I haven't been very active with it lately. We like to show what he gets in his searches. As of late, everything has been locked in our case so I have not been able to post anything. Because these are active cases, we can't release pictures. However, it's safe to say that once I can, I would like to show a little bit more of what's out on the street and what we've gotten. I want people to know the service that we provide," he said.

don't buy him treats, because amount of dope we get off the criminals we get off the street, and there's less risk of the drugs getting to the kids. That's my biggest concern, I don't want the drugs getting to the kids. The intel we have is that there is a lot of narcotics being pushed through this part of Texas. Between me and all the other deputies working here, there's been quite a bit of methamphetamine that has been taken off the streets, and that is our goal," he added.







Proposition Number 1 (SJR 2)

SJR 2 proposes a constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the reduction of the amount of a limitation on the total amount of property taxes that may be imposed for general elementary and secondary public school purposes on the residence homestead of a person who is elderly or disabled in order to reflect any statutory reduction in the maximum compressed rate of the maintenance and operations taxes imposed for those purposes on the person's homestead from the preceding tax year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the reduction of the amount of a limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes that may be imposed for general elementary and secondary public school purposes on the residence homestead of a person who is elderly or disabled to reflect any statutory reduction from the preceding tax year in the maximum compressed rate of the maintenance and operations taxes imposed for those purposes on the homestead."

Proposition Number 2 (SJR 2)

SJR 2 proposes a constitutional amendment increasing the amount of the residence homestead exemption from property taxes for public school purposes from \$25,000 to \$40,000.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment increasing the amount of the residence homestead exemption from ad valorem taxation for public school purposes from \$25,000 to \$40,000."




Two seeking council seat



Former LHS student escapes Ukraine

LAMESA – One day Sofia Sukach, 19, was your typical college student studying journalism in Kyiv (Kiev), Ukraine. The next day, bombs were exploding and shots were being fired in her country as Russian troops invaded the nation.

Sofia is a world away from here, but she still has close ties to Lamesa. She spent a year as a foreign exchange student at Lamesa High School, hosted by Steven and Joy Payson. She graduated as part of the Lamesa High School Class of 2019.

Sofia and her older sister have sought safety in nearby Poland. Sofia is working to get the word out about what is happening in her country.

She is writing letters asking Americans to help her country overcome the invading Russian troops. She's even written an open letter to the Lamesa community about the tragic situation.

"Several days ago I woke up with a full-scale war behind my window. My city Kyiv is being bombed right now. People hiding in shelters, losing their homes and even lives," Sofia said in the letter, emailed to the Lamesa Press-Reporter.

Her country, she said, is in a battle for its very survival.

"If Russia stops fighting, there will be no war. If Ukraine stops fighting, there will be no more Ukraine!" she added.

Steven said he offered plane tickets for Sofia and her older sister to come to the U.S.

"We knew it was happening. I told her before they invaded, 'We can get you out of there and get you to America,' Steven Payson said. "I'll get you both. You and your sister can come over here. I'll get a job for you."

Steven said she doesn't want to come to the U.S. "She wants to fight for her country. She's out raising money, fighting."

At the end of her letter to Lamesa, Sofia wrote, "Keep Ukraine in your thoughts and prayers, please. We will get through this together! And I'll come back to see you all again! Lots of love from brave and free Ukraine – Sofia."
