28 Oltonites On Jury List; 3 Cases Set

Twenty-eight Olton residents are on the 60-member prospective juror list for a criminal term of 154th District Court starting Monday at Littlefield.

Three murder cases are set for trial, District Judge Andy Bills said. Two of them resulted from incidents which occurred in the Olton area.

Leonard Lockett, 44-year-old Olton Negro cafe operator, is charged in a case in connection with the gunshot slaying of a cotton gin

worker here last fall. Another shooting, which occurred in the fall of 1958 on a farm near Springlake, resulted in charges being filed against an Earth man, Joseph J. Stark.

The third case will be tried in Littlefield on a change of venue from Bailey County. It is against Albert Griffin of Muleshoe, who is charged in the Sept. 13, 1959, shotgun slaying of Grover Tapp.

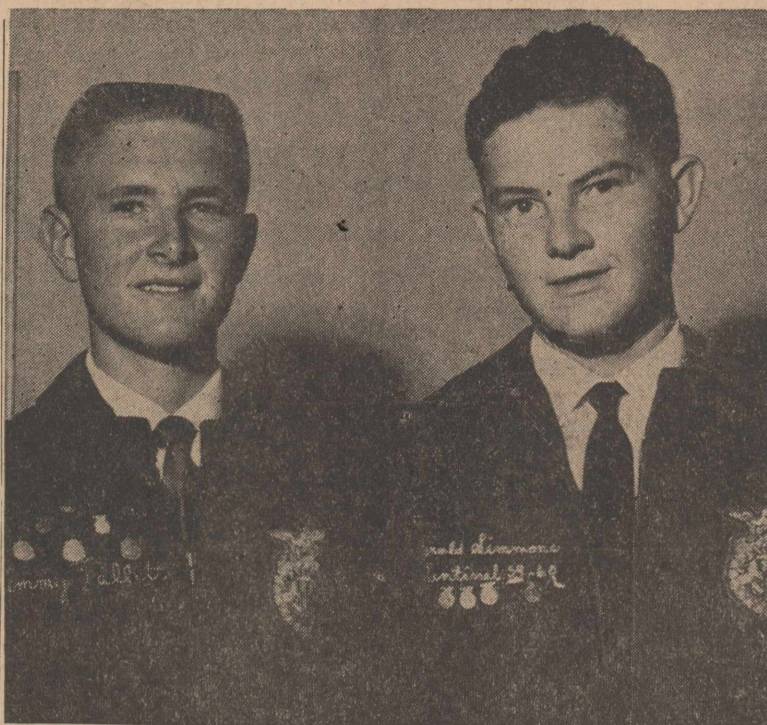
Lockett is charged in connection with the fatal shooting of James Oliver Mack after an argument at Lockett's cafe.

The case against Stark is in connection with the fatal wounding of Delbert Jackson, a Littlefield oil-field worker, after a poker game at the farm of L. H. (Peg) LaDuke near Springlake. Jackson died in a Littlefield hospital several hours after the shooting.

First case to be tried is the one against the Muleshoe man, Griffin. Lockett's trial is next on the docket, with Stark's case third.

Jerald Simmons, Jimmy Tollett Receive Lone Star Farmer Honors

Two Olton FFA boys, Jerald Simmons and Jimmy Tollett, will receive Lone Star Farmer degrees, highest state Future Farmer award, at the annual State FFA Convention being staged this week at Houston.

The boys, both outstanding members of the Olton FFA Chapter, left Tuesday for the meeting. The two were the only Olton students to apply for the high state award this year.

Ninety-six applications for the degree were submitted in Area I, which includes all counties south from the Oklahoma Panhandle through Lubbock County. The area quota was 83.

Cucumber Crop Harvest To Roll

1,000 Hands To Hit Fields Starting Monday

Harvest of Olton's top summer cash crop will go into full swing starting Monday.

More than 1,000 hands will head to the fields to bring in an expected bumper crop of cucumbers from 650 acres.

Two companies—Brown-Miller of Texarkana and Dalton's of Fort Worth—have set up graders in advance of the harvest.

A few cucumbers were harvested this week, but farmers found the weather a little cool for rapid growth of the cukes and most are waiting until Monday to go full speed ahead.

Brown-Miller has set up its grader at Straw Gin, getting set for cucumbers from more than 400 acres under contract. Dalton's has its grader at Olton Co-Op Gin in readiness for 176 acres under contract.

Cucumber acreage in the Olton area is almost double that of last year, when 375 acres were under contract.

"Merchants already are feeling an economic uplift from the cucumber crop," Dick Whiteley, Olton Chamber manager said. He added that the harvest should be at its peak in about three weeks and will last about six weeks.

Harvest of sweet corn, onions and potatoes is already under way in the community.

The first of the sweet corn came in this week to a shed being operated by Clovis Poteet, Lacy Armstrong and Harley Miller.

About 300 acres of the crop will be harvested, with the harvest hitting full swing next week.

The potato harvest, which began about July 4, is expected to last another week. Prices have dropped about \$3 per sack, according to Melvin Mitchell, who said he has stopped digging until he can find a market.

Potato prices have ranged from about \$7.50 a sack to \$2.50 a sack. Yields have been about 150 sacks an acre.

Almost 150 acres of onions are being harvested. Onions are yielding about 300 sacks per acre, with the price ranging from \$2 to \$2.50 a sack.

Cleo Smith and A. J. Givens are operating an onion shed a mile east of town.



They Grow Pretty Here

WHETHER you're talking about summer crops or pretty girls, Olton has 'em. Johnson Praised

Billy Clayton Sees Democrat Victory

Billy Wayne Clayton of Springlake, who found "you have to act like you know what you're doing to get anywhere" at a National Democratic Convention, believes the Kennedy-Johnson ticket will carry Texas in November.

Like other members of the Texas delegation to the national convention, Clayton would have preferred Lyndon B. Johnson's name first on the ticket.

Clayton returned from Los Angeles to find Texans still scratching their heads over Johnson's nomination as the Demo vice-presidential candidate. LBJ's selection and acceptance came as a complete surprise.

"I think Johnson's decision was all for the benefit of the party. It probably kept the South from bolting at the convention," says Billy Wayne.

"It's generally conceded," Billy Wayne added, "that Johnson strengthened the ticket more than anyone else could have with Kennedy in the top spot."

The Democratic ticket, Clayton thinks, will win in Texas. But he concedes there will be some opposition to Sen. John F. Kennedy, especially in rural areas.

Events at the convention increased Billy Wayne's respect for Johnson. "All Texas has a man to be proud of in Johnson, who in my estimation proved himself one of our greatest statesmen," he says.

Clayton believes Johnson would have had a "great chance" for the presidential nomination had the voting gone past the first ballot.

"Many delegates were willing to switch after they fulfilled their first ballot commitments," he says.

One of Billy Wayne's jobs was to "work on" delegates from New York, Alaska and California. Even though New York went strongly for Kennedy, Billy Wayne believes many of its delegates would have changed to Johnson on a second ballot.

Billy Wayne also worked security for the Senator, clearing the way for Johnson as he made his way through crowded hotel lobbies.

One of Clayton's biggest jobs was as a co-captain in the LBJ demonstration, which lasted 23 minutes.

"They only allowed about 50 demonstration passes on the floor,"

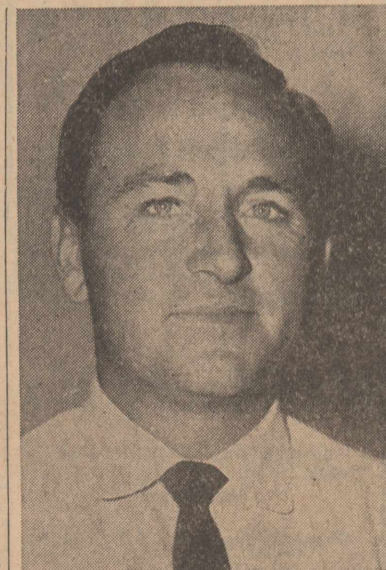
Kemp's Condition Is Serious After Scooter Accident

Bill Kemp, 33-year-old shop foreman for Thompson Chevrolet, was in serious condition today at Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, after receiving a head injury in a motor scooter accident here Wednesday about 6:15 p.m.

Kemp is under observation with a severe concussion. Attendants said the Olton man was unconscious at times, but that he regained consciousness Wednesday night and recognized his wife, who is at his bedside.

The accident occurred at 10th and Main. Kemp was driving his motor scooter north on Main when he saw a car crossing the road. He apparently slammed on his brakes at the last moment and was hurled from the scooter to the pavement.

The auto was driven by Mrs. A. A. Smith, Olton. She said the scooter did not hit her vehicle. Mrs. Smith and nearby residents rushed to aid Kemp until he was transferred to Community Hospital by Parson's ambulance.

110 Acre Feet Of Water Added To Recharge Lake By Recent Rains

Recent rains, which totaled 12 inches, filled the recharge lake at the High Plains Research Foundation with an estimated 110 acre-

feet of water, station officials reported. Recharge of the well was started the night of July 4 and has been recharging at the approximate rate of 850 gallons per minute since that time.

During the 11-day period ending the night of Friday, July 15, a total of 43.5 acre-feet of water has been recharged. The well is pumped for one hour every 24 hours and is surged three times at 15-minute intervals during this hour to clean as much as possible any silt which may be caught in the underground formation.

A filter system installed before the rains to study methods of removing sediment from the water has been of little value. The water level in the lake raised to more than 3 feet over the top of the filter.

After the water had been in the lake 8 days, a form of marine life commonly called "desert shrimp" increased to such numbers that they interfered with recharging by clogging the screens. This requires cleaning the screens every 4 to 6 hours since the screens will become completely clogged within this time.

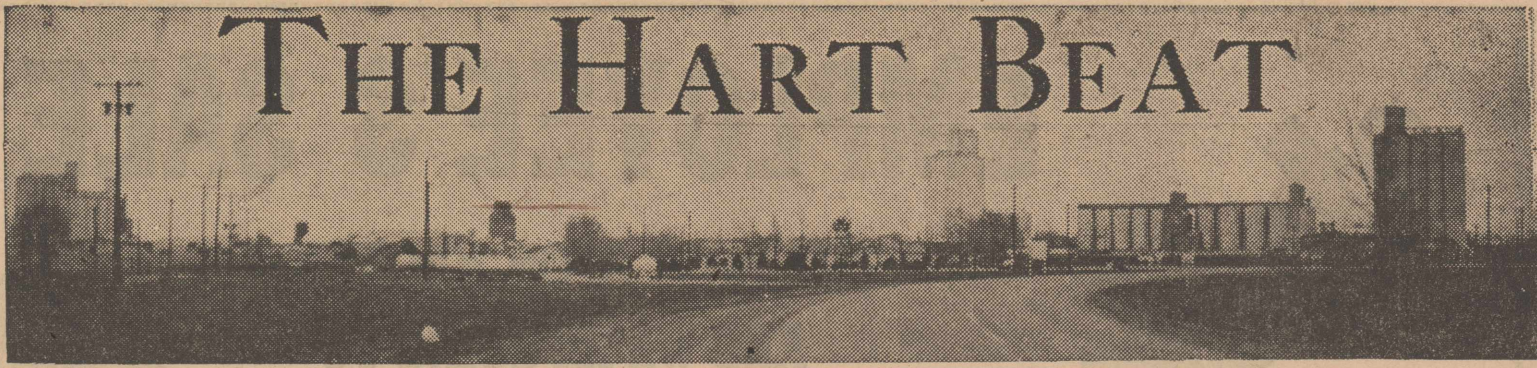
The board of the Hart Independent School District plans a new home for teachers of the school. It is to be built on the west end of the existing group of houses for teachers and will be similar to the present houses.

2 Hart Businesses Processing Potatoes

Two seasonal concerns are now in operation at Hart, boosting the economy of the community.

They are the Hart Potato Shed and H and S Produce, both of

which are in full swing at present in the processing of potatoes.

Two Hart men, Harold Smith and Bill Hill, own H and S Produce, which is located on the Dimmitt highway northwest of Hart.

The Hart Potato Shed is owned by Henry Allen of Halfway and Keith Jordie of Fort Worth.

Both concerns are processing potatoes grown by area farmers, with

Smith, Hill and Allen among the leaders in area potato production.

Most of the labor employed at the two businesses are transient workers who follow the potato harvest.

H and S employs between 150 and 200 workers during the season and some of them are from the Hart Community. Hart Potato Shed hires about 100 workers, most of them transient.

The potato shed will be in operation about six weeks, but H and S will operate until about Nov. 1.

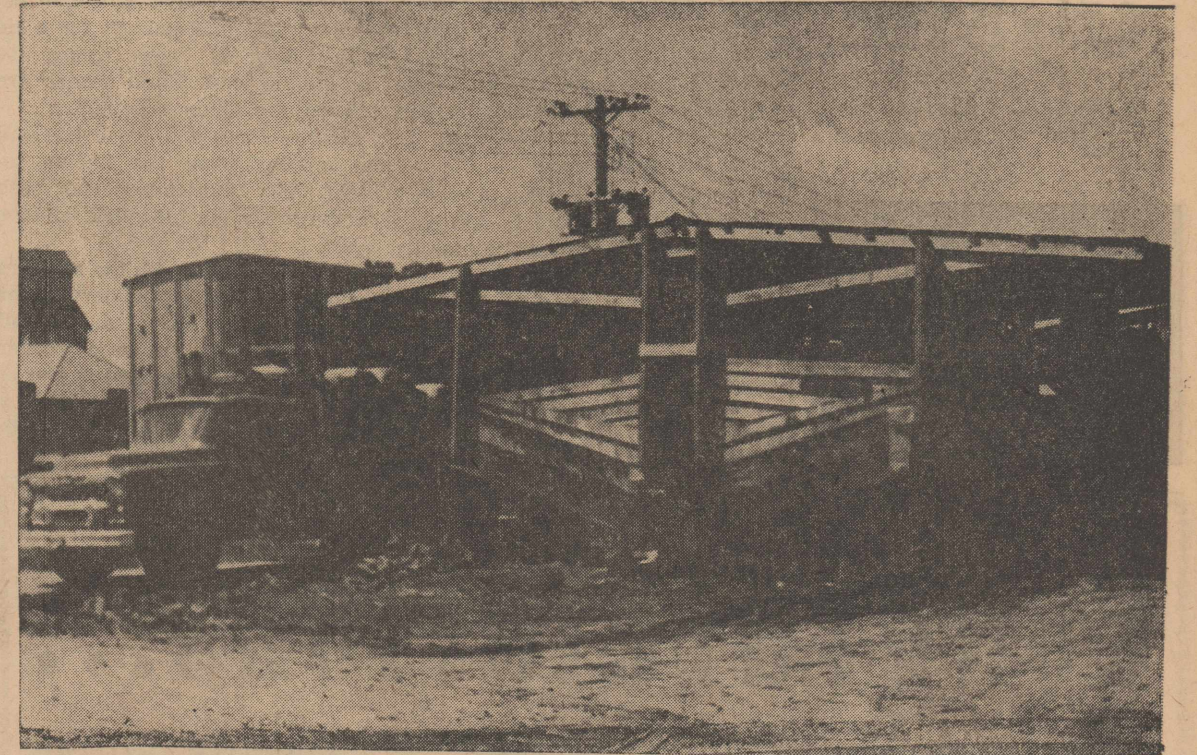
Both firms are experimenting to boost potato production. Allen is testing six varieties of potatoes to determine which will give the greatest yield and produce the best quality. H and S has an experimental plot on its land, with tests being conducted to find the varieties best suited to his area.

In charge of operations at Hart Potato Shed is Wilbur Allen. Ramon Flores directs the field crew.

At H and S Produce, Elias Martinez has charge of operating the shed and Dave Rainier handles the field crew.

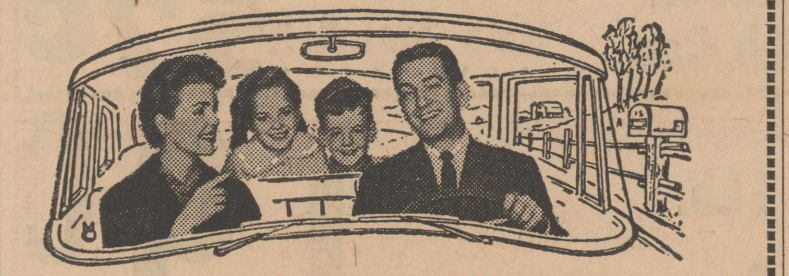


