Annual hospital auction starts at 5:30 here Saturday

The annual auction benefiting Lynn County Healthcare System will be held this Saturday, April 23, starting at 5:30 p.m. at the Lynn County Show Barn, and this year's event will bring lots of interesting auction items for bidders to consider. It's a fun evening where good-natured citizens gather to bid against each other in support of the local hospital, while enjoying good food and friendly conversation with one another.

The LCHD Foundation Auction is uniquely small-town, raising funds for the LCHD Foundation, which in turn directly helps make improvements at Lynn County Hospital District. Every dollar raised benefits the local hospital and its programs. The Hospital District serves several rural communities including Tahoka, Wilson, New Home, O'Donnell, Lamesa and Post.

This year's event will be the 41st annual benefit auction. The fun starts at 5:30 p.m. in the county show barn, located on South 9th Street near the ballpark. The event features a live auction, silent auction, door prizes, raffles for cash prizes, and the popular all-you-can-eat fish fry prepared by members of the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department.

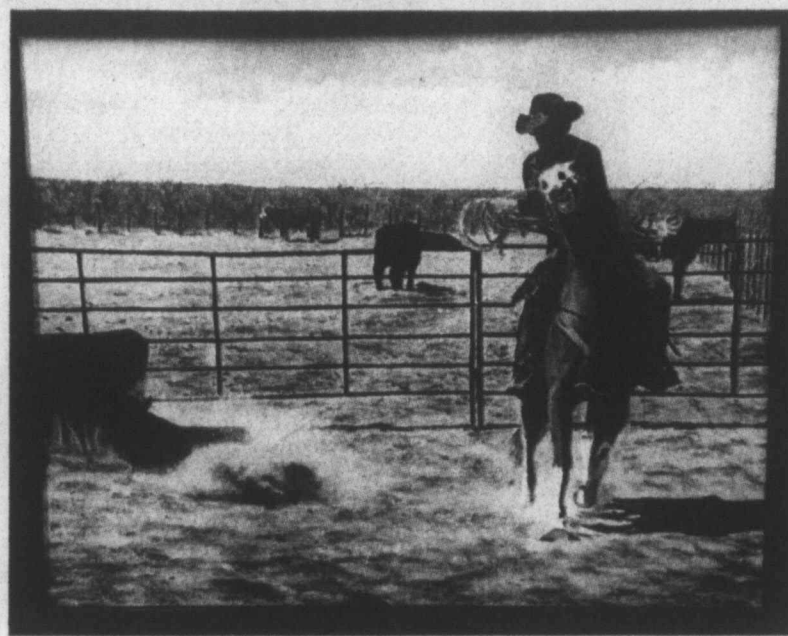
"This is always a fun event, with so many good-hearted citizens attending and enjoying the camaraderie and having such a great

time bidding against each other, all in support of our local hospital and its facilities. We are blessed to have the services of an outstanding hospital and the dedicated healthcare providers we have here, and this is our community's opportunity to show them how much they are appreciated," said Juanell Jones, publisher of *The Lynn County News*.

The funds raised at each event are used specifically to enhance the hospital and its services. This year, the Lynn County Hospital District's Board of Directors has chosen to use the funds to purchase two defibrillator/EKG units for the hospital.

"In February, FDA put out an order that certain defibrillators and AED units would no longer be certified in the healthcare setting. LCH has two defibrillators that we are now required to replace. These two units are used in the

Wildfire burns 1,480 acres of T-Bar pastureland

A wildfire burned 1,480 acres of T-Bar Ranch pastureland in a blaze that started at about 2:30 p.m. last Wednesday a few miles south of US 380 along FM 3112, west of Tahoka. Strong winds pushed the fire eastwards as firefighters fought to control flames in multiple areas. At least three homeowners in the rural area were aware and monitoring the potential fire danger to their homes, but firefighters were able to control the blaze from advancing towards the homes despite the extremely dry brush that fed the fire.

Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department initially responded to the scene, but it was soon apparent that assistance was needed. Tahoka Fire Chief Bryan Reynolds credits the help of many others in helping fight the fire, including O'Donnell and New Home Volunteer Fire Departments who responded immediately to offer assistance.

"It takes everybody when the conditions are dry like this," Chief Reynolds told *The News*. No cause was determined as to what started the fire, but Reynolds said that any small spark can start a fire in these extremely dry conditions.

"We asked for O'Donnell and New Home VFD to assist (and

Tahoka qualifies in 15 events for Regional Track, and Lady Bulldogs are Area Team Champions

Tahoka High School did very well in the Area Track Meet on April 14th in Sundown, grabbing seven gold medals, with nine athletes plus two relay teams qualifying in 15 events to advance to the Regional Track Meet. The Lady Bulldogs were the top girls team at Area, beating 10 teams to claim the Girls Team Championship title.

The Regional Track Meet will be held Friday and Saturday, April 29-30, in Canyon.

In the girls competition, Grace Reglin placed in four events, including 1st place in the 200m run and long jump,

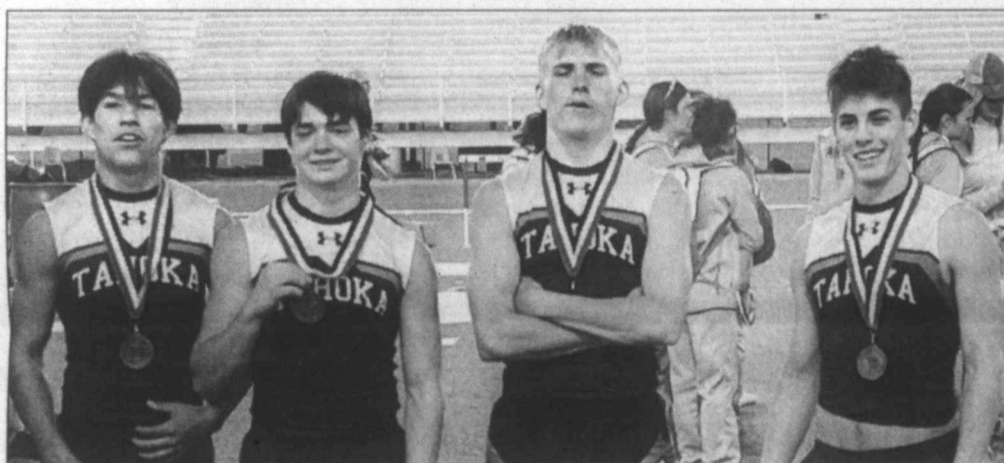
3rd place in the high jump, and 2nd in the 4x100 relay team. Brooklyn Harris was a 1st place medalist in two events, in the 300m hurdles and the high jump. Lillian Morrissey was a 1st place medalist in the 3200m and 1600 meter runs. Madison Rose won 1st in the discus, Gaby Stice was 2nd in the 800m run, and Malaya Garcia was 4th in shot put. Amy Tew placed 4th in the 1600m run.

The girls 4x100 relay team placed 2nd, comprised of Kylie Ramos, Zoie Garvin, Calgary Due and Grace Reglin.

In the boys competition,

Hunter Garrison placed 2nd in triple jump and long jump, 3rd in the 400m run, and was a member of the 4x400 Relay team placing 4th. Zane Garvin placed 3rd in the 200m run, and was a member of the 4x400 Relay team; and the other two members of the 4x400 Relay team were Ruben Arguello and Cason Resendez.

"These young men and women have been working extremely hard to better themselves each week. We look forward to what lies in front of these athletes," said Coach Kavin Comer.

City targeting unsafe structures

City of Tahoka officials are taking closer looks at structures considered unsafe here, with the City Council holding public hearings on three properties at their April 11 meeting.

Properties at 1829 Lockwood, 1900 South 5th, and S.E. 3rd Street were on the agenda for public hearings and consideration of possible action. For the Lockwood property, owners agreed to pay the city to demolish the property. On the 5th Street property, a request was granted to allow 60 days for the owner to repair and clean up property to bring it into compliance with city ordinances, and a 45-day period was granted for the S.E. 3rd Street property to be brought into compliance.

In other business, the council approved an estimate of \$3895 from Alpha Omega Resources for the purpose of mapping lagoon number 1 at the city's wastewater treatment plant to determine the condition and depth of sludge in the lagoon.

City Administrator Julie Arrington asked that the council allow her to direct \$150,000 in Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery funds for repairs to the city pool,

which was approved. The City of Tahoka was awarded \$656,000 in total recovery funds, of which half (\$328,000) was sent to the city in August of 2021. The other half is expected to be in city coffers this August. The city has used the funds primarily for public works projects, including sewer pond erosion repair, lift station repairs, service pump repairs at the wastewater treatment plant, a backhoe for the landfill, water well projects, and the upcoming city pool repairs. A small portion (\$5,000) was used to purchase tablets for council members to use.

During a monthly report by Animal Control Officer Laura Henderson to the council, she warned that fleas and ticks are becoming a big problem in Tahoka, and that animal owners need to take precautions to protect their pets and property.

A request to allow the installation of a concrete cemetery marker over three family graves was approved at the Tahoka cemetery.

Action was tabled on considering a franchise agreement with Rhyno Recycling.

Mayor John Baker led the meeting, with council members Ray Box, Shiloh Braddock and Ryan Curry present.

Early Voting begins Monday
for May 7 elections here

Early Voting for the May 7 elections will be held April 25-May 3, including a Constitutional Amendment election. In Lynn County, only three entities have contested races that will require having an election. Three city elections will be held, including Tahoka, O'Donnell and Wilson city positions.

There are four places on the Tahoka City Council to fill, including a Special Election for Place 1 for a one-year unexpired term, with Robert Webster and Nathan Garcia running for this position. In Place 2, Stephen Overstreet, Linda Oages and Jessie Moya are vying for the seat;

Mike Rivas and Joe Craig are seeking the Place 4 seat; and incumbent Ray Box and candidate Samantha Henderson are vying for the Place 5 (At-Large) seat. Early Voting will be conducted at the Lynn County Clerk's Office at the Lynn County Courthouse, Monday-Friday 8:30 a.m.-5 p.m.

In O'Donnell, Mayor Kim Parker is unopposed in her bid for another two-year term, but there are four candidates for three council seats, including the three incumbents Joseph Luera, Gustene Bairrington and Trent Hancock, and candidate Jessie Perez. Early Voting will be conducted at O'Donnell City Hall, 615 8th

St., Monday-Friday during regular business hours. Two 12-hour early voting days will be held 7 a.m.-7 p.m. on Thursday, April 28th and Tuesday, May 3rd.

Wilson Mayor Randy Dunn is unopposed for another two-year term with the City of Wilson, but three candidates are vying for two council seats, including incumbents David Maldonado and Clyde Wilke, and candidate Adam Ramirez. Early Voting will be conducted at the Green Building in Wilson Monday-Friday from 8 a.m.-12 noon and 1-3 p.m., as well as two 12-hour voting periods from 7 a.m.-7 p.m. on April 27 and May 3.

Early Voting for the Constitutional Amendment Election will be held at the Lynn County Clerk's Office, Monday-Friday, 8:30 a.m.-5 p.m.

All other school and city elections in the county, as well as the Lynn County Hospital District election, have unopposed candidates, allowing these entities to cancel their election procedures.

For the City of New Home, candidates Gayland James and Sara Clem will be declared elected for two council seats.

Four incumbents on the Tahoka ISD Board of Trustees were all unopposed in their bids for re-election, with Slate May (Pct 1), Jon Luna (Pct

2), Carol Miller (Pct 3) and Tamesha Harris-McClendon (Pct 5) to be declared elected.

Incumbents Melissa Pedroza and Landon Mires, and candidate Landry Barton, were all unopposed in their bids for the O'Donnell ISD Board of Trustees, and will be declared elected.

On the Wilson ISD Board of Trustees, incumbent JJ Pena and candidate Roman Parmer, unopposed for two seats, will be declared elected.

Lynn County Hospital District Director Mary Gayle Raindl and candidate Sarah Cook were unopposed for two seats on the board of directors, and will be declared elected.

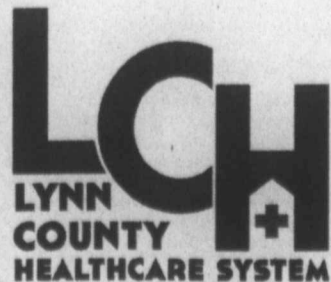

Lynn EMS transports driver after single-vehicle accident

A single-vehicle traffic accident occurred at US 380 and FM 179 early Saturday morning. Lynn County Sheriff's office (LCSO) received a call at 12:54 a.m. April 16 from Lubbock Police Department saying that they had received a call from a woman stating her daughter had been involved in an accident and giving the vehicle coordinates. A Terry County deputy located the accident and reported that the woman's vehicle had struck a telephone pole and the top half of the pole was hanging by the power lines. LCSO, DPS, Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept., Lynn County EMS and Lyntegar all responded to the scene. EMS transported the driver to a Lubbock medical facility for treatment of

unknown injuries, and the vehicle was towed.

The O'Donnell Police Chief requested the LCSO K-9 unit respond to a convenience store in O'Donnell at 1:40 a.m. April 13, where the canine gave a positive alert for drugs. Drug paraphernalia was found at the location.

A male was arrested for possession of a controlled substance during a vehicle search at a traffic stop at midnight April 11, at US 380 and US 87. A female driver was arrested on charges of possession of a controlled substance after a traffic stop 5 miles north of O'Donnell on US 87 at 9:05 p.m. April 12.

Other calls during the week were for stranded motorists, and for suspicious persons or vehicles.

Anyone who burns outdoors during a burn ban is committing a Class C Misdemeanor and can be issued a fine of up to \$500 for the offense of "Violate County Order-Burn Ban".

It's a record! Area gins finish processing record-setting 648,428 bales

An excellent 2021 cotton crop has finished being processed by Lynn County area gins, with a total bale count of 648,428 bales setting a record by more than 73,000 bales from the previous record of 575,403 from the 2007 crop year.

Four gins surpassed their own records that had been set in the 2007 crop year, with Woolam Gin in O'Donnell topping out at 73,928 bales this year, as they finished processing the 2021 crop on March 8. That number is slightly above their previous record of 73,689 from the 2007 crop.

Wells Coop Gin surpassed their previous record by 10,000 bales, processing 72,860 bales from the 2021 crop compared to 62,498 bales from the 2007 crop.

Garlyn Gin also bested their previous record, processing 27,175 bales compared to 26,285 from the 2007 crop.

Farmers Coop Gin in

O'Donnell merged with Slaton Coop Gin under a new name, Westex, for processing the 2021 crop, processing a total of 184,460 bales from the joint merger. On its own, Farmers Coop's previous record was 81,654 in 2005.

Texas Star Gin in Wilson/Union processed 137,544 bales of cotton from the 2021 crop, and New Home Coop Gin finished with 99,352 bales processed. Farmers Coop Assn. #1 in Tahoka processed 54,262 bales from the 2021 crop.

The previous 2007 crop record did not include bale counts from the Slaton Coop Gin. The gins reporting at that time included Texas Star Gin in Wilson/Union, New Home Coop-Lakeview, Farmers Coop O'Donnell, Farmers Coop Assn. #1 in Tahoka, Woolam Gin in O'Donnell, Wells Coop Gin, Close City Gin in Post, Grassland Coop Gin, and Lynn County Gin, with a total of 575,403 bales processed.

LAMESA - This year's Chicken Fried Steak Festival will include the 10th annual team roping events at the Lamesa Rodeo Arena.

Wilson would have responded but we wanted to leave at least one department available in case of another fire), Lynn County Emergency Management coordinator Bryant Sears and Lynn County Sheriff's officers were helping, we had numerous farmers and ranchers hauling water to us, and we had some retired firefighters who hauled water and brought drinks for the firemen," said Reynolds. "Lynn County provided three maintainers and personnel to cut fire breaks, and the Texas Forest Service also provided a truck, three bulldozers, and about a dozen firefighters to assist us," he added.

The Texas Forest Service, he explained, is currently stationed at Reece in Lubbock during the wildfire season here, and offers extra personnel and equipment to help fire fight wildfires when needed.

"They have firefighters from Texas, Florida and Georgia stationed here right now, and then they all move on to other areas as needed,"

Reynolds explained.

Some fencing was damaged in the burned acreage at T-Bar, but no cattle were lost, there were no injuries, and firefighters were able to prevent the fire from advancing too closely to nearby homes. Firefighters were at the scene for at least six hours, and it was about 9:30 p.m. before the Tahoka VFD fire trucks and equipment were back at the Tahoka fire department.

While it takes a community to respond, in Tahoka the core of the firefighting effort is provided by the selfless volunteers on the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department.

These men spend countless hours in maintaining the trucks and other equipment, training and preparedness, and when the call comes they are quick to respond. They leave their jobs, their farms, and their families and homes to provide an essential service to this community and county, fighting fires in sometimes extremely hazardous conditions, and they are to be commended for their service.
