Phone Rate Hike Asked

General Telephone Company formally put in its bid for an increase in local telephone rates here, but a company official declined to nail down specific figures on the proposal at a regular city council meeting Tuesday night.

Bob Saunders of Littlefield, district manager of the company, said General's earnings in Olton are "not adequate for the company to be in a financially healthy position here."

Prior to Saunders' presentation of the company's case for a rate

increase, city councilmen unleashed a barrage of squawks on General's service in Olton.

"We're not getting our money's worth at the present rates," declared Councilman Lynn Fite. He and other councilmen criticized General's service the past four months as "especially poor."

The discussion ended later with an agreement by the council to meet again and talk over the rate proposal at a special meeting the night of Oct. 4.

Saunders said, in presenting the case for a rate increase, that General's expansion program and the improvements in facilities made here recently make it doubly necessary that the company receive higher rates.

He explained, using figures from a booklet prepared in June, 1959, that General is making a return of 1.97 per cent on its investment here. The district manager said state law allows up to eight per cent and that his company feels it needs six per cent.

Saunders said he was not submitting any proposed rates, but he added that the rates requested by General in 1953 might serve as a "starting point" for discussion.

The city under went a rate increase in 1954, but not to the extent asked by the phone company.

The rates sought in 1954 were \$12.50 for a business one-party line, \$10.50 for a business two-party, \$6.75 for residence one-party, \$6.00 for residence two-party and \$5.25 for residence four party. At present, the rates are, respectively, \$9, \$7.50, \$5.50, \$4.75 and \$4.

The council still wasn't convinced, although the discussion continued until 1:30 a.m. Wednesday.

In other action, taken at the start of the Tuesday night session, the council:

1. Agreed to keep the same livestock ordinance the city now has in effect. A group appeared before the council recently and asked that the ordinance be scrapped or something better found.

2. Awarded a contract to D. L. Jones of Olton for pumping of water from the city's sewer lake. Jones, the only bidder, agreed to pay \$11 a year.

3. Accepted the resignation of J. G. Cole, special city judge. City Secretary Bernice Smith said Cole resigned because of his health.

Seek Third Victory

Mustangs Play Springlake 11

Olton's Mustangs, unbeaten in two games, travel to Springlake to meet the once-beaten Wolverines in a non-district football game Friday at 8 p.m.

The Ponies will be favored to notch their third victory against Springlake, but they may meet tougher - than - expected opposition.

The Wolverines are smarting from a 38-0 defeat at the hands of powerful Idalou last Friday night.

Olton had its troubles winning over tough McCarney, 12-8, last week.

Springlake, a Class A team, opened the season with a 7-0 victory over Bovina.

The Wolves got their only score late in the final quarter when Fullback Billy Stankey went over from two yards out. Another Springlake standout, Hal Hudson, had a touchdown called back against Bovina.

Springlake's Sandy Sanderson a tackle, is rated a top-notch ball player for the Wolverines. Against Bovina, he had 20 unassisted tackles and helped in 10 more of the 50 tackles recorded by Springlake in the game.

Olton again will be banking on the hard running of Robert Priest. The Pony fullback has averaged eight yards in 44 carries in the first two ball games of the season.

Fleet Halfback Rande Buchenau has 141 yards in 21 carries in the

two games, an average of almost six yards per try.

Another Pony threat is the passing of Quarterback Johnny Schenck, who has completed three of six tosses, two for touchdowns.

Paving Election Set For Saturday

No Tax Increase Due If \$80,000 OK'd By Voters

The City of Olton's \$80,000 paving bond issue, designed to rid the community of much of the mire which comes with rain, goes to voters for their decision Saturday.

Voting will be at the city hall from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Saturday. Eldon Franks is election judge.

Any resident of Olton who pays taxes on real or personal property within the city, and who has paid his poll tax, may vote in the election.

Approval of the bond election was endorsed this week by the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture along with a long list of businessmen and individuals.

The Chamber also is pushing efforts to get out the vote Saturday and is offering transportation to the polls for those in need of it. Persons needing rides to the polls should phone the C-CA at 4511.

The \$80,000 in bonds is for the city's share of paving costs, plus some funds to be used for a small amount of street maintenance equipment and repair to existing pavement where needed.

Of the total cost of the paving project, the city will pay about 20 per cent. About 80 blocks will be paved if voters give their approval to issuance of the bonds.

Bondsmen and auditors of the city have said that the \$80,000 in bonds can be voted without any tax increase.

Supporters of the paving project have stressed the "no tax increase" part of the election in recent weeks in an effort to correct rumors to the contrary.

The city currently is using \$15, 118 annually to retire its outstanding bonds. This amount is more than is actually required.

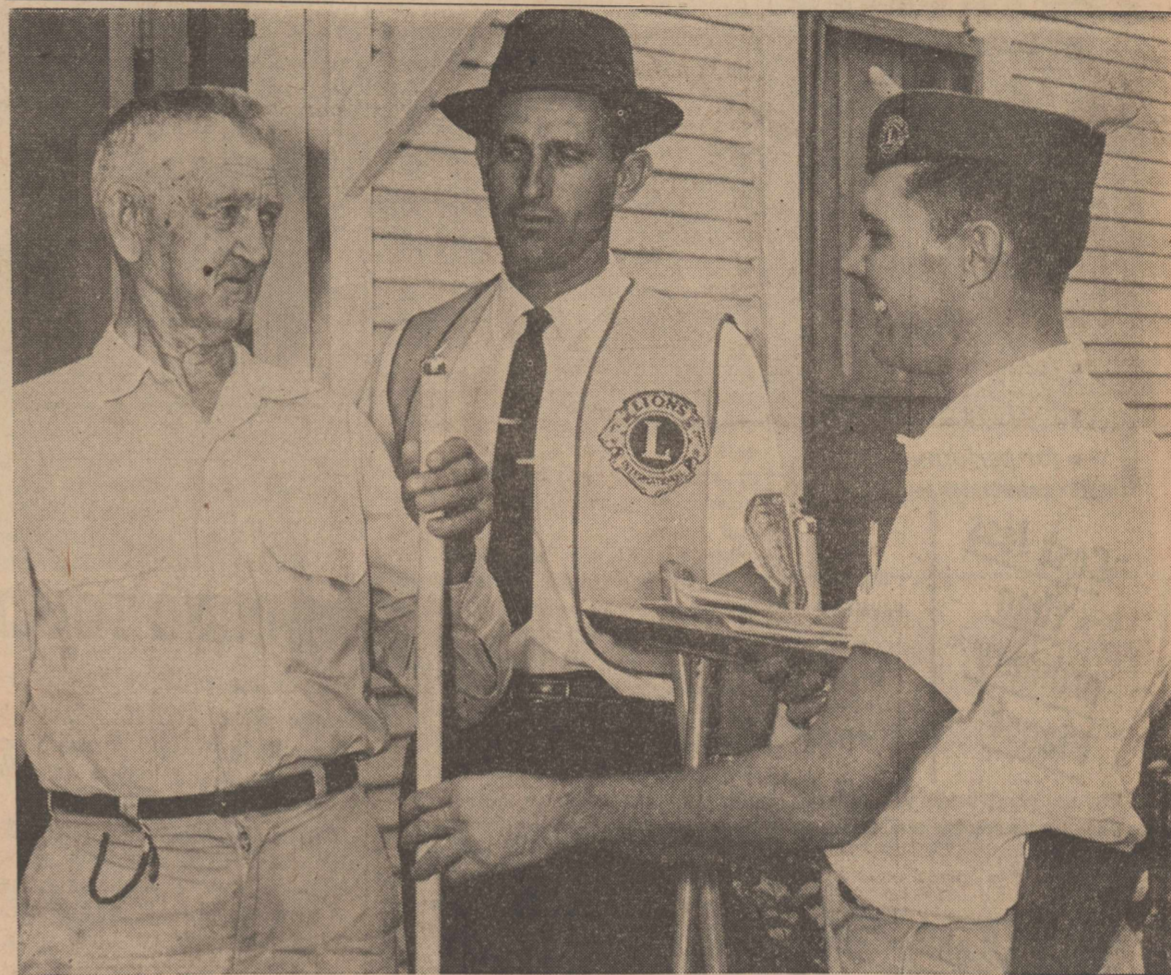
Average amount needed to retire the present indebtedness is \$7,753. That would leave \$7,365 a year for retirement of the \$80,000 in paving bonds, if they are approved in Saturday's vote.

Only a little over \$5,000 would be needed annually to actually retire the paving bonds, leaving a clearance of more than \$2,000 and making it possible for the bonds to be voted without a tax hike.

The city council has mapped out the streets for which the paving program is aimed, but it has stressed that the paving will go where the interest is.

Cost to the property owner would be about \$4.25 per front foot.

First of Texas Corporation, which will handle financing for property owners, has stated that a property owner can make a down payment and pay the balance in four years at 7 per cent simple interest.

2,500 Turn Out For HPRF Event

HALFWAY — More than 2,500 visitors, largest crowd ever for the High Plains Research Foundation's annual Field Day, turned out here Wednesday to see the results of "area people doing something for themselves."

That was HPRF president Frank Moore's way of describing the tests under way at the agricultural research station here.

The speaker of the day, Lawrence Hodges, director of agricultural engineering for the J. I. Case Co., touched on the same theme: "This is free enterprise at work," he said. "It is refreshing to see people doing something without government aid and the subsequent government controls."

Hodges, a native of Tulsa, also said he feels the farm surplus problem is not due to overproduction or under-distribution, as the argument goes.

"We are under-researched," he said. Earlier, it was pointed out that industry spends nine times more on research than agriculture.

The program was a climax to tours during the afternoon showing various projects at the Foundation. Displayed were test plots on sesame, soybeans, grain sorghum, cotton, flame cultivation, castorbeans, soil and water conservation, cotton varieties, and others.

Two Latin Youths Charged In Thefts

Two Latin American youths are in Lamb County jail at Littlefield following their arrest Saturday night in connection with the theft of irrigation equipment and vandalism to irrigation wells.

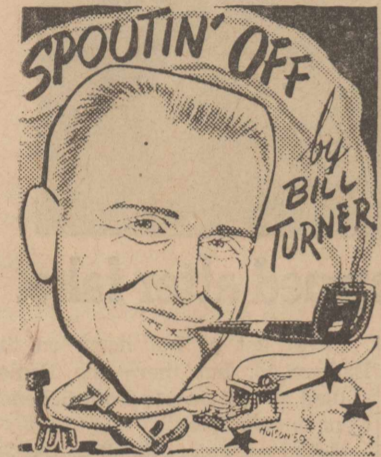
The two, Augustine De La Cerda, 18, of Olton, and Thomas Cabrera, 21, Corpus Christi, are charged with felony theft. Bond has been set at \$3,000 on each man.

De La Cerda and Cabrera were picked up Saturday night by Police Chief Emmett Burrows and officers Ernest Holland and Euel Roberts.

Deputy Sheriff V. L. Smith, investigating officer in the case, said the two Latins are charged in connection with the theft of 12 batteries, two generators, a box of tools, several quarts of oil and a tire and wheel.

About \$300 to \$400 in damage was done to irrigation wells and tractors at the time of the thefts.

Smith said batteries and other equipment were taken from the farms of O. J. Lee, Joe Hysinger and E. M. Hasha. A tractor was molested at the Elmer McGill farm. The thefts took place over a three-day period late last week.



BOND ELECTIONS usually cause some controversy, and Saturday's vote on Olton's paving program is no exception.

Although bondsmen, auditors and city councilmen have assured people time and time again that approval of the bond vote won't result in increased taxes, there are still some disbelievers.

Some folks are saying that "the city and the Chamber of Commerce are saying it won't cost any money and that's a bunch of bull."

If the city or the Chamber had said that, I'd be the first to agree. Nobody gets something for nothing.

But no one has said that the paving won't cost anything. Sure it'll cost.

I RECEIVED a letter to the editor this week from J. G. Cole, a resident who points out that you shouldn't "get it into your head that you will get it (paving) without paying for it."

He's right on that score. But he's wrong on another. He takes issue with the Chamber of Commerce, saying that it's a "mistake" to think that taxes won't be raised.

The thing that Mr. Cole failed to take into consideration is that that the city has enough money coming in—right now, at the present tax rate—to take care of the \$80,000 in bonds to be voted on Saturday.

I've been to the council meetings and I've heard the bondsmen say it over and over. And they can prove it in black and white.

I'M A NEWCOMER to Olton and I don't know all the background on what has happened here in the past.

It's probably better that way, because people ought to be looking to the future now anyway.

I firmly believe any town that wants to grow has to make changes, has to modernize, has to spend money — or it just won't grow.

Saturday's paving election is just another step toward the future. I can't vote in it, because I haven't lived here six months. But I think you know how I'd vote if I could.

And I think most people here want to make Olton a better place in which to live, enough to make Saturday's election a resounding vote of confidence in Olton's future.

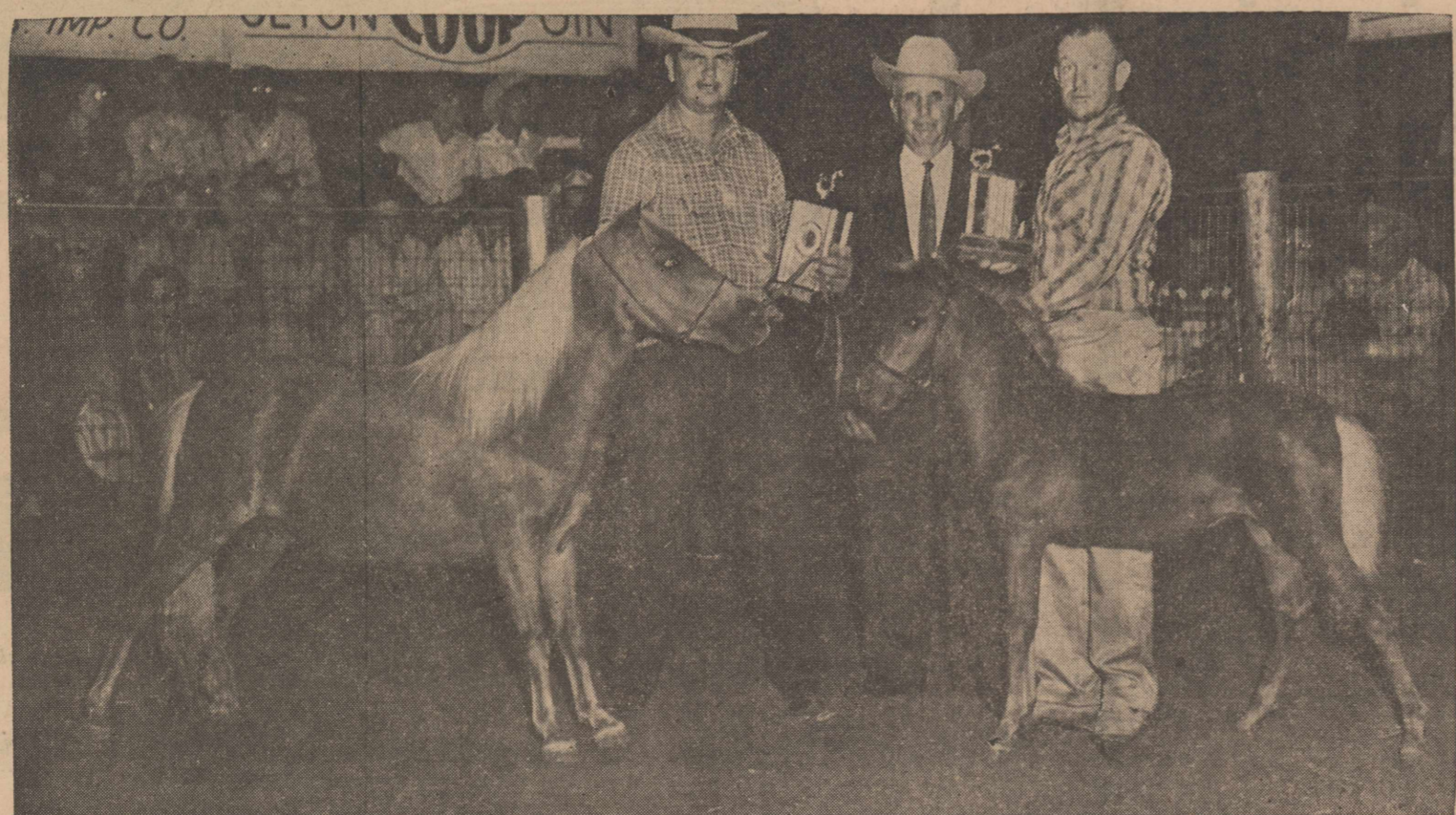
3 Olton Golfers Win At Hereford

Pony Show Success

In a show described as the "only one of its kind in the country," Lamesa and Wilson exhibitors took away the top prizes Saturday as the fourth annual Olton Shetland Pony Show closed.

Greaves Pony Farm, Lamesa, showed the champion registered stallion, "Torchlight," and the grand champion mare, "Major-ette."

Grand champion stallion was "Shorty," a pony shown by Floyd Heck of Wilson.

An Olton exhibitor, Archie May, showed the reserve champion mare, "Miss Fine Line."

Reserve champion stallion was "Toy", shown by George Gushwa, Elida, NM.

May, president of the Olton Shetland Pony Club, called the show one of the most successful in the four years the event has been held. Entries did not reach the

100 mark, as in 1959, but show officials said the quality of ponies was "better than ever."

Show Judge Perry Carlile, nationally known Oklahoma Shetland breeder, called the amateur show unique, saying the Olton event "is the only show in the country being staged at the grassroots level."

"This is what we need more of," Carlile said, "because it allows somebody besides just the rich folks to exhibit Shetlands."

Olton Scores Late For 12-8 Win

Olton's Mustangs, fighting to overcome a two-point deficit, battled 55 yards to a touchdown with two minutes remaining and edged a hard-fighting McCamey team there Friday night, 12-8.

Every yard came hard as Olton launched its winning drive.

Halfback Randee Buchenau, who scored both of the Mustang touchdowns, got it started with a 25-yard punt return to the Olton 45. The fleet Buchenau almost went

all the way on the punt runback, needing only one more block for a clear field.

Nine plays after the punt return, Olton had the winning touchdown. Fullback Robert Priest, a terrific ground-gainer for Olton the last half, got 37 yards on six carries in the winning drive. Buchenau got the touchdown from the one-yard line when Quarterback Johnny Schenck pitched out on the option play.

The same play had worked for Olton's first touchdown in the second period when the Mustangs took a brief 6-0 lead.

McCamey came roaring back a couple of minutes later to go ahead, 8-6, a lead that loomed larger and larger as time ticked by.

McCamey clearly outplayed the Ponies in the first half. They had six first downs to Olton's three, along with 85 yards rushing to Olton's 65.

The two teams battled to a standstill in the first period, neither able to move the first two times they had the ball.

After the kickoff, McCamey got nowhere in three plays and kicked to the Olton 45.

Schenck, Priest and Loveless carried on the Mustangs' first series of downs, netting a total of only four yards. Priest then punted 51 yards into the Badger end zone.

McCamey got the first first down of the night when James Tharp raced 10 yards to the Badger 31. But Olton's defense met the challenge and three plays later, McCamey's Charles Harlow punted to the Olton 31.

Priest found the going tough on first down, as the center of the Badger line rose up and stopped him for no gain. Buchenau then ran right end for six and Priest got two more, but it was fourth down, two to go. Priest booted the ball to the McCamey 15, where Harlow scooped it up and raced back to the McCamey 40.

A 15-yard personal foul penalty against Olton then put the ball on the Olton 42.

From there, McCamey drove to the Pony 19 for the first threat of the night by either team. Quarterback Bill Clary had the big

gain of the drive, a 12-yarder to the Olton 27 that might have gone all the way if it hadn't been for a smashing tackle by Pony Guard Larry Timmins.

Then the Badgers' Gary Don Howell, a 180-pound fullback who dealt Olton misery all night, gained two to the 25, where Priest put the stopper on him.

McCamey ran out of downs on the Mustang 19 when Tackle Bobby Brown stopped Clary after a five-yard gain.

Olton lost five yards in two plays after taking over as McCamey's Ronnie Wilkins and Stanley Coffee showed good defensive

work.

With the first quarter's end only seconds away, Priest took advantage of the wind and sent a booming punt 66 yards to the McCamey 20.

Duncan smashed through from his linebacker post to nab McCamey's Clary for a seven-yard loss on the last play of the quarter.

Clary fumbled on the next try and Olton's Brown recovered on the Badger 12.

Priest got four to the 8-yard line, Buchenau picked up one, and then Priest smashed to the Badger 5.

On fourth down, with three to

go, QB Schenck faked Priest into the middle and started wide on the option play. McCamey trapped him and he flipped to Buchenau, who had clear sailing into the end zone.

After Priest's kick for the extra point sailed wide, the Ponies led, 6-0.

After the kick-off, McCamey managed a first down the Badger 41, sparked by four and seven yard gains by Fullback Howell. Tharp got five more to the 47, but McCamey faced fourth and three and Harlow punted to the Olton 15.

Priest drilled seven yards to the 22 on the first play, but on second down, an Olton fumble was recovered by McCamey's Robert Hayes on the Pony 27.

On second down Clary uncorked a 13-yard flip to Halfback Mike Carroll on the Olton 15, giving McCamey a first down at that point. Clary, Howell and Carroll alternated the next three downs and McCamey faced fourth and three on the Olton 8.

Clary came through with a three-yard gainer to the five, where

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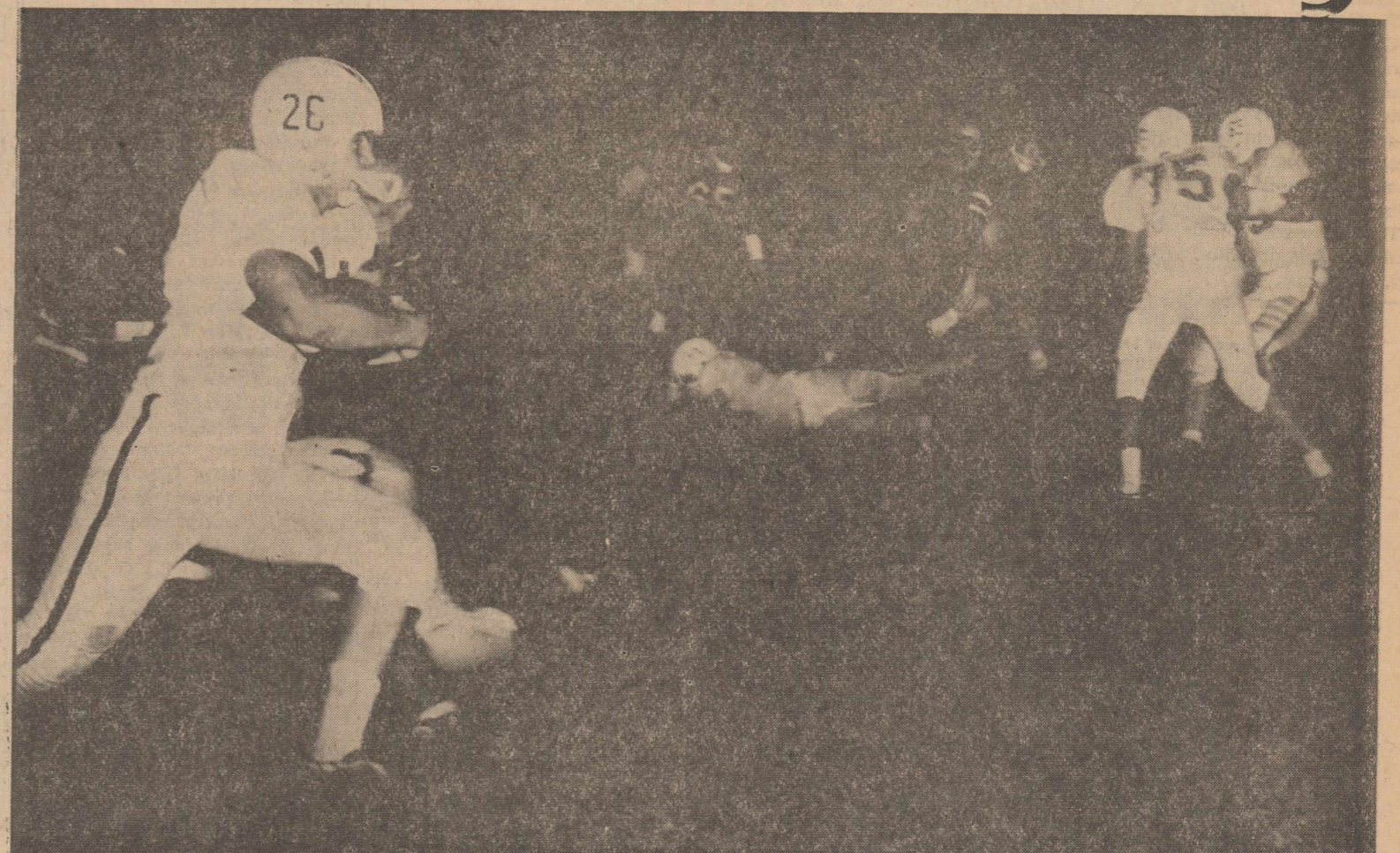
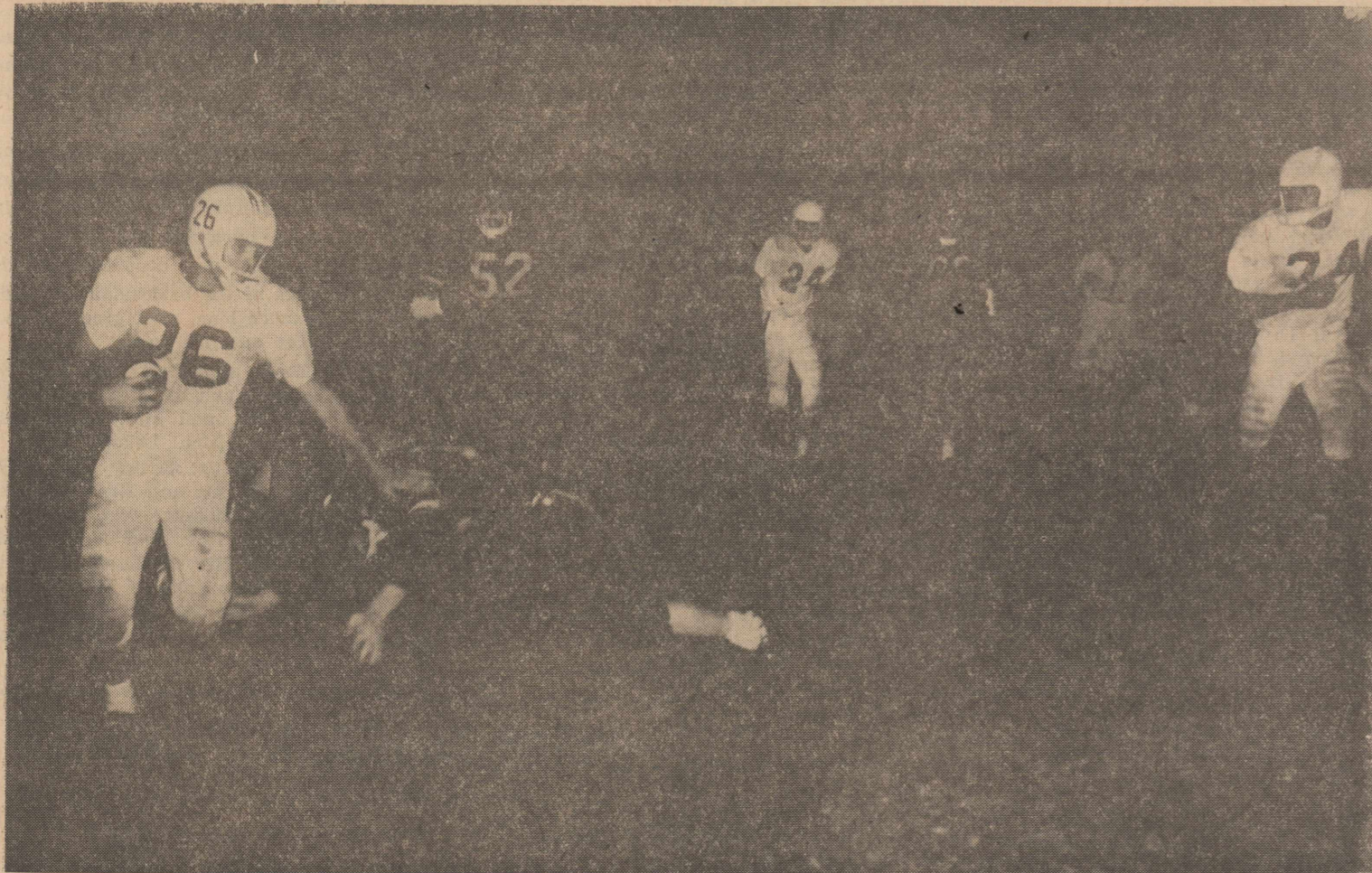

Fullback Howell gained five, then added four to the Pony 39 before Miller, Duncan and Fred Riney ganged up on him.

A play later, McCamey was guilty of taking too much time and was penalized five yards.

As the buzzer sounded Clary, back to pass, was nailed for a 12-yard loss by Olton's Brown and Featherngill.

That set up a new series and on first down, Priest blasted all the way down to the 13. Buchenau came through with a nine-yard gain to the four, giving Olton another first down.

Then McCamey stiffened and dropped Priest for no gain. On second down, however, the big fullback literally bulled his way down to the one.

McCamey got set again for a Priest blast, but this time QB Schenck faked to him and started wide. At the last moment he pitched out to Buchenau, who made it look easy. He got into the end zone without a hand being laid on him.

The clock showed two minutes to play after the Mustangs' try for the conversion failed.

McCamey came raging back. After getting the ball on the Badger 35, QB Clary went back to pass. For a moment, he appeared to be

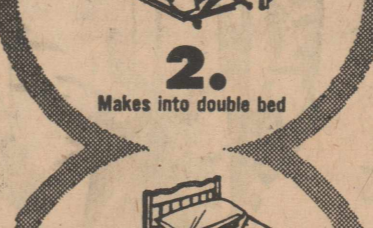
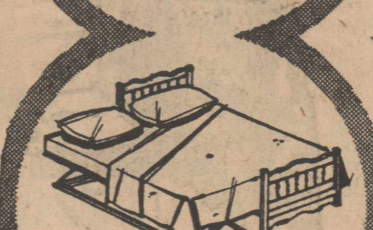

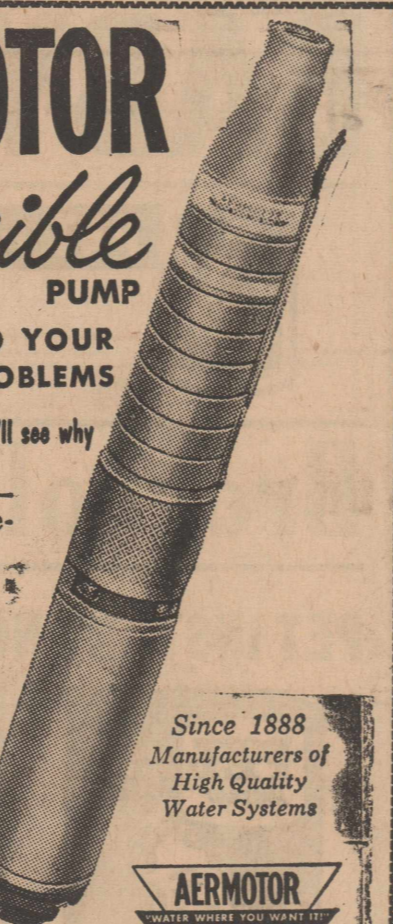

Dissolve 1 1/2 pound of brown sugar in 3 quarts vinegar and add 1-tablespoon each of black pepper, mustard, celery seed, mustard seed and turmeric. Pour vinegar juice mixture over vegetables and mix.

Cream sugar and margarine. Blend flour, salt and vanilla into mixture and beat well. Add eggs and stir milk into mixture. Pour into unbaked pie crust. Place in oven and bake at 450 degrees for 10 minutes. Reduce heat to 350 degrees and bake 30 minutes longer or until filling is firm. Do not cover filling with a top crust.

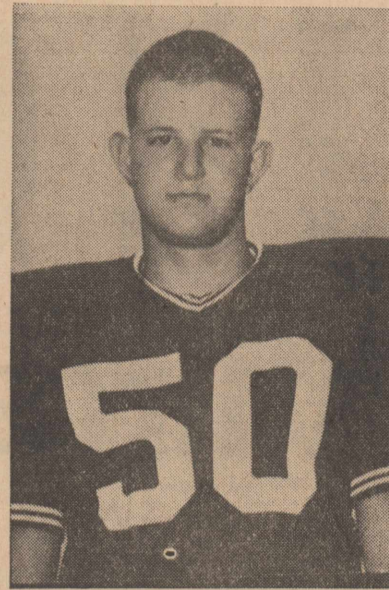

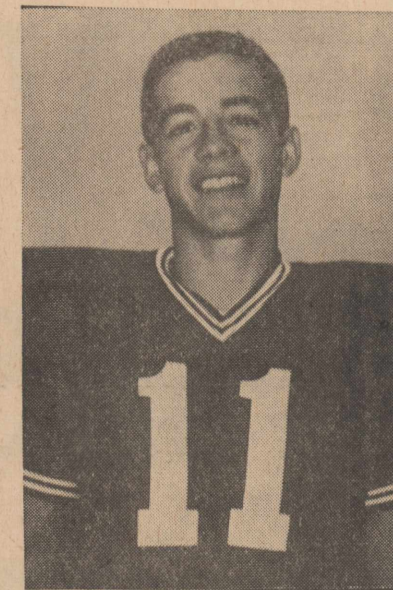

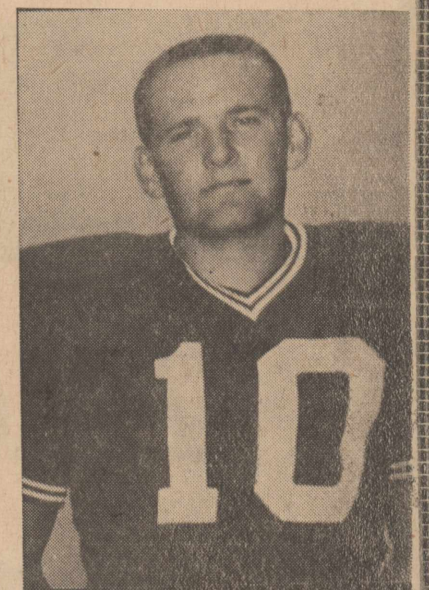

Why We Believe There Is A Need For PAVING IN OLTON And For Saturday's Bond Issue To Carry



OLTON STREETS NEED NOT LOOK THIS WAY!

1. IMPROVE DRAINAGE

With approval of the paving project, guttering will make drainage better, eliminate standwater that is the breeding place of encephalitic-carrying mosquitoes.

2. INCREASE PROPERTY VALUE

Leading contractors state that every dollar spent for paving increases the sale value two to three times.

3. REPAIR PRESENT STREETS

The city will be able to resal present paving that is in need of repair with a portion of the money derived from the bond issue. A part of the money also would be used to purchase some maintenance equipment.

4. ENCOURAGE FUTURE BUILDING

More paved streets will certainly be another incentive for new businesses to come into Olton and help us grow with the economy of the South Plains.

5. A CLEANER OLTON

Paving will go a long way in decreasing the amount of blowing dust and as a result will certainly aid in making our town a more healthy place in which to live.

6. YOU PAY FOR YOUR PAVING ONLY

The individual property owner pays for only the paving around his property. This will cost approximately \$4.25 per front foot. The cost can be paid out over a four-year period at a simple 7 per cent interest rate.

7. NO INCREASE IN TAXES

Last year, the City Council called in valuation experts and re-evaluated all property in Olton. Due to this, increased tax money was made available to the city. Because of this action, the city is now in a position to pay for a paving bond program without any increase in taxes. The city auditors and bondsmen have stated that the paving bond program can be handled without a tax increase.

An Open Letter To Olton Voters

We can afford this bond issue without a raise in taxes.

It will cost money, and no one is saying it won't. But there is enough money going into the sinking and interest fund of the city to take care of the bond issue and all existing bonds without raising taxes.

This bond money is for the city to participate approximately 20 per cent in the cost of paving. The City of Olton is in a very good position now to take care of this \$80,000 bond issue.

We must progress and this is the most progressive step we can take to make Olton prettier, nicer, more attractive, healthier and traveling on our streets more pleasant.

Approval of the bond issue will increase the value of the property owner's land and make it easier to sell and build on. Paving will make homes easier to keep clean. It also will encourage building of more new homes, by making loans with low down payments easier to get.

Regardless of the thinking of some citizens, the approval of the bond issue will **NOT** mean an increase in taxes.

We believe the voters will show Saturday that they are ready for progress. We know that the majority of the people in Olton would like to have paved streets. In our Community Clinic last March there were more suggestions for paving than any other need in Olton.

Olton is at the crossroads.

A vote "FOR" will take us down the paved road to progress.

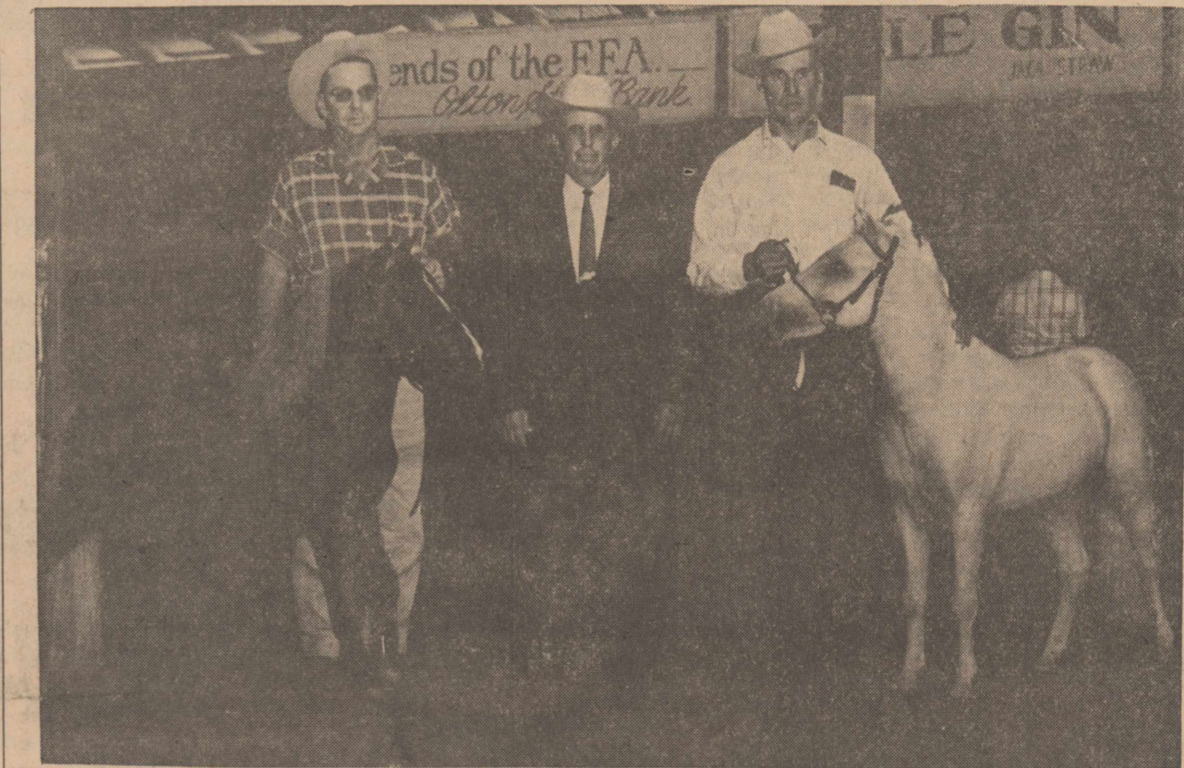

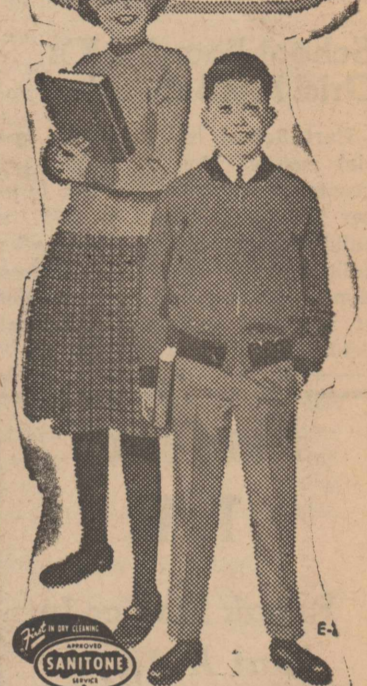

Put into buttered baking dish. Put in oven and heat thoroughly at 350. Remove from oven, lay biscuits on top of other ingredients. Turn oven up to 400 and bake until biscuits are a gold-brown. This meal is very quickly fixed and served with a salad and dessert is a nourishing, yet easily prepared meal. The above recipe may be put together and frozen before cooking which will help in the last minute preparation. Working away from home so much, I have fixed several casserole dishes on my day off so we would have better meals on the limited time I have at home to prepare them. Use glycerine for oiling your food chopper. It will leave no taste. Glycerine is also good for lubricating the egg beater and other cooking utensils. There are so many tomatoes in our gardens now it is hard to use them all or find enough people to share them with. Here is a good chilli sauce recipe you might like to try: 6 large ripe tomatoes. Chop onion and green pepper. Combine with other ingredients and cook slowly until thick.
