Olton has a new city government. We are going to say right out that Lefty Hollingsworth was not the man we would have preferred for mayor.

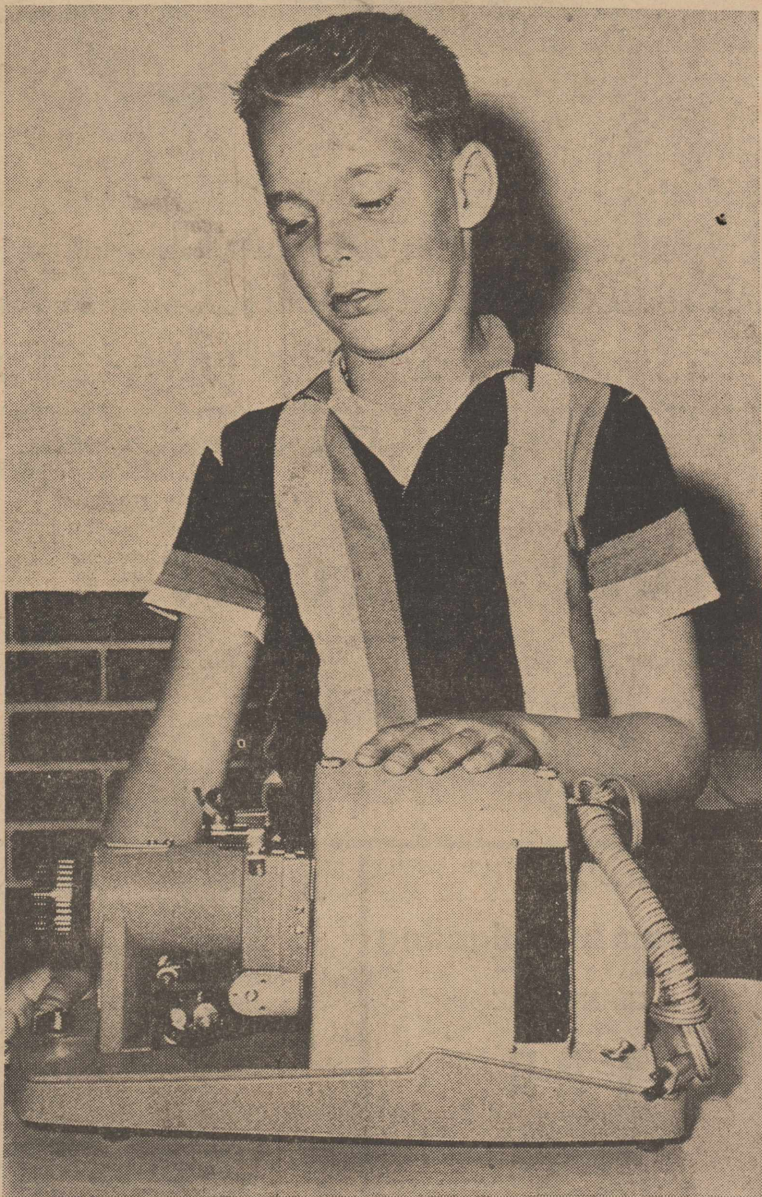

## O. R. Culwell Is Taken By Death Saturday

Oscar Ross Culwell, 85 years old, died at 6:50 o'clock Saturday evening at his home in Olton. He had been in failing health for some time.

Mr. Culwell had lived in Olton about a year.

Mr. Culwell was born Jan. 12, 1875 near Weston in Collin County. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. J. G. Culwell of Weston.

He was married Sept. 1, 1901 to Ela Adanson at Liberty Methodist Church in Weston. The Culwells were parents of seven daughters and three sons. A daughter preceded him in death.

Mr. Culwell farmed in Collin County until 1905 when he moved to Rows in Donley County. Later he moved to the new townsite of Hedley.

Mr. Culwell built the third house in Hedley. A daughter, Mrs. W. L. Hilton, was the first child born in Hedley. He farmed and operated a grocery and clothing store for 38 years in Hedley.

He became a member of the Methodist Church in 1919 during the ministry of Rev. Cal C. Wright. Mr. Culwell served as a steward of the First Methodist Church in Hedley and also was a trustee of Hedley Public Schools for a number of years.

He was active in civic affairs of his community. In 1939, he and

# Hollingsworth Nudges James In Olton Mayoralty Vote Tuesday

## Eleven Votes Separate Candidates; Heaviest Ballot In Olton History

Lefty Hollingsworth is mayor again. Hollingsworth nosed out Major James in a photo finish in the four-man mayoralty race in city elections here Tuesday. It was the heaviest turn-out for a city election in the town's history. Election officials said 441 votes were cast.

Here is how the balloting went in the mayoralty election. Hollingsworth led with 173 votes. James was second with 162 votes. Basil Sherman received 89 votes and Edd Hestand was fourth with 17 votes.

## Chamber Group Will Circulate Paving Petition

Members of the Olton Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture civic affairs committee will begin circulating a petition in the near future calling for a paving bond election.

Head of the civic affairs committee is Dr. Basil Johns.

Decision to circulate the petition was made Tuesday at a meeting of the Chamber board of directors. The petition will be presented to the city council.

At the board meeting Tuesday, Emmett Harper, president, reported the Chamber is checking into the possibility of obtaining a new post office building for Olton.

Ever popular Carroll Cox polled a smashing victory in the race for council. He received 300 of the 441 ballots cast.

Clovie Poteet swept into office by a comfortable margin. He received 257 votes. Lynn Fite won the other seat on the council in a down to the wire race with candidates W. A. Cure and Marshall Stone. Fite polled 189 votes; Cure, 182; and Stone, 180.

Charles McClain received 106 votes.

Other Big Vote Strangely enough, Hollingsworth was a candidate in the election which held the previous record for number of votes cast here. That was in 1955 when Hollingsworth was defeated by G. H. Bley on a write-in vote. In that election 553 votes were cast.

Maximum effort was made to get out the vote Tuesday. Several women volunteers called voters throughout the day to remind them that it was election day.

Heaviest Balloting Election officials said voting was heaviest between 9 and 10 o'clock in the morning and between noon and 1 o'clock. "It was pretty steady all day," declared Mrs. Era Maye Walthall, election clerk.

R. L. Chitwood acted as election judge in the absence of Howard Hall, who was unable to preside. His assistant was G. T. Sides.

Paving Issue New mayor and council members probably will take office Tuesday night of next week. Hollingsworth was elected to fill out the unexpired term of D. Y. Ray, who resigned in December. The current term expires in April of next year.

One of the first items of business confronting the new council probably will be the fate of a proposed paving project which is being advocated by Olton Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture.

Hollingsworth is a former mayor of Olton, having served in that office three terms. A. D. Adams has been acting mayor since Ray's resignation.

Cox, Fite and Poteet will replace Major James, Adams and T. M. Campbell on the council.
