Moisture-laden clouds hovering over the Panhandle dumped almost eight inches of rain on Olton this week.

The weather turned the entire South Plains into an area resembling a vast lake and slowed all types of activity to a crawl.

Farmers throughout the area were glad to get the moisture, but most were ready today to "holler uncle."

It was too wet in most fields to walk into them, much less plow. Many fields were under water. Roads were closed in some areas and those which were termed passable had spots with high water.

James Gallagher of Pioneer Natural Gas reported a four-day rainfall total of 7.85 inches through Thursday at 9 AM. Rain continued to fall heavily Thursday morning, but it had slackened somewhat by 2 PM.

Cloudy skies still prevailed late Thursday and most residents hoped for a break in the weather by Friday.

A thunderstorm hit the Olton area Monday night and turned hot, summer days into times resembling the beginning of fall.

Steady rains continued through today, with only slight breaks.

The rainfall apparently was heavier in Olton than it was on area farms.

Emmitt Harper, who farms three miles east of town, recorded 4.5 inches from Monday to early Thursday. In the same period, Athol Light, three north of Olton, received 4.25 inches. Brent Burrow said that rains totaled 4.1 inches in his area, three miles west of town. Five miles south, Roger Bartley reported 4.7 inches in the four-day period.

"My field looks like a lake," declared W. E. Miller, who farms near Circle.

He was joined by Frank Struve, west of Olton, who said: "My fields are flooded on both ends and rain is standing in the middle."

Ross Bryant, who farms two miles east of town, said it "has rained so much that I don't see how my field can soak up any more."

Hart and Hart Camp areas have reported about four inches of rain since Monday night.

The school board, meeting in regular session Tuesday night, started with a list of about 15 names.


Paring the list to two top candidates, the board appointed Supt. Joe Harper and Coach Turner as a committee of two to explore the qualifications and background of each candidate.

In other activity at Tuesday night's meeting, the board approved the employment of two new teachers, okayed the school calendar for 1960-61 and rejected two bids as too low on a pair of used buses the school district has up for sale.

The board okayed Aug. 29 as the starting date for the next school term. The year will end May 26. Holiday schedule will be the same as in the past.

The two new teachers approved by the board are Mr. and Mrs. E. J. McKnight, who will move here from Stinnett. He will teach junior high social studies and she will be homemaking instructor.

# Election On Paving Is Set In September

Olton's paving needs, in the spotlight after heavy rains this week made mud puddles of many streets, will be put to the voters in September.

City council tentatively has set an \$80,000 bond election for that month. The decision to hold the election in September came at a meeting last Thursday night.

In making the announcement, city officials pointed out that approval of the bond vote will not require a raise in taxes or an increase in valuations.

The \$80,000 would be the city's share in a program designed to pave, curb and gutter 80 to 100 blocks here.

The city's part of the program will be approximately 20 per cent, according to city officials. That would make the total program run almost \$400,000.

The city council hopes that paving can start next spring if the bond vote carries.

First of Texas Corporation and Eppler, Guerin and Turner, Inc., have been employed as financial advisors for the city.

Under present plans, property owners could finance their share of the paving through First of Texas, a private corporation headquartered in San Antonio.

City officials explained that paving would be done in areas where most interest is shown by property owners. Any area in town where property owners subscribe in sufficient numbers could be paved, they said.

New Law In Effect On Cattle On Roads

The Texas Department of Public Safety reminded Texas cattle owners this week that a new law went into effect July 1 aimed at controlling livestock on designated US and state highways. The new law makes it illegal for a person knowingly to permit his domestic livestock to roam at large and unattended on state and federal highways. It applies regardless of whether or not the highway right-of-way is fenced. Maximum fine for such violation is \$200, and each day the violation occurs may be considered a separate offense. Farm to market roads are excepted from the law. The new law also gives law enforcement officers the authority to have such livestock picked up, when unable to locate the owner, and turned over to the sheriff or constable in the county. The law does not prohibit the driving or herding of livestock across or along highways. It gives peace officers the authority to enforce provisions of the act without a warrant.



### Value Of Stubble Mulching Told By High Plains Station Agronomist

Stubble mulching has advantages in the long time farming programs in the High Plains that outweigh the immediate and temporary gains from burning the wheat stubble, Delbert Langford, associate agronomist at the High Plains Research Foundation, stated in a recent interview.

The advantages of plowing under the stubble are (1) maintaining the organic matter content of the soil which facilitates water penetration by improving the tilth and structure of the soil; (2) returning plant food to the soil; (3) better aeration of the soil; and (4) prevention of diseases.

Temporary advantages of burning are (1) killing weeds, (2) killing insects, (3) immediate effect of released potash, and (4) double cropping.

Research tests have been shown that burning stubble for a period of 5 years results in a considerable reduction in wheat yields as well as crops used in rotation. The loss

in production from continuous burning of stubble over a period of time is very high.

Langford emphasized that the return of crop residues to the soil is a sound conservation practice in maintaining soil productivity. It will become more important as our underground water level declines, and we are more dependent upon rainfall for crop production. Soil with poor physical structure and low organic matter is much less effective in absorbing and holding rainfall than soil with adequate humus.
