YOUNGSTER TOOK TO MUSIC AT 11 MONTHS

Earth Sends Budding Little Miss Mozart Here To Study

Mrs. Tom Stansell has an unusual piano student, Vicki Lynn Watkins, of Earth. Vicki is three years old and she plays the piano by note and ear.

Vicki is the only child of Mr. and Mrs. S. M. Watkins. Her father is employed by the High Plains Building Company in Amarillo. Vicki has curly blonde hair and brown eyes.

This young piano student has taken piano lessons from Mrs. Stansell for six months. Mrs. Stansell tried to discourage Vicki's parents from beginning her piano lessons when she was so young. But Vicki could play only one song, "Mary Had A Little Lamb" and she played this song almost continually. Out of self defense, her parents wanted Vicki to take lessons so there would be more variety in the music in their household.

Also, Vicki was very eager to begin her study of music. Vicki first wanted a piano when she was two years old. Mr. and Mrs. Watkins gave her the largest toy piano they could find that year for a Christmas present.

The little blonde-haired lassie was disappointed when she found the toy piano under the Christmas tree. Vicki told her

parents she wanted a "real" piano.

Vicki's parents bought her a "real" piano before her third birthday. Vicki said, "Now I'm ready for my lessons." (What she really meant to say was, "Now I'm ready for my recital.")

Mrs. Stansell gives Vicki two lessons a week in the Watkins home. Each lesson is fifteen minutes long. Mrs. Stansell says that Vicki sits perfectly still during her lessons and is very attentive.

After Vicki took her first music lesson, she said, "Now I'm ready for my recital." (What she really meant to say was, "Now I'm ready for my recital.")

Vicki has been in two recitals under the supervision of Mrs. Stansell. These recitals were given in the auditorium of the Springlake school.

Vicki's first recital piece was "Mary Had A Little Lamb," the first song she learned to play. Her second recital piece was a waltz entitled, "Fairies and Elves." This waltz is ten measures long and Vicki uses both hands on this number.

Vicki can play approximately fifteen melodies that Mrs. Stansell has taught her. She has learned to play quite a few songs by herself. One of the songs that she learned to play by herself is "This Old Man." She learns more quickly to play songs that have words to them.

Mrs. Stansell says that Vicki has very good use of her hands for a three year old child. When she colors pictures with crayons, she stays within the outline of the object she is coloring.

Vicki could hum "Mary Ann" when she was 11 months old. By the time she was fifteen months

old she could sing parts of some songs.

During a seige of bad weather, Vicki cautioned her piano teacher about the icy streets. One night, she insisted on escorting Mrs. Stansell to her car, to make sure that Mrs. Stansell got to the car alright.

Vicki is a charming child—a very nice little person to know.

ORC Members Vote 'No' On Building Plan

Members of Olton Recreation Center Thursday night of last week voted down a proposal to build a \$17,500 club house at the center, located two miles south of Olton.

The vote was 20 for and 27 against. Although the number attending the meeting was only about a third of the total membership, Center officials said they felt that the trend in the vote was sufficient to forestall a building program at ORC in the near future.

To have carried out the building plan, it would have been necessary to increase the membership dues at least \$2.00 a month in order to pay off the debt incurred.

Four men are seeking the office to be left vacant when the term of Don Bryant expires December 31. They are C. M. Moss, H. A. "Alvin" Hysinger, Alva J. Spain and Delmer Givens.

Another hotly contested race is that for state representative, 96th District.

Two school teachers are trying to unseat Jesse Osborn of Muleshoe, incumbent. They are Clarence Hamilton of Springlake and Bill Shelby of Hart.

Mr. Hamilton is a classroom teacher and farmer in the Springlake community. Mr. Shelby is high school football coach at Hart.

Bill Sheehan, incumbent, is opposed for district attorney this year by Jack Young of Muleshoe. Mr. Sheehan lives at Friona.

Opposing incumbent Dick Dyer for sheriff this year is Loy Dalton of Littlefield. Herbert Dunn is running unopposed for re-election as county tax assessor-collector as is Curtis R. Wilkinson, incumbent, for county attorney.

The race for attorney-general gets the spotlight in the statewide picture while Gov. Price Daniel is expected to be a shoo-in over his opponent James Cox. Waggoner Carr and Will Wilson are battling it out for attorney-general.

Ballot At School

Olton voters will ballot in the lobby of the H. P. Webb Elementary School Building. Election Judge Eldon Franks said the polls will open at 8 o'clock Saturday morning and will close at 7 o'clock Saturday evening.

Bob Chitwood will be assistant election judge this year. Clerks and tabulators will include Calvin Horn, Joe Turner, Mrs. Marshall Campbell, Mrs. Marshall Stone, Mrs. W. A. Cure, Mrs. B. C. Cooner, Mrs. Eldon Franks and Mrs. Ray Slatten.

Precinct Convention

Democratic Precinct convention will be held in city fire station at 4 o'clock Saturday afternoon. Precinct Chairman G. T. Sides said that a new ruling this year requires that to be eligible to participate in the precinct convention this year a voter must have voted in the primary and have his poll tax so marked.

"We're hoping for a big crowd this year," Mr. Sides declared. He pointed out that it is the average person's only opportunity to participate in the selection of a Presidential candidate for his party.

Hob Thomas' Kin Killed

A brother and a sister of H. D. Thomas, Lubbock, who formerly lived at Olton, were killed in a car-truck crash at Plantersville Easter Sunday.

Noel L. Thomas and Mrs. C. A. Hayles, Mineral Wells, were killed in the crash which also took the lives of another couple. The four had been to Houston to visit relatives.

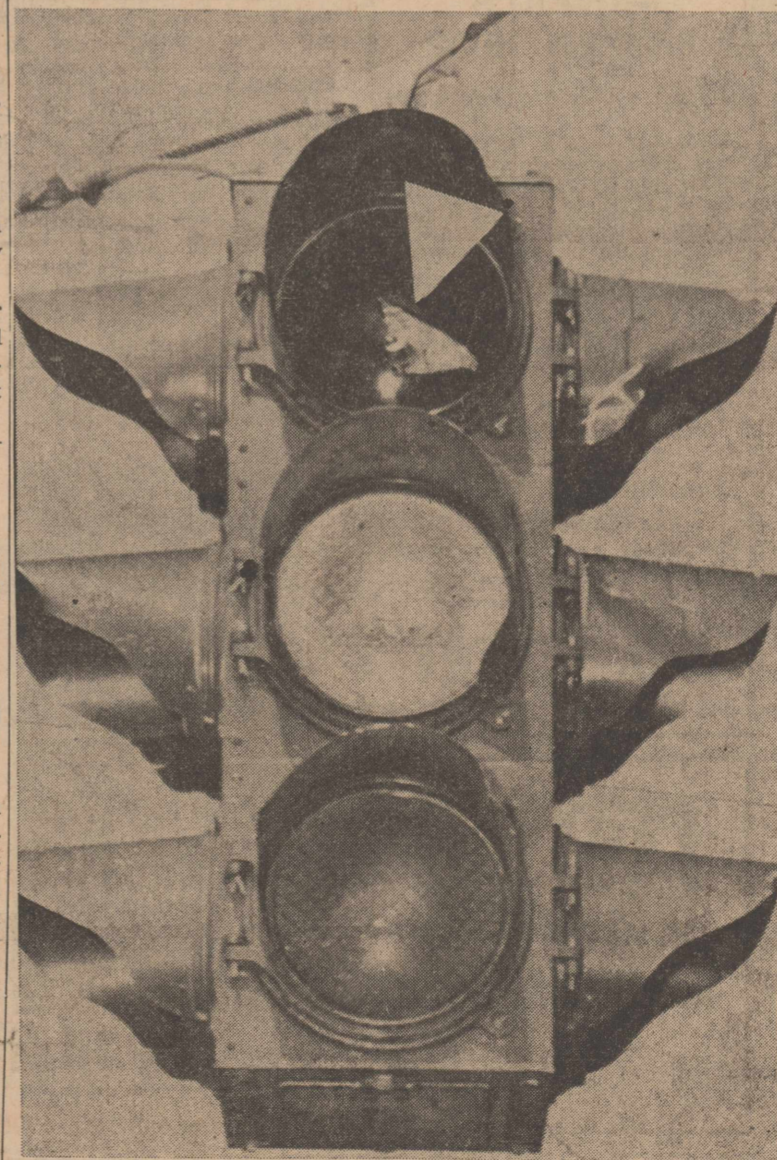
Mr. Thomas said the four were occupants of the car. They were killed instantly.

Some businessmen are so afraid of losing a customer and his

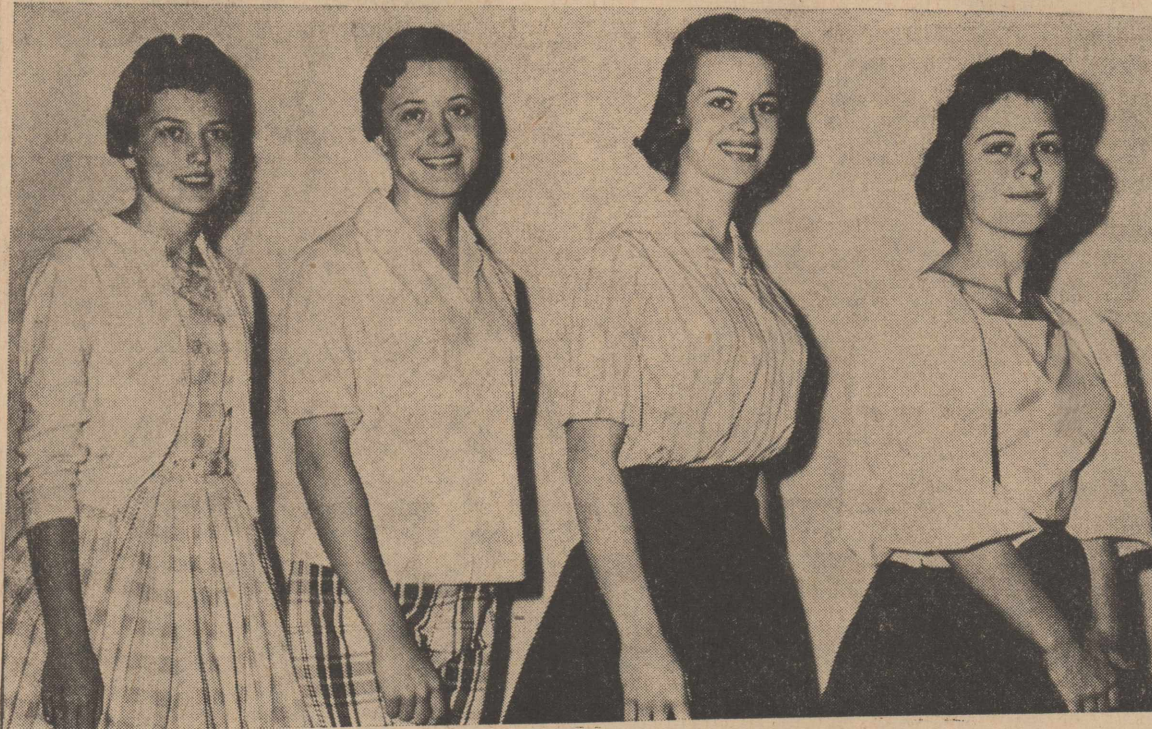
