## Texas Tech Men's Basketball Coach Tubby Smith To Receive John R. Wooden Coaching Award



Coach Tubby Smith to receive a coaching award

Texas Tech University men's basketball coach Tubby Smith will receive the John R. Wooden Award's Legends of Coaching honor in April, organizers announced on Friday, October 16, 2015.

The award recognizes coaches who exemplify the late UCLA coach's high standards of coaching success and personal integrity.

Smith has 538 victories in his 24-year head coaching career,

including winning the 1998 national championship at Kentucky. He also coached at Minnesota, Tulsa and Georgia.

Smith will receive the award on April 8, 2016 at the second annual ESPN College Basketball Awards Show. The announcement of the award was made by Wooden's daughter Nan at the annual Wooden Award Tipoff Luncheon at the Los Angeles Athletic Club.

The honor has been presented

since 1999, with honorees selected based on character, success on the court, graduation rates of the players in their program, coaching philosophy and identification with the goals of the John R. Wooden Award.

Past recipients include the late North Carolina coach Dean Smith, Duke coach Mike Krzyzewski and former Tennessee women's coach Pat Summitt.

## Ex-Chicago Schools Chief Pleads Guilty to \$23 Million in Corruption and Fraud

Chicago, IL — 66-year old Barbara Byrd-Bennett, the former chief executive of Chicago's public school system, has plead guilty in federal court to her crimes of corruption. She admitted to attempting to give \$23 million in contracts to her former employer in exchange for bribes and kickbacks. Had it been successful, she would have profited more than \$2 million.

She plead guilty just 5 days after federal prosecutors revealed that they were aware of her scheme and were planning to indict her, and two other executives that run executive educa-



tion training firms in Chicago. Byrd-Bennett had previously been employed at these firms.

Citizens of Lubbock will now have the opportunity to ride Citibus to the DPS located at 1404 Lubbock Business Park Blvd. Suite 100, from Citibus Downtown Transfer Plaza (DTP) located at 801 Broadway.

The new bus route will begin on Wednesday, October 28, 2015 and run only on Wednesday's, which is the least congested day for the DPS. If the demand of the route is supported by the public, it has a potential

to expand to more days in the future.

## Letter to the Editor Donald Trump Thrashes Black Lives Matter "I Think They're Trouble"

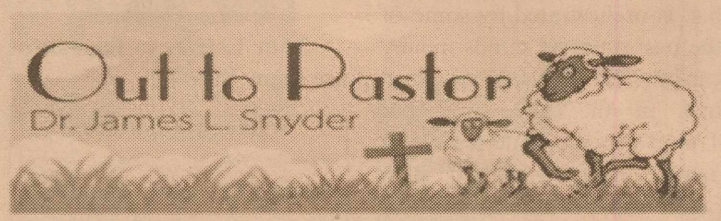


be given an additional \$3,529 fine if the music isn't kept to a minimum.

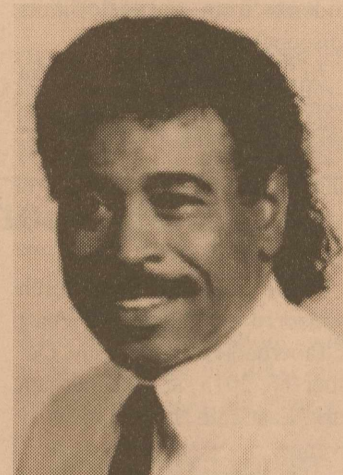
Memorial services were held for James Otis Price, Jr. on Monday morning, October 19, 2015, at the First Church of the Nazarene.

from living on campus, participating in extracurricular activities such as athletics, and were excluded from other University programs such as student government activities with the exception of the Texas Tech Band. Being a member of the band had its' limitations too. In the early years, James and other African-American band members were not allowed to travel with the band when it performed outside of Lubbock. The reason given to band students was that other Southwest Conference schools had decreed that they would not allow the African American band students in their stadiums or on their fields to perform the with the band.

When Preston Smith of Lubbock was elected Lieutenant Governor of Texas in 1963 the Tech Band was scheduled to march in the Texas gubernatorial Inaugural Parade. That invitation led to another successful intervention by Rev. Reed that allowed James and other African-American Tech Marching Band students the first opportunity to travel with the band to perform in that inaugural parade.

The Tech Band director, Dean Killion, through close personal observation and individual "skills checks" recognized and accepted James' talent and superior technical percussion skills. James successfully earned the drum section leader position after try-outs. Later, Mr. Killion suspended the requisite tryouts for the stage band and announced that James would also be the lead drummer for the stage band. James also was a member of the University Symphonic Band.

After earning his Bachelors' degree from Tech, James became an educator in the Lubbock Independent School District for two decades. He began his teaching career at Walter Posey Elementary School; he also taught at Wheatley Elementary School and briefly served as Student Activities Director at Dunbar High. In addition to teaching, some may remember him as the manager at Mae Simmons Swimming Pool during the summer months.

He played the role of a drummer in the 1992 movie "Leap of Faith" starring Steve Martin.

For many years Mr. Price could be seen playing on Thursday nights at Jazz Orleans Café. His last big performance was at the 2015 4th of July Festivities at MacKenzie Park.

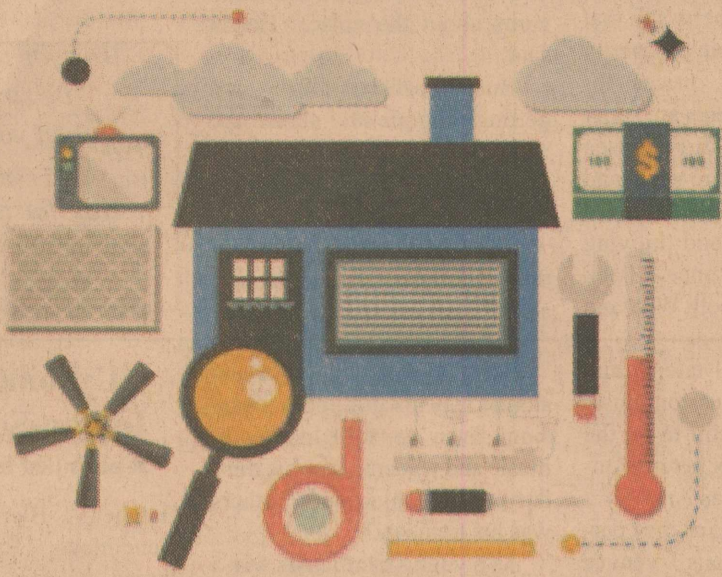

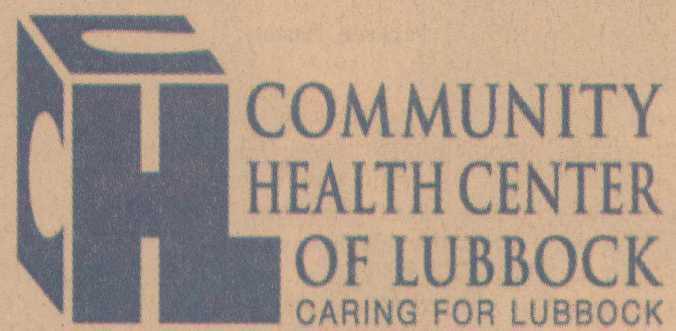
