## School Opening Near; Grid Drills Will Start

### Olton Admitted To WT Council

With the first gong of the teacher's bell only two weeks from Monday, activities began to bustle this week as Olton school officials made preparations for the new school year.

These were the developments:  
1. Olton Public Schools were admitted to the West Texas School Study Council, an organization of "forward-looking" school systems in this part of Texas.

2. Four teachers are needed to fill posts here following resignations of Morrison Asman, junior high principal, and Carl Moore, junior high coach.

3. Practice sessions for Olton Mustang footballers will begin Monday at 8 a.m. Drills already are under way for band students and preparations have started on other phases of the new school session.

#### Research Organization

Olton and Shallowater schools were the latest to be added to the West Texas School Study Council, an organization which has a slogan of "Better School Programs Through Research."

The 22-member council includes such other schools as Andrews, Littlefield, Plainview, Denver City, Kermit, Lamesa, Levelland, Slaton, Post and others.

Resignation of Asman and Moore came this week after the two accepted positions at other schools. Asman will become high school principal at Los Fresnos, Texas, and Moore will be a freshman football coach at Brownfield. Both men had served here one year.

#### Replacements Named

Superintendent Joe Harper announced Wednesday that E. J. McKnight, employed this summer as a junior high teacher, will replace Asman. McKnight was junior high principal at Stinnett six years.

Pat Blessing, a new teacher who did his practice teaching here two years ago, will move into Moore's spot as junior high coach, Harper said.

Teachers now needed by the school system include one for senior English, two in junior high and a first grade teacher.

### 1st Beans In; Cuke Pace Up

The Olton area's first load of beans came in and cucumber production soared as the harvest ran full speed ahead this week.

First beans were delivered to Sanders-Paris Co. Wednesday afternoon.

Lonnie Smith, the grower, was paid \$6.50 net per hundred for the No. 1 beans. The company also paid a 50 cents per hundred bonus for the first load.

Brown-Miller Co. and Dalton's, cucumber processors, reported improved yields and increased processing this week.

Clovis Poteet, receiving station agent for Brown-Miller, said the company shipped 424,000 pounds of cukes Monday, 448,000 pounds Tuesday and 433,000 Wednesday.

He reported a slight increase in prices and said grades have been "very good." About 28 farmers with a total of 461 acres are under contract with Brown-Miller, a Texarkana firm.

Earl Ray of Dalton's said prices have been high and grades fair at the Dalton grader. He reported "excellent" yields off 166 acres under contract with his firm. Fifteen farmers have contracted with Dalton's.

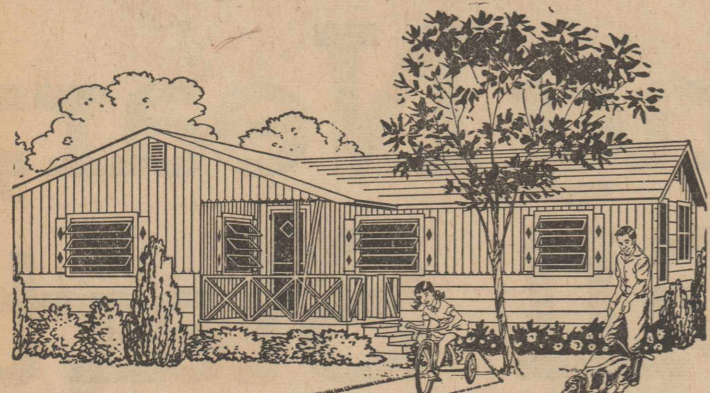

### Later Than You Think

#### Mothers, Get Birth Certificates Ready Now For New First Graders

Attention parents: It's later than you think.

This comes from W. D. Carroll, state registrar, whose vital statistics staff at the Texas State Department of Health is responsible for handling the flood of requests for birth certificates for children entering school for the first time this September.

Carroll's problem is this: There is a tendency among parents to put off requesting copies of their youngsters' birth records until the last moment. When too many parents delay in this manner, the results are obvious: a work overload.

The condition does not result from any lack of effort on the part of Carroll's staff. "Our limited Vital Statistics Division staff—despite long hours of night and week-end work—can process just so many requests before school begins," he explains.

More than 262,000 children are expected to enter elementary schools of Texas for the first time this fall. The estimate is based on calculations made by the Texas Education Agency.

A good many parents—some of whom may have waited too long in past years—have already requested and received birth records on this year's new scholars, but tens of thousands of additional records will have to be processed between now and the time that first school bell rings in September.

More than one youngster has been forced to postpone his first days at school simply because his parents couldn't produce proof of his age when it came time to register him.

Carroll's advice to parents: "Send in your request today to the local registrar, county clerk, or the State Department of Health."

All you have to do is give the child's name, date and place of birth, the mother's maiden name, and the name of the father. This information, with the legal fee of one dollar, should be addressed to your local registrar, the county clerk, or to the State Department of Health, Section on Records and Statistics, 410 East 5th Street, Austin, Texas.

Something else: Be prepared to show school officials a record of "shots" your youngster has had. Depending on local school board

regulations, proof of immunizations against smallpox, whooping cough, diphtheria, and other diseases may be required.

#### \$7,000 Research Grant Is Given To Halfway Farm

LUBBOCK — W. O. Fortenberry, president of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., today announced the distribution of \$25,000 in agricultural research grants to the Lubbock and Spur Agricultural Experiment Stations and the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway Farm in Hale County.

An additional \$20,000 has been approved by the PCG Board of Directors and will be utilized at the pilot spinning plant at Texas Tech College later this fall, Fortenberry said.

At the High Plains Research Foundation, a grant of \$7,000 will be used in fertilizer projects on hard land soils in connection with cotton. At the Spur location, a grant of \$2,500 is at work on dryland water conservation projects for cotton production and at the Lubbock station, a \$10,000 grant is to be used for cotton breeding and mechanical stripper harvesting and another \$5,000 grant is used on cotton fertilization on mixed and sandylands. Part of the sandyland project is done in Terry County.

Fortenberry, in commenting on the grants, said: "It's wonderful that farmers themselves can make this money available for research work on problems that hamper our cotton production on the Plains. The PCG Board and membership are very proud of these grants and believe it is one of the ways to discover some of the answers to our cotton production and marketing problems."

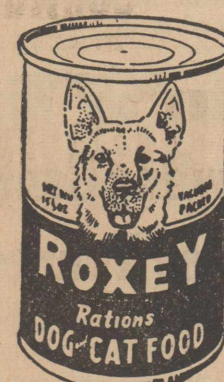

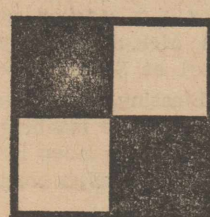

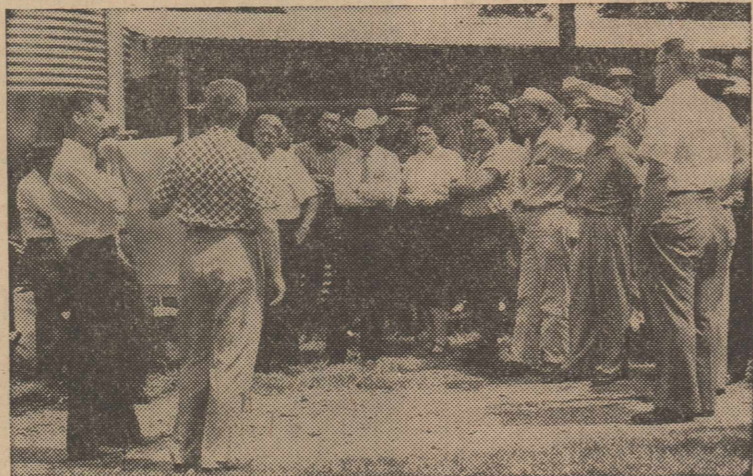

# Social Security Benefits Go To 1,242 In County

Sunday is the 25th Anniversary of the Social Security Act. Just 25 years ago, Congress enacted the law which has since been amended and broadened several times. At the end of 1959, as Federal social security was starting its 25th year, old-age, survivors, and

disability insurance monthly benefits were being paid in Lamb County to 1242 persons at the rate of \$63,736 a month, according to John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock Social Security District Office.

"This is an increase in number of beneficiaries of about 16 per cent since February 1959, the last previous date for which Lamb County figures are available," he said.

Nationally, about thirteen and three-fourths million persons were receiving old-age, survivors, and disability insurance monthly benefits at the end of 1959 at an annual rate of more than \$10 billion. At the close of 1940—the first year in which monthly benefits were payable—beneficiaries throughout the Nation totaled 200,000. Almost half a million disabled-worker beneficiaries and their dependents receiving benefits at a yearly rate of over \$400 million are included in the figures for 1959.

The number of wives, husbands and children of disabled-worker beneficiaries receiving monthly benefits increased sharply in 1959. Such benefits were first payable for September, 1958. Nationally, from February to December, 1959, the number of these beneficiaries more than doubled—from 60,000 to 126,000.

Payments to a retired worker with no dependents receiving benefits averaged \$69 a month nationally at the end of last December; to a retired couple, both of whom were receiving benefits, the average payment was \$121. The average for a widow with two young children was \$169.

By contrast, Mr. Hutton recalled that when benefits first became payable in 1940, the average monthly payment to a retired worker with no dependents receiving benefits was \$22, and to a retired couple the average payment was \$36.

As social security celebrates its Silver Anniversary (the original Act was signed into law on August 14, 1935) about 74 million working people are in covered employment or self-employment in the course of a year. They are building old-age, survivors, and disability protection for themselves, their dependents, and their survivors under the social security law.

For the entire State of Texas, old-age, survivors, and disability insurance payments at the end of December, 1959, were being paid to 540,833 beneficiaries at the rate of more than \$350,000,000 per year.

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security Office will be in Olton next Wednesday in the City Hall at 9 a.m. to assist in all matters pertaining to social security.

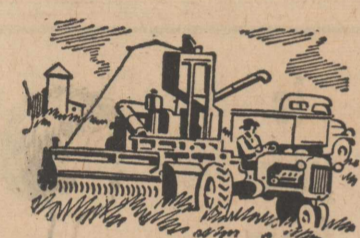
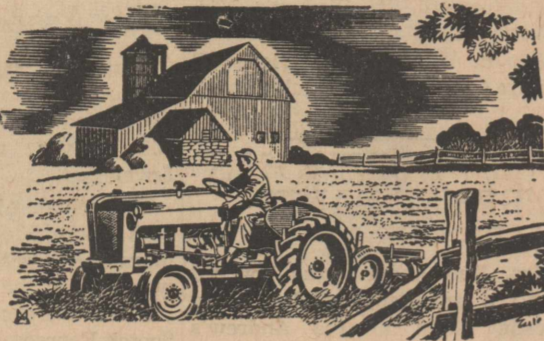

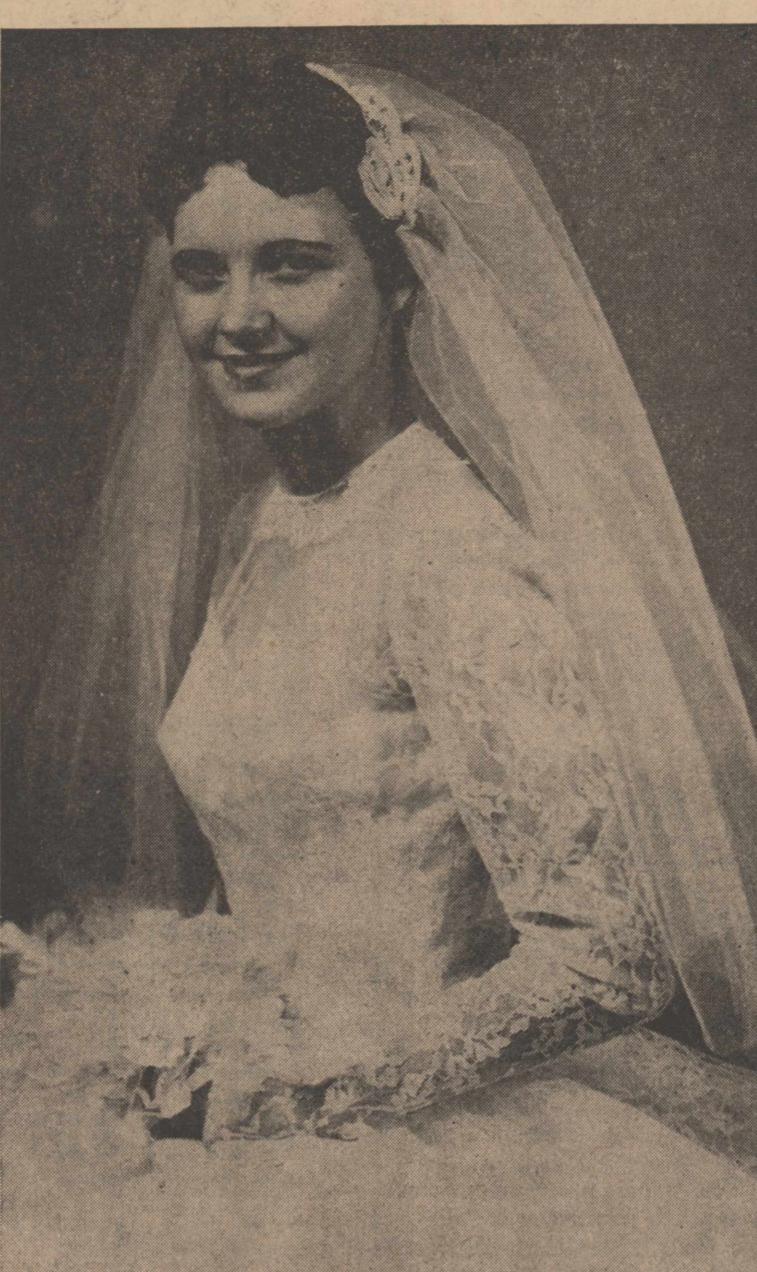

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## Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

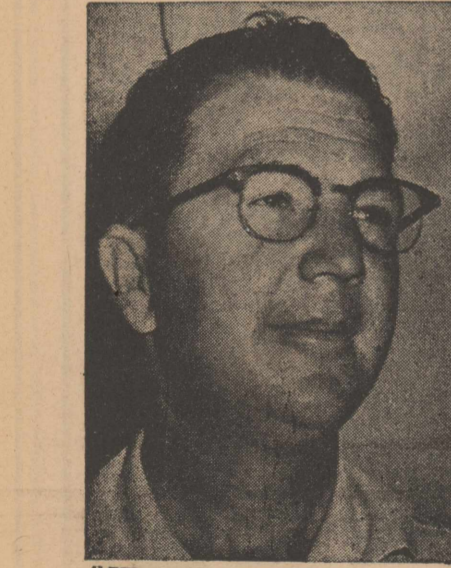
Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1960, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum."

"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a provision authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue the bonds authorized under such Section to bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed three and one-half percent (3-1/2%) per annum."

"If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the valid cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date set forth in said Amendment, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith."

"Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the state."

# 175,000-Bale Cotton Crop Forecast For Lamb County

First estimate of the 1960 cotton crop by the Plains Cotton Growers lists a forecast of 175,000 bales for Lamb County.

Over the South Plains, the 1960-61 estimated crop for the 23 members of the PCG was announced at 1,899,000 bales.

If produced, such a crop would be the second largest crop in history ever harvested off the High Plains, being topped only by the more than two million bales harvested in 1958. Production this past year, 1959-60 was 1,869,353 bales.

The estimated production total of 1,899,000 bales is expected off total 23-county allotments this year of 2,263,395 acres and standing acreage as of Aug. 1, totals approximately 2,175,000 acres.

Condition of the cotton crop as of Aug. 1 was given as good to excellent.

Hot, dry summer weather during July enabled the crop to do some "catching up" and most agricultural observers see the crop as perhaps somewhat late this year, but still in good shape. Some dry-land cotton is reported to be in the best condition in the past 10 to 20 years.

One more shower or rain in late August will insure a good production. Irrigated cotton is again being watered in some areas. Thus far insects have not been too much of a problem. Control measures have kept the situation in check.

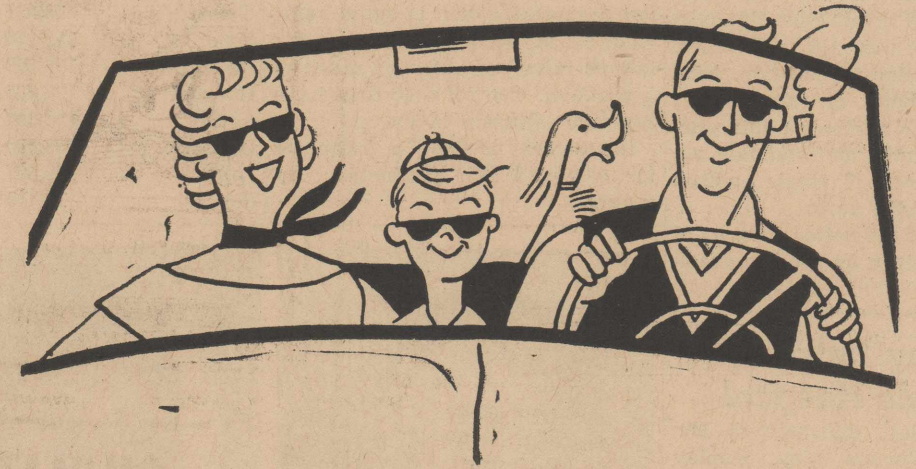
## Funeral Services Are Conducted For C. K. Keenom, Shooting Victim

Funeral services for a former Hart resident, Clarence Levi Keenom, 34, who died of a gunshot wound last Thursday at his home near Nazareth, were conducted Saturday afternoon. Rites were held in the First Baptist Church of Hart, with the Rev. Denzel Leonard, pastor, and the Rev. Lee Crouch, pastor of Hart Methodist Church, officiating. The Hart American Legion Post conducted military graveside rites at burial in a Hart cemetery. He was a member of Legion Post 311 of Hart. Keenom was shot and killed early last Thursday afternoon at his home, Beverly Ann Pelletier of Pauls Valley, Okla., his 18-year-old stepdaughter, was charged with malice aforethought in connection with the slaying. Mrs. Pelletier, a divorcee and daughter of Mrs. Keenom by a former marriage, is the mother of an infant son. She was released from Castro County Jail last Friday morning on \$1,500 bond. Keenom, transport driver for a fertilizer and butane firm, was killed instantly by a single shot from a .22 caliber rifle as he stood in the front door of the family home. Witnesses said he and Mrs. Keenom had argued and "scuffled" in the family auto in front of the house minutes before the shooting occurred. Keenom and his family had lived at Hart about five years before moving to Nazareth a few months ago. He was born Dec. 10, 1925, in Montgomery County, Ark. He served with the Army in World War II. Survivors include the wife, Bessie; three children, Lavern Jean, Donna Lynn and Clarence Don, all of the home; four children by a previous marriage, Bobby, Glen

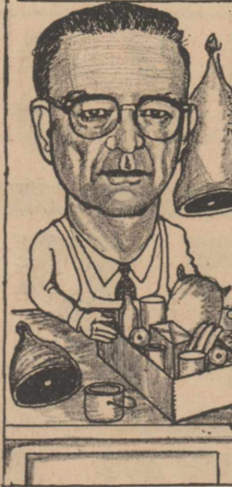

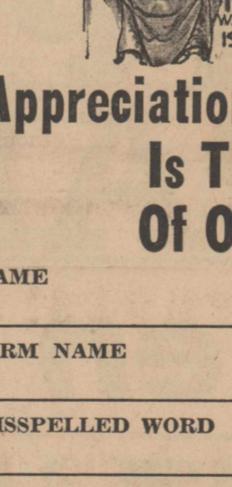

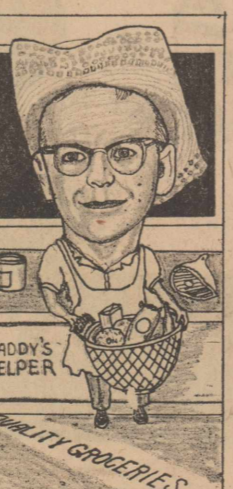
