Olton High School's old grads will come home Friday. Several hundred exes are expected to be on hand for a day filled with activities and highlighted by a parade, supper, crowning of a homecoming queen and a football clash between Olton and Hereford.

## Cotton, Grain Harvests Get Off To Slow Start

Slowly but surely, Olton's cotton and grain harvests are beginning to move. At mid-week, approximately 200 bales of cotton had been ginned at the four local gins.

Grain elevators reported their pace picking up during the week. However, the harvests still were moving slowly in comparison with some past years.

Rains of about one-inch which hit the Olton area last Friday, along with cool nights and none-too-warm weather contributed to the slow start of the harvests.

Last week's rains apparently didn't damage the crops, however. One ginner said some of the cotton being pulled last week was "a little dirty, because it came from bolls close to the ground."

He said this was affecting some of the turnouts right now, but pointed out that later pulling will be from bolls higher off the ground. Defoliation of cotton probably will get into full swing in the next week or two.

However, County Agent Bill Kimbrough, Littlefield, warned that timing on defoliation can make or lose money for farmers on their 1960 crops.

Too early application, said Kimbrough of both defoliant and desiccants can reduce lint yield as much as 175 pounds per acre. Timed properly, defoliant increases yields.

The "too early" period, Kimbrough said, is when only 30 per cent of the bolls are open.

## Whiteface 11 Favored By TD

Olton's Mustangs, winners of four straight, will play the underdog role for the first time this season here Friday night when they meet Hereford's fast-rising Whitefaces in the highlight of Olton's homecoming celebration.

Hereford, unbeaten but once-tied, will be a touchdown favorite in the non-conference game.

Both clubs have more than one reason to win the ball game. Hereford, tired of being a doormat, has risen up to clout two foes and hold another to a draw.

The Whitefaces hope to avenge a 13-12 loss taken at the hands of Olton last year.

The Hereford team also may be a bit miffed after Muleshoe scored the first touchdown of the year against the Whitefaces last weekend. That score gave the Mules a 6-6 tie.

As far as Olton is concerned, the Mustangs would like nothing better than to take a Class AAA team down a notch.

Coach Bryan pronounced his Pories fit and ready Thursday. Rande Buchenau, who left the Hale Center game with a leg hurt in the third period, came back to practice this week without any sign of injury.

How good is Hereford? "They're rough," says Coach Bryan. "We probably are equal in team speed, but they're heavier."

Hereford lost a star, Fullback Eddie Skypala, in the Whitefaces' 28-0 victory over Dimmitt, but Coach Bryan says the Deaf Smith County team has another boy—160-pound Curtis Ritchie—just as good.

With Skypala out with a broken collarbone, Ritchie ran for the only Hereford touchdown against Muleshoe. He plunged over from the five.

Hereford went 11½ quarters this season before its double stripe was crossed. The Mules tied it up midway of the final period.

In the victory over Dimmitt, Hereford was led by Mack Cansler, a 165-pound halfback who got scores on 10 and 35-yard runs. Ritchie scored once against Dimmitt. Skypala led the victory over Canyon, 28-0, with three touchdowns, with Cansler getting the other on a 35-yard punt ruck.

In the line, the Whitefaces are led by an all-state guard, 185-pound Edwin Thomas, the team captain.

Starters in the Olton backfield, other than Buchenau, will be Fullback Robert Priest, Halfback Frankie Miller and Quarterback Johnny Schenk.

## City May Submit Proposal Of Own On Phone Rates

Olton city council's planned meeting with General Telephone Company representatives here next Tuesday night may not come off.

The council is thinking of preparing a proposal of its own in connection with General's request for a rate increase here Mayor M. T. James Jr. said Thursday morning.

James said the proposal probably will be ready for presentation to General's district manager, Bob Saunders, sometime early next week.

If it goes to Saunders prior to the Tuesday night meeting, the session may be delayed until General Telephone officials have had time to consider the Olton proposition.

Saunders presented an "opened" request for a rate increase when he met with the council here Sept. 13. This means that no definite figures are being requested. Saunders said this week that "we are asking that Olton up the rates sufficiently to provide the company with a reasonable return on its investment."

The district manager said the company does not deny that service "has been worse" here during the past four months.

"We always interrupt service when we expand and enlarge our equipment, and therefore service has been considerably worse during the last four months. We regret this inconvenience, but the final result will be a greatly improved telephone service for Olton."

Active in the Permian Basin Water and Sewage Association, he served as president in 1955.

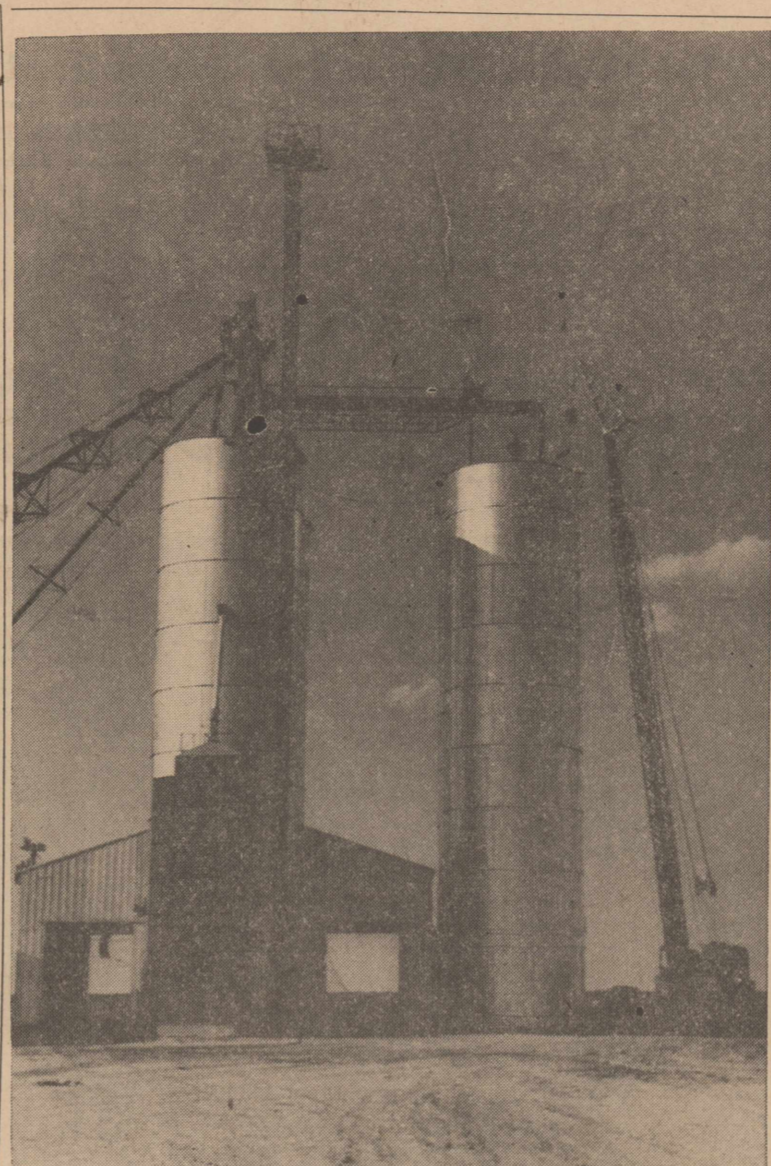

It's a shame that the old Rebel, General Walter Williams and his contemporaries aren't going to be around to see what today's Civil War enthusiasts are dreaming up for the centennial of the great 1861-1865 conflict.

later. "Old Reb" Williams, who bore the honorary title of General and was the last survivor of several million Civil War soldiers, almost made it though. He missed the opening of the centennial celebration next January by only a little more than a year.

pointed a National Committee under the leadership of no less a personage than retired major general U. S. Grant III, and Southern states have just recently formed the Confederate States Civil War Centennial Commission.

importance. Texas will hold its share of observances with ceremonies at such famous places as LaGrange, where more companies were mustered for Confederate service than in any other town in the state; at Sabine Pass where Lt. Dick Dowling and his handful of Confederates repulsed Federal gunboats; at Tyler, where Union prisoners of war were impounded; and at Palmetto Ranch near Brownsville, where the last battle

of the War was fought and, ironically, won by the Confederates. But the state will participate in observances in other states also, mostly where Texas troops were engaged in campaigns and battles. Among these will be the Battle of Gettysburg where General John Bell Hood's "Texas Brigade" fought with distinction. A ceremony is also scheduled at Vicksburg when a Texas granite memorial will be dedicated to Texans who fought in that engagement.

Its been a long time since any-thing has caught the imagination and interest of Americans as has the centennial observance. People from all walks of life have been bitten by the Civil War bug and "buffs" are spring-up all over and in the most unlikely places. Scholars and historians and writers have studied and written about THE WAR since it first began, but now even those who were never interested in history in any form are spending the family gro-

cery money on reading matter about the Civil War. So the great war is about to be fought all over again. There's one thing in today's strategist's favor, though. He'll know more about what's going on than did most of the original participants. He won't have to await the outcome—he'll know beforehand.

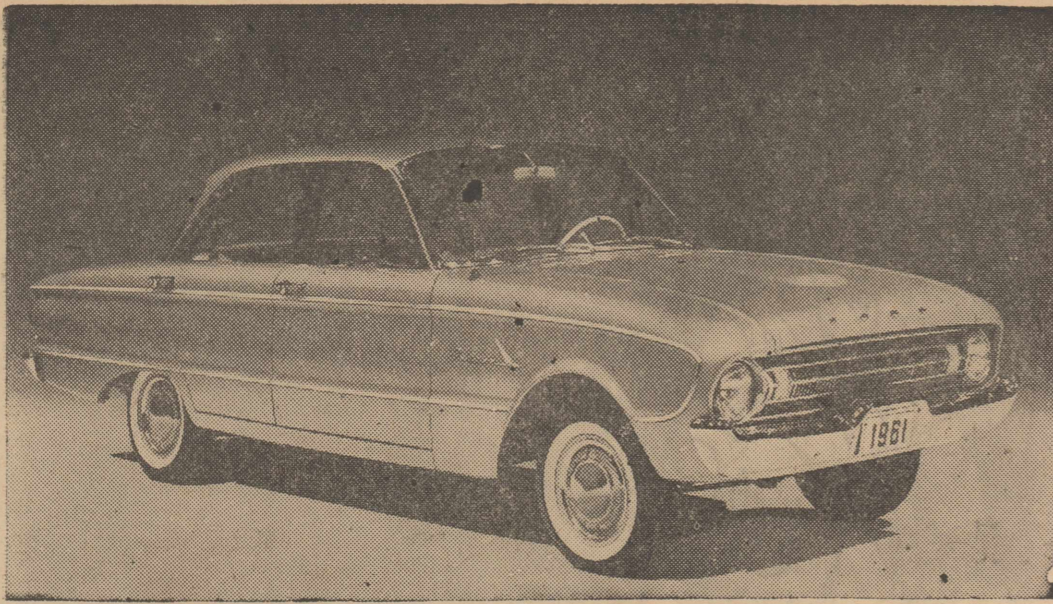

## New Ford Falcon Goes On Display

A new 101-horsepower performance option through the Falcon 170 Special engine is featured in the 1961 Ford Falcon now on display at Hall-Sides Motors in Olton. The 1961 Falcon has a new convex-shaped aluminum grille, but

preserves the styling and inside-outside dimensions of its predecessor.

That means the Falcon will continue to offer full six-passenger seating room and a 23.7-cubic-foot trunk to carry luggage in vacation quantities.

The 1961 Falcon will be offered in four models—two and four-door sedans and two and four-door station wagons.

Ford's compact car delivers up to 30 miles per gallon of gasoline and the oil change interval with the Falcon's Full Flow oil filter is 4,000 miles.

For those who want increased performance—about 15 per cent better than the standard 85-horsepower 144.3 cubic inch engine—Falcon will offer an optional 170 cubic-inch, six-cylinder engine that is rated at 101 horsepower.

Both Falcon engines operate on regular grade fuel.

Two transmissions—three-speed shift and Fordomatic—can be matched with either the

standard or optional engine. Heavy-duty transmission and drive-line components are used with the Falcon 170 Special.

Falcon styling is simple and functional, with a minimum of decorative chrome. The front fenders and hood slope downward to provide maximum visibility. Single seven-inch headlights, set into the new grille, provide illumination comparable to that of the smaller dual headlights on other cars.

Other new appearance items include headlamp rims, rectangular parking lights designed to blend with the new grille, and new Falcon emblems on the sides of the front fenders.

The Falcon body is of unitized construction, with the front fenders being bolted on for easy repair or replacement. This construction combines strength and rigidity with minimum weight.

## Wheat Program Has Few Changes

With winter wheat planting getting under way, L. D. Aten, manager of the Hale County Ag-

ricultural Stabilization and Conservation office, has pointed out that the wheat program for 1961 will be essentially the same as it has been in recent years.

Aten listed the following program highlights:

As a result of an \$7.4 affirmative vote of wheat growers who voted in a referendum July 21, marketing quotas will be in effect for the 1961 crop and the marketing of excess wheat will be subject to penalty.

Price support will be available on 1961 crop wheat at a minimum national average rate of \$1.78 per bushel, the same as the rate for the 1960 crop.

Each wheat-producing farm has an acreage allotment, representing the farm's share of the national allotment, which again in 1961 stands at 55 million acres, the minimum permitted by law.

Under the marketing quota system, any farmer who keeps within his wheat acreage allotment (or does not exceed 15 acres of wheat) may market his total wheat crop without penalty. Also exempt from penalty is any farmer who obtains approval to participate in the feed wheat program and produces 30 acres or less of wheat for use on his farm.

Other growers who exceed their allotments will generally be subject to a marketing quota penalty on the normal yield of the excess acres. The penalty rate for 1961 will continue at 45 per cent of parity, which for 1960 worked out to a dollar-and-cents penalty rate of \$1.08 per bushel.

The wheat price support program 1961 will be carried out through purchase agreements. Support will be available from harvesttime in the summer of 1961 to the end of January 1962. The tentative support level is a minimum announced in advance of planting, which may be increased on the basis of later information next year but may not be reduced.

The total U.S. wheat supply for the 1960-61 marketing year is now estimated at a new record of 2,682 million bushels, according to the latest U.S. Department of Agriculture report on the wheat situation received at the County ASC office.

**Hybrid Cottons To Be On Market, Spain Reports After Research Tour**

Don Spain, Olton Farm Supply owner, was among more than 800 persons attending the annual field day of the DeKalb Agricultural Association at the firm's research farm near Lubbock last Thursday. DeKalb will introduce its first hybrid stormproof cottons next year, Spain said.  
 Open-boll DeKalb hybrid cottons already are being grown in Mississippi and in South Texas and Spain has a test plot of the new hybrid on his farm west of Olton. The new hybrid, DeKalb 108, has

shown in tests that yield increases of about 15 per cent can be expected, Spain said.

Breeder of the hybrid is Dr. J. B. Weaver, a nationally known specialist who has been with DeKalb three years. He previously was in cotton research at North Carolina State College.

Crossing of the new hybrid is being done with bumble bees, according to Spain. Studies showed other insects were not so successful in pollination because of the heaviness of cotton pollen.

Research to date shows these characteristics of the hybrid: 1. resistance to Thrip increased 25 per cent in early plant size; 2. resistance to disease; 3. more seedling vigor; 4. foliage not so dense; 5. bolls higher off ground; 6. five per cent increase in staple.

Field Day visitors also saw numerous grain sorghum research projects at the 80-acre DeKalb farm, including 13,000 hand-crosses in a breeding program. New hybrid grain sorghum strains were inspected on the guided tours at the research farm.

Willis died at about 2:40 p.m. Wednesday in the Knight Rest Home at Littlefield. He was 73 years old.

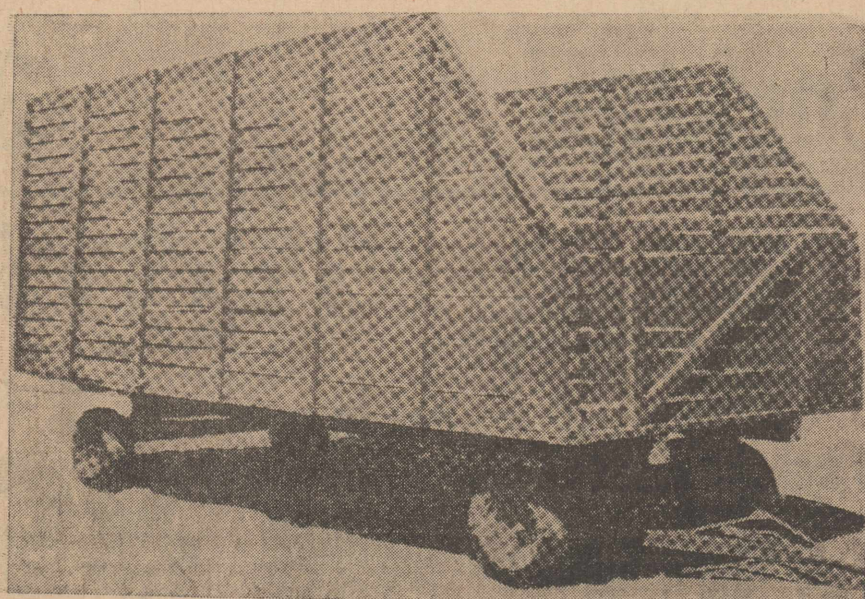

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# Mustangs Take Fourth Win, 26-6

Olton's Mustangs broke open a close ball game in the fourth quarter here last Friday night to beat Hale Center, 26-6, and win their fourth straight game of the season.

Leading only 13-6 after three periods, the Mustangs drove 44 yards for one score and used an intercepted pass for another and put Hale Center out of contention.

The Ponies showed a big advantage in the statistics, gaining 262 total yards to the Owls' 127 and 15 first downs to eight by

Hale Center.

But Olton's fourth victory against no defeats did not come easy. The Owls showed a stubborn defense, led by Linebacker Harold Wardlaw, a 190-pound tackling demon.

But in the end it was too much for Robert Priest and Johnny Schenck that turned the tide against the Owls.

Priest gained 142 yards in 28 carries during the night and scored one time.

Schenck passed for two touchdowns and returned an intercepted pass 35 yards to a score.

Another Olton threat, Halfback, Rande Buchenau, retired in the third period due to a minor leg

hurt. The injury wasn't expected to keep him out of this week's ball game with Hereford.

Olton got a couple of touchdowns in the second period to lead 13-0 at the half.

Hale Center opened the ball game with a 66-yard drive to the Olton 21.

Halfback Perry Ritchey, who gained 82 yards in 28 carries for the night, picked up a first down for the Owls on their own 38, gaining 15 yards in two carries.

Ritchey got another five on a second down try, then passed to Wardlaw, an end on offense, on a play that covered 28 yards to the Olton 29.

Ritchey completed another pass, this one to Halfback Gerald Granger at the Olton 25, but the Mustangs rose to the occasion and took over two plays later.

Good defensive work by Guards Larry Timmins and Harold Featherthrigill helped stop the advance for Olton.

Olton came right back with a drive to the Hale Center 31, with Priest picking up 20 yards on four carries and Buchenau getting off one 10-yard jaunt.

However the advance faltered when Halfback Frankie Miller fumbled at the 31, where the alert Wardlaw pounced on the ball for Hale Center.

A 15-yard penalty against the Owls and some good defensive work by End Jimmy Lawson and Priest set the Hale Center team back to its own 12. QB Don Dollar punted out to the Olton 35.

From there Olton started a drive

that looked like it would go all the way. HB Miller picked up four yards, then Priest got eight more to the Owl 23.

Priest carried twice and Buchenau once as the Ponies moved down to the Owl 8 for a first down.

But there the Owls poured in on Buchenau and downed him at the 10. Priest ran down to the six as the quarter ended. After Buchenau was stopped for no gain, Schenck tried his hand at the running game. He swept left end but was nailed at the two and the drive faltered.

Hale Center booted out to the Owl 32 after two plays failed to gain.

Priest picked nine yards on a blast at the line and Miller got down to the 21 on a two-yard pick-up.

Buchenau then ran to the 15, where he was stopped by Wardlaw. Priest took another crack at the Owl line and got the eight.

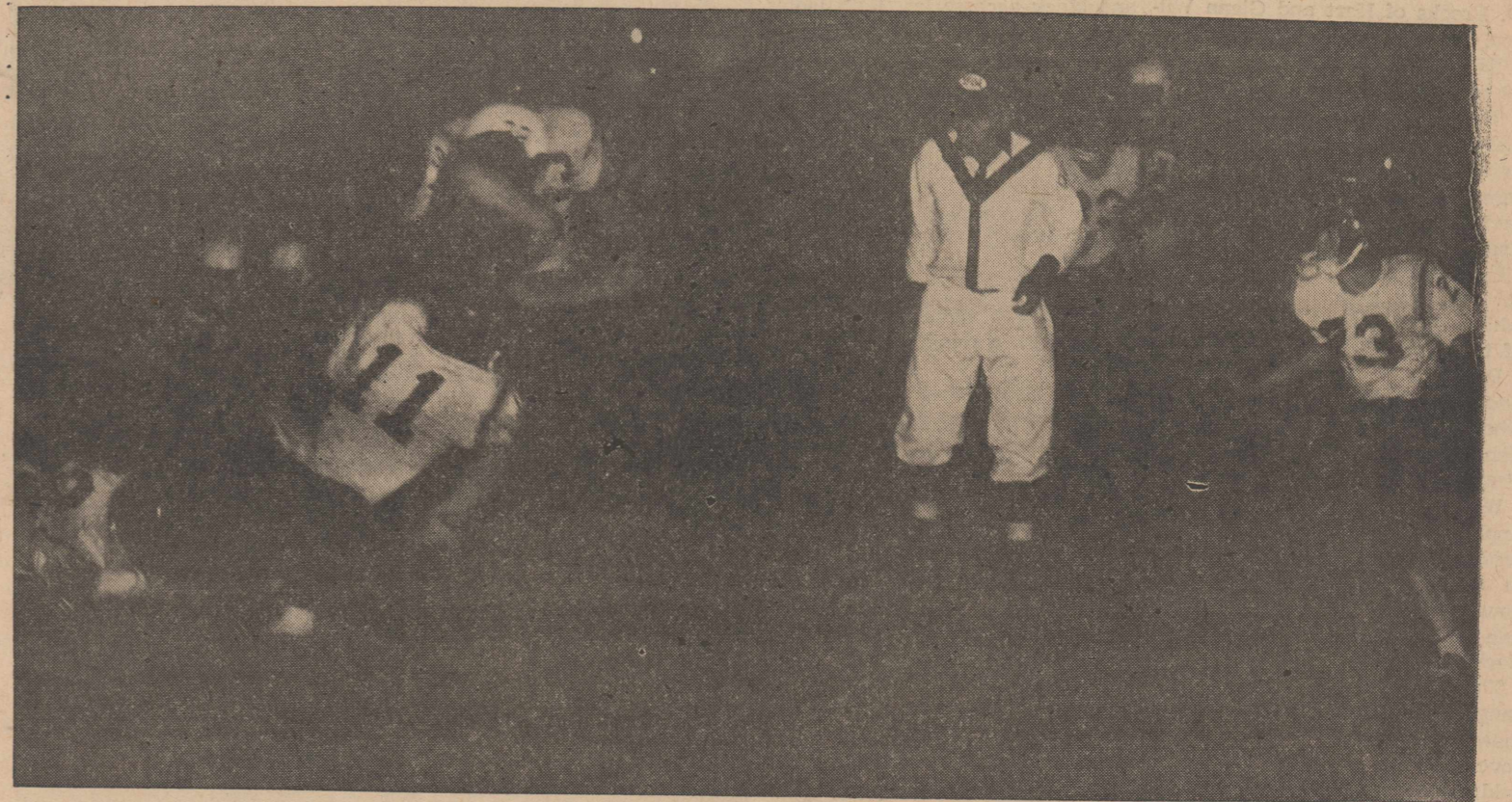
Two plays later, the Mustangs were back on the 10 as Hale Center's defenses stiffened.

But Schenck "relaxed" the Owls on the next play. He threw to End Lawson, standing alone in the end zone, for a touchdown. Buchenau kicked the extra point and it was 7-0 with 7:44 left in the half.

After the kick-off, Hale Center couldn't go and the Owls punted to the Olton 37. The Mustangs drove from there to paydirt in 11 plays.

Priest started the drive with a five-yard gainer and Buchenau added seven for a first down at the Olton 49.

Priest gained four and then Buchenau picked up another first down

with an eight-yard run to the Owl 41.

J. A. Nivens, an Owl captain, broke through Olton blockers and hurled himself in front of Priest. It was the first blocked kick of the year for Olton.

Nivens fell on the ball at the 50 and Hale Center set sail on a touchdown drive.

Ritchey did most of the damage. He carried to the Olton 42 on the first play before Buchenau moved in for the tackle.

After HB Sam Reedy gained one, Ritchey drove to the 38, then to the 33, then to the 23. A couple of plays got no gain for the Owls, but on third down Dollar got down to the 16.

Facing a fourth down-and-three situation, Ritchey got five yards for a new series.

Center Robert Duncan, Tackle Bobby Brown and Priest got in on the tackles as the Ponies tightened their defenses.

But on third down from the seven, Ritchey went back to pass, found End Arthur Klatt in the clear and pitched to him for the touchdown. A rushing try for the extra points failed and it was 13-6, Olton.

After the kickoff, the Mustangs couldn't go and Priest punted out of bounds on the Hale Center 27.

Four downs later, the Owls kicked right back, with Dollar kicking to the Olton 35, where Buchenau hauled it in and carried to the 43.

With Hale Center's Danny Oliver, a tackle, getting in some good de-

fensive work, the Mustangs again found the going rough and had to punt on fourth down.

Hale Center took over at the 18, and then tried a pass. Olton's Schenck was waiting for it, however, and the Mustang quarterback returned the interception 22 yards to the Owl 13.

However, Hale Center stopped the Ponies and took over at the seven as the third quarter ended.

Four plays later, Ritchey punted to the Hale Center 44. The Mustangs took over and drove for a score in 11 plays, despite a 15-yard penalty.

Priest gained to the 42 and then Schenck ran 29 yards to the 13. However, an official noted an infraction of the rules by Olton at the 20 and the Mustangs were penalized back to the 35.

That made it third down with one to go and Priest promptly got the necessary yard.

After Miller lost a couple of yards, Priest carried to the 27, then to the 23, then to the 17.

Schenck gained a couple on a running try, then handed the chores back to Priest, who drove to the seven for a first down.

On the next play, Priest bulled all the way into the end zone,

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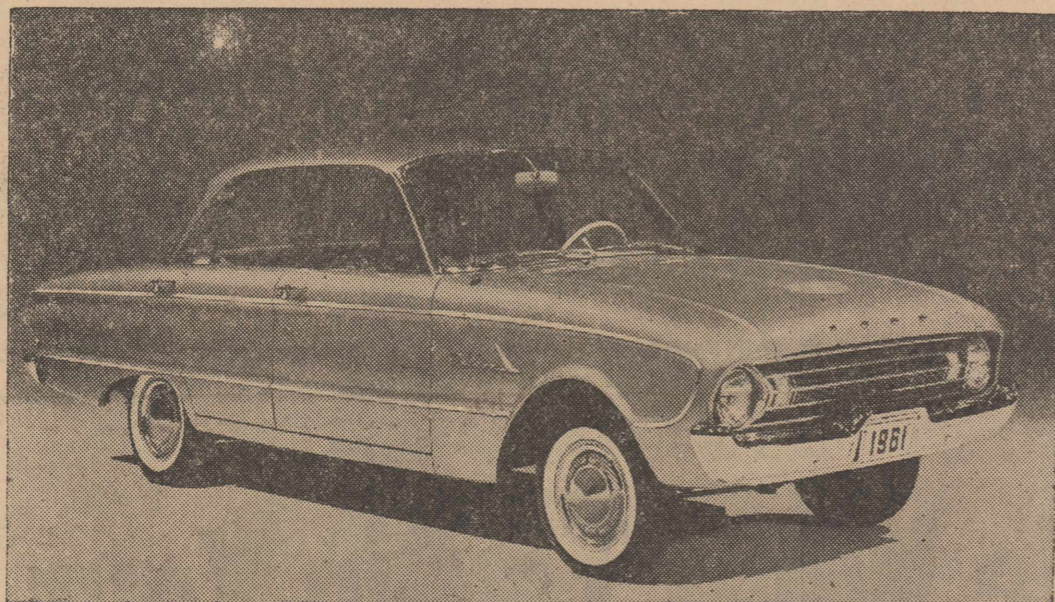
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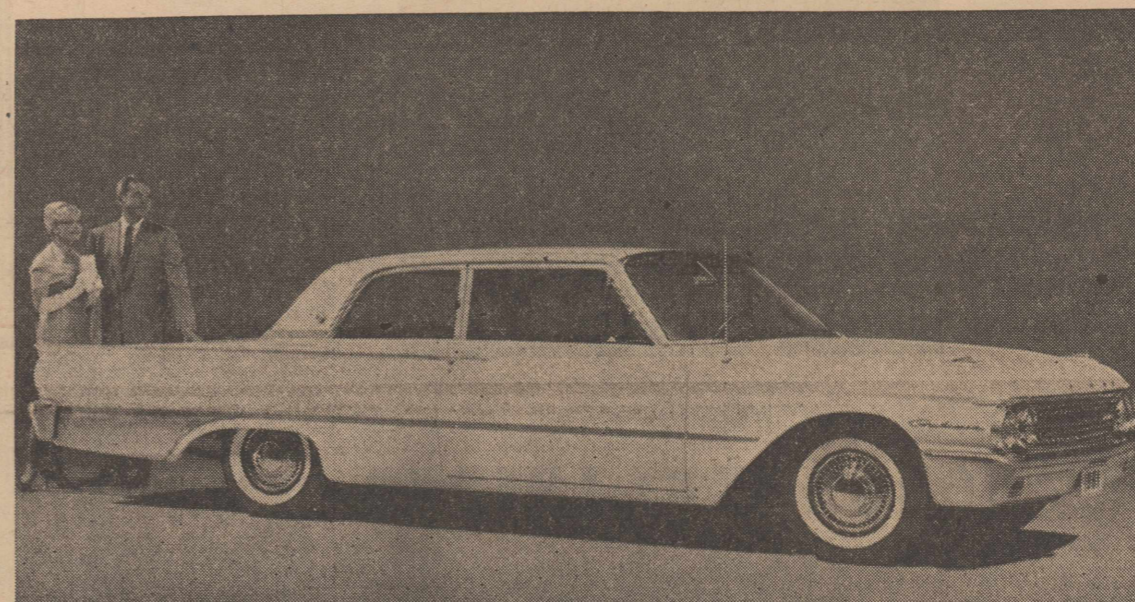
