Mrs. Jones is the former Miss Pauline Hipp. She moved to Olton with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Hipp, and family in 1932. She is a 1933 graduate of Olton High School.

She attended college in Oklahoma and then business college in Lubbock. She married a well-known Olton High School athlete, J. C. Jones.

Mrs. Jones is the mother of twin daughters, Glenda Gay and Linda Kay, 8 years old, and two sons, John Paul and Roy Neal. John Paul is a sophomore at Levelland Junior College. He was an athlete

during his high school years and was considered a fine student citizen.

He was on the student council three years, served as council president and was "Mr. OHS" his senior year. He won many awards for his FFA work during his high school career.

Roy Neal is a senior at Olton High School this year. He, too, has been an outstanding citizen. His achievements in FFA work have been especially significant. He was named "Mr. FFA" this year.

"Pauline was left with the great task of being both father and mother to her children with the passing of J. C. in 1956," Mrs. Raymond Carson, long-time friend, noted in an article praising Olton's "Mother of the Year."

Olton Club Wins District Trophy

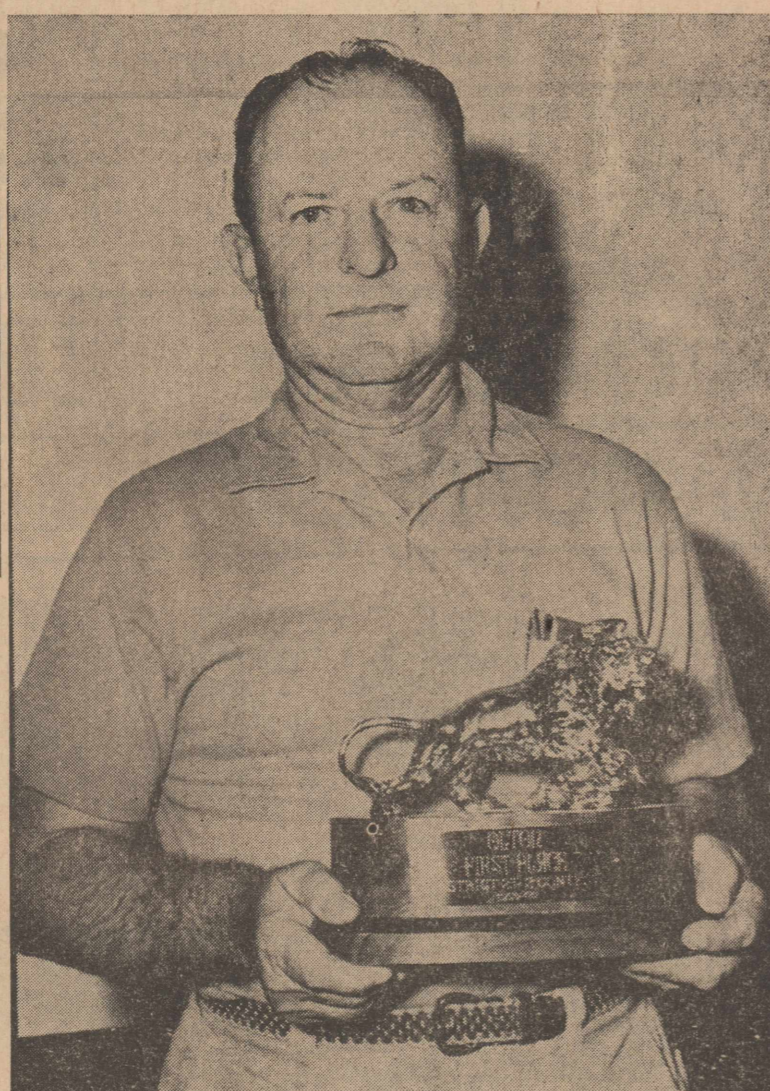
Olton Lions Club received the district membership and attendance trophy for the year, last weekend.

CADETS PROCLAIMED BEST BAND IN AREA

Cadet Band Gets Two Top Ratings

Olton's Cadet Band was judged best in the university interscholastic league music contests held Saturday at Monterey High School in Lubbock.

The band is made up of sixth and seventh grade students. It received a Division I rating in both concert performance and sight reading.

The Olton Cadet Band was the only band in Class C, junior high schools with fewer than 500 enrollment, to win a Division I for concert performance.

Decision of the judges was unanimous. The judges were Floren Thompson of Eastern New Mexico University; G. T. Gilligan of Kermit; Leonard Haug of the University of Oklahoma; and Glen Hatch of Wichita Falls.

Entries, other than Olton, were Post, Seagraves, Littlefield, Floyd and Brownfield.

Olton Cadet Band was the only band made up of sixth and seventh grade students. The others included eighth grade students. By winning a Division I in both categories, Olton won a special award.

The contest ended the season for Olton bands.

"The music department has had a very successful year," declared Band Director Dick Bentz.

A week ago the Mustang Band won one of two Division I ratings given at Levelland.

CONVENTION VOTES DOWN PARTY LOYALTY RESOLUTION

LBJ All The Way In Olton Precinct

Lyndon Johnson won support of the Olton precinct convention Saturday afternoon as those attending gave unanimous approval to a "Johnson for President" resolution introduced there.

G. T. Sides presided as permanent chairman over the convention which saw record attendance for the Olton precinct. More than 40 persons turned out for the meeting.

The Johnson resolution was designed to assure the state's senior Senator the backing of the Texas

delegation in a bid for the Democratic nomination for the Presidency.

A party loyalty resolution introduced just before the close of the meeting was defeated by an overwhelming majority. The resolution called for delegates to the county and state conventions to take an oath to the Democratic nominee regardless of whom he might be.

Seven delegates to the county convention named Saturday were G. T. Sides, Troy Martin, Don Spain, Howard Hall, Mardema Ogletree, Hope Loveless and Buddy Hedges.

Alternates include Andy Stroebel, Marshall Stone, Eldon Franks, Elmer McGill, Major James, Russell Grimes and Ralph Glover.

The county convention will be held at 2 o'clock next Saturday afternoon in the district court room at Littlefield.

COMPANIES TO ACT AS ADVISERS

Council Retains Two Bond Firms

Olton city council Tuesday night accepted a petition calling for a paving bond election and hired an adviser to help prepare for the election.

The paving bond petition was presented by Dr. Basil Johns, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce civic affairs committee.

First of Texas Corporation and Eppler, Guerin & Turner, Inc., were employed as financial advisers for the city.

Representatives of those firms will lay necessary groundwork for calling of an election.

In prospect is a \$75,000 bond issue to be decided by the voters some time between now and September. City officials hope that paving can be done next year if the bond issue carries.

The bond issue is designed to pay the city's portion on some 75

blocks of paving, curbing and guttering.

In other action at the city council meeting, C. A. Cox asked that his dissenting vote on the H. L. Dennis suit be officially recorded in the minutes.

At the last meeting of the council, the governing body of the city voted four to one to proceed with its suit against H. L. Dennis. The city contends that Mr. Dennis moved a building into a city fire zone illegally and is seeking remedy in district court.

Following that meeting The Enterprise reported that Councilman Cox abstained on the vote. He instructed the city secretary Tuesday night to record his vote as a "no" vote on the matter.

The council Tuesday also heard a report from City Auditor James Adair.

Special Election Called June 7; Will Be Sixth Mayor In Six Months

Mayor Lefty Hollingsworth resigned Monday as an aftermath of a heart attack suffered Sunday.

Mr. Hollingsworth notified the city council in writing Tuesday afternoon. Stricken only a month after being elected the city's chief magistrate, Mr. Hollingsworth had presided over only one meeting since the April 5 election.

Olton has had five mayors and mayors pro tem during the past seven months.

City council members acted swiftly Tuesday night at a regular meeting of the governing body. They accepted Mr. Hollingsworth's resignation and called a special mayoralty election for June 7.

Call Election The June 7 ballot will be the third such election held here this year.

Olton's mayor merry-go-round started turning in December with the resignation of Mayor D. Y. Ray. After his resignation, A. D. Adams was named mayor pro tem.

A special election was held January 5. Carl Hooper was elected mayor by a write-in vote. He resigned without presiding over a single meeting.

Mr. Adams again was named mayor pro tem. Another election was called for April to be held in conjunction with the regular city election. Mr. Hollingsworth was named mayor.

With his resignation Tuesday, the city council appointed C. A. Cox mayor pro tem.

Stricken At Home

Mr. Hollingsworth was stricken about 10:30 o'clock Sunday morning at his home. A daughter, Mrs. Bob Gullett, said he was working in the attic at the time.

He was treated here and then rushed to Littlefield Hospital in a Parsons Funeral Home ambulance. Mrs. Gullett described her father's condition as "very serious" early this week.

Mrs. Gullett said her father had been suffering chest pains and a numb feeling of the arms for about a month.

Mr. Hollingsworth told the city council in his letter of resignation that his doctor insisted that his resignation was made imperative by the condition of his health.

Mr. Hollingsworth's name has been closely connected with local politics for almost 20 years. He is a well-known Lamb County figure.

HAMILTON BARRELS INTO RUN-OFF WITH OSBORN

Spain, Moss In Stretch; Young Defeats Sheehan

C. M. Moss and A. J. Spain moved into a run-off Saturday as they led a field of four in bids for the county commissioner post of Precinct 1.

Run-off election will be held June 4.

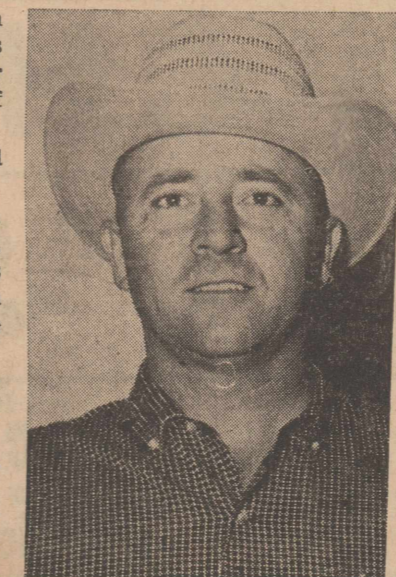
Moss led the pack with 477 votes. Spain polled 400; H. A. Hysinger, 195; and Delmer Givens, 91. This is a total vote from Olton, South Olton and Springlake which make up Precinct 1.

Voting at the Olton box was heavy. Election officials said more than 900 cast ballots.

Clarence Hamilton took the Olton box by a majority of more than three to one in the race for state representative. The Springlake school teacher wound up with 524 votes from the Olton box. Bill Shelby of Hart got 140 and Jesse Osborn received 160. Area-wise, Hamilton and Osborn are in a run-off for the state representative post.

Each candidate carried his home county by an overwhelming majority. Hamilton got a whopping 2,963 votes in Lamb County as compared to 1211 for Osborn and 388 for Shelby.

Osborn carried Bailey County 1397 as compared to 376 for Hamil-

ton and 290 for Shelby. Castor County gave Shelby 1060 votes whereas Osborn got 331 and Hamilton 263.

Jack Young polled 493 votes in his bid for district attorney. Incumbent Bill Sheehan received 336. Young carried the race over the district and will be the next district attorney.

Dick Dyer bested Loy Dalton 571 to 278 in the race for sheriff. Dyer won the battle 3379 to 1393 in the county.

Truitt Sides defeated Glen Exter 533 to 192 in the race for precinct chairman of the Democratic Party. Running for county offices unopposed were Lindsey Williams,

county surveyor; Herbert Dunn, county tax assessor-collector; Curtis R. Wilkinson, county attorney; and Pat Boone, Sr., Democratic chairman of Lamb County.

Olton voters favored Price Daniel 487 to 388 over Jack Cox in the gubernatorial race. Ben Ramsey handily defeated Don Yarborough for lieutenant governor, 560 to 287.

For attorney general, Waggoner Carr received 558 votes; Will Wilson, 281; and Robert Looney, 26. Lyndon Johnson was unopposed for U. S. Senator.

In the race for chief justice of the Supreme Court Robert W. Calvert received 435 votes and Robert G. Hughes 332. Clyde E. Smith and

Joe Greenhill were running unopposed for places on the supreme court.

For Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals W. T. McDonald received 290 votes; Lloyd Davidson, 256; and Jim Bowmer, 147. Ernest Thompson was unopposed for Railroad commissioner.

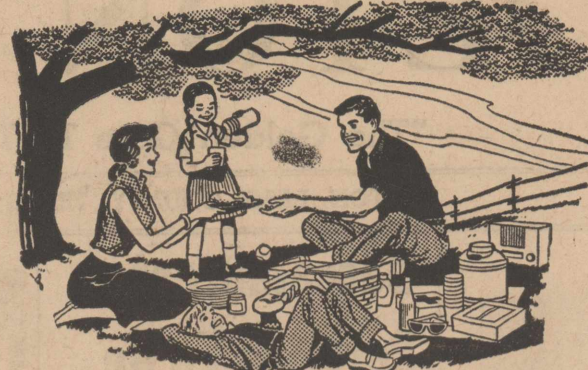
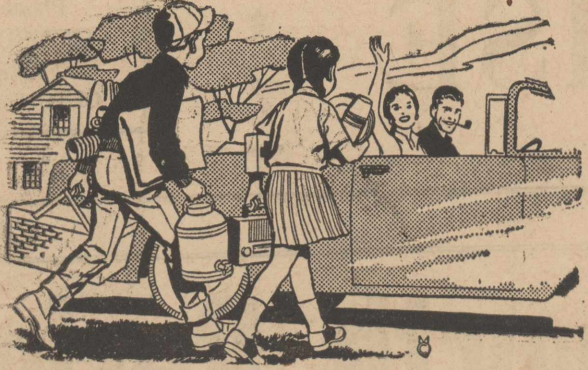
Robert S. Calvert received 468 votes and V. L. Ramsey 200 for comptroller of public accounts. Jesse James ran unopposed for state treasurer.

Bill Alcorn received 435 votes and Jerry Sadler 321 for commissioner of the general land office. John C. White ran unopposed for commissioner of agriculture.

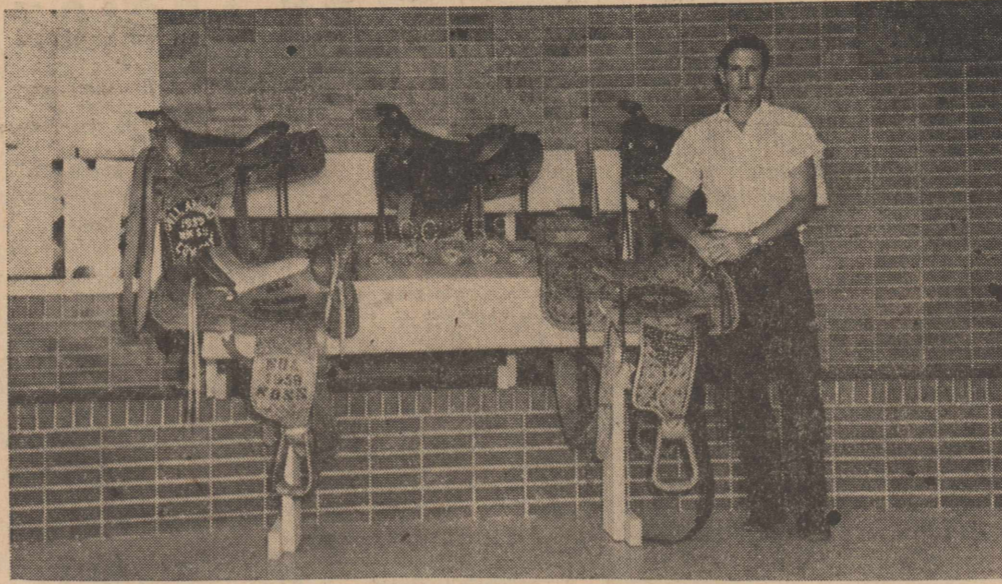

TRF Station Tests Corn This Year

Sixteen varieties of corn were planted on April 21 in the 1960 corn variety test at the High Plains Research Foundation. Dr. E. H. Collier, chief agronomist, stated. Both white and yellow selections were included in the test.

This is the fourth year that corn variety tests have been conducted at the Halfway Research Farm. Each year the number of varieties has been reduced through the elimination of those found to be unsuitable for the area. As many as 147 different varieties have been tested in one year.

The date of planting experiment on corn is also being continued. Early, mid-season, and late maturing varieties include two yellow and one white. In previous tests on both white and yellow corn, the late April and early May plantings resulted in higher yields than corn planted at later dates. Mid-September harvest of the early planted corn has resulted in decreasing

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

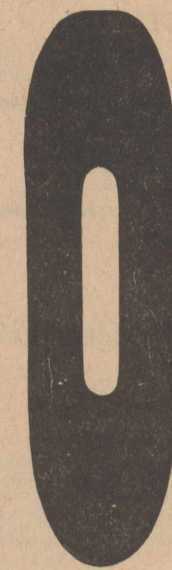
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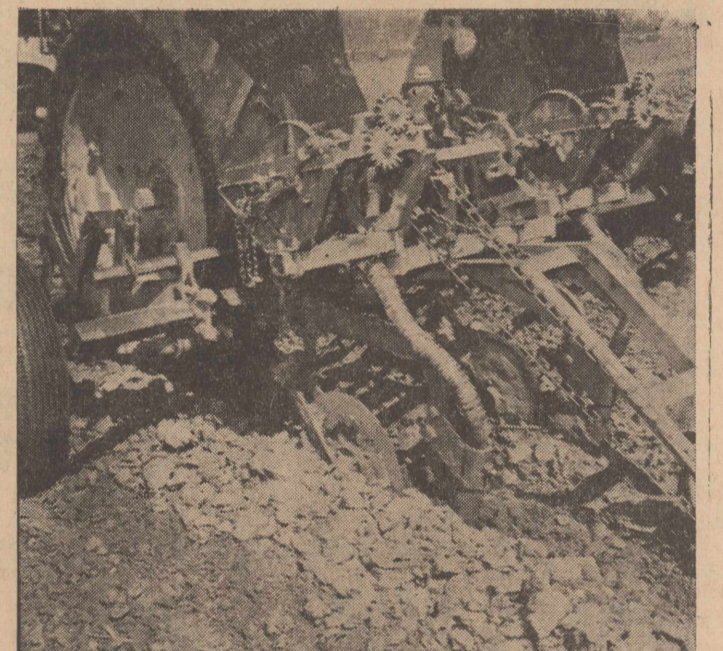
