



## Schools Take Precautions

### Diphtheria Shots Urged In Olton Area

Immunization against diphtheria was urged for residents here this week in an effort to lessen chances of an area outbreak reaching Olton.

As another precautionary measure, school officials both here and at Hart announced that all children must present certificates of immunization against the disease before re-entering school next Monday.

Warnings were issued as Plainview diphtheria outbreak continued unchecked. As of Tuesday, 63 persons had been struck there since Nov. 2. The outbreak claimed its first fatality Sunday as a 3-year-old Plainview girl died of the disease.

Fifty-one of the Plainview cases have been reported since Dec. 16. Two cases of the malady were reported last Friday at Dimmitt. Through Wednesday afternoon, no cases

had been reported in Olton. Joe Harper, superintendent of Olton schools, said that no child will be admitted to classes Monday without first presenting a certificate of immunization against diphtheria.

"Anyone who comes to school without a certificate must report to the school nurse before being admitted to class," Harper said.

At Hart, Supt. Paul Kennedy said the school board had approved the policy requiring certificates at a special meeting Wednesday morning.

Hundreds of diphtheria shots have been given here in the past week. In some cases, those who received shots did not pick up immunization certificates. These may be obtained by requesting them from local physicians.

# Weather, Elections, Sports Top '60 News

## Cotton Harvest Beats '59 Total

Weather, crops, politics, football and progress topped the news in the Olton community in 1960.

The weather went all sorts of ways in 1960, bringing snow in January, 14-inch rains in July, hail in August and October and snow again in mid-December.

But the big story, weather-wise, was a terrifying tornado which struck the Sunnyside community in April, killing three persons and injuring more than 30.

On the political scene, headlines finally read, in June, "A Mayor, A Mayor, A Mayor, At Long, Long Last, A Mayor."

This was after a special election in January, in which voters wrote in the name of Carl Hooper, who turned down the job. And it was after another vote in April which named Lefty Hollingsworth, who was forced to resign in May following a severe heart attack.

In June, a unique city election was held. There was no campaigning and no candidates. Voters wrote in the name of Major James, and he has served since.

On the farm front, the big news was the amount of cotton ginnings at the end of the year. Approximately 36,000 bales had been weighed in at the six ginning firms serving the Olton area.

This total topped 1959 ginnings by almost 3,000 bales. As for sports, the Olton Mustangs surprised even the home town fans as they won 11 straight games on the gridiron before falling to Denver City in a regional clash.

Olton residents took a progressive step in September with the approval of an \$80,000 bond election designed to finance the city's portion of about 70 blocks of paving.

By months, here's a summary of what happened in Olton during 1960:

**JANUARY**—Six inches of snow blanketed Olton the first week in January; Carl Hooper won the mayor's post by a landslide write-in vote, but immediately announced: "I won't serve"; Olton FFA Chapter won seven firsts at the Amarillo Stock Show; Emmett Burrows was hired as new police chief to succeed Floyd Cavin; Precinct 1 commissioner's race took on interest as possibly the county's best.

**FEBRUARY**—John Wayne Hair, a mighty mite at 130 pounds, made the All-American football prep team as a halfback; M. T. James Jr. was named Olton's "Citizen of the Year"; Sharon Smith won the Enterprise Award as Home-maker of the Year; G. T. Sides was named president of ORC; Three outstanding Olton farmers, Don Spain, E. C. Jones and Robert Struve, won honors from the county's Soil Conservation District.

**MARCH**—Owen Norfleet took the reins of Olton State Bank as D. M. Granbery stepped down; Jerry Mathis led all entries in the annual stock show as he exhibited two grand champions; Dick Whiteley was named OCCA manager; Olton youngsters swept top honors at the county stock show; Paving was determined Olton's biggest need at a community clinic; Judith Chester was named Lions

## Lamb County In Fiscal 1960..

# Retail Trade Healthy

(Special to the Enterprise)

NEW YORK, Dec. 19.—How was business in Lamb County in the last fiscal year?

According to a new, nationwide survey, just made public, retail activity locally was at a healthy level right through the first half of 1960.

With a majority of the workers getting bigger incomes, personal expenditures were high.

The survey, covering every part of the United States, is for the twelve months ending June 30, 1960. It was compiled by the Standard Rate and Data Service on the basis of data gathered from national, state and local sources.

It shows that retail business in Lamb County reached a gross figure of \$31,260,000 in the year.

This was in direct contrast to the experience in some other areas of the county where there was considerable unemployment and, consequently, a large drop in business.

With their \$31,260,000 volume, retailers locally accounted for .0143 per cent of the nation's business, states the SRDS report. It was more than

their quota since the county's population is only .0122 per cent of the national.

Sales strength was noted in most groups of stores, but especially in those selling children's clothing and shoes, drugs, household equipment, food and other supplies that reflect the fact that the birth rate has been high and that there are more youngsters around.

Most of the confident spending by Lamb County residents

stemmed from the fact that personal incomes, by and large, held up well.

The report shows that local earnings, after allowing for tax deductions, amounted to \$45,-834,000 in the year, as against \$40,774,000 in fiscal 1959.

It was at the average rate of \$7,207 per household, which is more than was available in the rest of the United States, \$6,-396 per household. In the State of Texas it was \$5,823.

## Rural Phone Installations Are Delayed

Saunders indicated that some 400 poles were toppled in the wake of the ice and snow storm in the Hobbs area alone. Lovington and Taum were isolated from long distance service, making it necessary for the company to move all available construction crew personnel into that area to restore service.

The emergency crews included personnel from the Littlefield plant area, thus creating a work stoppage on construction of lines which will provide service to the rural residents mentioned above.

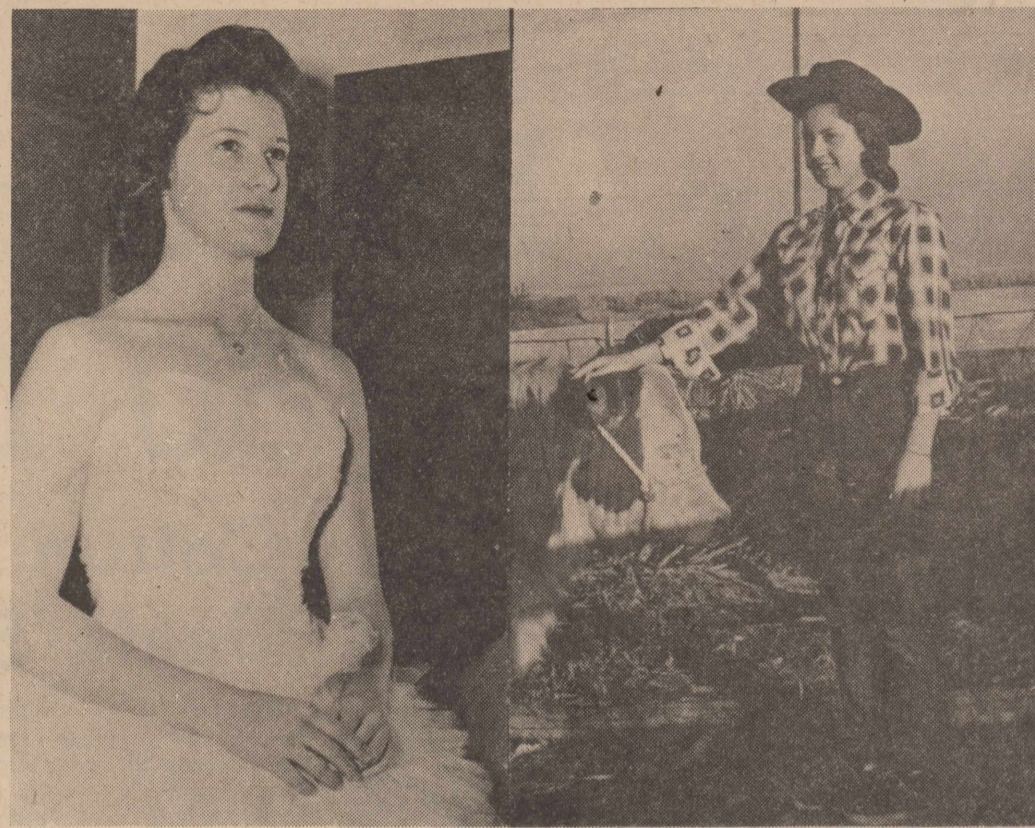

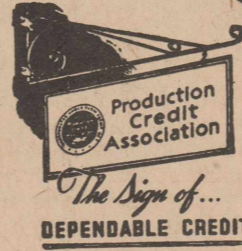

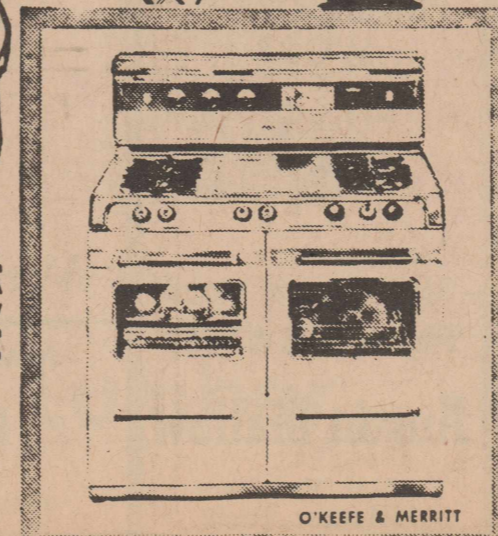

JUNE--Major James was elected mayor; Joe Turner was elevated to high school principal after Don Waldrip resigned; A. J. Spain won the county commissioner's race in precinct 1; Troy Martin announced sale of the Enterprise to Bill Turner; Ed Workman was named best all-around collegiate cowboy in the nation.

JULY--Cheryl Poteet was named Miss ORC for 1960; Heavy rains, totaling 14 inches in a five-day period, struck Olton; Walter Bryan was named head football coach to succeed Joe Turner.

AUGUST--Hall-Sides team was champion of the Little League; Inch-wide hail struck hard at a 9-mile strip north of Olton; Andy Andrew won the ORC golf tournament; H. L. Dennis, Olton contractor, won a court fight to keep a building housing Dennis Builders Supply where it stands; Paving election was set for Sept. 17.

SEPTEMBER--The first cotton and grain of the year rolled in, with Royce McFadden bagging the first bale and R. W. Huckabee bringing in the first bale and R. W. Huckabee bringing in the first load of grain; Lamesa and Wilson exhibitors took the top prizes in the fourth annual Olton Shetland Pony Show; General Telephone Company asked for an increase in phone rates; \$80,000 paving bond election approved by voters, 155-129; Olton gridders beat Petersburg, McCamey, Springlake, Hale Center and Hereford (homecoming) to rack up a 5-0 record.
