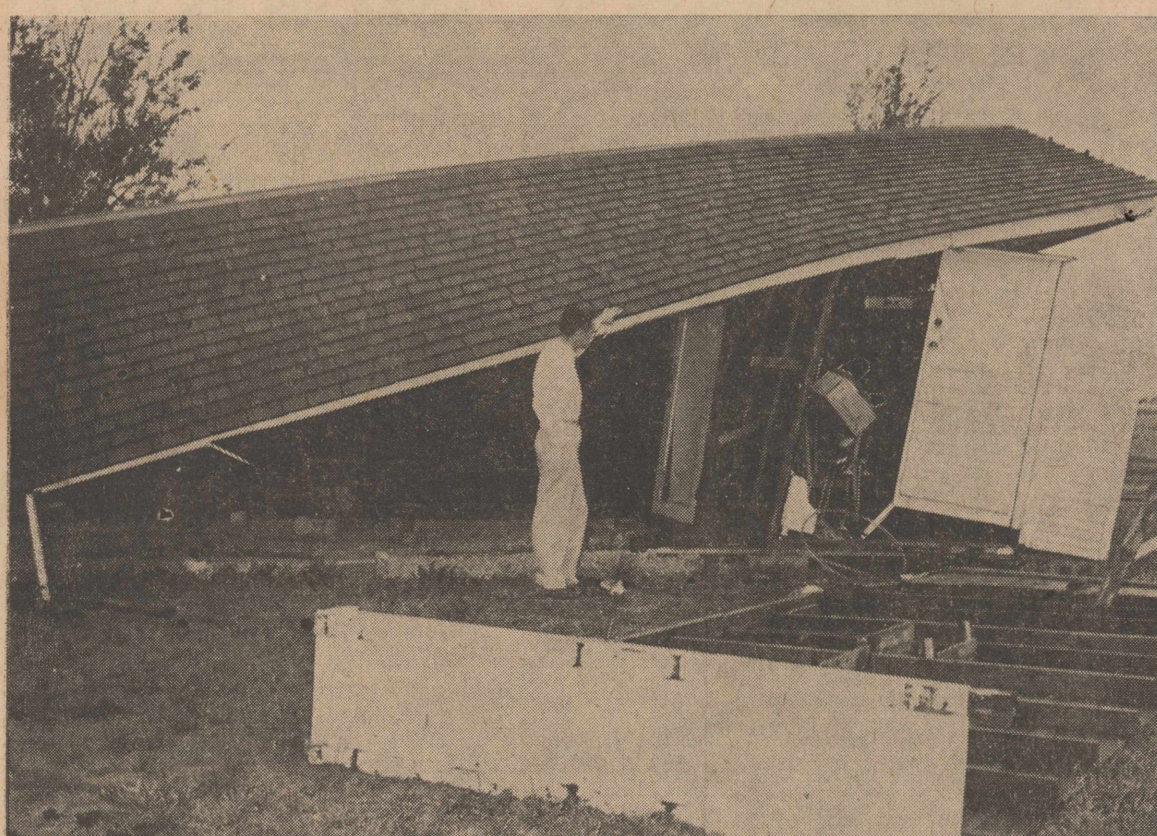

Paving Bond Election May Get Green Light At May City Meet

Chamber To Present Petition; City Dads Hint Early Action

Olton city council members in a called meeting Monday night discussed a proposed paving project, hired a water superintendent and building inspector and talked about a forthcoming lawsuit.

Council members discussed a proposed paving project at length. Councilman Fred Thompson displayed a city map which showed blocks which proponents of the project hope to see paved.

Mr. Thompson explained that the map was only tentative and that under proposed plans, paving would be constructed in any area of town where there is sufficient interest and support.

A Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture committee headed by Dr. Basil Johns is scheduled to present a petition to the council next month. The petition will request a paving bond election.

There was strong indication Tuesday night that an election will be called after the petition has been presented.

Re-Hire Davis
Forrest Davis was re-hired as city water superintendent. Mr. Davis resigned several weeks ago but decided to return to city employment.

David Maxey was retained as city building inspector and placed on a \$25 a month salary.

The council also voted to proceed with its suit against H. L. Dennis.

The city is seeking to force Mr. Dennis to move a building which it contends was illegally placed in the city's fire zone in May of last year.

Dennis Suit
Four out of five council members voted to continue with the suit. The vote came after City Attorney Frank Day asked for instructions in the matter.

C. A. Cox abstained from the vote. Mayor Lefty Hollingsworth votes only when there is a tie and in this instance did not have a vote.

Mayor Hollingsworth announced that the case is set for trial in the district court of Judge E. A. Bills May 12.

The building in question is a metal structure. It was moved from a site on Main Street in the block just off Highway 70 last May to a location just across the street from the I. B. Holt home in downtown Olton.

WOULD GROW QUALITY SWEET CORN

Produce Growers Form Association

Olton sweet corn growers have formed an organization known as Olton Produce Association and have set production of quality sweet corn as one of their foremost goals.

Contracts signed by growers give the association control of grading of corn produced by members. The association will have elected officers and will be controlled by its members.

Dick Whiteley said farmers here have agreed to produce some 200 acres of sweet corn. However, contracts have been signed for only 45 acres.

Mr. Whiteley said association contracts must be signed and arrangements made before a farmer may market through the association. He urged prospective growers who have not signed such contracts to drop by the Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture office at city hall and sign them.

He explained that planting dates must be staggered in order to have a continuous supply of sweet corn available for marketing throughout a two-month season.

A cucumber meeting will be held in Olton High School study hall at 8 o'clock next Tuesday night.

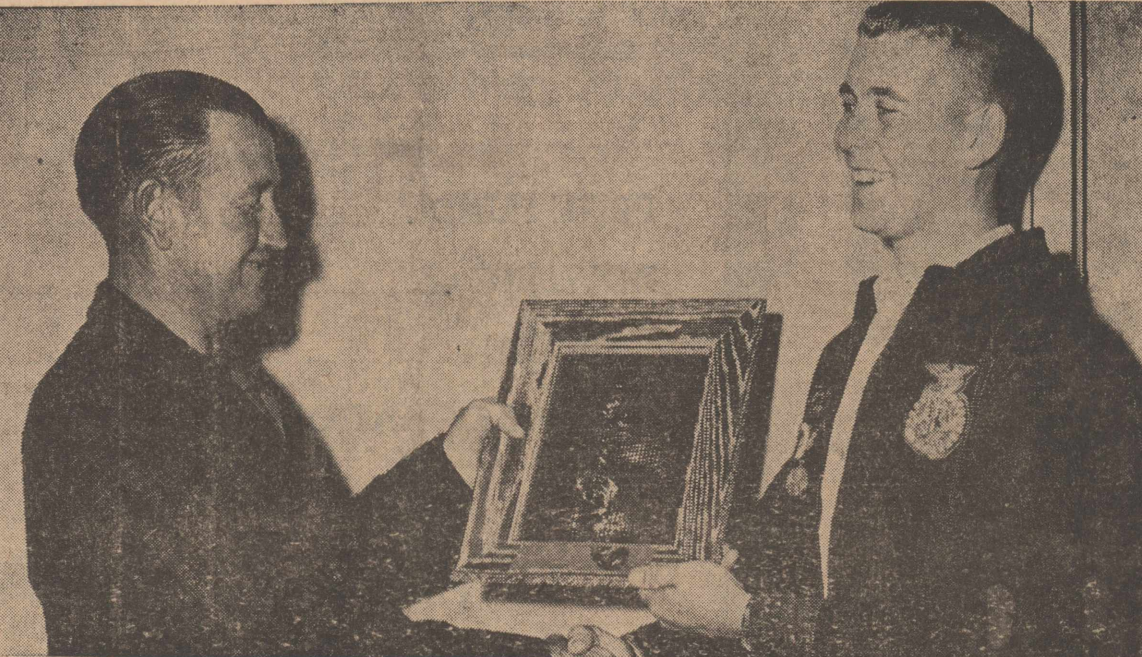

IRAN DOING BRISK TRADE WITH WEST GERMANS

Persian Engineer Is Observer Here

Here in Olton last week observing the operations of General Telephone Company of the Southwest was Ali Bahrainian of Tehran, Iran.

Ali is an electronics and telephone company engineer employed in Tehran by the Iranian government. Ali is 30 years old and is a graduate of the engineering school of the University of Iran.

Youngest of three children the Iranian engineer is the son of an import-export merchant.

Ali was accompanied on a tour of the Olton area by Bob Saunders, district superintendent for General Telephone.

The young Iranian said he is a direct descendant of Persians who inhabited Iran 6,000 years ago.

He reports that Iran is doing a brisk business with West Germany. He said his country has made many huge purchases from the Germans in recent years.

He specifically mentioned dial telephones and buses. Bus sys-

tems as well as telephone systems are government owned in Iran.

The country is ruled by a Shah and a parliament. The Shah obtains his title by birth while the parliament is elected by the people.

Iran is a key country in the world game of chess for spheres of influence. The oil rich country boasted one of the largest refineries in the world at Abadan on the Persian Gulf during World War II days.

Chief Explains Hart Fire Alarm Siren System

Firechief Claude Cox this week explained methods by which fires may be reported and various warning sounded by the fire siren.

A fire may be reported by pressing a button located at the rear of the fire station. The button is outside the building, about five feet off the ground.

The person reporting a fire should remain at the station until a fireman arrives so firemen can learn the location of the fire.

If a phone is available, a fire may be reported by calling any member of the fire department, preferably the firechief.

Here are some signals given by the siren. One steady blast indicates a tornado in the vicinity. Two steady blasts signify a practice run or regular fire meeting. Three steady blasts signifies a tornado alert.

A series of short blasts is given for fire. All residents of Hart who have storm cellars have been asked to report their locations to Chief Cox. They will be plotted on a city map so that if a tornado should ever hit Hart, rescue parties may locate them quickly. This could save lives as people might be trapped in cellars by debris.

Hart fire department recently purchased a portable public address system. The auxiliary equipment may be heard for a mile or more and will be used in event of power failure.

Two Fires At Hart Saturday

Hart Fire Department answered calls to a grass fire and to a pick-up fire Saturday of last week.

A grass fire broke out at the Claude Cox farm on the draw at about 7:30 o'clock. There was no damage.

The pick-up, which belonged to H. D. Smith, caught fire at H & S Produce west of Hart. It was being filled with butane. It was destroyed.

Slope Land Wastes Water Says HP Group

One of the most wasteful practices in the use of irrigation water is applying this water to land having slopes of 1-3 percent with the rows running down the slope. To illustrate this fact, water studies are being conducted at the High Plains Research Foundation comparing water usage on sloping land to a benched area of same acreage.

An 8-row bench 726 feet in length and two areas of similar dimensions running down the slope were selected for this study. During preplant irrigation, 55,000 gallons or 4.6 inches of irrigation water were applied to the bench. This same number of gallons was applied to one of the sloping areas, but 12,800 gal. or 1.06 inches were lost in run-off, and the moisture was not sufficient.

On the remaining sloping area, irrigation water was applied until the soil was sufficiently moist. To obtain this moisture, 108,000 gallons or 9 inches had to be pumped with 30,300 gallons or 2.5 inches run-off.

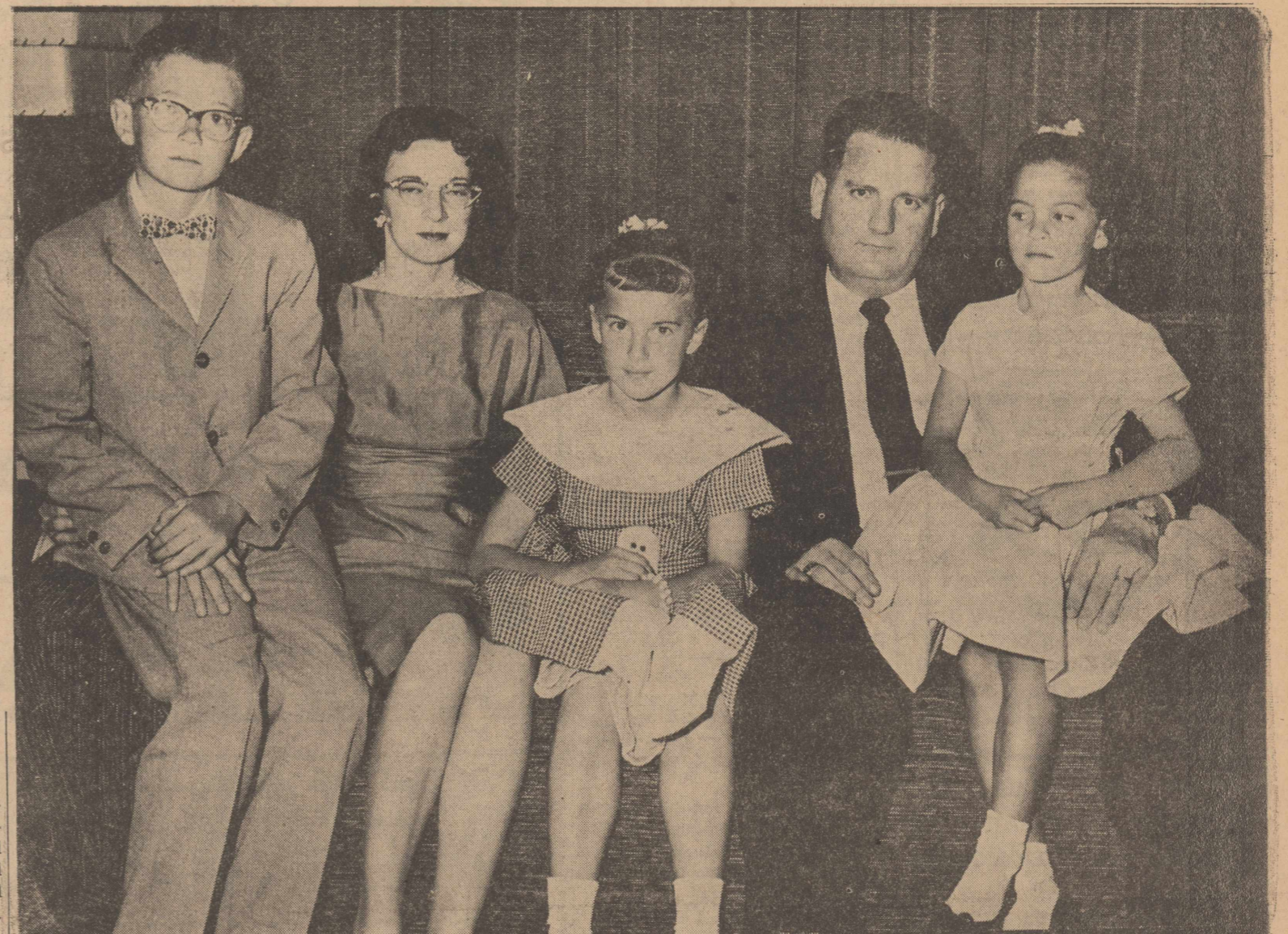
