## Ben Carson: 'Democrats Tend to Look More at the Color of Their Skin'

Washington (CNN) – Ben Carson said Wednesday that Republicans are more colorblind than Democrats when it comes to race.

"I find black Republicans are treated extremely well in the Republican Party. In fact, I don't hear much about being a black Republican," he said Wednesday at an event in Michigan. "I think the Republicans have done a far superior job of getting over

racism."

Carson was a Democrat for years, but said he's found the Republican Party to be more welcoming.

"When you look at the philosophies of the two parties now, what I have noticed as a black Republican is that Republicans tend to look more at the character of people. And Democrats tend to look more at the color of their skin," he said Wednesday.

## City Manager Appoints New Fire Chief

Friday, September 25, 2015, City Manager James Loomis appointed Deputy Chief Lance Phelps as the new fire chief of Lubbock.

Phelps has served in Lubbock Fire Rescue for over 28 years. He began his career as a fire fighter in January of 1987, before rising in the ranks to become deputy chief of operations in October 2012.

Phelps' appointment must be confirmed by the Lubbock City Council. Once confirmed, Lance Phelps would become the 9th fire chief in the history of the City of Lubbock.

# In Cinque

Summer is about to be a time of the past in a few days when autumn officially sets in on the 23rd of September. It is the season between summer and winter. For many of us who suffer with seasonal allergies, this is a beautiful time of the year to see but it is a dreaded time of the year to be comfortable.

The trees are slowly beginning to shed their leaves as they change colors and pose a different kind of yard work for the average home owner. This year, in particular, the squirrels are eating up all of the pecans and making extra work for homeowners who have pecan trees in their yards. Individuals who are allergic to trees and grass are finding it difficult to be outside now. Though autumn or fall as we call it does not begin until later in September, the effects of pollen have a head start about the middle of August. Ragweed is at its worst in August and does not let up until the first frost is recorded.

When I first noticed the onset of ragweed, grass and tree pollen affecting me, I thought I had contacted a summer cold. My nose ran, eyes itched and there were moments of non-stop sneezing. When school started in September, I was told by one of my professors that I would be miserable until the first frost fell. Being young and skeptical of non-medical advice, I shrugged the thought off, but true to the saying, I did not find relief until it was cold enough for a frost. I still did not think much of the information until the next summer soon after I began working as an adult on a job which I had begun in August.

Fortunately, I worked in an air conditioned building and on some days I actually needed a sweater to be comfortable, but the minute I left work

and started home, I was one miserable, blowing, snorting, itching soul. My most benevolent aunt with whom I resided got her pharmacy to give me some ephedrine. It helped some, but I was still miserable. I soon learned that the impact of the allergies made my immune system weak and I was prey for Sinusitis, Flu and any other type of ailment which affected the respiratory system, especially Bronchitis. It was my first episode with Bronchitis which sent me to the doctor. Some drugs available to treat respiratory ailments helped during these times but were not very good with the allergies.

As years went by, doctors prescribed medicines for my allergies which helped but never made me feel good until the turn of the century when allergy medicines became more effective. The one thing that I have learned in all these years is that you cannot cure an allergy. You can treat it, and it is best treated on a daily basis, rather than waiting until you are attacked by an allergen. Sometimes it is necessary to have tests to find out what you are allergic to, but some things make you aware without a test. However, the modern day allergy medicines work better if taken every day of the year. I still sneeze some, have a little itching and blow a little bit this time of year, but treating allergies on a daily basis is the best remedy for me, and perhaps for you, too, if you are affected. Get 'in cinque' and be comfortable this season. Take care of your allergies by seeing your doctor and finding relief.

## Beyond the Rhetoric

 Going from a Great Nation to a Land of Poverty

Our stock market has been correcting itself for quite some time. It appears that the major correction is on its way and the world's economy is going to take a "nose dive". America, being the wealthiest nation, has the most to lose. The Great Recession started in 2008 and the recovery is very anemic (if it is a recovery at all). We tried to address it with the Stimulus Project but that was a total failure. We were \$17 trillion in debt and we threw another \$1 trillion up against "the wall". Thus, our debt today is over \$18 trillion and few on Capitol Hill and the White House seem to care about that. That neglect will cost this nation more and more jobs. The agency knows this and does nothing about it. Our civil rights group see it but do nothing but take union sponsorship money. Our elected officials, including Black ones, are afraid of the union muscle and sell out our potential workers. We need jobs!! But they let this persist. It is very much publicized about "Silicon Valley" discriminating against Blacks in the high tech industry. Where is the publicity

I have never been in serious trouble except with the Gracious Mistress of the Parsonage. I must have gotten in trouble with my parents when I was young, but I am too old now to remember that. The great thing about getting old is having a selective memory.

Now, the only trouble I get into is with her. And trust me; I have had my moments of trouble with her and can remember every one.

We were getting ready to visit our son and his family for a week. Four of our grandchildren live with my son and his wife.

Grandchildren are God's way of apologizing for children. When you have children, you are too young and busy to know what to do with them. At the

grandfather stage, it is a different story altogether. I now have the experience and the time to spend with these grandchildren.

Half of my grandchildren live here in Florida and the other half lives in Ohio. It would be great if I could spend half of my time in Florida and the other half in Ohio, but nobody has bought into that suggestion, and by "nobody" I'm referencing my children.

Rose started his educational journey in 1956 at Wheatley Elementary School and graduated in 1969 from Dunbar High School in Lubbock, Texas. He was an avid basketball player in the position of guard. The team was runner-up for the State Championship in 1968.

Rose enlisted in the military in 1972 as a U.S. Navy Seaman. He traveled to many countries and did a tour in South Vietnam. He was ranked as an E5 Hospital Gorman when he received an Honorable Discharge in 1979.

Rose was preceded in death by his mother, Beatrice Walker; and two brothers: Tom Ricks and Albert, Jr.

Rose leaves a multitude of family and friends to celebrate his life: his three children: Christopher La Var (Kelly),

**Moses Malone, 76ers' 'Chairman of the Boards,' Dies at 60**

Moses Malone, the N.B.A. center known as the Chairman of the Boards for prodigious rebounding that propelled him to the Basketball Hall of Fame and acclaim as one of the top 50 players in the league's first half-century, died during the weekend of September 12, 2015, in Norfolk, Va. He was 60.

His death was announced on Sunday, September 13th, by the Philadelphia 76ers, whom he helped lead to the 1983 N.B.A. championship.

The Norfolk police said in a statement that Malone was found unresponsive in his room at the Norfolk Waterside Marriott by hotel workers shortly before 8 a.m. on Sunday. He was pronounced dead there.

Officer Daniel Hudson, the chief public information officer for the police, said there were "no signs of foul play." The Virginia chief medical examiner's office in Norfolk said that a pathologist would examine Malone's body on Monday.

[The office later said the cause was cardiovascular disease.]

Calvin Murphy, the Hall of Fame guard and Malone's former teammate with the Houston-Rockets, told KRIV, a Fox TV

station in Houston, that he had spent time with Malone on Saturday night and that hotel security was called when Malone did not appear at breakfast before they were to play in a celebrity golf tournament.

At 6 feet 10 inches and 215 pounds or so when he turned pro, Malone was hardly the biggest or strongest center, but he played with uncommon intensity and energy.

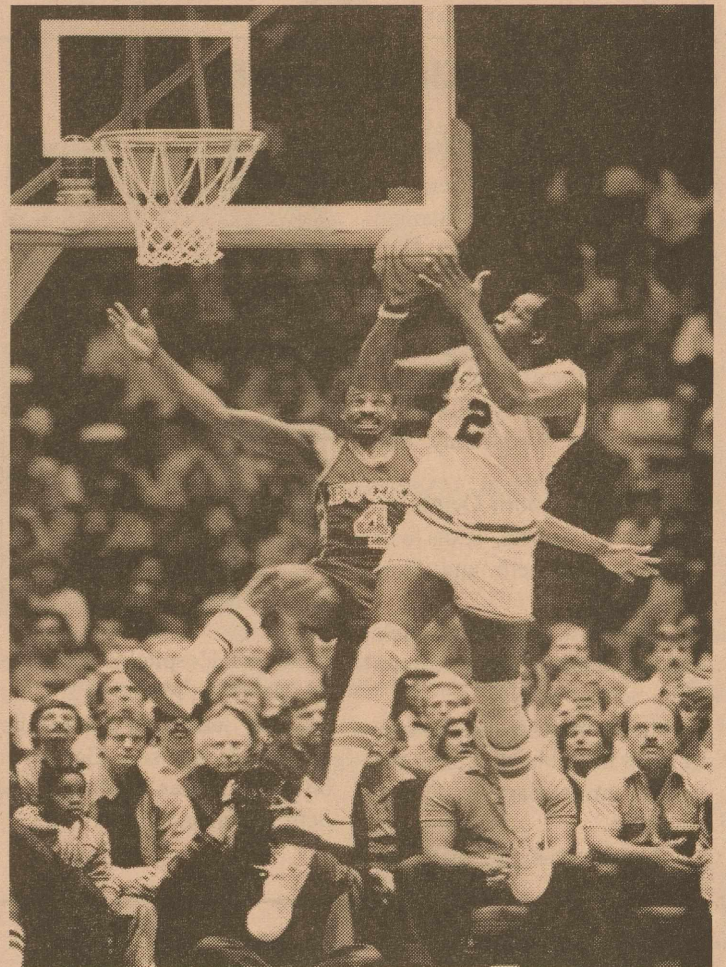
"Most guys have second and third effort," Kansas City Kings center Sam Lacey told The New York Times after Malone's Rockets defeated the Kings in the 1981 N.B.A. playoffs. "Moses had ninth and 10th effort. He just keeps going and going until he gets the ball."

When Malone joined the Utah Stars of the American Basketball Association out of high school in Petersburg, Va., in 1974, after intending to play for the University of Maryland, he was the first high schooler in modern basketball to go directly to the pros.

Darryl Dawkins, the flamboyant center known as Chocolate Thunder for his fierce dunking and the first high schooler to go straight to the N.B.A. when he became a 76er in 1975, died on Aug. 27 at 58.

Playing for 19 seasons in the N.B.A. — with the Rockets and the 76ers in his prime — Malone was a three-time most valuable player, and he appeared in 11 All-Star Games. At his death, he was the league's career leader in offensive rebounds, with 6,731. He led the N.B.A. in total rebounds five times and averaged 20.6 points a game. He was inducted into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass., in 2001.

Malone signed with the 76ers before the 1982-83 season and was named M.V.P. for the regu-

lar season. He teamed with Julius Erving and Bobby Jones at forward and Maurice Cheeks and Andrew Toney at guard on that Sixers team, coached by Billy Cunningham, which finished first in the Atlantic Division with a 65-17 record.

Before the 1983 playoffs began, Malone predicted the 76ers would go "four, four, four" — or, as has commonly been cited, "fo, fo, fo," in the Southern vernacular — en route to the championship.

He was off by one game.

The 76ers defeated the Knicks in four straight games in the Eastern Conference semifinals; beat the Milwaukee Bucks, 4-1, in the conference finals; and

then swept the Los Angeles Lakers to capture the N.B.A. championship. Malone was named M.V.P. of the finals.

Moses Eugene Malone was born on March 23, 1955, in Petersburg, Va. His father moved to Texas when he was a child, and he was living with his mother, Mary, who worked at odd jobs, when he starred for his high school team.

He planned to play for Maryland, but he signed instead with Utah of the A.B.A. He played for another A.B.A. team, the Spirits of St. Louis, the next season, the last one before the A.B.A. merged with the N.B.A.

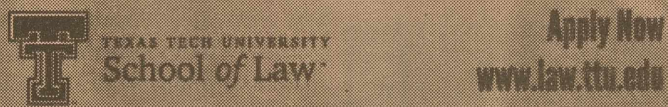

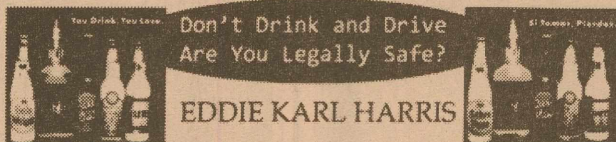

On what Colin Powell said When O'Reilly played a clip of former Secretary of State Colin Powell defending Black Lives Matter, Trump responded: "He's wrong. He's totally wrong. It's 'All Lives Matter,' and that should be the theme of this country, frankly, or one of the themes. So he's obviously catering to somebody. I don't know who he's catering to."

So what is the Black Lives Matter Movement anyways?

Organizers of the Black Lives Matter movement say their purpose is to call attention to "systemic mistreatment of African-Americans by police officers". The movement was formed after a series of recent high-profile incidents over the past year in which unarmed African-American men died during their encounters with law enforcement. It started in Ferguson, Missouri but also includes incidents in Baltimore, MD and other cities.

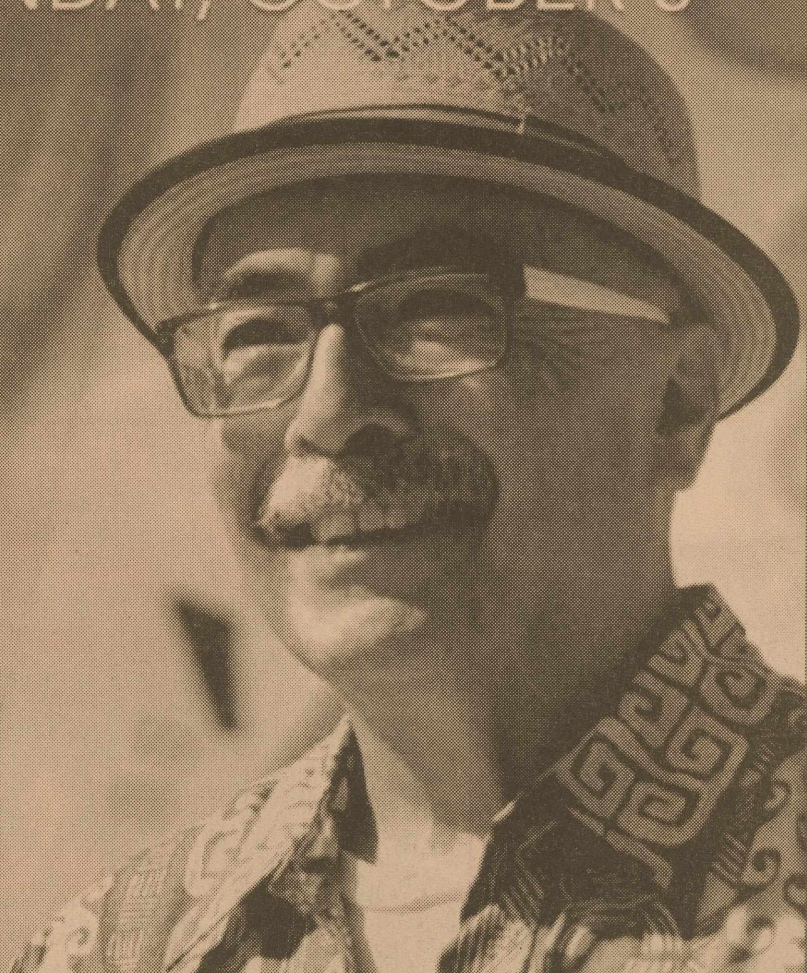

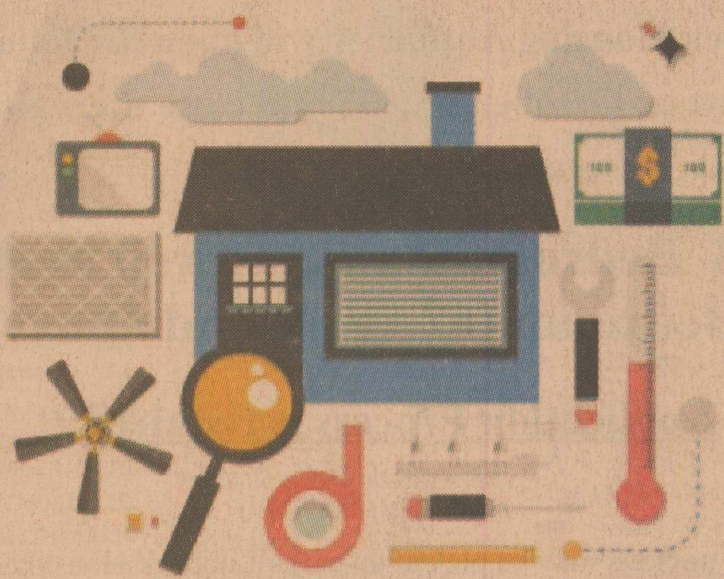
