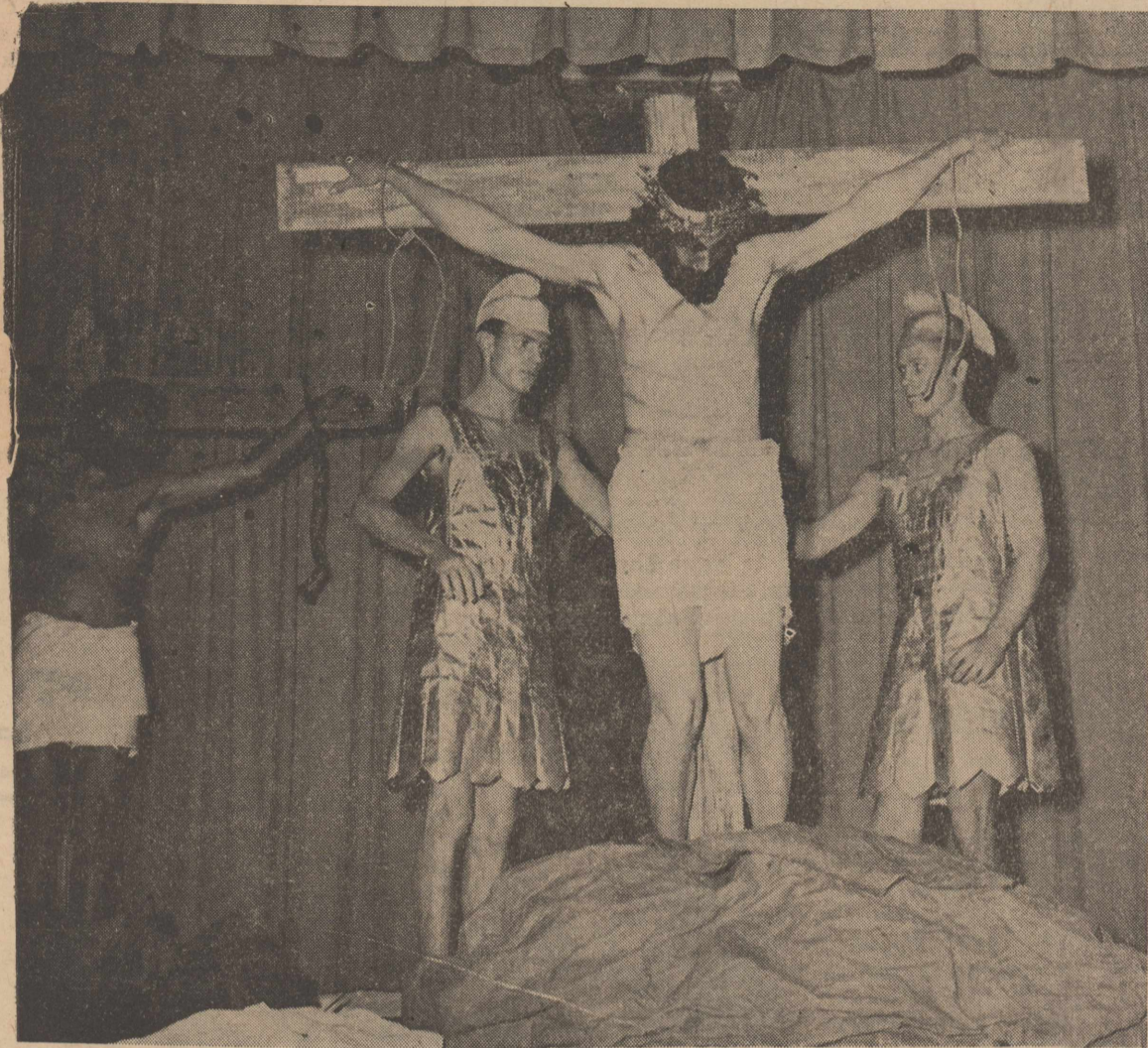

Chamber To Kick Off Drive For New Members Monday Morning

Paving, Vegetable, Industrial Plan Current OCCA Projects

Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture will kick off its annual membership drive with a breakfast at 6:30 o'clock Monday morning in the Ideal Cafe.

This information came this week from Dick Whiteley, Chamber manager.

Don Williams is chairman of the drive in town and Lacy Armstrong will be in charge of the efforts to gain new farm memberships.

Mr. Whiteley said workers will be divided into teams with team captains to report progress the following Monday.

The membership now totals 160. Mr. Whiteley said an effort will be made to boost the membership above the 200 mark.

Chamber budget last year was \$8,700. Chamber officials hope to increase the budget this year to \$10,000.00 or more.

Ambitious Program
The Chamber manager pointed out that the organization has embarked upon the most ambitious program of work to date. In the mill right now are plans to secure additional money crops for farmers, more paving in town and an industrial plant to be erected here.

These are only a few of the current projects of the Chamber.

Largely through efforts of Chamber members, contracts for growing of another 150 acres of cucumbers have been secured for Olton producers. This brings Olton's cucumber acreage well above the 500-acre mark. Clovis Poteet is chairman of the Chamber agricultural committee.

Paving Petition
A petition now is being circulated to be presented to the city council asking that a paving bond election be called. Proponents of the issue hope to see some 75 blocks of paving, curbing and guttering done here in the not too distant future.

Dr. Basil Johns is in charge of the Chamber's civic affairs committee which is circulating the petition.

In the meantime, the Chamber has received an inquiry from an industrial plant which might locate here. The Chamber's industrial committee has secured an acre of land for use by the plant.

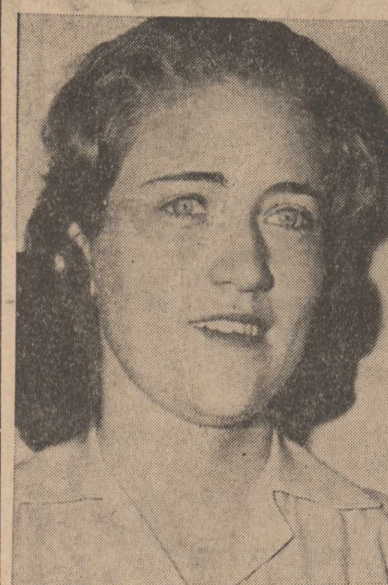
Industrial Committee
James Hall, chairman of the industrial committee, said more adjacent land is available if needed.

He said the firm has not divulged the nature of its finished products but company officials have told the West Texas Chamber of Commerce that it would employ 25 people immediately and as many as 125 by the end of the first year.

Although several other towns have an opportunity to try for the plant, Mr. Hall said that he feels that availability of land here will give Olton a better than average chance in securing it, all other factors being equal.

Mr. Whiteley said that he believes that the Chamber's record of accomplishments during the past year, plus current projects and future program of work is good recommendation for joining the Chambers ranks and helping to build Olton.
