Dennis Wins Suit **Court Ruling** Favors Dennis; FootballContests

H. L. Dennis, Olton building contractor, has won a court fight to keep a building which houses Dennis Builders Supply where it

District Judge E. A. Bills last week ruled against the City of Olton in its suit aimed at forcing Dennis to move the structure. Wednesday night, the City Council decided to drop the case after

discussing it at length at a special meeting. Judge Bills wrote in a final judgement:

"The City of Olton . . . has failed to discharge its burden to show that the building described in its pleadings is of 'unprotected, non-combustible construction', as such is defined in the abbreviated addition of the National Building

Insufficient Evidence "The Court further finds that

the evidence is totally insufficient to show that the exceptions to 'restrictions within the fire limit' as set out in said building code do not apply in this case and that the plaintiff has again failed to discharge its burden of proof." The judge ordered that the plaintiff, City of Olton, "pay all costs

Bond Election Slated Sept. 17

An \$80,000 paving bond election for the City of Olton has been set for Saturday, Sept. 17. The action was taken Wednesday night at a special meeting of

the City Council. The \$80,000 in bonds is for the city's share of paving costs, plus some funds to be used for a small amount of street maintenance equipment and some repair to existing pavement.

Of the total cost of the paving project, the city will pay about 20 per cent. About 80 blocks would be paved under the program.

The City Council, after setting the election date, called on property owners interested in paving to contact the city hall as soon as

"The program will go where the most interest is," Councilman Fred Thompson said.

Plans For Seal-Coating The city also announced that plans call for seal-coating of all existing pavement where needed. This work will be done in connection with the paving project, if it is approved by the voters.


Total cost of these proposals to strengthen the school program is estimated at \$100 million annually, of which the State would pay approximately \$80 million and local districts \$20 million.





FRESH PEACH FREEZE 20 marshmallows

- 11/2 cup crushed fresh peaches 14 cup water
- 1/2 pint whipping cream




