Golfers from throughout Lamb County, including about 50 from Olton, are expected here July 21-24 when the annual Lamb County Golf Tournament will be staged on the Olton Recreation Center course for the first time.

Cuke Harvest To Get Under Way Here Next Week

Chamber of Commerce manager Dick Whiteley reported Thursday that cucumber harvest in the Olton community will get under way next week.

The cucumbers have been contracted by Brown & Miller Pickle Co. at Texarkana and the Dalton Pickle Co.

Brown & Miller Company will set up their sheds and grader at Straw Gin. Clovis Poteet is in charge of cucumber processing for the company.

The Dalton company's sheds will be located at Olton Co-Op Gin. A representative of the company will supervise the cucumber operation in this community.

About 40 farmers in the Olton area have almost 675 acres of the crop.

This is the third year for the vegetable crop to be grown in this part of Texas.

Members of the Olton Co-Op Gin board of directors met Monday night in the gin office to organize and elect new officers.

Owen Jones was elected president of the board; T. J. Roberson, vice-president; and Raymond Lewis, secretary.

At a recent stockholders meeting, R. G. DeBerry and Houston Carson were elected new directors for the coming year.

Board members other than the new officers and directors include A. J. Spain and B. C. Cooner.

Retiring from the board of directors were O. E. Patterson and Milford Lambright.

A total of 14,931 bales of cotton was handled by the gin during the 1959-60 ginning season. Two modern gin plants, land, a warehouse and office buildings make up assets totaling approximately \$800,000.

USDL Investigates Bracero 'Incident'

'Undue Concern' Is Unnecessary

Olton city councilmen have forwarded a letter to the U.S. Department of Labor at Lubbock apologizing for the city's part in an incident which resulted in the jailing of a Mexican National at the request of his employer.

Farmers here viewed the situation with some concern this week as the Olton area prepared for cucumber harvest.

But a USDL official in Lubbock Thursday maintained a calm attitude about the matter.

Paul Vigil, USDL foreign service labor representative, said, "At this point, I personally see no cause for undue concern in the Olton community in regard to continued availability of Bracero labor."

Vigil said it is an "individual case involving a farmer and a National and it is being investigated on that basis."

The incident took on significance in that mistreatment of Mexican Nationals has resulted in refusal by the Mexican government to grant Bracero labor in some areas.

Key figures in the situation are: Jose Andrade Gonzalez, the Mexican National; J. B. James, prominent Olton area farmer who employed Gonzalez.

Vigil said his investigation shows James and Gonzalez had a disagreement and that the National was slapped by James. The incident occurred during the early part of last week.

Later, Gonzalez was placed in the city jail, at James' request, on a charge of "desertion of contract."

James, contacted Thursday, said in a telephone conversation that he felt the case was between himself and the National. He declined to discuss details of the disagreement.

However, he did say that a letter sent to the USDL by city councilmen was substantially correct.

The letter, written July 8 at a special meeting of the city council, reads as follows:

"This letter is written relative to the recent arrest and holding of Jose Andrade Gonzalez (a Mexican National). The officer of the city jailed this man without full knowledge of the laws under which the Mexican Nationals are contracted to work in this country. The man was held strictly by request of his employer on a charge of 'desertion of contract.'"

"Please consider this letter as an apology from the undersigned for action taken in this case."

The letter was signed by Mayor Pro Tem C. A. Cox and Councilmen J. R. Duncan, Clovis Poteet and Fred Thompson. Mayor M. T. James and Councilman Lynn Fite were out of town and unable to attend the special meeting.

Vigil, the USDL official, said a report of his investigation would reach regional headquarters at Dallas Monday. A decision in the case (Continued On Back Page)

Burrows warned local residents to watch their dogs and keep stray animals away from their homes.

At City Meeting

Stock Ordinance Change Is Asked

City councilmen took under advisement Tuesday night a request that a seven-month-old livestock ordinance here be scrapped, or otherwise made more acceptable.

A group of about 15 persons asked that some arrangement be made so that 4-H and FFA youngsters may keep their animals in town.

Mayor M. T. James and the council pointed out the request put them on the spot.

Councilman Fred Thompson, explaining that the ordinance was passed because the council felt the majority of the people wanted it, said:

"You must realize that the ordinance was under consideration about eight months before we passed it. It isn't something that we can turn around and change right quick."

The ordinance, approved in November, 1959, bars hogs, cattle, sheep, goats and other animals from being kept in the city limits. The law does allow animals to be kept in town during a 72-hour period for a show or exhibition.

Calvin Horn, speaking for the group at the council meeting, said the ordinance is "working a hardship" on youngsters who raise livestock.

He suggested an arrangement whereby lambs only might be kept in town. He added that this would be limited to 4-H and FFA youngsters.

But Councilman Carroll Cox said, and other members of the council agreed, that it would be hard to allow one type of animal and not open the door for all other types

Visitors See Olton On Friendship Tour

"We've met a lot of very nice people everywhere we've gone in America," said Nicholas Hobson of London, England, shortly after his arrival in Olton.

He was one of six Ambassadors for Friendship, which also included two American students, plus one each from Greece, Ceylon and Iran, who arrived in Olton Tuesday night.

Olton received the honor of the

three-day visit by the young men along with 29 cities in the United States out of 12,000 which applied after an article describing the program appeared in the February issue of "Readers Digest."

James Speer contacted the magazine and applied for the students' visit to Olton. The Chamber of Commerce and Lions Club are handling details for the visitors' stay.

Lee Mitchell, 21, an American student who is accompanying the foreign students, gave the purpose of the tours when he said, "The tours show the foreign students that Americans aren't all cold-blooded like many of the American tourists which travel in their respective countries." The touring program is classified as educational travel.

Mitchell is a pre-theological student at MacAlester College, St. Paul, Minn., where he will graduate in 1962. He then will attend a seminary.

His father is a banker and his mother is secretary to the principal and school board at Media, Minn.

American Motor Company furnishes cars for the students' travel. Gas and oil are donated by Standard Oil Company. Expenses are financed by the selling of "stock", sold at "a dollar per share" to

anyone wishing to contribute to the program.

Harry Morgan originated the program of Ambassadors for Friendship, at MacAlester College in St. Paul, Minn., after discovering how little of the true American way of life foreign exchange students are able to see while attending college.

The students visited the High Plains Research Station at Halfway Wednesday. They were taken on a tour of Earth, Hart and Dimmitt Thursday, to give them a view of the different crops grown in the surrounding areas.

Bryan, 26, agreed to a one-year contract.

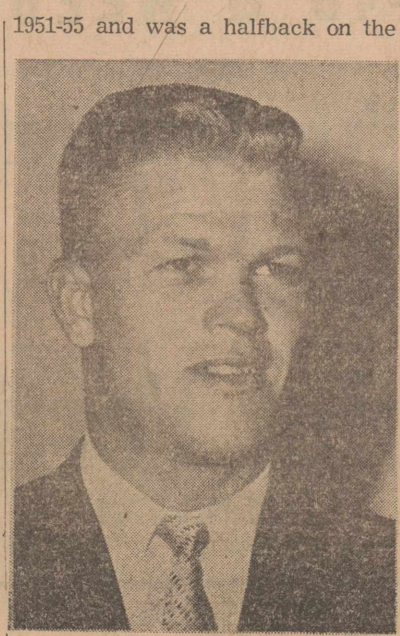
Turner, who bowed out as football coach after eight years in that post, has taken on new duties as high school principal.

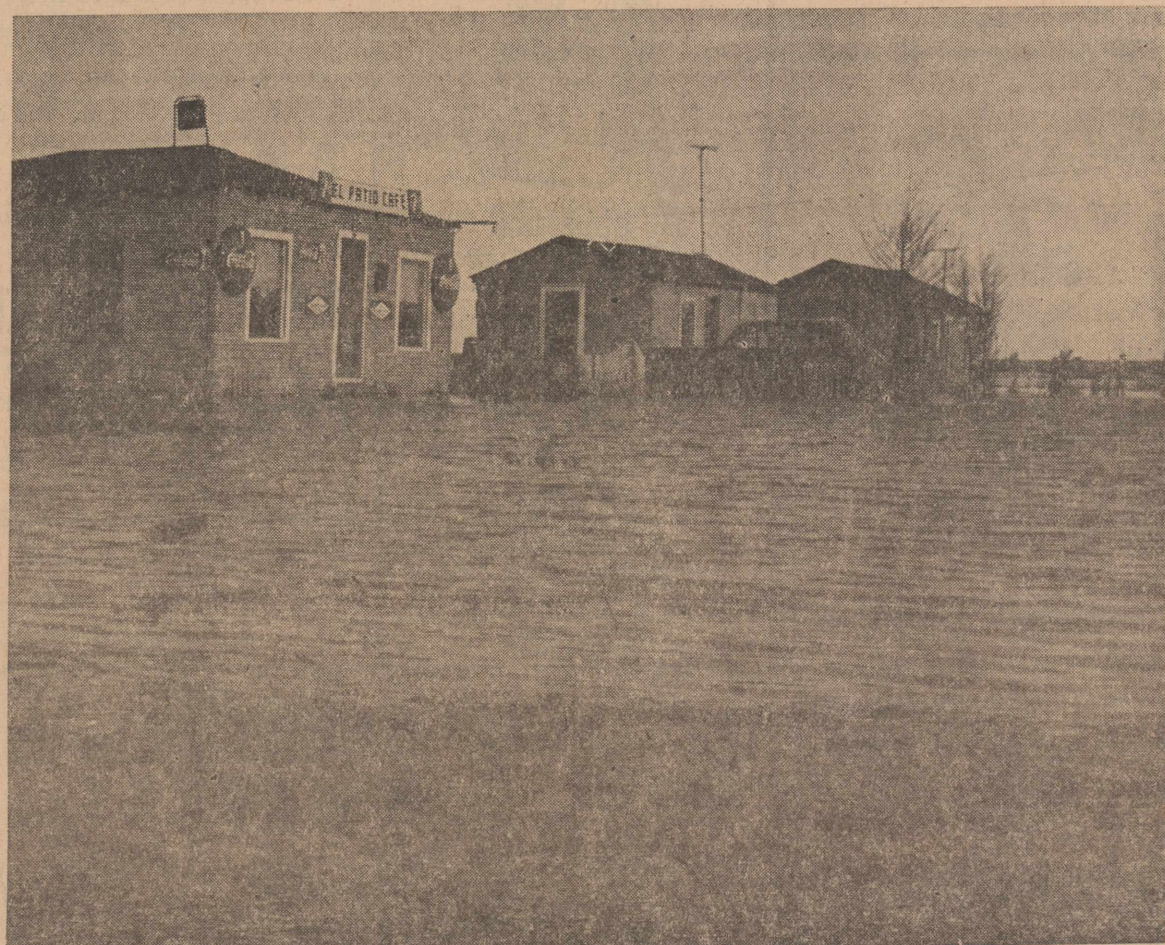
He was a defensive halfback with Baltimore's professional team in 1955. Bryan played high school ball at Olney.


The new high school principal will be Malcolm Atwood.

He was graduated from Rio Vista High School and received his B. A. Degree in Administrative Education and Mathematics from Texas Tech. He is married and has three children. 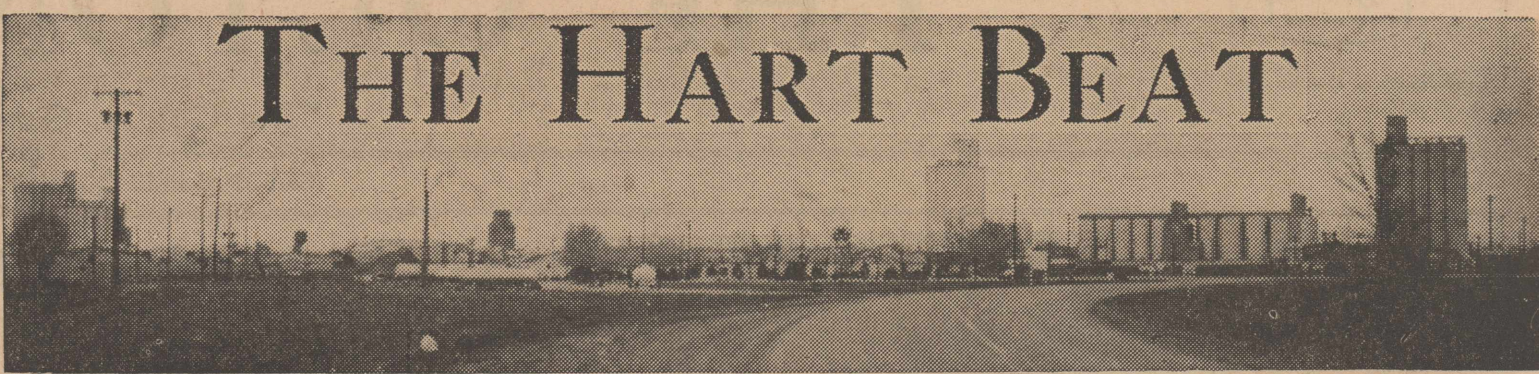

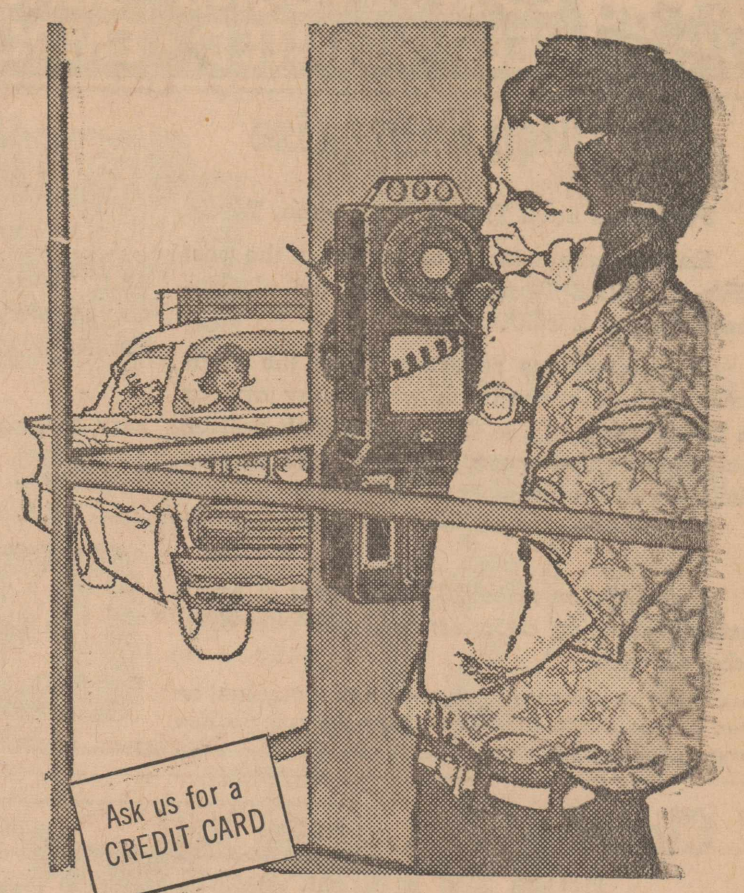

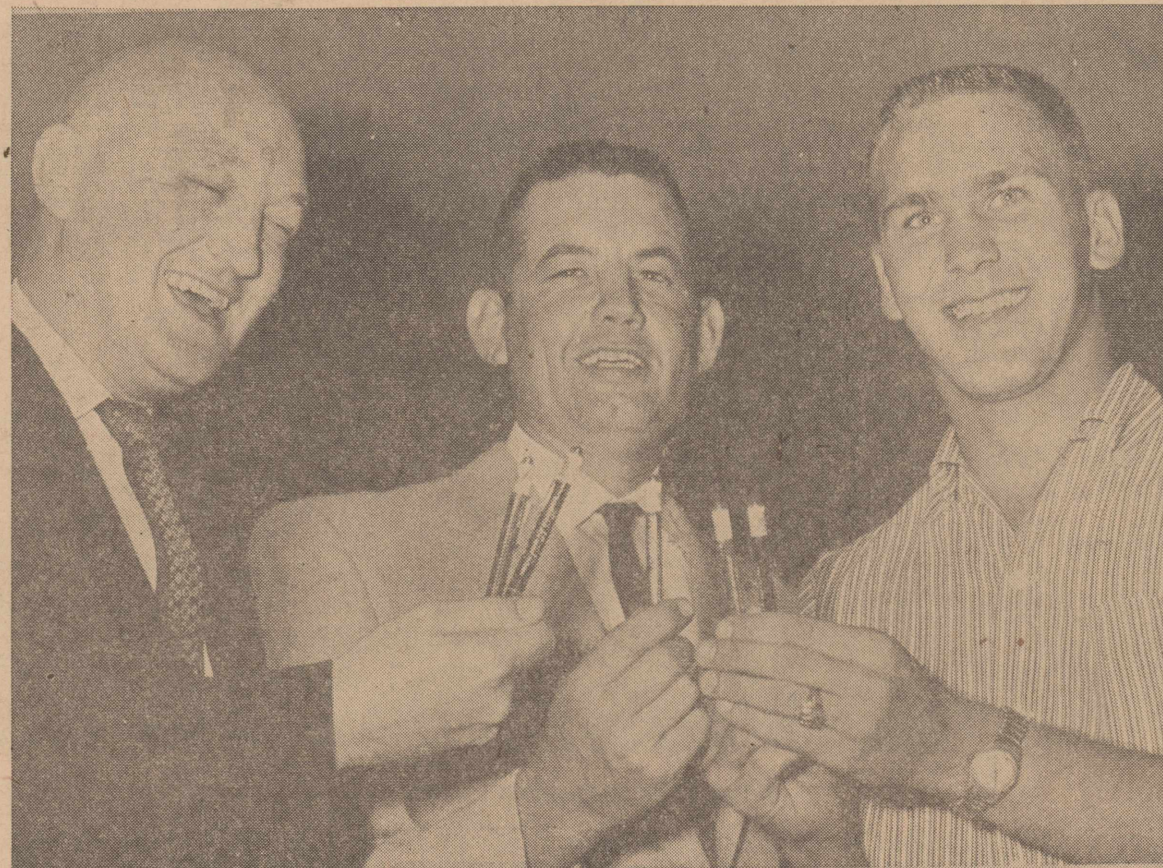

County Wheat Allotment Set At 6,012 Acres

Lamb County's wheat allotment for 1961 has been set at 6,012 acres, 118 less than 1960, L. D. Aten, county ASC office manager, announced.

Secretary of Agriculture Benson has proclaimed marketing quotas on the 1961 crop and has set July 21 as the date for a referendum to determine producer approval or disapproval of quotas.

The Agriculture Department announced last week an average support price for 1960 crop wheat of \$1.78 a bushel, up a cent from a year ago. It also announced that the average support of \$1.78 a bushel will prevail for the 1961 crop if wheat marketing quotas are approved at the July 21 referendum.

If marketing quotas are not approved by the necessary two-thirds of the voting producers July 21, there will be no restriction on wheat marketings and acreage allotments will remain in effect as a condition of eligibility for price support at 50 per cent of parity as required by law.

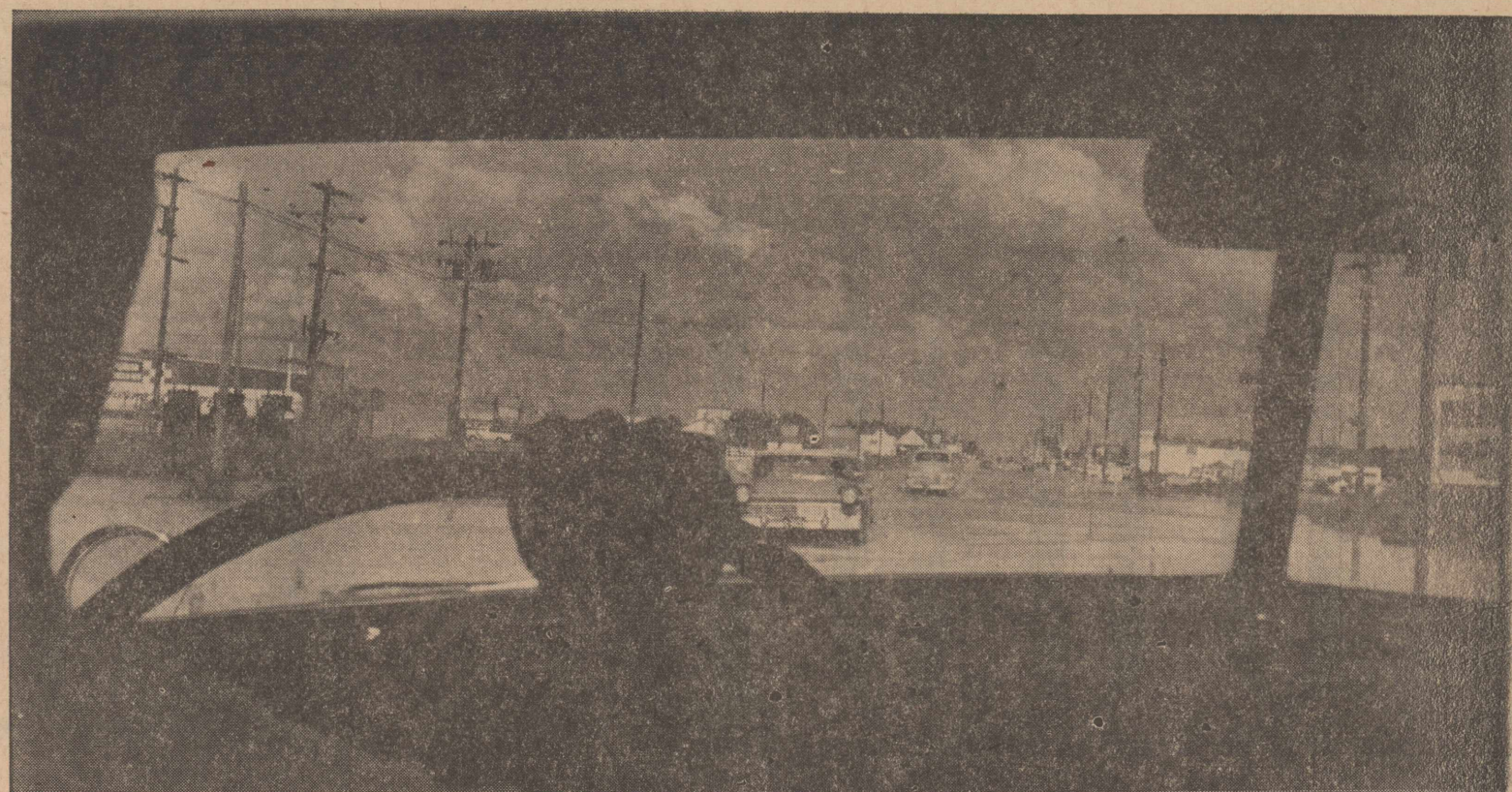

Phone Problems Laid To Change In Facilities Here

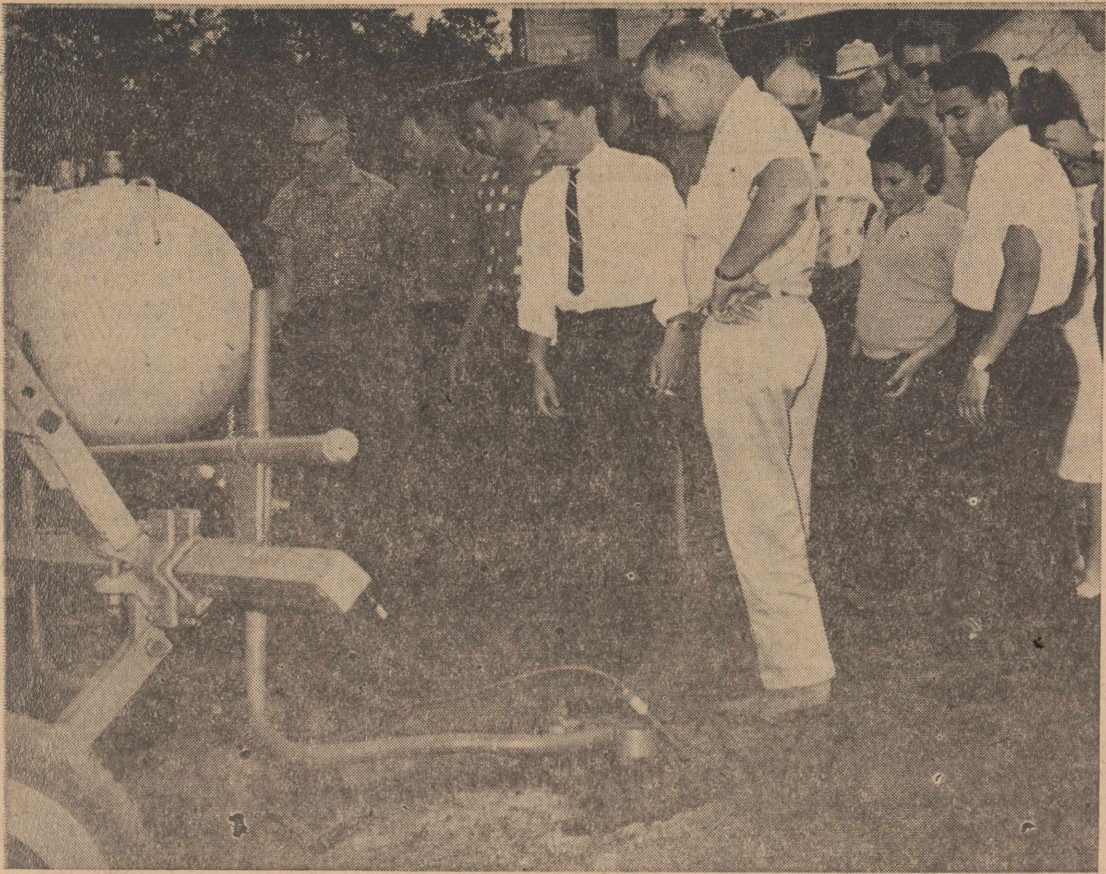

4. Approved a resolution on a low-cost housing project for Olton. The action allows the council to check further into the project before deciding definitely to go into the program.

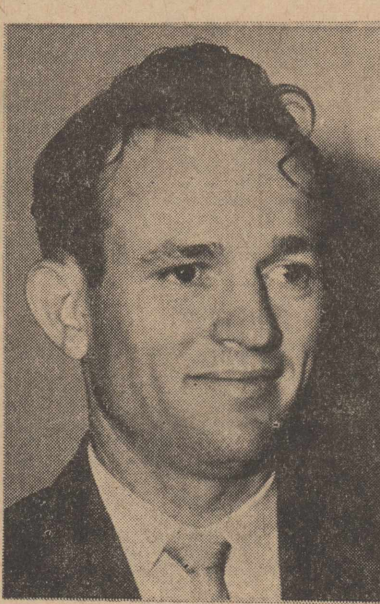
Girls' Basketball Practices Slated

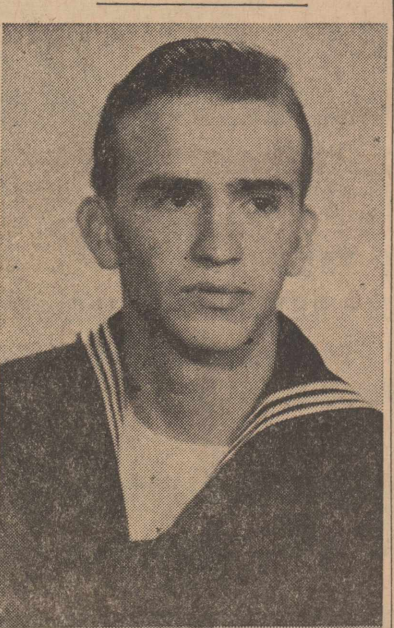
