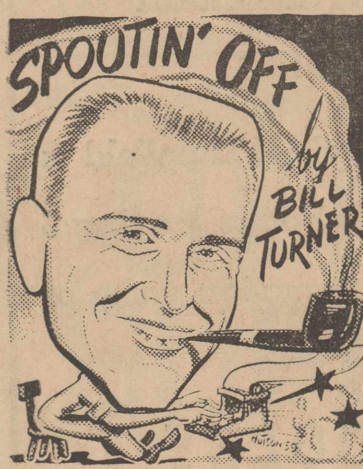

I can tell already that I like it here. People have been helpful and friendly ever since the Turners moved in.

In fact, Olton is just about the friendliest town I've run across.

Olton, however, has some bad habits, just like any other community.

I noticed one of them the other night.

People all over raise cane because the city isn't run right, taxes are too high, schools ought to be better, etc. It happens everywhere.

Then they turn right around and sit at home in an easy chair when they ought to be out learning what makes their town tick.

It happened here the other night at the school budget hearing.

It was labeled a "public" hearing, but only one school board member, Ed Thompson, the superintendent, the business manager and I showed up.

Not a single taxpayer came around.

I'll take that back. A couple of fellows on their way to a quarterback club meeting stuck their heads in the door to ask directions to the football meeting.

Now this doesn't make Olton unusual. I went to public budget hearings at Littlefield four years in a row and no taxpayers showed up at any of them.

The fact that "everybody does it" doesn't make it right.

And if the fact that the school budget was raised \$12,000 comes as a surprise to you, you have no kick coming.

Not now, anyway.

You had your chance when the "public" budget hearing was held.

DEPUTY SHERIFF V. L. Smith made news a couple of ways this week.

One time was when he did his duty in the Simmons case at Littlefield. The other was when he did what he really likes to do—help boys at the Westview Boys Home in Hollis, Okla.

Smitty went around with some fellows from the Boys Home and collected more than 7,000 articles.

Burial was in Olton cemetery under direction of Parsons Funeral Home.

Mrs. Dennis died Friday in a Muleshoe hospital. She was presented a lifetime membership in the Olton Eastern Star chapter last year, had been a member of the Methodist Church 64 years, and had lived in Olton 38 years.

Survivors include three sons, Lindsey, Olton; Dewey, Austin; and Clyde, Rosemeade, Calif.; three daughters, Mrs. Vera Nichols, San Bernardino, Calif.; Mrs. Jewel Smith, Rialto, Calif.; Mrs. Ola Pasich, Riverside, Calif.; three brothers, Tommy Hair, Plainview; Freed Hair, Long Beach, Calif.; Lowell Hair, Sacramento, Calif.; three sisters, Mrs. Mabel Short, Brady; Mrs. Maude Gregg, Bonger and Mrs. Hazel Murray, Long Beach, Calif.; 21 grandchildren; 23 great-grandchildren and two great-great-grandchildren.

Her husband, R. E. Dennis, died in 1949. Two sons and one daughter also preceded her in death.

Dies After 45-Foot Fall

Jimmy Robbins Rites Are Held

Funeral services for James Lee (Jimmy) Robbins, former Olton High School football, basketball and track star who was fatally injured in a fall at Lubbock Monday, were conducted here Thursday afternoon.

Jimmy, 19, died in Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, about 2:30 p.m. Monday of injuries suffered in a 45-foot fall from a cable in the Lubbock Christian College field house now under construction.

A 1959 graduate of Olton High School, Robbins was an LCC student.

Last rites were read in the Main Street Church of Christ with G. B. Stanley, minister, officiating, assisted by E. R. Higgins and Dr. F. W. Mattox, both of Lubbock.

Burial was in Olton Cemetery under the direction of Parsons Funeral Home, Olton. Lester Perrin of Lubbock, Jimmy's track coach at LCC, assisted in the graveside rites.

Robbins is survived by the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Lee Robbins, and a sister, Mrs. Naomi Wilkinson, all of New Smyrna Beach, Fla.

Before the fall, Robbins, a member of a college crew working on the field house, was hanging from a cable being used as a guy wire from the ground to the top of the building to keep steel girders perpendicular.

Dr. F. W. Mattox, LCC president, said witnesses told him Robbins fell on his head and shoulders. Attending physicians said the youth died of head and chest injuries.

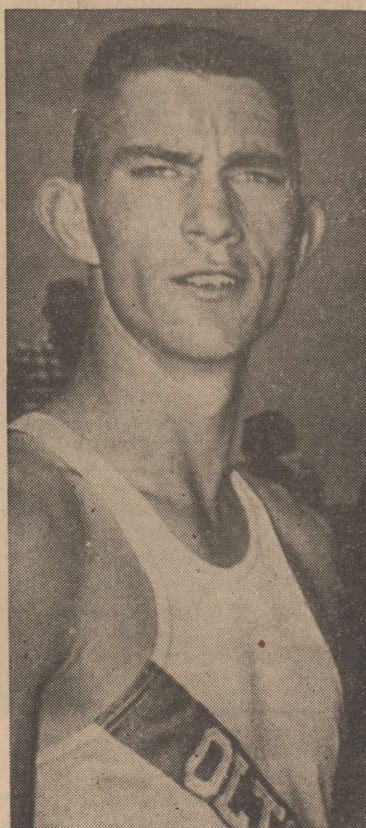
He was on an x-ray table at the time of death and an attempt was being made to remove a peach seed lodged in his throat. Witnesses said Robbins had eaten a peach just before climbing the guy wire. A physician said the seed "may have" contributed to the fall and death.

College officials said the seed could have dropped into Robbins' throat while he was on the cable, causing either panic or a shortage of breath.

Jimmy, described by LCC President Mattox as "one of our best athletes," was an outstanding athlete while a student here.

As an OHS senior, he was all-district in football and basketball. He was a member of the 1959 sprint relay team which won fourth at the Class AA state meet, and the mile relay team which placed third in 1959 state competition.

Two OHS Grads Among New Teachers In Olton

Two Olton High School graduates will head the list of new teachers who will assume duties in Olton Public Schools when classes begin Aug. 29.

Mrs. W. D. Holt, a 1938 graduate of Olton High School, and Willis Hedges, who was graduated from Olton schools in 1942, will be among the new teachers.

A graduate of Texas Tech with the bachelor of science degree, Mrs. Holt taught high school subjects at Olton in 1945-46. She will teach in junior high this year.

The Holts and their five children, Steven, 15, Mark, 10, David, 7, Jane 6, and John, 2, attend the Methodist Church.

Mr. and Mrs. Horace Walker of Olton are Mrs. Holt's parents.

Willis Hedges, a former coach at Grapevine, will teach fifth grade in Olton schools. He is a graduate of West Texas State College with a bachelor of science degree. Before beginning his teaching career about 10 years ago, Hedges was a captain in the United States Marine Corps.

Mrs. Hedges, who was graduated from Louisiana Tech, Ruston, La., will teach a second grade class. Hedges' parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Hedges, also live in Olton.

The Hedges family, who previously lived in Lubbock, includes two children, Carla, 13, and Ann, 12. They attend the Baptist Church.

C. H. McClure, replacing Carl Moore as junior high science instructor, previously taught high school math and science here in 1955-58.

McClure resigned his teaching post to farm north of Olton. He and his wife, Helen, have a 2-year-old son, Chris.

A graduate of Southwestern State College, Weatherford, Okla., McClure and his wife are members of the First Baptist Church here.

After graduating from Seymour High School in 1955, James Baldwin, new boys' basketball and assistant football coach at Olton, attended McMurry College at Abilene. He coached high school basketball and football at Vera a year, following his graduation from college in 1959.

Baldwin, a member of the Church of Christ, also will teach algebra in high school.

E. J. McKnight, a teacher for 19 years, will succeed Morrison Asman as junior high school principal. McKnight, a Texas Tech graduate with a master of arts degree, has taught at Lakeview, Clarendon and Stinnett.

Mrs. McKnight will be one of the home economics teachers. She was employed after the resignation

Hail Rakes Belt North Of Olton

Damage Heavy In 9-Mile Strip

Hail measuring up to an inch in diameter cut a three-mile-wide swath across farmland northwest of Olton Tuesday evening, destroying crops at some points and inflicting damage at others.

Hundreds of acres of prize crops were affected in a belt which stretched about nine miles between

the Springlake-Dimmitt and Olton-Hart highways.

Thompson Gin north of the Circle community was near the center of the storm's fury.

From there, the damage stretched to the Dennie Barnett farm five miles northwest of the gin to the Jack Edwards place three miles east and one south.

Rains up to three inches and high winds accompanied the hail.

The storm came late in the season, leaving the affected farmers no chance to replant.

Cleo Smith, who farms a section of land just east of Thompson Gin, said he lost "just about everything."

The hail left cotton leaves ragged and bolls on the ground, bruised and battered.

A bean crop, which Smith had planned to thrash Wednesday, was "shelled" heavily by the hail.

Some farmers who suffered lesser damage felt that late feed crops may "make it." Early feed, they thought, would not.

At the Jack Edwards farm, Jarrell Edwards said "cotton was a total loss. My father is going to plow it under as soon as it dries up."

Three inches of rain were reported at the Edwards place.

Mrs. A. C. Light reported: "We have about 50 per cent damage to our cotton. The hail stripped the feed and the wind blew it over to one side." The Lights had an inch of rain.

"My field looks awfully ragged. About two-thirds of my crop was ruined," said Winton Hackler, whose place is three miles east and a half south of Thompson Gin. Malcolm Ogletree, who farms next door to the gin, was asked about his feed crop.

"Yeah, that's what it was," he said, putting emphasis on the "was."

Three miles north of the gin, the Leroy Hackler place escaped most of the hail, but Hackler reported 2 1/2 inches of rain.

Mrs. T. W. Hackler said "our cotton doesn't look like it's hardly worth gathering."

Wilton Bodkin, who reported two inches of rain, said damage was "about 100 per cent on most of my cotton. What's left won't have time to leaf back out and do anything."

I. D. Grimsley reported: "Hail beat all the fruit and leaves off

Registration Set By Olton Schools

Registration for the 1960-61 school term in Olton Public Schools will get under way next Thursday, school officials announced this week.

H. P. Webb Elementary School will register students in grades one through five who are entering school here for first time.

These students may register from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. either Thursday or Friday.

"This means students who have moved into our school district since school was out last May," said Principal Fred Gordon. It also includes any child who will be six years of age on or before Sept. 1 who did not register in the spring.

"All students must have a small pox shot before entering school," Gordon said. "All children who will be in the first grade must have a birth certificate."

The elementary principal said that children who attended grade school here last year do not have to register. Room assignments will appear on the door of the room Monday morning, Aug. 29.

Registration for junior high students, grades 6-8, will also be conducted Thursday and Friday, according to E. J. McKnight, principal.

Joe Turner, principal of the high school, announced the following schedule for grades 9-12: 9:30 a.m. Thursday—All Freshmen. All football boys register at 10 a.m. 1:30 p.m. Thursday—All sophomores. 9:30 a.m. Friday—All juniors. 1:30 p.m. Friday—All seniors.

A general faculty meeting, first of the new year, will be held next Friday at 8 p.m. in the school cafeteria, Supt. Joe Harper announced.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, increasing to three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) the maximum permissible interest rate on bonds heretofore issued by the Veterans' Land Board; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended by adding thereto the following:

"The foregoing notwithstanding, bonds heretofore issued by the Veterans' Land Board pursuant to the authority of this Section 49-b of the Constitution may bear a rate or rates of interest not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date set forth in said Amendment, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the state.

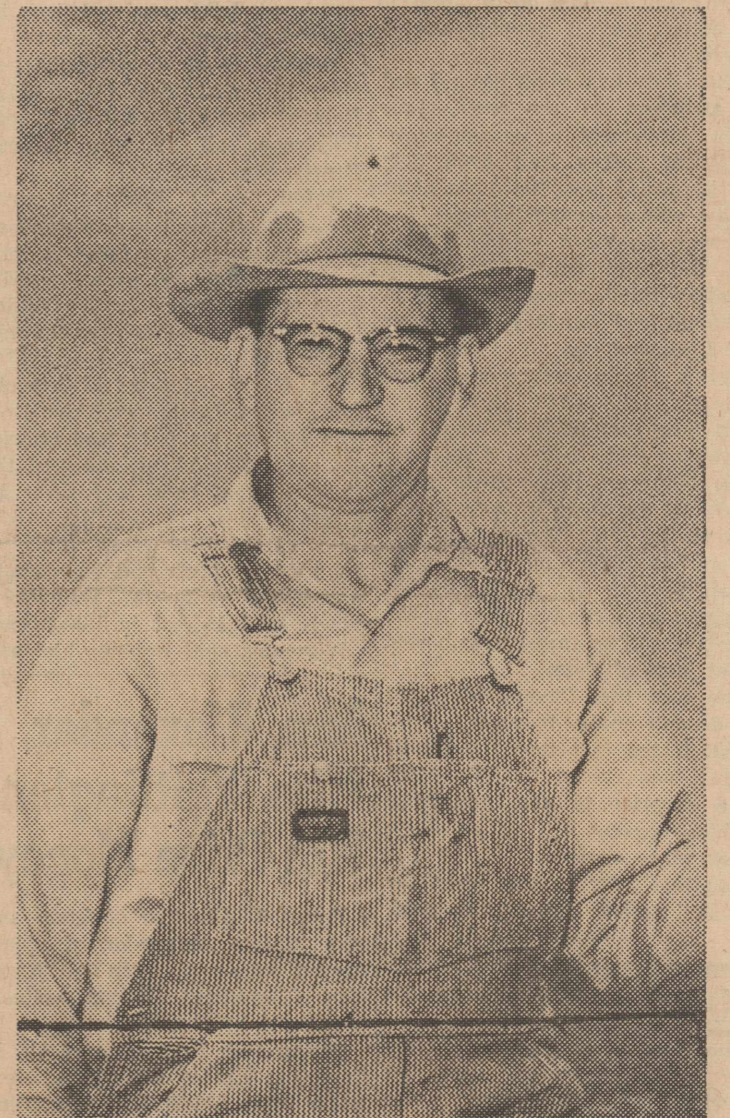

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Wage-Hour Man Reminds Farmers About Child Labor

DALLAS — Farmers who hire workers for harvesting fall crops were reminded today that the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act

sets a 16-year age minimum for the employment of children in agriculture during school hours. The reminder came from Regional Director William J. Rogers of the U. S. Department of Labor's Wage and Hour and Public Contracts Divisions here, the agency which administers this law. "Today and in the foreseeable future, the need for youngsters to

meet even higher educational standards is beyond question," he said. "The child's chance for success in later years can depend on whether he enrolls in school this fall."

Rogers pointed out that children may lawfully work on farms before and after school hours or on weekends, but that their place is in the classroom when school is in session in the school district where the child is currently living.

"The law protects the children of migratory workers as well as local children," he said. "The only exception to the law is the child working exclusively for his parents or guardian."

An age certificate showing that the youngster is at least 16 is the best protection the farmer can have against inadvertent violation. In Texas, these certificates are available, as a public service, from local Texas Employment Commission offices.

He added that the Federal child-labor law applies to farmers who engage in interstate commerce or ship their products in interstate commerce, either directly or to firms who ship them across State lines in their original form or as an ingredient of another product.
