#### **Enrollment Total** Reaches 1,045

Enrollment in Olton Public Schools, with figures still incomplete Thursday at noon, totaled 1,045, an increase over last year.

Supt. Joe Harper said he expects this figure to reach 1,100 when all students have registered. He expects some to register as late as Monday or Tuesday of

At the end of school last spring, 1,028 students were enrolled.

Through Thursday at noon, 223 students had enrolled in high school. This figure is about the same as last year.

In the first eight grades, this was the enrollment: first grade, 116; second, 115; third, 112; fourth, 114; fifth, 95; sixth, 96; seventh, 91; eighth, 86.
