Last Rites Read For Ben Dodson, **Olton Pioneer**

Last rites for Ben A. Dodson 79, Olton pioneer resident, were conducted here Sunday afternoon. Services were at the First Baptist Church with the Rev. John E. Lewis, pastor, officiating.

Dodson died in his sleep at 3:15 Saturday morning at his home. He had been bed-ridden 18 months. Born Nov. 7, 1880, at Charlie in Clay County, Dodson came to the South Plains as a young cowboyfreighter in 1890.

He was married to the former Miss Daisy Brewster in Plainview in 1900. They acquired land holdings southeast of Olton, where they ed a family of six sons and one daughter.


The family resided in the rural area near Olton, in the same dwelling for more than 40 years. Three years ago, the house was destroyed by a tornado and Mr. and Mrs. Dodson moved to Olton.
