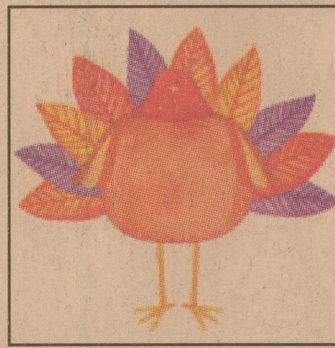
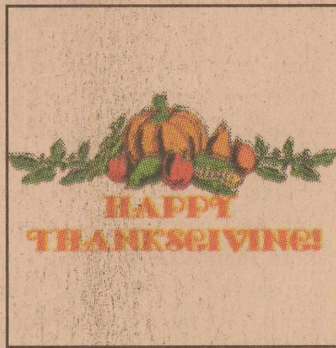

Hope Is In East Lubbock



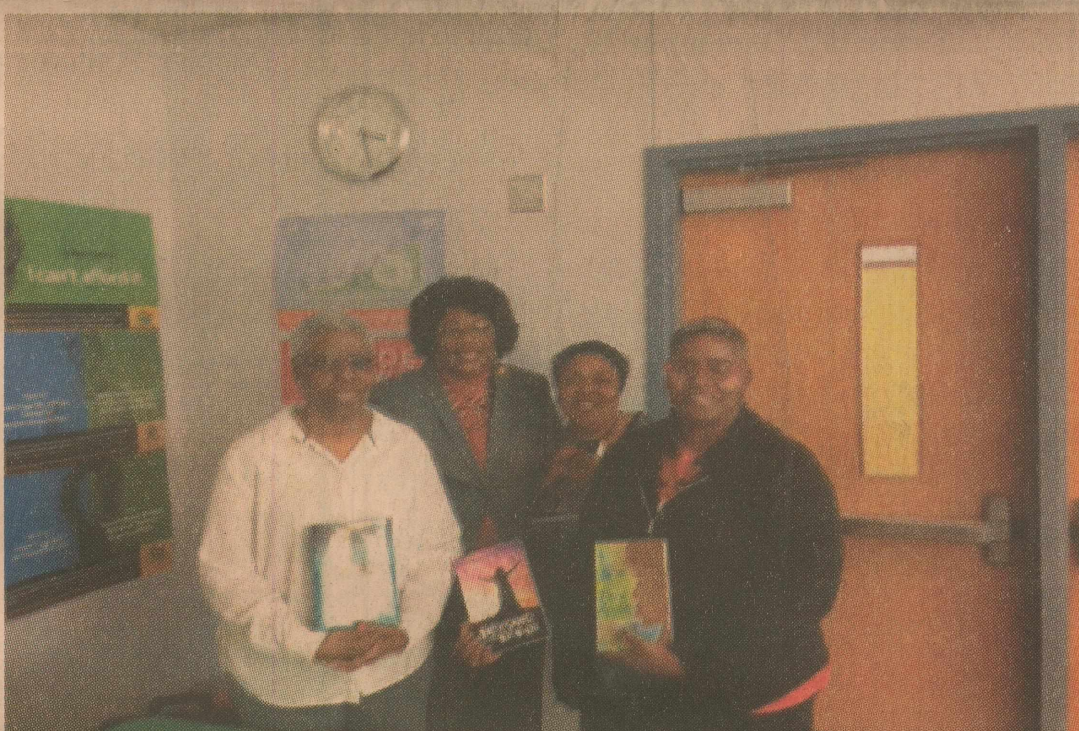

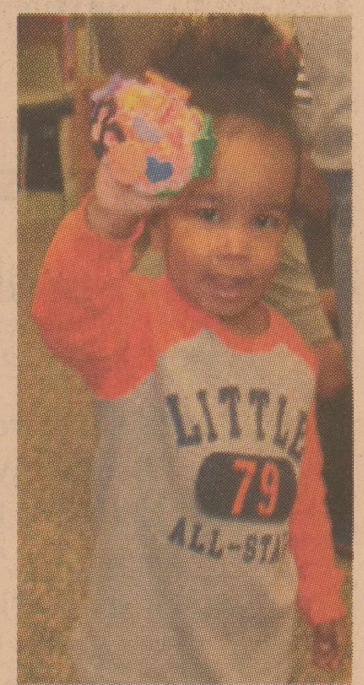
to read to the children at the Patterson Branch Library, 1836 Parkway Drive.

In Cinque

has been 106 years since the inception of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People when concerned citizens answered "The Call." The organization was founded by American citizens of the Black and White races to help to guarantee equal rights to people of color whom had gained freedom by law, but denied it in reality. Each year the organization sponsors a Freedom Fund Banquet which is conducted in all of its branches in the United States and elsewhere. The Fort Worth/Tarrant County Branch held its 38th Annual Dr. George D. Flemmings Freedom Fund Banquet was held on Friday, October 23, 2015 at the Will Rogers Memorial Center. Approximately 500 freedom fighters were expected to grace this banquet and it had no cooperation from the weather as rain flooded parts of the city. None-the-less, the banquet hall was packed with members and friends of the NAACP. I was happy to be a part of that group as a Life and Supporting member of the NAACP and a member of the church with the largest attendance at the affair: Baker Chapel A.M.E. Church.

An award was given to the largest group attending and thus my Pastor, Reverend Walter McDonald, who is also celebrating 13 years as the Pastor of Baker Chapel A.M.E. Church in Fort Worth, received the NAACP award for member attendance.

Everyone in attendance enjoyed the menu food delicacies as well as the inspirational message of the keynote speaker, the Reverend Dr. William Barber II from Goldsboro, N.C. who has been an elected officer of the North Carolina State Conference and National Board Member. He is the Pastor of Greenleaf Christian Church Disciples of Christ since 1993.

Dr. Barber spoke about "NO TIME FOR FOOLISHNESS." He briefly carried the audience through tragedies of the past which garnered national attention and gave rise to a need to spring into action to secure freedom. He spoke on items which he felt that as a people that needed more attention and a push for equality. He listed: 1. Housing, 2. Education-college, 3. Health care: Medicare and Medicaid, 4. Fairness and Equality, 5. Expanding Voting Rights and Equal Protection of the Law, 6. We need the items which the Constitution should provide: justice, provisions for common defense, general welfare and domestic tranquility. He went on to say that the South in the United States has the most poor people and states which have not extended the Medicaid provisions of the Healthcare Law have denied one million people and have caused the deaths of 56,000 people, simply because there is a Black man in the White House.

Dr. Barber suggested that we: 1. Build membership in the organization. 2. Mandate pressure on Congressmen. 3. Make members be heard; know what it is that you want and say something; 4. Mobilize and build forces to push for equality. After elaborating on his points, Dr. Barber gave a spiritual arousal to the audience and had everyone on their feet swaying with Amens, Halleluiahs and "Yes Lords" to end his message. It is so hoped that members in attendance will get 'in cinque' and spread the word to give more impetus to the organization.

So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to everyone, and especially to those who are of the household of faith. Galatians 6:10

Life can change quickly. All of a sudden the simplest things started becoming complicated. My logic and rationale were rattled. Headaches and bewilderment started zigzagging my mind. It wasn't long before my wife Kay decided to take us to my primary care doctor. Within 5 minutes, he tested my knees with a hammer for deep tendon reflexes. My left knee did not react. He ordered me to go to the nearest hospital (John Hopkins). He called ahead to the hospital and got me priority in the Emergency Room. It became apparent that I was showing signs of pressure on the brain. A CT scan showed blood shifting my brain.

The medics turned me over to Dr. Thai. We would later find out that Dr. Thai is a highly competent brain surgeon. In fact, he was the senior resident for the honorable Dr. Ben Carson. This

calmed my concerns. He told me that we would go into surgery next morning. Many of my concerns were removed as it became obvious that I was in gifted hands. We settled into Intensive Care Unit and began preparing for my surgery. Dr. Thai said that he would be in the next morning before dawn. The staff of the hospital was congenial and obviously well trained. Realizing that my life was now on the line I tried my best to fight off fear as it tried to break through my mental door. I could see fear in Kay's eyes and knew that I had to become a "rock". We told no one at the time but eventually our twin sons would recognize the signals.

Midnight would come soon. The thought of such sensitive surgery made me contemplate my demise. The nurses told us that Dr. Thai prefers to do surgery around 7am and would first appear at 5am. As we sat in the ICU, time became evermore precious. I decided to console myself by silently repeating The Lord's Prayer over and over. Fortunately, my faith remained strong. The staff of the hospital

was very well organized and professional. They were truly a team as the night ticked by in anticipation of the surgery. There must have been a team of 30 people. Forty percent of whom were Black with the sole mission of my operation. It was so impressive and assuring to Kay and me.

At 4am, we became aware of the surgical staff mingling together in a waiting room. They were huddling in preparation of the big operation of the day. At 5am, there was plenty of small talk and then it was announced that Dr. Thai was in the building and would be coming in for the big moment. Around 7am, I was taken to the operating table and heard those impressionable words: let's apply the propofol. That is when they put you to sleep. This is the anesthesia that was involved in Michael Jackson's quest for sleep. I knew that whatever was about to happen I would find out about it later if I survived. Propofol is the best sleep one can experience.

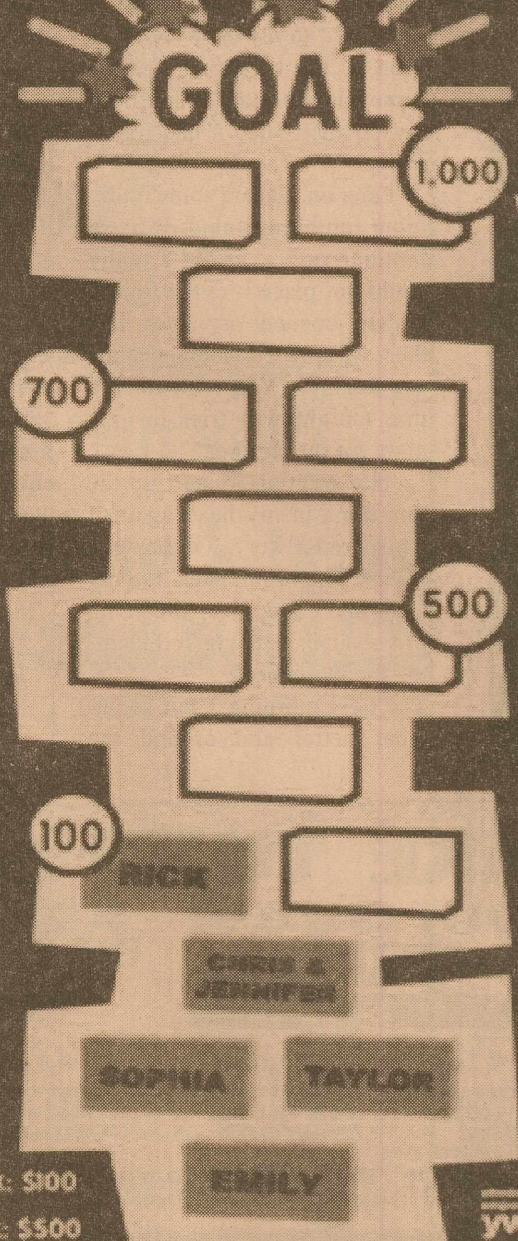
Then presto, I woke up with the capable staff standing around my bedside accompanied by my

devoted wife Kay Kay. It wasn't long before Dr. Thai came and talked to me in a very simple manner.

Kay would tell me later that Dr. Thai spoke with her and our sons and that I had done well. That was so relieving for her. Three days later, as predicted, I left the hospital. Medicine has come a long way. My physical faculties were slow but surprisingly intact. I thank our Lord in so many ways and couldn't wait to arrive home and be surrounded by my wife and sons.

Reflection of that experience and my life were cause for a philosophical review. It occurred to me that so many people were depending on my duties as a leader in various facets of Black life, education, leadership, economic development, policy, calling a wicked man wicked and marching our multitudes to a better way of living. There was a great need for me to recover quickly even though it has only been a few days there would be thousands waiting for me to continue my work. I cannot let them down. So begins my road to

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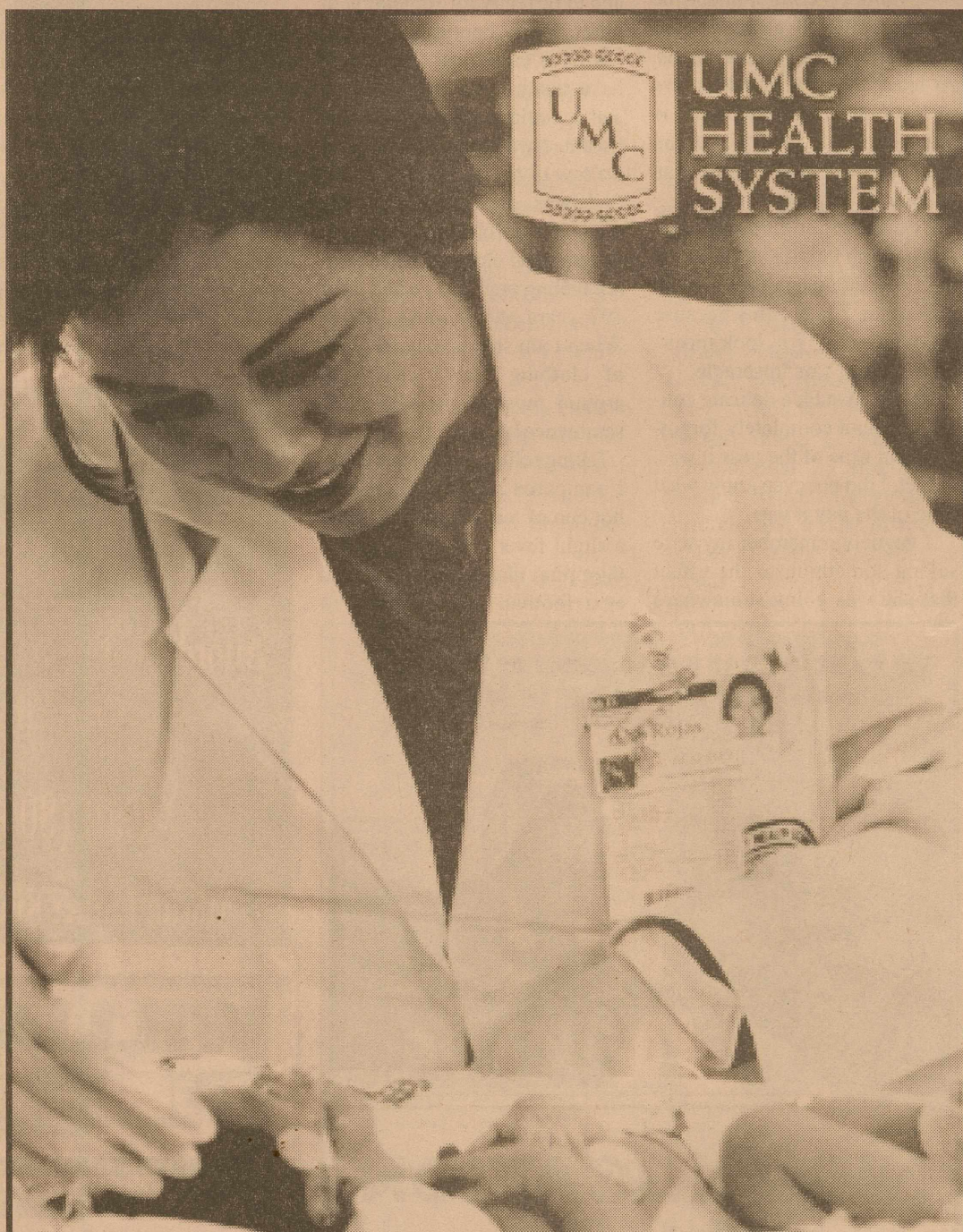


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Mike Tyson Endorses Donald Trump For President — Says, "He's Not a Racist"

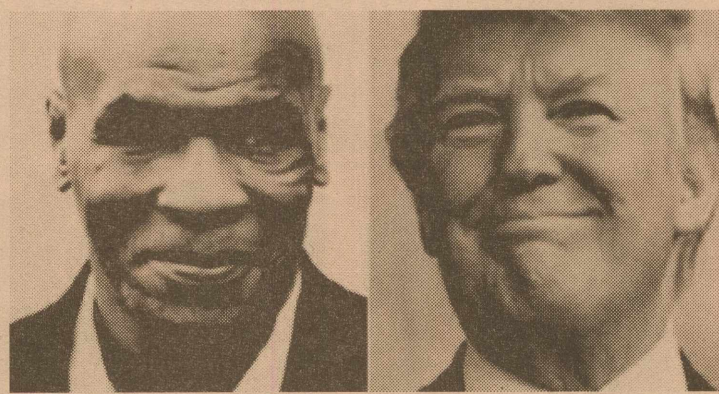
Nationwide — Former champion boxer Mike Tyson has officially endorsed billionaire Donald Trump for the next president of the United States. He made the announcement recently during an interview with the Huffington Post. "Let's try something new," Tyson said. "Let's run America like a business, where no colors matter. Whoever can do the job, gets the job."

Tyson even defended Trump's controversial comments about Mexican immigrants. He commented, "He didn't know how to say it. It was really crude, and he needs somebody to work with him on how to deliver his messages and stuff. But as far as what he did, he's an average guy like everybody else. He needs time to grow too. I don't think he thinks of Latinos in that way."

Regarding democratic candidates Hillary Clinton and Bernie Sanders, Tyson said he doesn't support them, and then quickly reiterated his endorsement for Trump. He said the polls indicate that most Americans want Trump in the White House.

Do they even know each other?

Actually, they do. Way back in 1988, Trump promoted Tyson's title fight against Michael Spinks in Atlantic City, and the fight itself was even held at Trump Plaza (one of Trump's casinos). Although the fight



lasted less than two minutes, before Tyson knocked out Spinks, it is still regarded as the highest-grossing boxing match in history. Ironically in the past, Donald Trump has also endorsed Mike Tyson.

Man Cashes in \$5K Worth of Pennies He's Been Saving For Almost 50 Years



Monroe, LA — Otha Anders, a 73-year old man, who started saving pennies more than 45 years ago, recently cashed in more than 500,000 pennies he

had stored in 15 five gallon plastic water jugs. That amounts to exactly \$5,136.14.

Anders comments, "I became convinced that spotting a lost or dropped penny was an additional God-given incentive reminding me to always be thankful. There have been days where I failed to pray and more often than not, a lost or dropped penny would show up to remind me."

He added, "If I was at someone's house and I found a penny, I would pick it up and I would keep it. I will always tell the person that if it was a quarter, I would give it back, but since it is a penny, I'm keeping it."

He cashed in his enormous coin collection at the Ruston Origin Bank, in Ruston, Louisiana.

Jennie Cole, vice president of the bank, admitted that it was not a typical day at the bank when Anders brought his collection of pennies in on a dolly. But she says Anders is a valued customer, and they wanted to help

Pope currently serves as Chief Development Officer of Covenant Health System.

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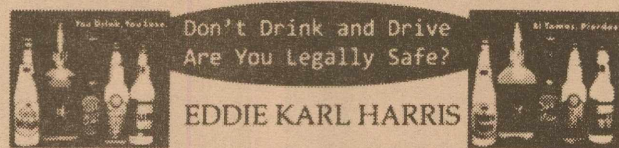

More than twenty-five Dunbar-Manhattan Neighborhood residents and community members came together on November 8, 2015 at the Theodore Phea Boys and Girls on November 8, 2015. Residents came to hear and discuss concerns for the children and schools in the community, and develop plans to address the recent rash of burglaries and physical/sexual assaults in their area. The group focused on how neighbors could work together to insure the safety of all residents. Dunbar-Manhattan resident, Billie Russell, facilitated the meeting where the consensus was to take a stand and work together, march together and even pray together to ensure that the neighborhood is safe. Those present were given an opportunity to introduce themselves and share their ideas and what steps they felt needed to be taken to address community issues. The

meeting was a follow-up to an initial meeting held on October 25, 2015.

Residents also had the opportunity to hear from Lubbock Independent School District (L.I.S.D.) Police Chief, Jody Scifres, who shared and discussed the standard procedures for dealing with students attending the neighborhood schools. He also spoke about the efforts the school system is making to keep students in school each day to prevent truancy and other delinquent conduct from becoming an issue. Former City Councilman T.J. Patterson was also present and took part in the discussion on community efforts to provide for safe area and the importance of community involvement. Pastor Chris Moore shared the efforts that are in place in the Parkway-Cherry Point neighborhood to insure a decline in criminal and negative activity.

Residents were able to meet each other and shared personal experiences that allowed all members of the group to gain insight on the affects that criminal activity and negative behavior has on members of the community. Valuable information was made available to those in attendance. Additional meetings are planned for the future, as well as, a prayer rally, the development of a more efficient neighborhood watch and community policing. Each of the residents were encouraged to bring other residents to the next meeting and to share with Dunbar-Manhattan neighbors the importance of their taking part, and evening joining to neighborhood association. The next meeting will be held on December 6, 2015 at the Theodore Phea Boys and Girls Club, located at 1802 East 24th Street. Come out and be a part of a positive effort for the neighborhood.

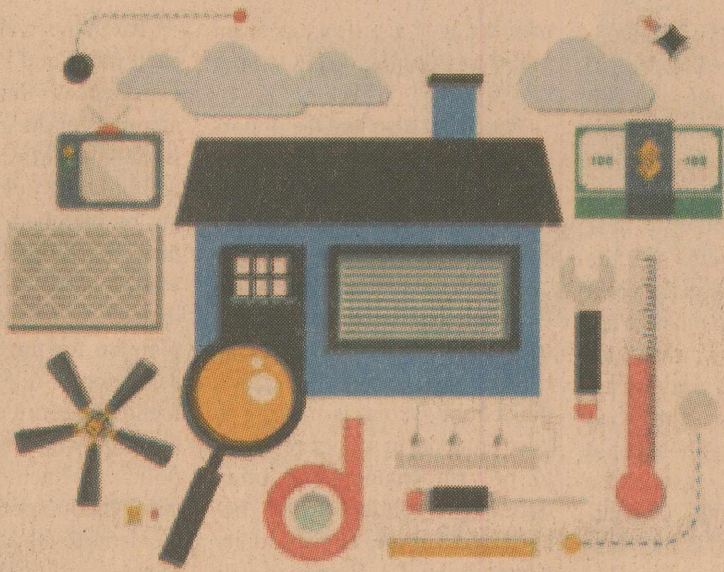

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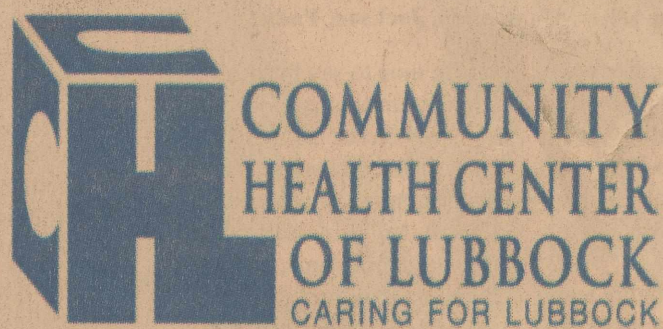

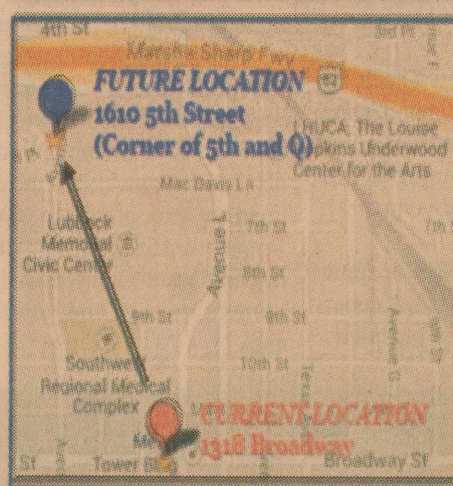


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
