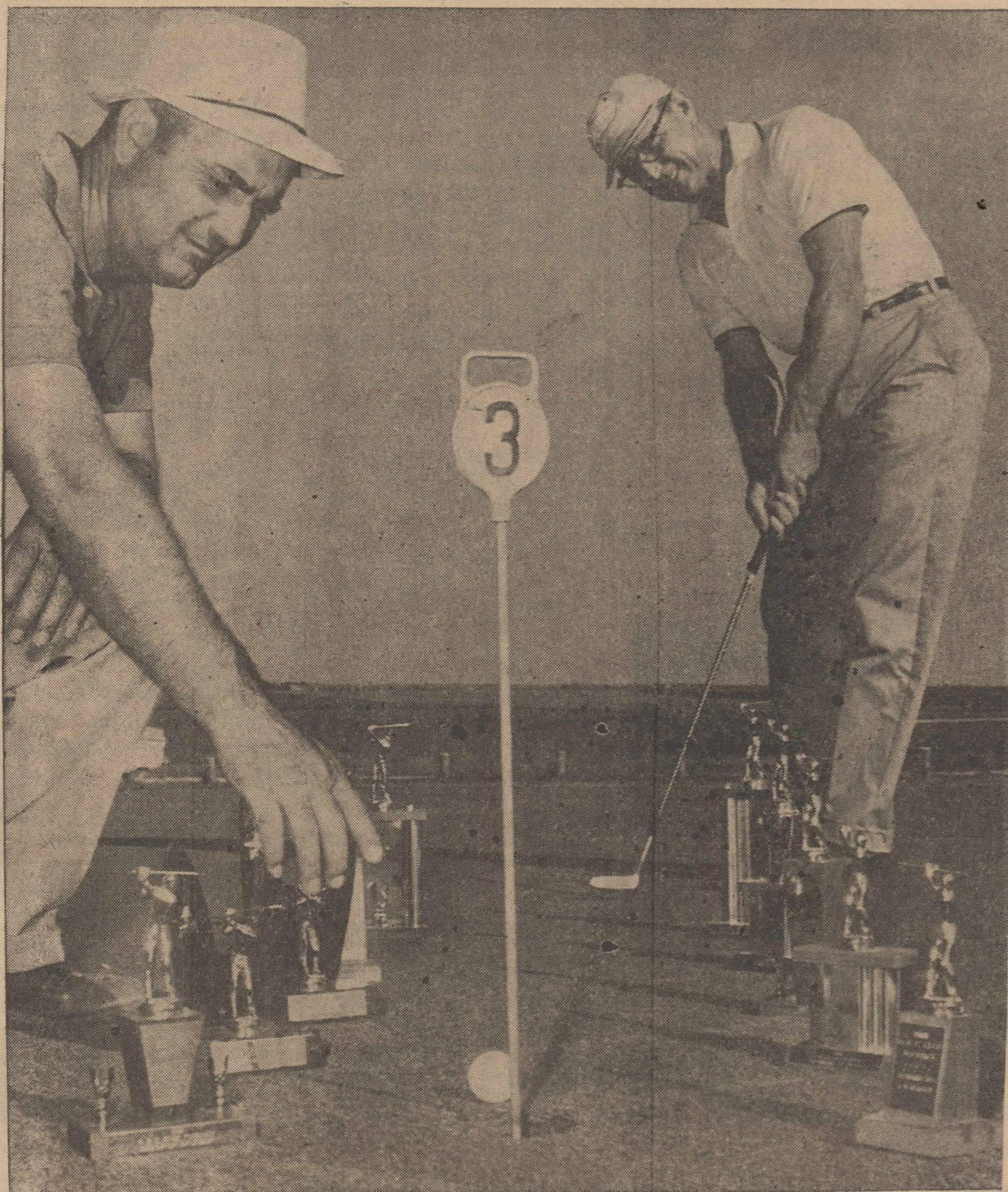

3rd Annual ORC Golf Tournament To Open Monday

Olton Recreation Center's third annual club tournament will get under way Monday and a new champion is sure to be crowned. Bob Richmond, winner of the ORC tourney the first two years, has departed, leaving the way clear for a new swinger to grab the top prize.

About 80 golfers are expected for the meet, according to Laus Hair, tournament chairman. Golfers in five flights will be shooting for winner and runner-up trophies in each flight. Consolation winners will get merchandise prizes.

The tournament will be played over a two-week period, Hair said, to allow all ORC golfers to compete.

Entry fee is \$5 and deadline for entering is Monday. Through Tuesday, 43 golfers had signed up.

Pairings will be made up Monday.

Olton Sputters After Gas Line Becomes Clogged

Olton Monday ran out of gas-natural gas, that is. Cook stoves stopped cooking and residents took cold baths Monday night as service was disrupted to some homes for as long as 18 hours.

Pioneer Gas Co. officials said the trouble came when the main line to the city was stopped up by paraffin, an oil by-product. The gooey stuff got into the line at the border station near Straw Gin.

The break in service came about 4 p.m. Monday. About 20 Pioneer employees from the Littlefield district and a mainline crew from Lubbock worked until midnight in an effort to restore service to all parts of town. The mainline crew worked through the night.

Workers cut off gas at all meters in town during the service break and later cut all meters back on and lighted appliances when service was restored.

Everything was in order by noon Tuesday, according to Charles Duval of Littlefield, district manager. "We want to thank everyone for being patient with us during the emergency, because we know it was an inconvenience for some," Duval said.

Olton 'Can Afford' Paving Bond Debt

Olton's proposed paving program, only a few weeks away from a bond election, was outlined here Tuesday by City Councilman Fred Thompson in a talk before the Lions Club.

Thompson asked the question, "Can the city afford it?" then proceeded to answer it affirmatively.

"We can service an \$80,000 bond issue with 87 per cent tax collections," he said, adding, "Past performance shows we collect 90 to 95 per cent of our taxes year in and year out."

The city councilman said the city currently is using \$15,118 annually to retire its outstanding bonds, more than actually is required.

The average amount required to retire these bonds is \$7,753, he said. That would leave \$7,365 a year to use for retirement of the \$80,000 in paving bonds, if they are authorized by the voters.

Only a little over \$5,000 would be needed annually to actually retire the paving bonds, leaving a clearance of more than \$2,000, he said.

Convicted Slayer From Olton Taken To State Prison

Lamb County Sheriff Dick Dyer Monday transferred Leonard Lockett of Olton, 44-year-old convicted slayer, to the Texas Department of Corrections at Huntsville.

Lockett was sentenced to a two-year term in state prison last Friday. A 154th District Court jury found him guilty in the fatal shooting here last fall of a 20-year-old cotton gin worker, James Oliver Mack. The shooting occurred at Lockett's cafe in the Negro section of Olton.

In the trial, the defense, handled by Olton Attorney Andy Stroebel, maintained that Lockett shot Mack in defense of his wife.

Members of the jury included Charles A. McClain, D. M. Holt, and Allen Johnston, all of Olton; Rex Jenkins, Pete Mitchell, Ray Glascock, Dennis Simmons and Bob Belew, all of Earth; Clifford Hopping and Ralph Rudd, both of Springlake; Dalton Wood of Sudan and Virgle Zoth of Littlefield. Belew was foreman of the jury.

The \$80,000 proposed for the paving program includes the city's share of paving costs, plus some funds to be used for a small amount of street maintenance equipment and some repair to existing pavement. The city will pay about 20 per cent of the total cost of the project.

A total of 75 to 100 blocks would be paved in areas where property owners show the most interest.

The map of proposed paving recently released by the city does not limit the paving to places marked on the map, Thompson explained.

"Anyone can get paving if his location connects to an existing paved street or to proposed paving," the councilman said.

Cost to the property owner would be about \$4.25 per front foot.

Thompson also explained that approval of the paving project would enable engineers to draw up a master plan for Olton, insuring proper drainage for all paved streets when rains come.

The city council tentatively has set the paving bond election for September.

Area Directors Pick Olton Band As Tops In Region

The Olton Mustang Band recently was chosen as "Best AA Band" in the region. Band directors from Abernathy, Floydada, Muleshoe, Morton, Slaton, Lockney, Spur, Post and Tahoka made the selection.

All regions in the state chose an outstanding band. A tape recording was made while each regional honored band was playing. The recordings were sent to a state committee which will select the "Best Texas Band" from the group.

The high school band receiving the state honor will be featured at the Texas Music Educator's Convention next year at Dallas.

Selection of the "Best Texas Band" will be announced in the fall.

Public Hearing Slated Aug. 15

Olton's school board Tuesday night gave the green light to a preliminary budget for 1960-61 calling for substantially the same spending as last year.

The board voted to pass the proposed budget along to the taxpayers for their comments, if any, at a public hearing.

Public hearing on the 1960-61

spending program has been set for Monday, Aug. 15, at 8 p.m. in the school board meeting room.

Only three weeks remain before the start of school, which is set for Aug. 29.

In other action Tuesday night, the board:

1. Authorized opening of the Negro school on Aug. 8, a date which will allow the school to close later so that students may work in the cotton harvest.

2. Approved employment of four teachers, including Walter Bryan, football coach; Willis T. Hedges, junior high school; Mrs. Willis T. Hedges, elementary; and Mrs. Helen Holt, junior high.

Bryan came here about three weeks ago from Plainview. The Hedges taught last year at Grand Prairie, while Mrs. Holt taught at McCamey.

The new budget calls for spending of \$430,380, up about \$12,000 from last year's budget.

Spending for the new year is calculated at the same rate as last year in all but three departments.

Under administration salaries, the budget is set at \$19,000, up \$3,200 from last year.

Under instruction, an annual increase of \$54 per year for teachers' service will make spending go up about \$3,200, from \$233,299 to \$236,510. Other increases for instruction include \$200 more for substitute teacher pay and \$95 more for the agriculture department.

The other major area where spending is expected to increase is "operation of plant." Utility costs are expected to be up from \$12,500 to \$15,000 and salaries in the department are figured at \$15,600, up \$2,600.

The budget is based on the same tax rate as last year, \$1.80 per \$100 assessed valuation, with actual values assessed at 40 per cent.

Of the \$430,380 set up for spending, the state will pay 50.6 per cent, with the local tax bill being 49.4 per cent, or \$211,599.

SEASON FOOTBALL TICKETS ON SALE

Season tickets to the five Olton Mustang home football games have been put on sale at the school business office, Joe Harper, superintendent of schools, announced this week.

Reserved seats are \$7.50 for the five games. People who had such seats last year will be given first choice on the same seats again this year if they purchased their tickets by Aug. 29, Harper said.

Football practice opens Aug. 15 and the Mustangs will meet Petersburg here Sept. 2 in their first game.

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Decision-Making Time Approaching On How Cotton Harvest Will Be Done

The time for harvesting this year's cotton crop is fast approaching, and the farmer should be considering how this harvesting is to be done. If the crop is to be machine harvested, the problem arises of whether it would be better to own or hire the machine. County Agent Bill Kimbrough says that often it is cheaper to have the crop custom harvested than it is to own the equipment. By hiring the custom work, the farmer can avoid the investment in machinery and use the capital

elsewhere in the farm business. The farmer's labor problem is eased if the custom operator furnishes all the labor for the job. Also, because the custom operator is skilled in operating and maintaining the machinery, the farmer may get a faster, more efficient job, Parker points out. Before deciding on hiring custom work, however, the farmer must make sure that the answer to each of the following questions is "yes." Is equipment for custom work available? Will it be avail-

able when I need it? Are the operators dependable and efficient? A machine may be purchased, however, with the idea of doing custom work in addition to personal work. This would lower the farmer's cost of harvesting his own crop, Kimbrough continues. Other factors, such as alternative use of labor and capital, should be considered before the farmer decided between owning or hiring a machine.

Six Home Games On Raider Card

LUBBOCK - If there's a home stadium advantage in football, Texas Tech's Red Raiders could spoil the Southwest Conference title chances of two teams prominently mentioned for 1960 laurels.

Baylor University, the darkhorse choice of many, will be played in expanded Jones Stadium Oct. 15, and defending co-champion Arkansas will be met here Nov. 19. A third Southwest Conference member, Southern Methodist, is slated for the Red Raiders' homecoming Oct. 22.

Rounding out a home card of six games are West Texas State Sept. 17, Tulane Nov. 5, and Wyoming Nov. 12. West Texas State and Baylor are the only night games at home.

On the road the Raiders play Texas A & M, Texas, Texas Christian, and Rice.

Coach DeWitt Weaver's Red Raiders will be making their Southwest Conference football debut, a goal set back in 1927.

For the first time in history, Texas Tech will have a major All-American first team selection in the person of center E. J. Holub. The choice of the Football Writers Association and NEA Service last year, Holub, 6-4, 215, has been picked on the pre-season All-American teams of about a half dozen magazines.

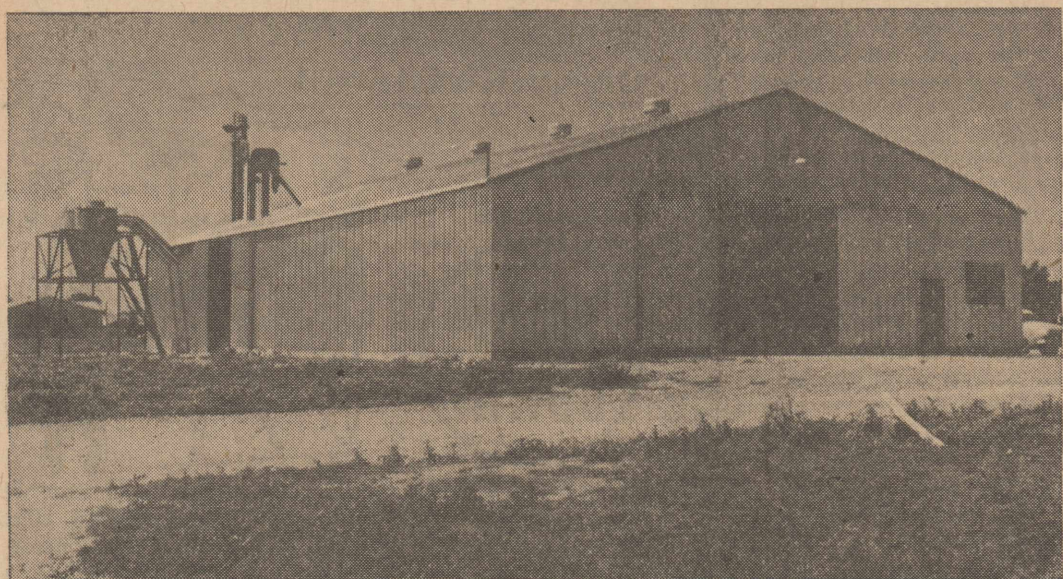

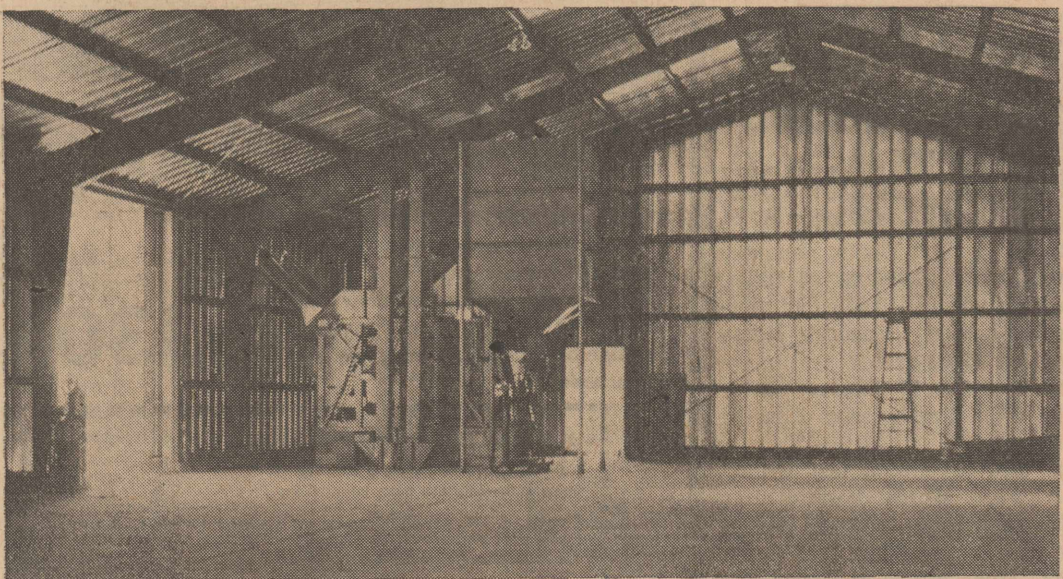

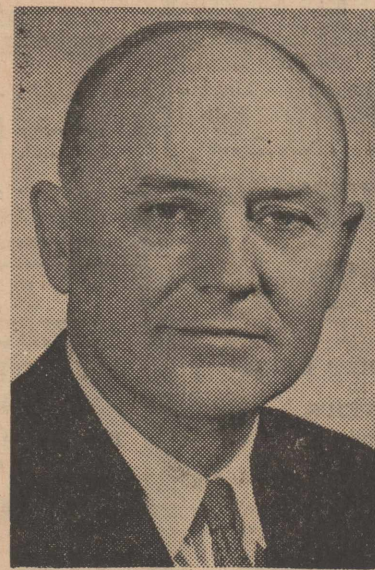

The young cowhand took the championship honors by placing high in four events, bareback bronc riding, saddle bronc riding, bull dogging and calf roping.

Workman received a trophy for winning top honors, a trophy buckle in the bareback bronc riding contest and a sizeable share of money.

In May, he won recognition by being named best all-around cowboy in the Southwestern Region in intercollegiate competition.

Yield Results Announced On 1960 Wheat Fertilizer Tests At Halfway

The 1960 yield data from two wheat fertilizer tests were released by Delbert Langford, associate agronomist, of the High Plains Research Foundation. The two varieties used in the tests were Early Triumph, a standard high yielding variety, and Tascosa, a new hard red winter variety with exceptional adaptability for the High Plains area.

The following observations were made in these tests: (1) nitrogen alone increased yield an average of 19.08 bushels per acre above no fertilizer; (2) phosphate alone gave an increase of 16.66 bushels per acre; and (3) potash in combination with nitrogen and phosphate did not increase yield.

While the phosphate alone was not the most profitable fertilizer

application, this is the first time at the Foundation that phosphate alone has given a significant increase in yield. This indicates that as these Pullman clay loam soils are cropped heavily year after year, there is a greater need for phosphate fertilizer.

The average yield of the Tascosa variety in fertilized plots was 61.56 bushels per acre and the Early Triumph averaged 52.17.

The fertilizer treatment which produced the highest yield in the test was not the most profitable. The fertilizer treatment giving the highest average yield was 120 lbs. nitrogen and 80 lbs. phosphate. This returned \$23.99 per acre above the cost of the fertilizer, but with only 40 lbs. of nitrogen alone, the yield was almost as high and the net return per acre was \$30.55.

This year's wheat fertilizer data at the High Plains Research Foundation are good indications of what results can be expected from fertilizing wheat on Pullman clay loam soil. The application of fertilizer on winter wheat is indicated to be a profitable practice, but additional research is required to determine specific fertilizer recommendations.

Barley Irrigation Increases Returns \$29.56 Per Acre

Irrigation on barley increased returns \$29.56 per acre over dryland barley at the High Plains Research Foundation in the 1959-60 test. Cordova barley was used in the test which compared yield and returns between dryland barley and that of irrigated, fertilized barley.

The dryland barley yielded 9 bushels per acre compared to 67.5 bushels per acre from the irrigated barley.

The irrigated barley received two four-inch applications of water a long with 200 pounds of 10-20-0 fertilizer per acre.

At 75 cents per bushel, income from the dryland acreage was \$6.72 per acre and the fertilizer cost totaled \$7.72 per acre. Deducting these costs from the \$50 received, the net income from the irrigated, fertilized test was \$36.28 per acre. James Valliant, water engineer at the Foundation, conducted the tests.

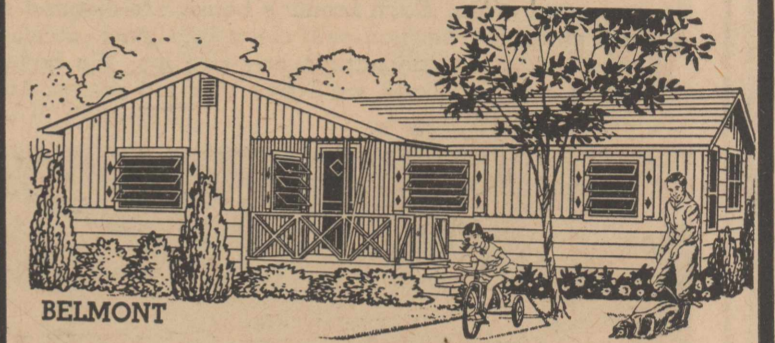

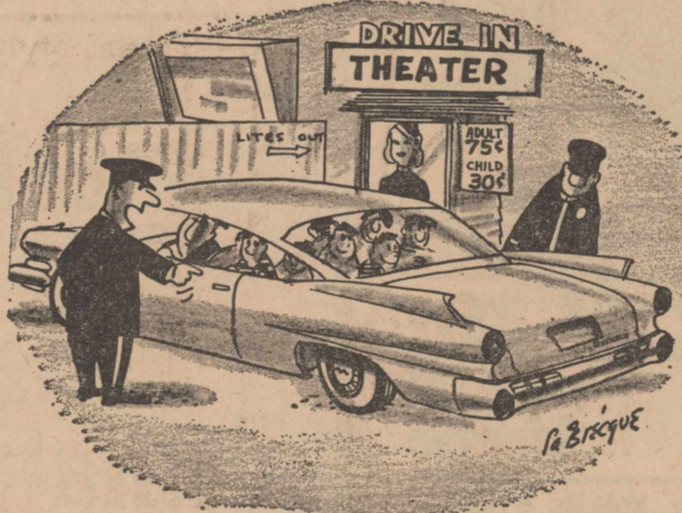

Teachers Stay Busy During 'Vacation'

The "never-tiring" teachers are once again preparing to resume their duties at school.

During the summer months, several of the teachers have studied in college training programs or at home, in order to keep informed on current methods and knowledge in their respective fields of instruction, in this fast advancing world.

James Caley, a Texas Tech graduate who has been a member of the Olton High School faculty for two years, attended a six-weeks training program recently at SMU. At the training school, he learned the latest scientific information, and gained new ideas about science projects for his students. Caley said, "I feel any teacher needs constant growth in his teaching field."

He hopes to offer a lab course once a week this summer, for students interested in science.

Several members of the Mustang coaching staff are attending a special school this week at Dallas.

A new home economics instructor, Mrs. E. J. McKnight, and commercial subjects teacher, David Howton, attended a Houston teachers training conference.

Director of summer homemaking classes, Mrs. H. B. Maxey Jr., also has taught in high school two years.

Besides working in summer courses with her students, Mrs. Maxey makes clothing and experiments with different sewing methods. When she finds better and faster "short-cuts" in the sewing art, she teaches them to her students.

Mrs. Maxey said, "I am always willing to help my students, in or

out of school."

In striving to meet the demands for higher school standards, faculty members are working on a program which will accredit the Olton school system with the Southern Association. Final decision on the accreditation is expected to be announced in the fall.

A teacher for 13 years, Mrs. Joe Harper will begin her third year of teaching in Olton this fall.

She taught in Kyle, Weatherford, Brock, Cranfills Gap, Brownwood and Comanche schools before coming to Olton.

Mrs. Harper has been nominated for the state teacher of the year award.

There have only been three summers in her teaching career that she hasn't worked with students or attended college. Next week, Mrs. Harper will begin work with annual staff members to plan next year's annual.

In August, she will accompany several students to the West Texas High School Press Association at Texas Tech.

She feels the spirit of democracy and patriotism should be instilled in the minds of each young person by his teachers.

Since the United States has been challenged so severely by other nations for her world leadership, the public spotlight has been thrown even more so upon the school teacher, who is expected to teach American youth to out-think, out-accomplish and out-shine any opposing force which might dull the American light of superiority in the eyes of the world.

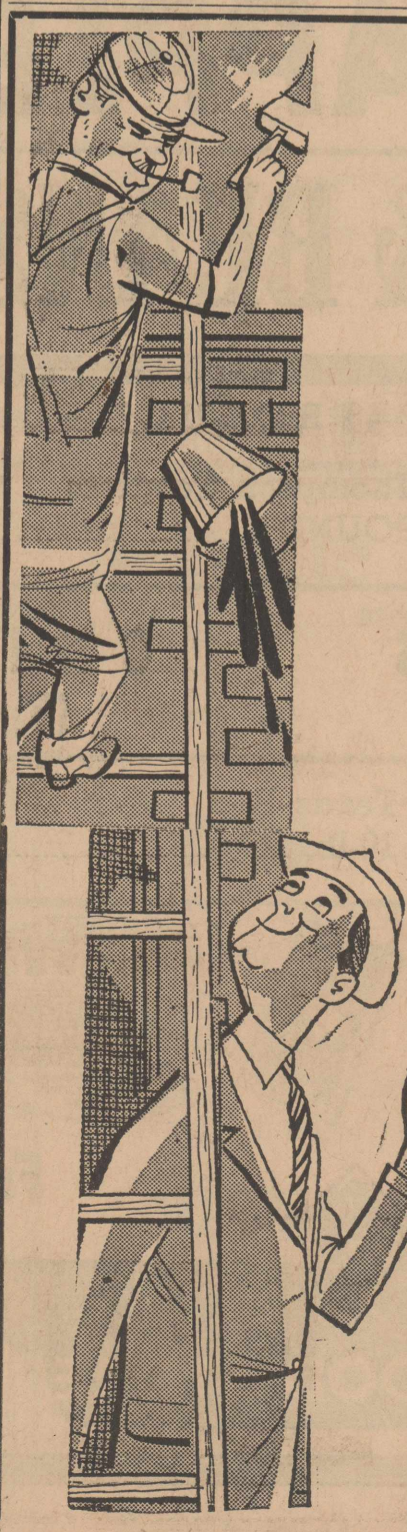

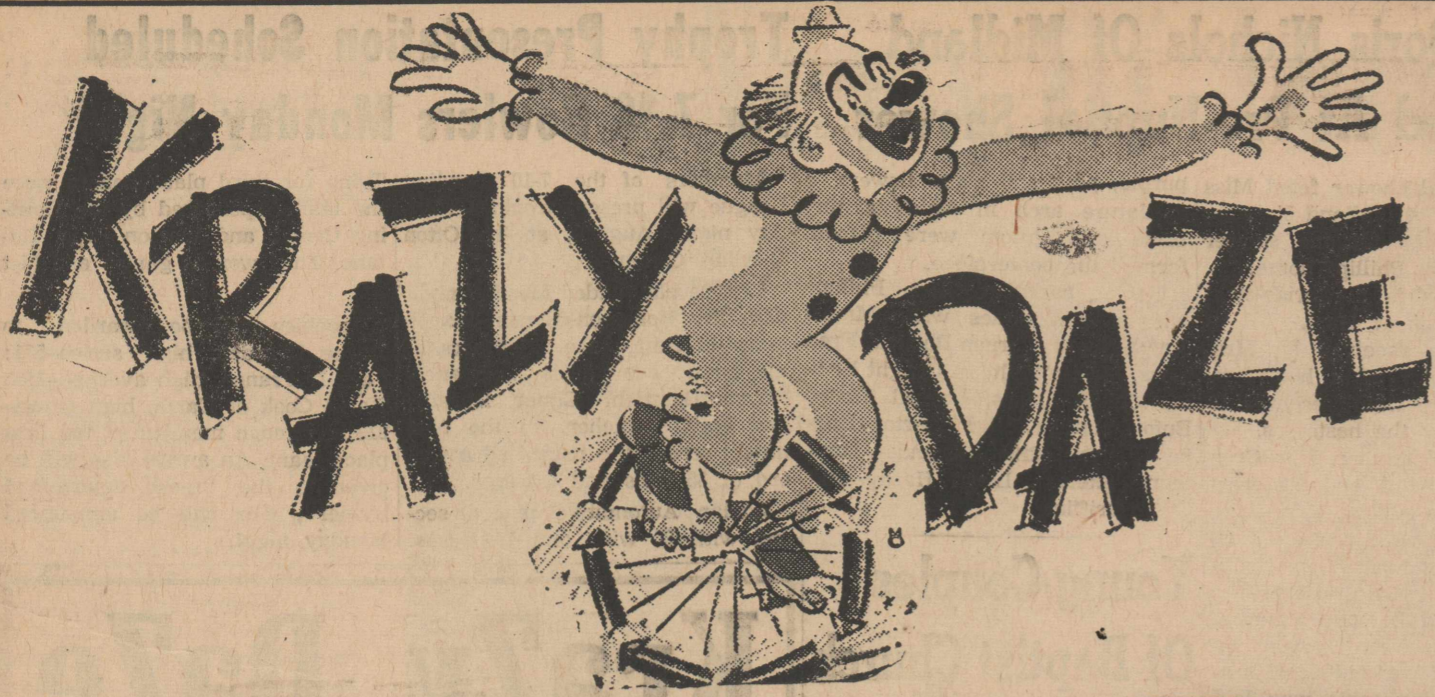

Bumper Vegetable Crop Pours Into Local Sheds

Paul Burrus reported an average of 6000 pounds a week from his cuke crop.

The corn shed operated by Clovis Poteet recently shipped 600 bags of corn to Lubbock in one day.

Prices have been averaging about \$2 per sack.

Harley Miller, local farmer, said his corn produced about 240 sacks per acre.

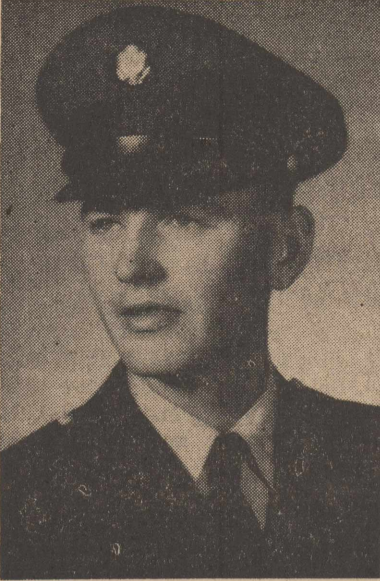
Potato and onion harvests are expected to end next week.

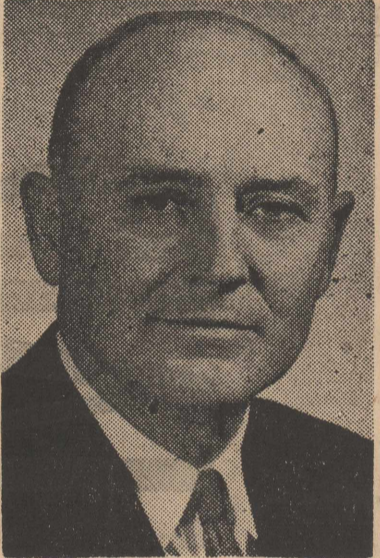

Deep Plowing Will Reduce Cotton Root Rot

Drying out the soil for 2 weeks or more after deep plowing can reduce cotton root rot to as low as two per cent or less the following year, according to Dr. Harlan E. Smith, extension plant pathologist.

Deep plow 10 to 14 inches or more. It is best to use a mold board or disc type plow. Bedding and listing are ineffective. Plow

in the summer if possible. If not, plow as soon in the fall as possible, advises Smith.

Drying out the soil helps reduce the root rot by lowering the number of fungus seed bodies or sclerotia in the soil. It also kills old cotton roots and roots of susceptible weeds on which the fungus lives over-winter. The fungus has been found at depths of 8 feet; however, most of it is concentrated in the top 12 to 20 inches of the soil.

Deep plowing is most effective if no rain occurs for at least 2 weeks after plowing.

Check the long range weather forecast. Try to select a time when dry weather is expected. Do not

irrigate after plowing for at least two weeks to allow soil to dry.

A combination of practices carried on for a number of years is necessary for best results. Local county agents can supply additional information on recommended cotton root rot control practices, Smith says.

Texas Voters Will Ballot On Constitution Changes

Texas voters should look to the month of November 1960, as another time of decision, for it is in this month that the General Election will be held. At this time a new president will be elected. His running-mate, the vice president, on the Democratic ticket will be a Texan. All other elective offices, both national and state, likewise will be voted upon. There will be much pre-election campaigning and ballyhoo by both Democratic and Republican candidates. And, because of publicity in the newspapers, and on radio and TV, interested voters will be afforded ample opportunity to study the various candidates and their respective platforms.

At the same time Texans will again be called upon to amend their Constitution, but the four propositions which will be submitted for approval or rejection are not likely to attract as much attention as the candidates.

Nevertheless, these amendments should be carefully studied by every voter, because each involves matters of finance even though the specific subject matter of the amendments is unrelated. The amendments will be headed as follows:

"Proposed Constitutional Amendment to be Voted on at an Election to be held on Nov. 8, 1960."

A brief digest of the four proposed constitutional amendments follows:

NUMBER ONE (HJR 39)—Authorizes the Legislature to create hospital districts co-extensive with Lamar County, Hidalgo County, and County Commissioners Precinct No. 4 of Comanche County, and sets forth certain powers, duties and limitations.

NUMBER TWO (SJR 6)—Increases the maximum permissible interest rate on bonds hereafter issued by the Veterans' Land Board to three and one-half per cent.

NUMBER THREE (HJR 3)—This bill is what is known as the "Annual Salary Bill" for legislators. It provides for an annual salary of not to exceed \$4,800 for each legislator, and a per diem allowance of not to exceed \$12 a day for the first 120 days of each regular session and for 30 days of each special session as maximum compensation for members of the Legislature. Also it limits the regular session to 140 days.

NUMBER FOUR (HJR 6)—Authorizes the Legislature to classify loans and lenders, define interest, and provide for a maximum rate of interest of ten per cent per annum in the absence of legislation setting maximum rates of interest; provides that the rate of interest shall not exceed six per cent per annum in contracts where no interest rate is agreed upon; provides for the right of appeal and trial de novo in the event of cancellation of or refusal to grant any permit.

SAFETY EXPERT URGES CARE ON COOKOUTS

Nothing smells better on a soft summer evening than a steak or chicken cooking over a charcoal fire. A burning house or a burned hand adds nothing to the pleasure derived from a cookout, however.

A few precautions will help keep accidents from marring an otherwise pleasant occasion.

One of the first safety measures to take is to set up your grill or dig the barbecue pit in an open place, well away from buildings, trees, dry leaves, grass or brush.

If you use a charcoal-lighting fluid, be sure to use it according to directions. Soak a little into the briquets, before starting the fire. Never use gasoline, paint thinner or any other highly combustible fluid to kindle charcoal.

As a final suggestion, a pail of water should be kept handy so that you can douse the fire in an emergency or when leaving the picnic site.

When you have taken these precautions, sit back, relax, and enjoy that wonderful aroma of charcoal cookery.

Bowling Champ To Appear At Local Lanes August 11

One of the nation's top bowlers, TV bowling champion Billy Welu, will be at Olton Bowling Center next Thursday, Aug. 11.

He is scheduled for an all-day exhibition at the center. In addition, he will offer free bowling instruction to the youngsters at 4 p.m.

Welu, who won the coveted BPAA All-Star individual match game championship at Buffalo, N.Y., in 1959, is a member of the Bowling Promotion Staff of American Machine & Foundry Company.

Welu, a native of Houston, but now residing in St. Louis, led by only 9 Peterson points entering the

final game, and as a nationwide TV audience watched, rallied from two early splits to string five strikes and secure his first All-Star crown. He won 26 of his final 43 All-Star games by striking out in the final frames.

Earlier in the 1958-59 campaign, Welu annexed the First Annual Invitational TV Singles Championship at the storied Faetz-Niesen Bowl in Chicago. In a field of 60 hand-picked stars of top-notch caliber, Welu emerged the victor, averaging 232 for the tourney.

Welu also owns an outstanding ABC Tournament record. Through

the 1959 tournament, Big Bill (he stands six four and one-half) was the leader in the four-year bracket with 213 (he also holds the all-time four-year mark of 231-35) and, for the past five years, leads with 212-41 average.

In addition to his achievements as an individual bowler, Welu helped spark his team, the Falstaffs of St. Louis, to the unprecedented "grand slam" of team championships during the 1957-58 season. They won the ABC Team Championship for 1958, setting an all-time all-events record enroute, plus the BPAA All-Star Team Eliminations and National Team Match Game crown for 1957-58. He carried a 219 average with the Falstaffs in the traditionally rugged St. Louis Masters League for the 1957-58 season.

He was a member of the famed Budweiser squad of St. Louis, when they took the 1955-56 BPAA Team title. He has been named to Mort Luby's Bowlers Journal All-American first teams for the 1955-56, 1957-58 and 1958-59 seasons. Bowling Magazine also placed him on their 1958-59 All-American squad.

The 27-year old Texan, who has won every major bowling tournament in the Southwest, first came to national prominence during the 1953-54 season when he won the ABC Doubles title in Seattle, teaming with Don McClaren.

He is one of the youngest bowlers ever to compete in the All-Star. In December 1951, when he was eighteen, he took part in the twelfth edition of the tournament, a victory in the Texas All-Star Eliminations earning him the qualifying spot.

On four occasions Welu was a member of teams that copped Texas State Championships; twice he was a member of Southwest championship teams.

A graduate of Houston's University of St. Thomas, class of '54, he holds a BA degree in Psychology. Aside from his talents as a bowler, he's shown professional ability in announcing and emcee work in both television and radio. His lecture work in connection with bowling exhibitions and clinics, and his interview spots in TV and radio have been received with high praise.

An injury to his right hand some years ago forced Billy to develop a bowling grip all his own. The middle finger hole of his bowling ball is drilled for a fingertip grip while the ring finger is drilled semi-fingertip. The holes are drilled very close to each other with almost no bridge and Welu's middle finger (the longer one) overlaps the ring finger (shorter) so that the two fingers are virtually employed as one big finger. This type grip allows Billy to obtain additional lift on the ball with a minimum of exertion.

A spot bowler, Welu has cut the size of his hook down considerably in the last couple of years. He now rolls his powerful ball on a "tighter line" that approaches the pins with a small, sharp breaking hook.

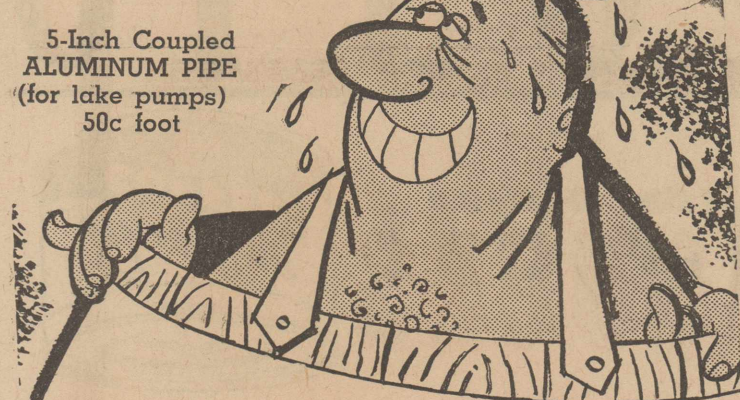

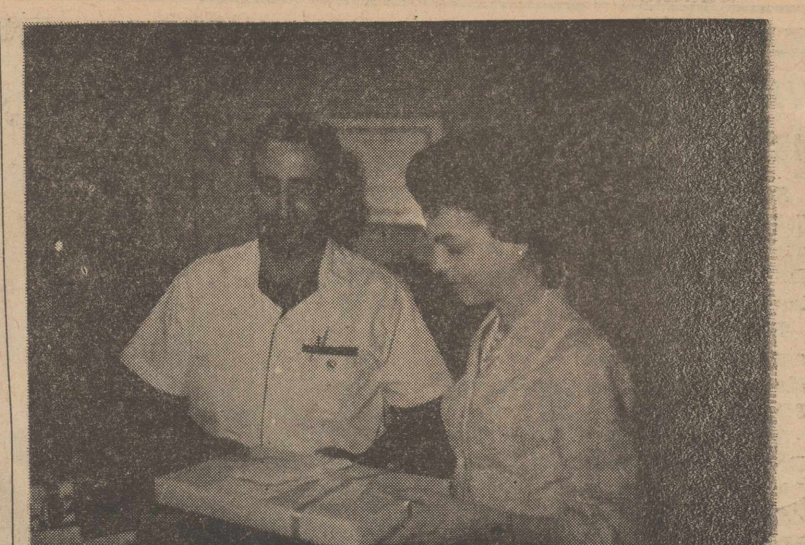
