Olton Men Hear Farm Problem Talk At Annual Co-Op Membership Meet

Five crops were listed as the United State's basic farm problem by Walter Berger, administrator of Commodity Stabilization Service and executive vice-president of Commodity Credit Corporation, as he spoke to more than 1,000 persons at Lubbock last Thursday afternoon.

Eight from Olton attended the meeting.

The occasion was the three-way annual membership meetings of Plains Cooperative Oil Mill, Farmers Cooperative Compress and Plains Cotton Cooperative Association.

Berger listed the five crops as tobacco, peanuts, rice, wheat and cotton as being the basic farm problem.

On wheat, he stated 510 million bushels were exported last year

at a subsidy of 58 cents a bushel, totaling \$300 million.

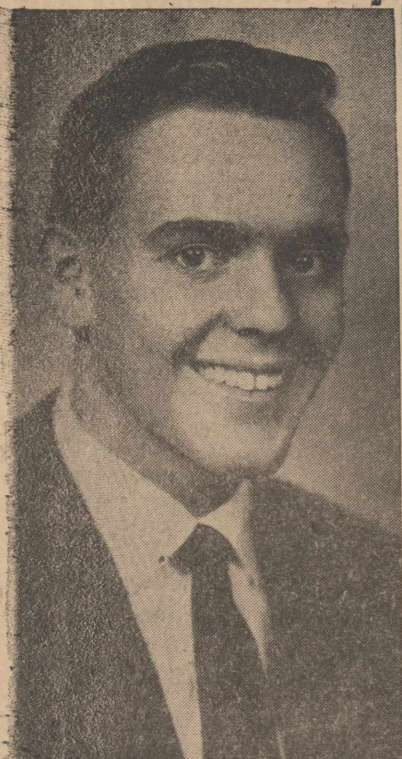

5,000 New Textbooks Set For Use In Olton Schools

"Far out on the sands at Cape Canaveral, the late afternoon sun made a glittering column of the tall rocket poised on the launching pad. In its network of cranes, platform, and steel ladders, it looked enormous and it was. It towered eight-five feet above the pad and was twelve feet thick. It had a powerful name: Atlas."

This quotation was taken from "Sending the Word", one of the 300 new library books which will be used in junior high when school resumes.

Approximately 5,000 new textbooks will be put into use during the next school year. Supt. Joe Harper said \$2,000 of the school budget has been designated for buying books and films.

A committee of teachers, the superintendent and Elmer Moore, curriculum coordinator, selected the new books.

New science books will complete a series of science studies which will be used from elementary through high school.

In elementary school, a new series of spelling, art and writing books will put added interest in students' studies. High school studies will be highlighted by the book, "World Geography", which hasn't been used here before. In

addition to these, new trigonometry and journalism books will replace the old series.

More than 1,000 junior high library books have been rebound. Some of the interesting classifications of the new library books are fiction, biography, science, history and religion.

Both high school and junior high libraries use the Dewey Decimal System for filing. Mrs. Sonny Miller will assume duties as new high school librarian, replacing Mrs. Clifford Curry, who will serve at the position in junior high. Twice a year an inventory is taken of all library books.

Elmer Moore said the schools' text books are "very adequate"

for the coming school year. He also stated that better science and literature books will be used.

The principal in each building will distribute books.

The Texas Education Agency, provides textbooks, issues them under a five-year contract. Expiring adoptions may be continued in use for three years after the contracts on the multiple lists expire. The school may then readopt the books or select others.

An annual requisition of text books is submitted by Superintendent Harper to the state education agency.

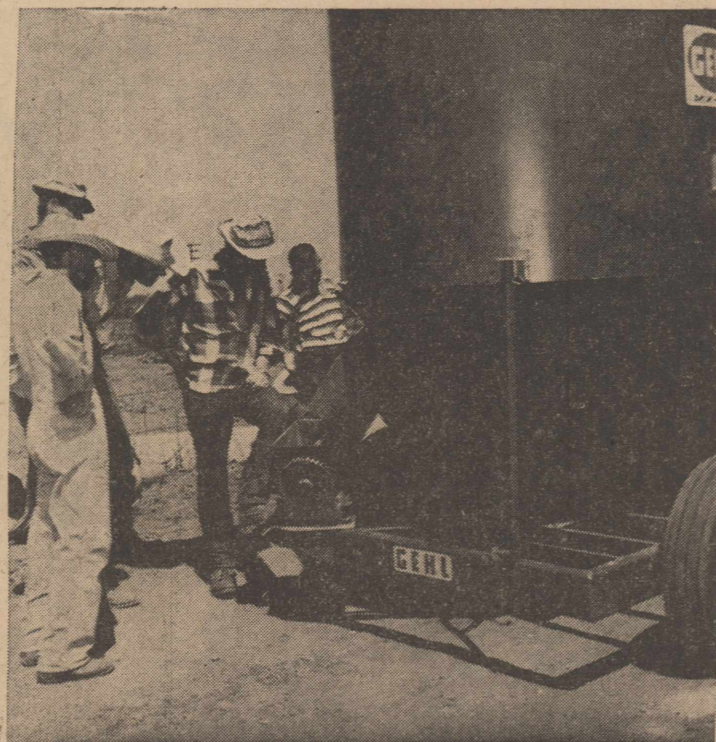

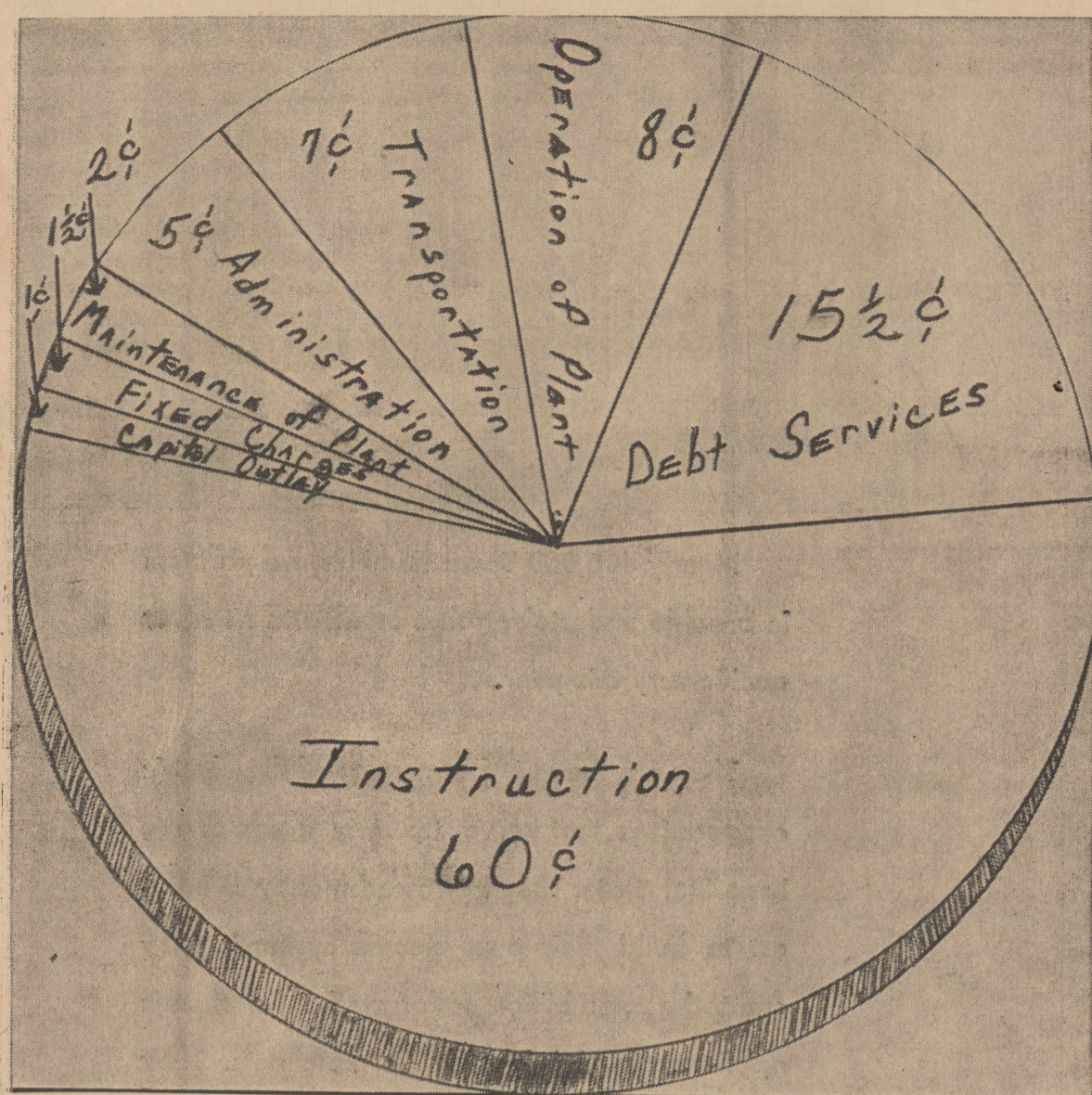

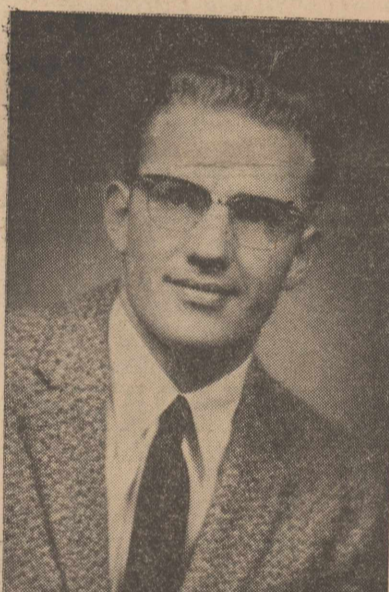

USDA Announces 37 Undesirable Wheat Varieties

The U. S. Department of Agriculture recently named 37 wheat varieties which are undesirable because of inferior milling or baking qualities and which will be discounted 20 cents per bushel in price support rates on the 1961 wheat crop.

The number and varieties are unchanged from those for the 1960 crop. Discounts to discourage plantings of undesirable wheat varieties have been included in the price-support program beginning with the 1956 wheat crop.

The 37 varieties named as undesirable for the 1961 wheat support program follow by class:

Hard Red Spring — O. T. 231, Casser, Henry (except in Wisconsin, Oregon, and Washington), Kinney, Premier, Progress, Russell (Except in Wisconsin), Spinkcota, and Sturgeon.

White — Fiftyfold, Florence, Greeson, Rex, and Sonora.

Soft Red Winter — Kan Queen, Kawvale, Nured, and Seabreeze.

Durum — Golden Ball, Peliss, and Pentad.

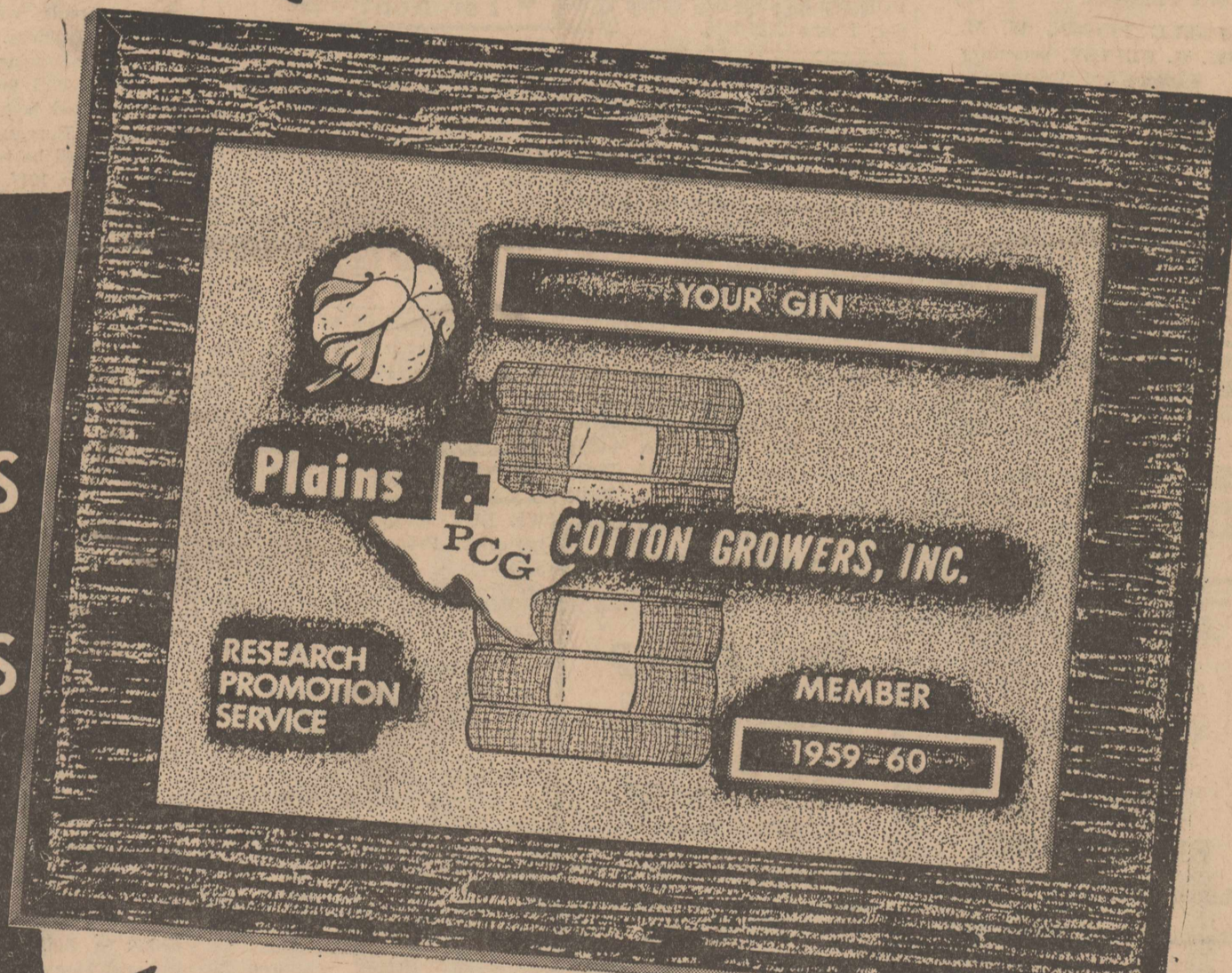

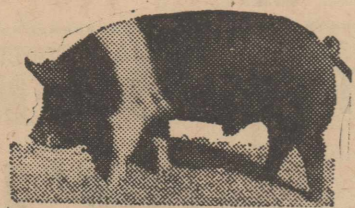

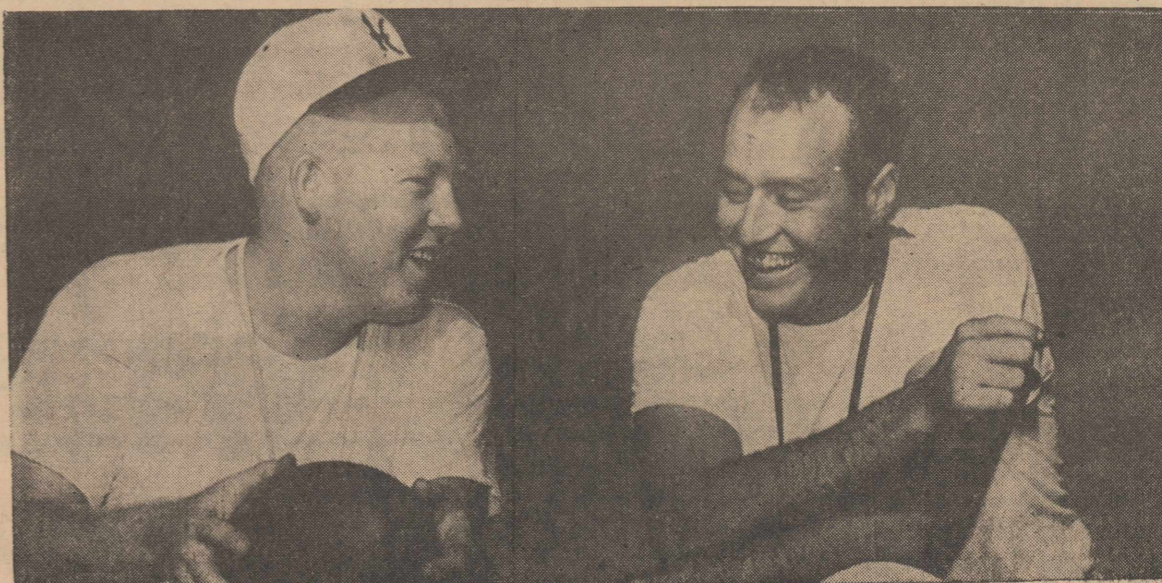

79 Acre Feet Of Water Is Drained Underground From July 4-August 4

Seventy-nine acre feet of water was drained by gravity flow into the underground water sand from the Playa lake on the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway between July 4 and Aug. 4, 1960. Since June 19, 1959, 185 acre feet of lake water has been stored in the underground sand from the lake.

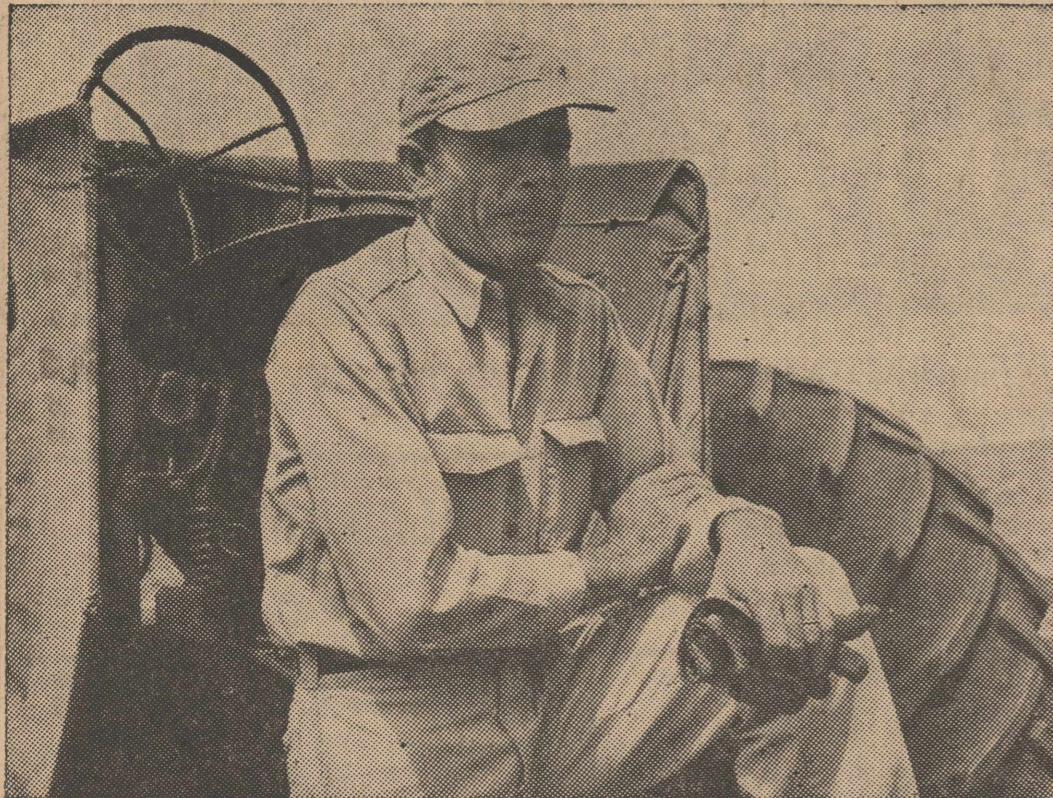
The value of one acre foot of water applied to cotton has been estimated at \$65 an acre foot. If this 185 acre feet of water had been used to irrigate cotton, the value of the water thus applied would be \$12,025. Water thus stored was saved from evaporation and added to the underground water supply for fu-

ture irrigation. This added water supply will be the first used in subsequent irrigations. The recharge process, bench leveling, and other water conservation research will be displayed at the Foundation's Fourth Annual Field Day Wednesday afternoon, Sept. 14.

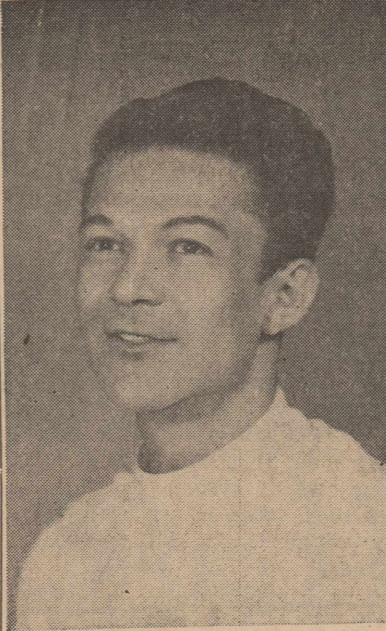

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1960.

Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date set forth in said Amendment, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the state.

KITCHEN KORNER

Peaches and Grapes are plentiful at your grocers' now. There are so many ways to prepare these fresh fruits to help vary our meal planning.

FRESH PEACH FREEZE

20 marshmallows
1 1/2 cup crushed fresh peaches
1/4 cup water
1/2 pint whipping cream
3 T. sugar

Sprinkle peaches with sugar; let stand while marshmallows are steaming. Pour 1/4 cup hot water over marshmallows in double boiler; melt until marshmallows are at liquid stage, then remove from heat and let cool. When cool and slightly thick, add whipping cream folding gently. Fold in peaches; pour in refrigerator tray and freeze.

To make a tasty peach pie use a crust made of graham crackers mixed with coconut. Fill with a pre-cooked peach pie filling and top with whipped cream. Peaches have such a delicate flavor you can not use other flavors mixed with them or you will lose the peach flavor entirely.

To prepare an in-between snack for the children, try freezing grapes and then serve frozen.

PERFECT GRAPE JELLY

Stem and wash grapes. Crush slightly, just enough that no water is needed to start them cooking. Boil until grapes are cooked. Strain, and to one cup of juice add 1 1/2 cups sugar. Bring to boil. Stir until sugar is well dissolved. Do not let boil. Pour into hot sterilized glasses. Seal with paraffin.

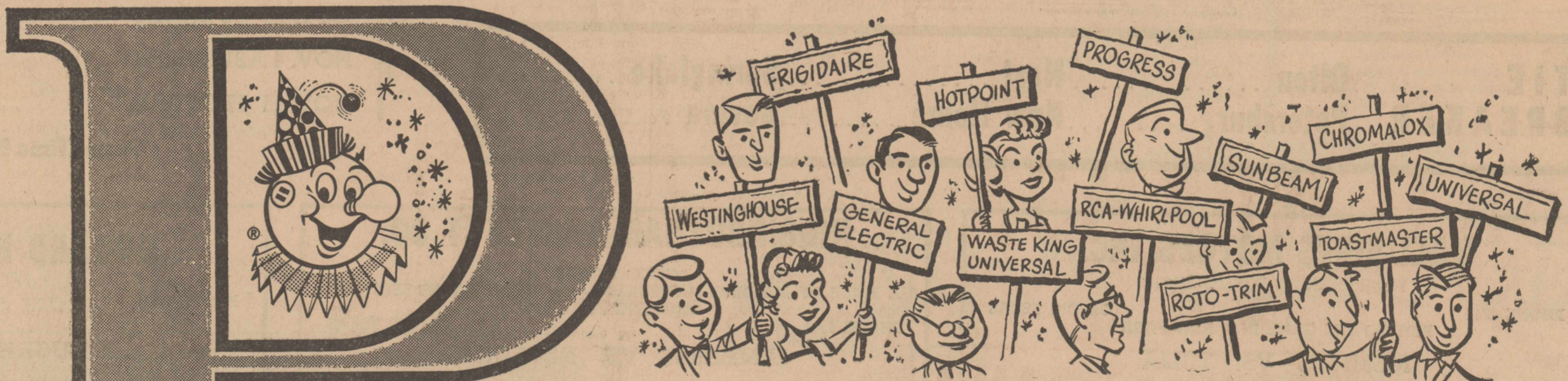
There are plenty of watermelons to use this time of year. Try using them for a salad treat. Scoop out rounds of melon from the center of the melon and serve on lettuce leaves. Using melon balls and cantaloupe balls together are very appetizing and colorful, too.

If you have venetian blinds, spray with the new wax polish; let dry and shine. They are much easier to dust. I have found that a feather duster is the best to use on these blinds between waxing.

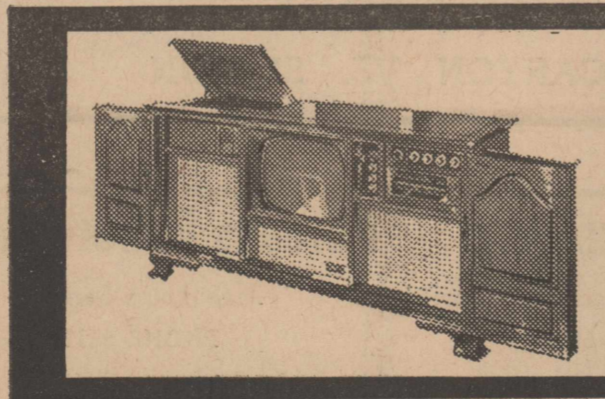
