Among the farmers in the area whose crops were damaged were Eldon Franks, Elmo Bryant, G. T. Sides and many others. One insurance man here estimated the haled strip was about two miles wide, stretching from Sunnyside to Halfway.

Mr. Franks said the hail was fine and was driven by a "terrific" wind. He lost some 100 acres of cotton and 70 acres of sesame. He was re-planting the cotton this week.

Mr. Franks said about 1 1/2 inch of rain fell in about 20 minutes at his farm north of town.

Farmers say that cotton that has not been haled upon is not growing off well. They blame electrical storms and insects.

Foreign Students To Visit In Olton

Four foreign exchange students will visit Olton July 15, 16, and 17. They are male students attending colleges in the mid-western part of the United States.

T. Kirupairajah, a track star from Ceylon who is attending Miami University at Oxford, Ohio, is one of the students. Others that will visit Olton are Maneouchehr Movasseghi from Teheran, Iran, who attends Macalester College in Saint Paul, Minnesota; George Lymeris, a Greek, and Nicholas Hobson, an Englishman.

Geoffrey A. Thompson, a divinity student at Macalester College, and Lee Mitchell are American students who will accompany the foreign students on their trip.

Tours made by the exchange students are sponsored by Harry Morgan's Friendship Ambassadors, a non-profit organization that was founded about 12 years ago. The group's aim is to bring foreign students to America, so they can see the American ways of life and better understand our nation.

"The Reader's Digest" published an article about the Harry Morgan organization and received much response from the American public. The magazine is in charge of arrangements for the exchange students.

Jim Speer initiated the idea of bringing the students to Olton after reading the article, and contacted "The Reader's Digest" publishers.

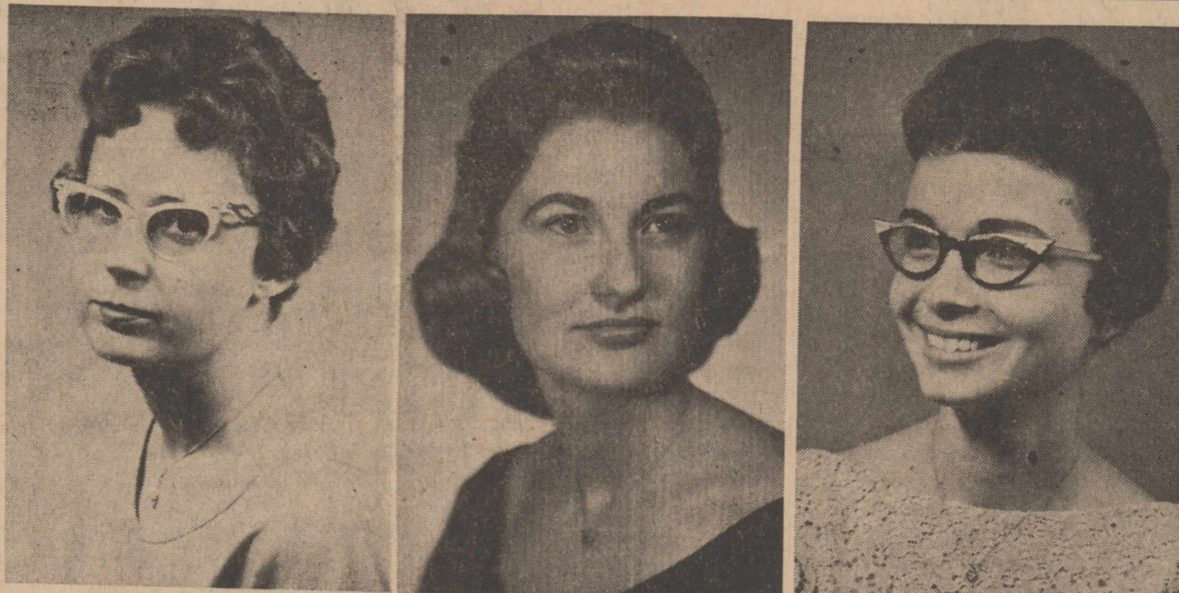
The Olton community was chosen over 100 other communities to be one of the areas the students would visit.

INCH-FURROW TESTS TO MARK EFFICIENCY

Halfway Station Tests Fungicide

An in-furrow fungicide test to determine the efficiency of 12 different chemicals used in the prevention of seedling diseases on cotton is underway at the High Plains

Research Foundation. Each of the 12 chemicals has been applied in four row plots, 300 feet long. A 13th plot has been planted with no chemicals applied to be used as a check plot for comparison. This test is being conducted by Dr. Harry Lane of the Lubbock Experiment Station and Delbert R. Langford of the Foundation staff.

A comparative date of planting test on cotton is in process at Halfway to secure further information desired by area farmers so they can achieve higher quality yields.

Cotton was planted on April 20 and May 20, and will be planted on June 20 and 30.

A climatology test on cotton is included with the date of planting research program. This test consists of cotton planted on (1) dryland, (2) irrigated land with no fertilizer, and (3) irrigated land with various rates and combinations of fertilizer. Air temperature, relative humidity, and solar energy are to be recorded throughout the growing season to determine the effect of these factors on the cotton yields. These tests are being conducted by Dr. J. D. Bilbro, ARS, Lubbock, and Delbert Langford of the Foundation.

These projects are being conducted at the High Plains Research Foundation in cooperation with the Texas Agriculture Experiment Station, Lubbock, and the Agricultural Research Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

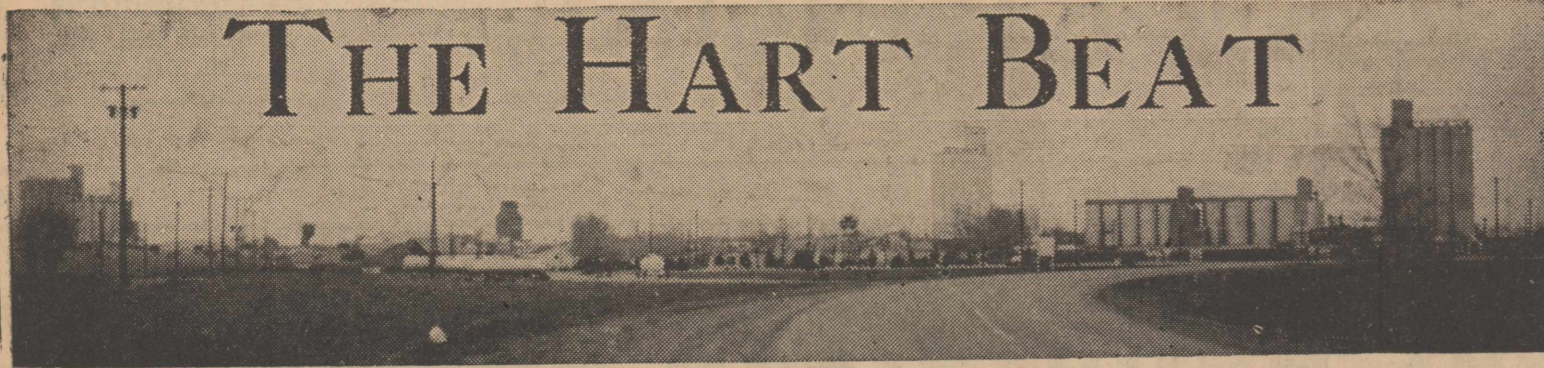
