### Five-Day Swine Short Course To Be Held Here

A swine short course for adult farmers will be held Nov. 28-Dec. 2 under the sponsorship of the Olton High School vocational agriculture department, according to Joe Harper, superintendent, and Calvin Horn and Max Malone, teachers of vocational agriculture.

C. M. Laywell, swine specialist with the vocational agriculture division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Husbandry at Texas A & M College, will be the instructor for the course.

Laywell holds a B.S. degree in animal husbandry from Southwest Texas State. He assisted in the field of veterinary medicine at San Marcos and has had several years of ranching and on-the-farm experience. He has been an instructor in vocational agriculture and has acted as swine judge at livestock judging contests.

"Many swine short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Laywell and all have met with outstanding success," according to Walter Labay, area supervisor of vocational agriculture, Plainview. Arrangements for the adult education short course in swine husbandry and in other fields are made through Labay's office.

The short course here is scheduled to begin Nov. 28 at 8 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of five will be held nightly through Dec. 2.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools or the agriculture teachers. An entry fee of \$2.00 will be charged. Swine husbandry short course certificates are to be presented to each student who attends all the training sessions.

She far outdistanced a field of more than 100 entries.

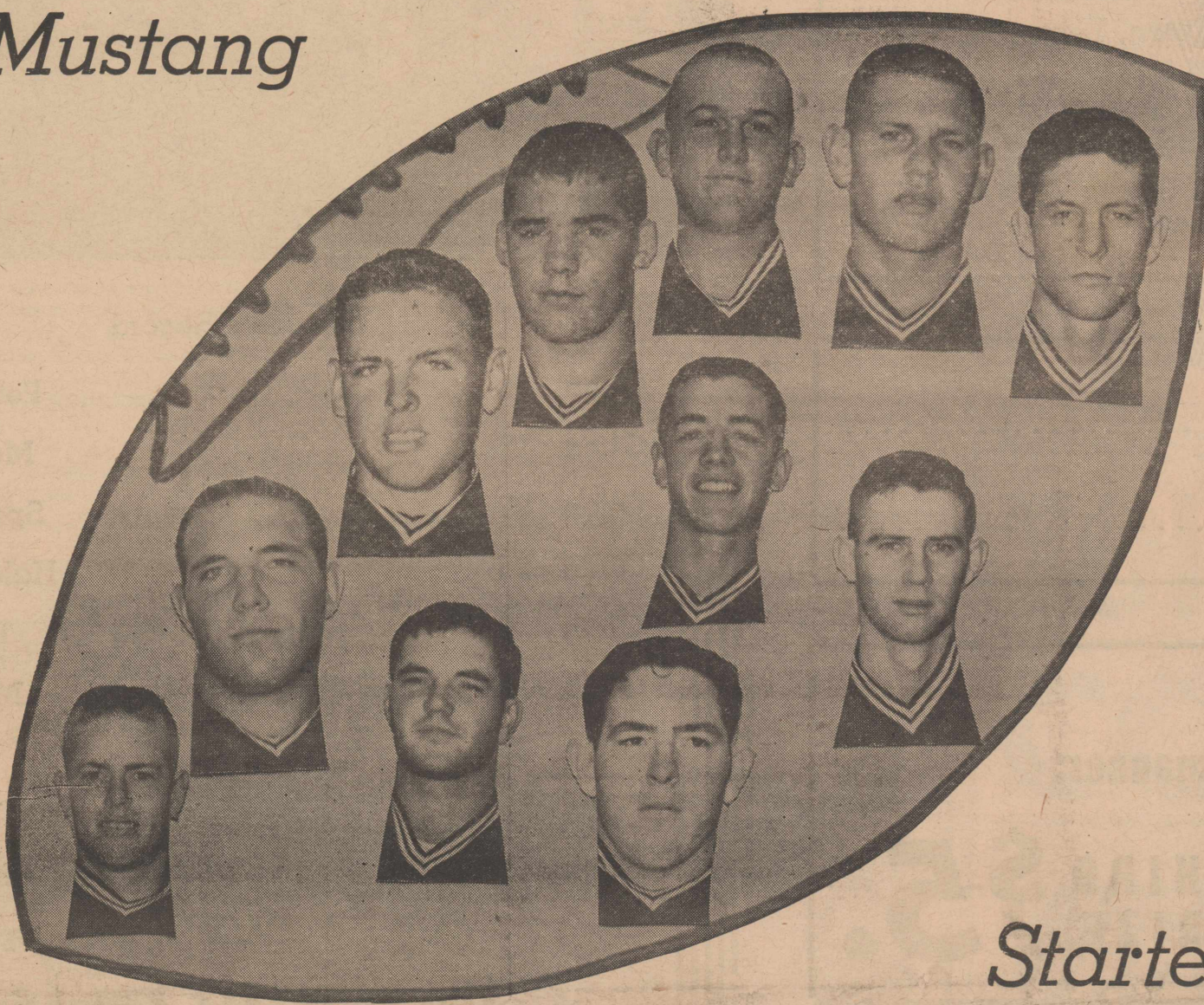
Second place in the contest, worth \$10, went to Carroll Cox, who guessed correctly on 13 of 18 games.

## Unbeaten Powers Seek District Championship

"An irresistible force meets an immovable object."

It may be an old saying, but it fits in the case of Olton and Floydada, a pair of unbeaten, untied football teams who clash at Floydada Friday at 2:30 p.m. for the District 2-AA championship.

In this case, Olton apparently is the irresistible force.

The Mustangs have averaged almost 30 points a game in mowing down all opposition.

Immovable Floydada, on the other hand, has allowed but 42 points all year long, average of less than 5 points a game.

The Whirlwinds, who blow more like a hurricane, will be a slight favorite. It's homecoming time at Floydada and the Winds naturally will be trying to put on a good show for the old grads.

And what happens when an irresistible force hits an immovable object?

Something has to give.

The team that gives will hang up its duds for the season. The winner will take on Dimmitt, district 1-AA champion, in bi-district play.

Only one team has scored more than one time against Floydada this year. Lockney managed two touchdowns in a 20-14 loss.

Only one team has held Olton to less than two touchdowns. The Mustangs got by Hereford, a Class AAA foe, by 8-0.

The records sum up this way: Olton, 9-0-0, 257 points scored against 113 for the opposition; Floydada, 9-0-0, 179 points scored against 42 for the opposition.

Only one thing is sure Friday afternoon...seats will be hard-to-come-by for the fan who shows up at the last minute.

Olton school officials warned this week that the Floydada Stadium can't possibly accommodate all the expected crowd. They advised Olton fans to leave early to be assured of seats.

Floydada will enjoy a 10-pound-

per-man weight advantage in the line. The Olton line averages near 170, while Floydada's is about 180.

Whirlwind starting backs tip the scales at an average of about 154 per man. Olton backs average about the same.

The Green-and-White Whirlwinds already own a 6-0 decision over the Friday afternoon winner's next opponent — Dimmitt.

Floydada edged past Spur, 6-0, whipped Post, 33-6, edged Dimmitt, 6-0, Ralls, 31-7, and Canyon, 22-0, in non-conference play.

With team leader Rodney Teague injured and out of the line-up, the Whirlwinds nudged Lockney, 20-14, and Muleshoe, 14-7, Teague,

a 165-pound quarterback who does everything, returned to help the Winds beat Abernathy, 13-8, and Morton, 34-0.

Olton, against the same teams, rapped Lockney 30-8, Muleshoe, 35-22, Morton 38-22, and Abernathy 32-14.

Five of the defensive starters for this year's Floydada team were sparkplugs of the great 1959 outfit which allowed only 20 points in 11 games.

While Teague is the top Floydada offensive threat, he is joined by a trio of fleet backs who can score from anywhere, halfbacks Charles Christian and Richard Marler and fullback Van Stovall.

## Record Vote Here Gives Nixon 54-Ballot Margin

After eight years of Republican administration, the nation went back to Democratic leadership Tuesday as John F. Kennedy became the first Roman Catholic to win the United States' highest office.

Olton, however, broke with Lamb County as a whole as voters here gave GOP Nominee Richard M. Nixon a 54-vote edge over the president-elect.

A total of 1,080 voters cast ballots here, giving Nixon 509, Kennedy 455 and Charles Sullivan, Constitution Party candidate, 47.

### Bank To Be Closed Friday Afternoon

Olton State Bank will be open for business Friday morning but will be closed Friday afternoon in observance of Veterans' Day and "Mustang Day", proclaimed by Mayor Major T. James Jr. last week to honor the football team.

Kennedy led Lamb County by 3,089 to 2,764. Sullivan received 153 votes.

The turnout here was believed to be more than 95 per cent of the eligible voters. The total edged the turnout of 1956, when 972 voters went to the polls and gave Adlai Stevenson, Demo nominee, 575 votes to 365 for President Eisenhower.

So it turned out that Olton gave the loser the edge in the past two general elections.

The total Lamb County turnout was 6,280, a record-smasher. Where 5,177 ballots were tallied in the presidential race of 1956, 6,005 were counted in the 1960 voting.

At Springlake, Voters gave Nixon a 103-100 margin, while at Hart Camp, the vote was for Nixon, 37-33.

In the U.S. Senate race, Lyndon B. Johnson received 3,772 votes to GOP John Tower's 2,007. Olton voted for Johnson, 588 to 370. Springlake and Hart Camp went the same way, 127-77 and 51-23, respectively.

George Mahon was returned to his seat in the House of Representatives by an overwhelming majority. He led Lamb County 4,714 to 588 over Constitution Party candidate John Anderson. In Olton, Mahon received 757 votes to Anderson's 111.

Gov. Price Daniel won easily over his Republican opponent, William Stegar, and led in Olton, 889

Olton experienced its first hard freeze of the year Wednesday night, as temperatures dropped to the mid-twenties.




## Tip Randels Enjoy Trailer Life, Travel

Olton is the main "stopping-place", coming and going, for Mr. and Mrs. Tip Randel as they travel from one part of the country to another in their trim and comfortable home-on-wheels.

Mrs. Randel is the former Miss Fern Silcott and the sister of C. S. and L. E. Silcott, both of Olton. A student and graduate of Olton Schools when the school only had one or two rooms, Mrs. Randel says that Olton certainly has changed since that time.

A native of Bing, Oklahoma, Randel spent his boyhood days on a farm in that state.

Although Mr. and Mrs. Randel both lived in the state of Iowa at one time, they met at Monrovia, Calif., and married there March 7, 1922.

Their travels have taken them to many states, including Missouri, California, Colorado, Wyoming, Arizona, Montana, Texas and across the border to Mexico.

In 1957, Mr. and Mrs. Randel left their home at Monrovia, Calif., where they had lived and worked for 40 years to make their first trip in a trailer. Randel was associated with the Union Oil Company in California for 35 years.

They journeyed to Yellowstone National Park, then through Texas and Old Mexico on their first trip.

Randel said, "We liked trailering so well that when we went back to California, we gave away or sold 'lock, stock and barrel' all of our household goods."

He added: "When it's night-time, we just find a wide spot in the road, park there and stay all night. Our property has never been damaged or molested in any way."

One of the best things about the life they lead is the nice and friendly people they meet on their travels, people from every state and from almost every walk of life. They also have met equally nice people from some foreign countries, including Japan, Germany and Hawaii.

The couple recalls a time when they went to Big Lake in Arizona to try their luck at fishing. Randel was leveling the trailer and making other needed preparations when a lady who lived in a nearby trailer came over with five large trout for their dinner. This is only one of the ways people have shown them how nice people really can be!

They have occupied the trailer they are now living in for the past three years. Their first trip was made in another trailer.

Randel remarked, "We have been through just about everything in this trailer. We have been through both good and bad weather. His wife added, "Yes, we have been through rain and hail in this trailer—and met more wonderful people."

The 26-foot trailer has a sofa that makes into a bed, two other beds, chairs, table, built-in electric stove and burners as some of its furnishings. It also has a complete bathroom and is equipped with panel ray heating. The trailer is roomy and pleasant and has plenty of windows.

How they both feel about the way they live was summed-up nicely by Randel when he said,

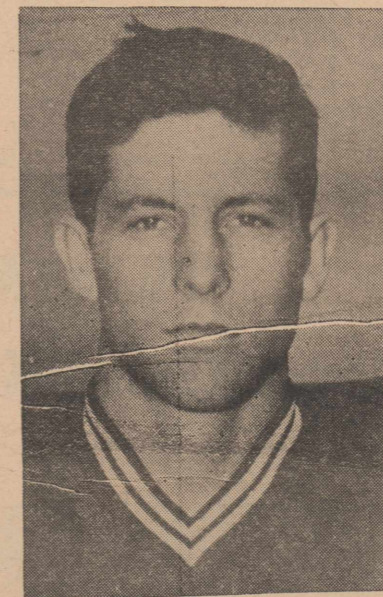
"We have enjoyed traveling so much and I don't think we would give it up. We are doing something we have always wanted to do — see the country and be comfortable, too."

# Mustangs Trip Abernathy, 32-14

Olton and Abernathy traded spectacular scoring plays, fumbles and pass interceptions here last Friday night, but Olton got the best end of the deal as the Mustangs won 32-14.

The Ponies remained undefeated for the season and in District 2-AA play as they marched on to a showdown with Floydada, also unbeaten and untied.

Both teams knew they had the scoring guns in the Olton-Abernathy shoot-out and it was simply a matter of who got there "fustest with the mostest."

It turned out that Olton was the master of the quick-draw as the Mustangs gunned down the Antelopes with two long strikes.

Late in the first period, Olton's Robert Priest rambled 60 yards to open the scoring.

Randee Buchenau sped 65 yards for a Mustang score in the second

period to put the Mustangs in front, 12-0.

For all intents and purposes that was the ball game.

But Frankie Miller, Mustang Halfback, added icing to the cake just before the half with a four-yard run for a touchdown and Quarterback Johnny Schenck put the Ponies out front by 26-0 with a one-yard plunge early in the fourth quarter.

After Abernathy used a long pass for a touchdown, the Mustangs came back with a 22-yard touchdown gallop by Buchenau midway in the fourth to make it 32-7.

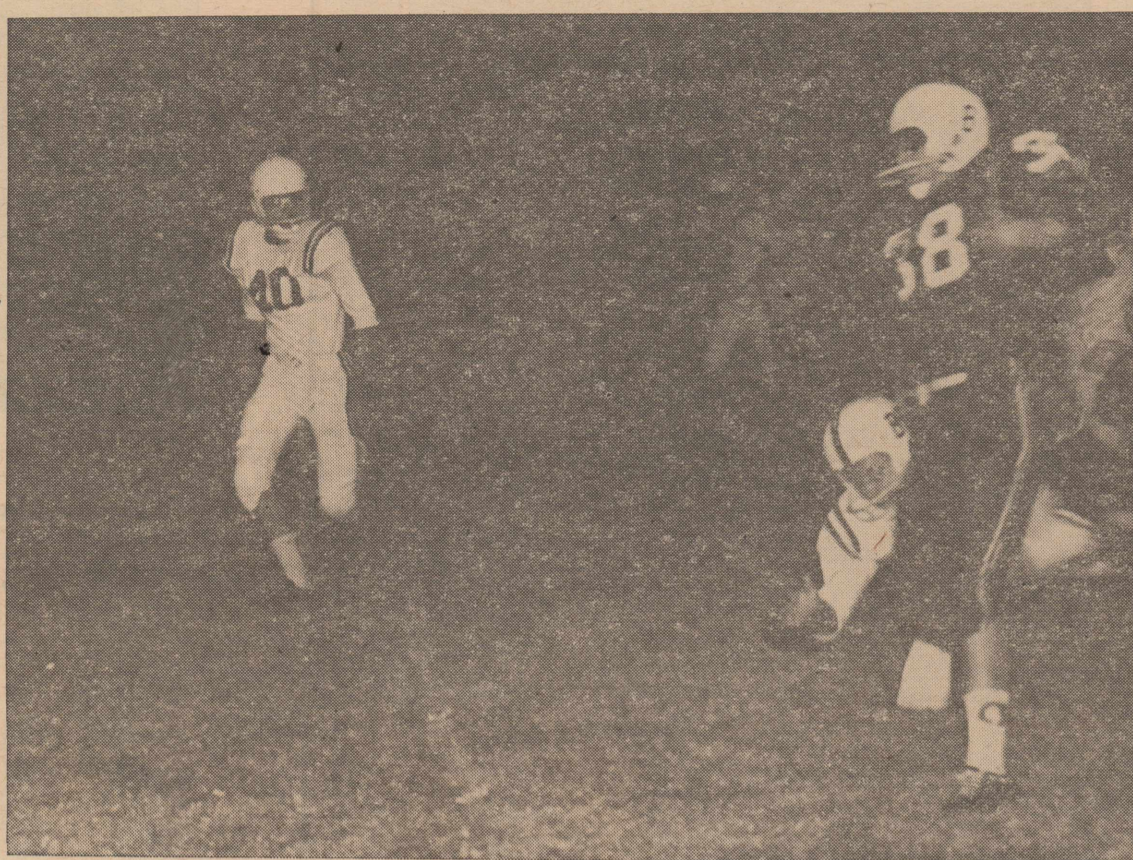
The Antelopes got their final touchdown with five seconds remaining on another long pass play.

Priest and Buchenau, with their long touchdown runs, racked up impressive yardage totals for the night. Priest gained 158 yards in 20 carries and Buchenau got 127 in eight tries.

Brown punted, the ball rolling dead at the Olton 40.

On first down, Priest moved off left tackle, found a big hole and raced all the way. Buchenau's extra point try was no good and Olton led, 6-0.

Abernathy took over at the 20 after Buchenau's kick-off rolled into the end zone.

On the first play from scrimmage, the Antelopes' Adams almost got away for a score, Adams broke into the clear at the 35, but Mustang End Jimmy Lawson swept across the field and nailed the Antelope at the 40.

This time the play covered 36 yards as Priest, the last man between the Antelopes and pay dirt, stopped Ritchey at the 12.

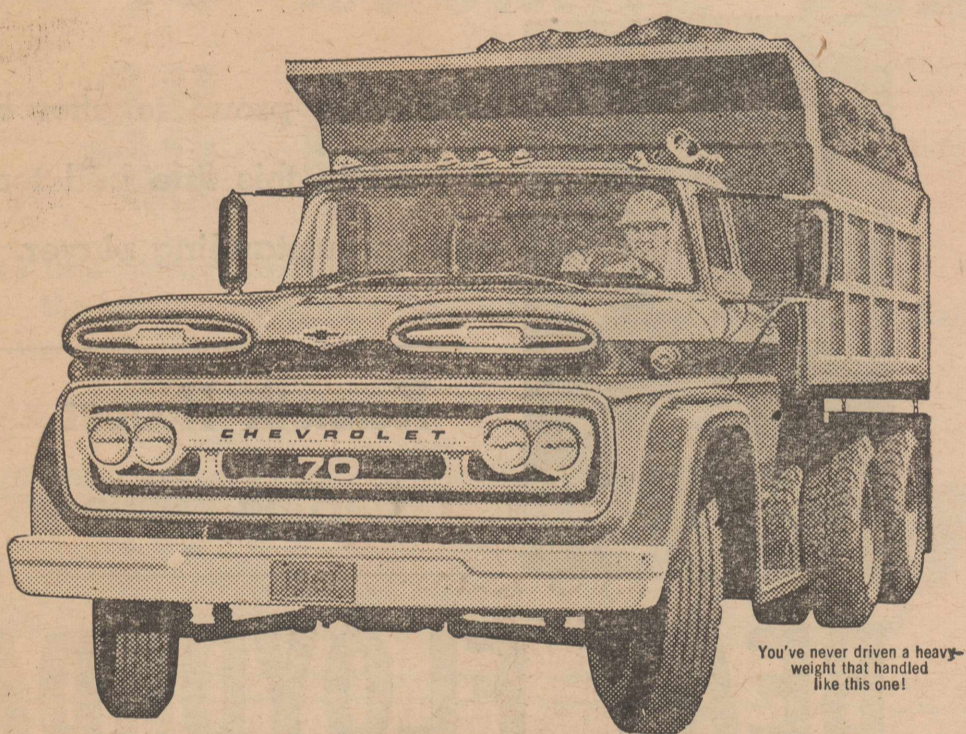

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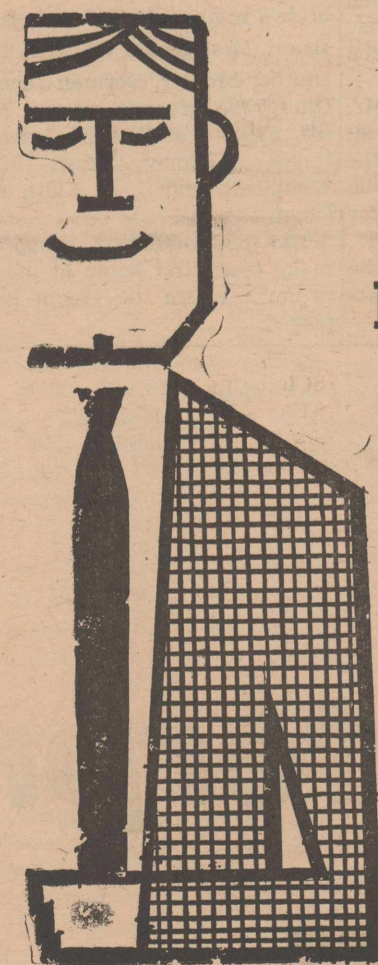
