ELECTION MAY BE WHOLLY WRITE IN

No Candidates; Deadline Looms

Candidates for mayor in Olton's special election set for June 7 have been conspicuous by their absence.

At mid-week no one had filed. Deadline for filing is Friday, June 3, a little more than a week away. City officials fear that voters may be faced with a blank ballot when election date rolls around two weeks from next Saturday.

It will be Olton's third special mayoralty election this year. In the first election, held in January, Carl Hooper was named on a write-in vote to replace Mayor D. Y. Ray who had resigned in December. Mr. Hooper resigned without having presided over a single meeting.

Lefty Hollingsworth led a field of four candidates in April but was stricken with a heart attack early this month. His doctor ordered him to resign.

Reeves Hiked At Littlefield

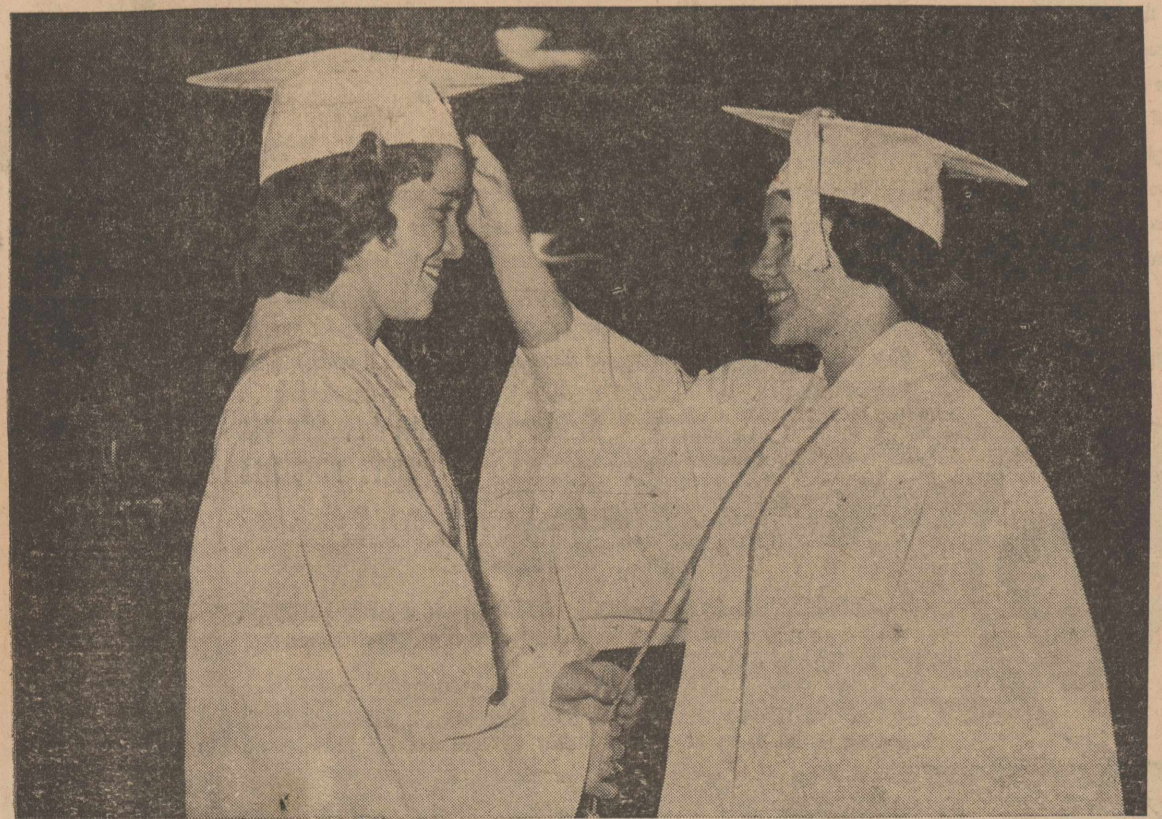
Glen Reeves, former high school principal here, has been named superintendent of schools at Littlefield to succeed Ralph Schilling.

RATED TOPS IN SOUTHWEST REGION

Olton's Workman Is Best In West

Edd Workman returned to Lubbock Christian College this week from the University of New Mexico Rodeo with the title of "Best All-Around Cowboy" in the Southwest-

tern Region in intercollegiate competition. At the Albuquerque Rodeo, he placed first in calf roping and bull riding and second in bareback riding.

The LCC sophomore from Olton won top individual honors this year in six of the seven regional college rodeos he entered and came out with first place in regional totals in four events: calf roping, bareback riding, saddle bronc riding and bull riding.

Workman received national recognition this week, when Sports Illustrated magazine carried a summary of his performance at the Hardin-Summons rodeo, along with his picture. Lubbock Christian College placed second in regional standing in National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association competition, with Sul Ross College of Alpine coming in first. Both schools are eligible to send their entire teams to the National Championship Rodeo to be held in Clayton, NM, June 16-18, when they will meet the top contenders from the three other NIRA regions.

In addition to his rodeo prize money, Workman this year has won three saddles, a suit, luggage, eight hats, three pairs of boots, 14 buckles and three other trophies. As a freshman at LCC last year, he took top individual honors in five out of the six NIRA rodeos, receiving a saddle at each rodeo. His brother Don received the title of "World Champion Bull Rider" in NIRA competition while a student at LCC in 1958.

Cotton Crop Off To Early Start; Farmers Complain Of High Wind

Thrip Attacking Young Plants; Many Growers Spray This Week

Elements and insects appeared to be ganging up on Olton's early cotton crop this week.

Cotton acreage planted neared the 100 percent mark here this week. However, some of the crop dried out and must be replanted. Elsewhere, farmers are frantically watering in an effort to bring up a stand.

High, dry winds were blamed for the most part with the fact some acreage has dried out and may not come up to a stand. There has been a little hail damage to young cotton east of town but this has been described as negligible.

Thrip has made its appearance in many fields. Some farmers this week already were spraying for the pesky insects.

ARCHIE SORLEY: Mr. Sorley said Tuesday that his 275 acres of cotton was up to a stand and already was under attack by thrip. Archie has been planting since April 27. He finished May 17. The Sorley farm is 6 miles southwest of Olton.

GENE CADE: Mr. Cade is a neighbor of Mr. Sorley. His cotton is up and he was thinking seriously of beginning spray operations at mid-week.

LEE SIMMONS: "I've got a pretty good stand," Mr. Simmons reported Tuesday. He said he hasn't noticed any thrip in his field but the wind has been hurting the cotton some.

KENNETH RAY: Mr. Ray lives east of Olton. He has some cotton up to a good stand, according to Mrs. Ray. Some other acreage has dried out and he is watering in an effort to get a stand.

JOHN MONTGOMERY: Mr. Montgomery farms 2 1/2 miles southwest of town. He said he expected to have a good stand by the middle of the week.

ELDON FRANKS: The Franks' farm is 6 miles north of Olton. He has about 95 acres up. Some of it is "skippy." He is watering some more acreage trying for a stand. Mr. Franks planted about May 9.

SPECK AIKMAN: Mr. Aikman farms just south of town. He has a good stand but the small plants are being attacked by thrip.

Mr. Aikman planted April 20. FRED HICKS: Mr. Hicks reports a good stand. He farms 2 miles east of Olton.

School Hires New Manager

Olton school system has employed a new business manager to succeed Rae Porter.

He is Norman Thomas. Mr. Thomas and family will move to Olton in about a month. No further details were available at press time this week.

City Uses Four Trucks In Clean-Up

Olton is much cleaner this week as an aftermath of a city-wide clean-up drive staged here Monday.

Participating in the clean-up were two city trucks and six men. Services of two trucks and seven men were donated through the Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture by various businesses and individuals.

Cleo Smith and Ed Thompson furnished trucks for the clean-up.

City dump grounds were cleaned up and smoothed out Friday of last week by city workmen and with use of a Lamb County maintainer.

The city sprayed Monday night for mosquitoes. Forrest Davis, city sanitation department, said his department has begun spraying trash barrels when they are emptied. He said this eliminates one breeding place for harmful insects.

The building will be 60 feet by 30 feet and will be equipped with a cooling tank 40 feet long, 10 feet wide and 4 feet deep. This tank will be used to take the field heat out of sweet corn before it is shipped.
